They spent about 2 hours interviewing Cloie Morgan and Donna Toombs and getting detailed shots and close-ups of Cloie’s quilt, “Arkansas Favorites” and a new Modern style quilt made by Riley Middaugh. Then their cameras captured Cloie doing hand quilting, followed by VERY close-up views of cutting, pressing and piecing being done by Donna, Riley, Debbie Spinks and Mary Jane Beard.

The team will also attend our “Airing of the Quilts” in Scott on May 9th to complete gathering the material regarding quilting that they need to produce the show. But, don’t be expecting to view their final product anytime soon – the episode will air February 13, 2017.

**MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING**  
**11 APRIL, 2016**

Meeting was called to order at 6:31 pm by President Alina Polta.

**Minutes:** No corrections or additions to minutes were offered. A move was made by Susie Olson, and seconded by Mary Jane Beard to approve the minutes as written. The vote was passed.

**Treasurer's Report:** Copies of the report were made available to all members present. Treasurer Kim Lotz reviewed the report.

### COMMITTEE REPORTS

**AWOL:** Leah Sample reported that the March AWOL made a profit of \$16.18 with approximately 27 people attending. The next AWOL is scheduled for November 4, 5, and 6, 2016 and registration will begin in a couple of months.

**Challenges:** The 2016 Challenge is for two or more people to make the same pattern using different material (remember that size matters!) or for two or more people to use the same fabrics but in different patterns. There will be prizes offered for all who participate.

**Community Service:** Alicia Bell, Chair, stated that she has purchased additional fabric and now has 31 kits available. Currently there are 9 quilts finished. Eddie Landreth and Leah Sample volunteered to provide the quilting and Judy Stewart agreed to assist with binding the quilts. Ms. Bell is hoping to receive a minimum of 40 quilts for the CALL. She stated that she will bring kits and batting to the Sit and Sew held at South West Baptist Hospital between 8am and 5pm on Saturday.

**Demo/Vendors:** Donna Toombs, Chair. Betty Bradford generously demonstrated bias binding before the meeting.

**Fundraising:** Boneta Hollis, Chair, reported: Name Tags: There are now 13 name tags ready to distribute per previously placed orders. The tag is white, has a magnetic backing, and has a brightly colored AQG emblem on the top. The cost to have them made is \$9.71 (tax included). They will be for sale for \$12 each. Ms. Hollis has placed her first order for the T-shirts with the saying "Quilters Always Press to the Dark Side". Ms. Schaap announced that the French Seam bought 12 copies of the AQG cookbooks at \$7 each. Mary Jane Beard asked if there were replacement straws available for the drinking cups sold last year. The answer was that none are available.

**Hostess:** Tonight there were 56 members present with the added pleasure of one guest. The winner of the fabric exchange was Sammie Harrell. Door prize winners were Sherri Webb, Kim Lotz, Jan Partain, and Liz Ketcherside. The fabric exchange for May will be a four matching blocks using the 4 patch pattern and they are each to measure 6 ½ inches. Members were reminded to check the 'freebies' table and that there would not be a 'freebies' table at Scott next month. However, there will be a table for guests and members to provide registration information upon their arrival. Information about Knots will be published soon.

**Membership:** Mary Jane Beard, Chair. There are now 106 paid members for 2016. (The goal remains to have 160 paid members). She reminded everyone that members receive a pin for bringing a guest and are given

a special charm for that pin if the guest becomes a member of AQG.

**Newsletter:** Jackie Bibbs, Chair, shared that members are able to have 'links' listed with their names on the membership list and asked if there were any additional members who would like to have their sponsored link included on this list.

**Newsletter Ads & PR:** Ms. Polta stated that the Chair for the Ads/PR position is open and she would really appreciate it if someone would volunteer for this position.

**Programs & Workshops:** Lavern Schaap, Co-Chair, distributed a program guide that had been completed for all of 2016 as well some months during 2017. She also provided the following:

**April Workday:** Ms. Schaap contacted Mr. Cerino regarding clarification of the topics he would like to have included in his special on "Follow the Cotton". She arranged for presentations today on various aspects of the process of quilting. She stated that the television crew was present this morning and the tape will be aired on February 13, 2017.

**May's "Airing of the Quilts/Ice Cream Social":** Ms. Schaap designed flyers and postcards to advertise the event. Ms. Schaap arranged for the endless list of necessities required; such as tables, chairs, a PA system, 'welcome' posters, plastic sheeting to protect quilts displayed on the fences, etc. Visitors will be provided a sheet providing information about the history of "Airing of Quilts" and some data about each of the quilts on display. Sponsors are requested to provide a minimum of \$25 each. She provided a list of the different ice cream sundae toppings that AQG members are to bring to this event according to the letter of their last name. There was some discussion regarding posting information regarding transportation to/from Scott for those who would like assistance.

During June's meeting Aileen Anderson will present a workshop on wool and other fabrics on a linen background for the price of \$40. All supplies required will be included in kits that she has available for an additional \$30.

July's meeting will start with a showing of UFO's and each will have a required minimum bid. This will be followed during the same meeting by the presenting of a yard sale.

August will include a day workshop by Meg Cullum with the topic to be announced at a later date.

September. Members are requested to share at this meeting any photographs they might have of major quilt shows that they have attended.

**Property:** No Chair. Lavern Schaap stated that her husband has agreed to evaluate the condition of the eight quilt racks that Shelia Simpson had kept in storage for the Guild.

**Quilt Arkansas 2017:** Angie Heifner, Chair, provided a definition of Quilt Arkansas and what activities typically occur at this event. She did an informal survey of members present regarding attendance at Quilt Arkansas and roughly 11 members have never attended; 10 have gone to one; 7 have gone twice; and 2 have gone ten or more times. When asked

about their favorite activity at Quilt Arkansas, members shared that attending classes was clearly the favorite. When then asked for their favorite class, 50% of the members present tonight stated machine quilting, with the next favorite topic being a mystery quilt class. She was thrilled to announce that all the offices are filled now since Ms. Riley Middaugh volunteered to be the new treasurer. Members were given a reminder that Quilt Arkansas will be September 7, 8, & 9, 2017. The next planning session will be April 28 and all are welcome to attend. Angie has made arrangement for two teachers for Quilt Arkansas, although no contract has been signed at this time: Catherine Redford: topics to include machine quilting. Nova Montgomery: maintenance of Featherweight sewing machines.

**Quilt Show/Exhibit:** This will be held at the Terry Library during October and November. Mary Jane Beard reminded all that there is a size limit – if the quilt is long, then a sleeve is to be placed at the 76 inch line. An application to hang your quilt is required and it is “first come, first hung”. Last year Francis Wade made special ribbons for the awards, such as the People’s Choice Award. It is hoped that she can be induced to do so again this year.

**Sunshine:** No report.

**Website:** The website is due for renewal fee of \$131 for a new 2 year contract.

## OLD BUSINESS

The Chairs for the Quilt Challenge during 2015 were not present. However – UFO: Judy Pearlstein “finished something I did not like then and not sure about now”. Journey: Jan Partain with the “Road Trip to Bentonville” as it also included an experiment with having all four sides of different lengths. Branch Out. Mary Jane Beard presented her Witch she made for the Wizard of Oz Challenge as it was new for her to use ‘lick and stick’. Judy Pearlstein completed a miniature quilt. Debbie Spinks attended a class on thread painting; did a hand quilting class; and also, using the information presented during the class on EQ7 she attended, showed everyone patterns she developed for 5 squares done in red and white.

## NEW BUSINESS

Ms. Schaap provided all Board members present with a handout about the Mount Holly Cemetery Association. It has offered to purchase the fabric and materials to create a quilt provided that AQG would make the quilt that they would then use as their fund raiser during 2017. Ms. Schaap stated that she has already begun thinking about designs for this quilt. The Board members discussed and believe it would be an excellent public outreach/community service project and voted to bring this to the April AQG meeting.

Jan Partain shared that she is in need of someone to quilt a T-shirt quilt that had been brought to her.

Jim Gatling announced that he is retiring after 41 years of teaching.

Phillis Westerfield is hoping to locate a 1972 pattern for a 3-D stuffed chicken called the “Ozark Chicken”.

Alina Polta reminded all that Dave’s Retreats is sponsoring a quilting retreat at Heifer International at the end of this month.

## SHOW AND TELL

Jan Partain displayed “Road Trip!”, a quilt to memorialize the trip that she and ‘a bunch of friends’ made to Bentonville last year. She included a lot of really amusing anecdotes.

Susi Olson made her own Baltimore Album quilt using an autumn theme and named it “Baltimore Autumn”. She shared that it required two years to complete and was quilted by Alina Polta.

Pamela Davis created “Block Party” by using the block of the month patterns provided by Ritzy Rags in Mountain View. She started it in 2013 and finished her black, rust, and sage colored quilt in 2016.

Mei Travis shared with all a quilt that her great-grandmother hand pieced and then quilted and bound using a treadle sewing machine! The pretty bright colored pastel quilt was made using old clothing. The “1932 Flower Garden” was passed down to Mei and she especially loves that it is so brand new that it still smells like her grandma’s house! This was Mei’s first time to have a ‘show and tell’.

Judy Pearlstein made “Nancy’s Quilt” for her daughter using Batik scraps of brown, gold, and orange. She was proud that she only had to purchase the border fabric.

Beverly A. Pullings stated that her step-son and his wife purchased a new house and that she made a quilt for each of their 5 (five!) children. Beverly stated she felt it was time to make a quilt for the parents and the result was a king sized “French Country” quilt made in gold, blue, and other colors.

Beverly Phillips showed “Bed of Roses”, one of two identical quilts made for sisters that her cousin had fostered and had now adopted. Beverly was thrilled to put their NEW initials on their quilt. Leah did the quilting.

Liz Ketcherside made a special “Puppy Dog Tails” quilt for a friend who became a first time dad at the age of 40! The dog bone pattern was adorable. Leah did the quilting.

Liz Ketcherside also showed everyone a very patriotic quilt that included the Pledge of Allegiance that she made for her youngest nephew’s graduation that she is calling “Let Freedom Ring”. In addition, she also made matching pillowcases. Leah continued the patriotic theme by employing flying eagles in her quilting.

Linda Coburn brought her first quilt to show at AQG: “Feathers are Wild”. This quilt was made using very old charm pack that was purchased for an embroidery project. When she started it she didn’t like the pale pastel material. However, she stated that now, years later, she found fabrics to match and created a shabby chic quilt in the “X and O” patterns. She was especially proud of the back of her quilt.

Susan Furr brought a unique, one-of-a-kind quilt she called “My Journeys”. Susan shared that she finds a lot of joy in collecting patches from places that she has visited instead of souvenirs. Therefore, she needed a place to ‘document’ her travels. Thus she developed this quilt that has a large map of the world and another of the United States of America. She placed patches on the countries and states as appropriate and embroidered the year onto places where she was not able to get a patch. She finished by sharing that this quilt will be ‘a work in progress until the day I die’.

Meeting adjourned at 7:28pm.

## APRIL PROGRAM MEET YOUR MEMBERS

Susi Olson's been sewing a long time – since she was nine years old, on an old treadle sewing machine that was kept in her bedroom. By the time she got married, she was skilled enough to make her own wedding dress.

Looking back, she now acknowledges that she had some strange quirks, like her penchant for making matching things, such as the sailor suits she made for herself and her son Eric. She also shared pix of him as a little guy all dressed up in more of her handiwork: a three-piece suit and a velvet Little Lord Fauntleroy outfit. (Don't tell him we saw them – that would mortify any big, macho 44-year old.) Just think what fun Susi could have had if she'd had a daughter! But she was destined to just have grandsons.

In the early 1970s she and her Air Force husband were stationed in Hawaii. She looked regal in a Victorian-style long gown she made in the style the Hawaiian monarch liked. And there was more matching stuff: Hawaiian shirts for her son and grandson (which they wore only once – for that photograph).

The first quilt she attempted was animals painted with Tri-Chem paints – a lumpy start to the masterpieces she later produced. Her quilts are well loved – she considers it the highest compliment to see them worn to a frazzle.

Susi retired in 1999 and started quilting in earnest. In 2001 her family moved to Washington state, where she joined a guild. When she lived in San Diego, she enjoyed visiting Eleanor Burns' shop. San Diego was also special because that's where her son met his wife, our own president, Alina Polta. Finally, Susi had a daughter...and a quilting buddy, one who can long-arm all her quilts to boot!

Susi treated us to 25 of her quilts. Her "repertoire" is extremely versatile, ranging from traditional geometric piecing, to whimsical and elaborate applique, to magnificent paper-pieced, award-winning works. Some of the designers she's followed are Pam Bono, Eleanor Burns, Judy Niemeyer, Carol Doak, McKenna Ryan and Jacqueline de Jonge, whose pattern won her Best of Show at the Arkansas State Fair. She shared an impossibly intricate applique quilt designed by Pearl Pereira, that used hundreds (thousands?) of tiny laser cut pieces.

Several of her quilts told of the many places her family had been stationed: "Home Is Where the Air Force Sends Us," and "Montana on My Mind," a gorgeous Hawaiian plumeria applique, and a bargello featuring the surf and sand of San Diego, as well as one showing that city's Sea World.

Her next ambitious undertaking is Judy Niemeyer's "Prairie Star."

Suzi has documented all her work in a marvelous journal that contains not only photographs of her quilts, but narratives of who received them and memories of the occasions. She certainly inspired us to try new things; she's definitely mastered every technique out there!
