ARKANSAS QUILTERS GUILD MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING 10 APRIL, 2017

The Guild Board meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm by President Alina Polta who then announced a welcome to all the guests who came this evening.

Minutes: One correction was noted in the minutes for March: Danette Devlin stated that her name had been misspelled. Judy Rickard moved to approve the minutes as corrected, Susi Olson seconded the move, and the vote was passed.

Treasure's Report: Treasurer Mary Jane Beard provided the following information.

Leah Sample discussed the conflict with the Sit n Sew for April. It is scheduled for the third Saturday each month but that is Easter weekend this month. The Quilt Show in Heber Springs is scheduled for the fourth Saturday this month. The decision was that there will not be an April Sit N Sew, but rather the April and May sessions will be combined into one session on the first Saturday In May.

Committee Reports

Community Service: Alicia Bell, Chair, reported that eight quilts were donated in March and that five quilts have been donated already during April. This makes a total so far of about 30 quilts for *The Call*. In addition, Bev Phillips donated about 9 pillowcases. Alicia stated that she has batting and kits available but that people can use their own fabric and own patterns. She also reminded everyone that she is planning on having two drawings for a prize using that names of all the members who have donated quilts/pillowcases, quilted, or assisted with preparing the donation.

Membership: Judy Stewart, Chair, proudly shared that two people joined the Guild this evening making a current total of 113 paid members for the year 2017. Final date for payment of dues was March 30th so only those people who paid had their names on the list of current members. If others so desire, they can be fully reinstated once they pay the Guild dues.

Fundraising: **Boneta Hollis, Chair**, stated that she has some quilt batting still available and that, since the sales have been steady, she plans to continue sales of the batting. She also still has some additional 'needle beetles'.

Quilt Arkansas 2017: Angie Heifner, Chair. Riley Middaugh, Treasurer. Angie announced a clarification regarding payment: the cost can be divided up in payments over several months but must be paid in full by the August meeting. Angie laughed about it raining

outside this evening because it might help promote the sales of the umbrellas that she displayed. It is a blue popup and has the Quilt Arkansas logo that Meg Cullum designed printed on it. Angie shared that one of the teachers scheduled for Quilt Arkansas 2017, Raija Salomaa recently won five ribbons at a quilt show!

Programs & Workshops: Cindy Barszczwski and Sue Womack, Co-Chairs. Carol Hart and Pam Brown, Assistants. Ms. Barszczwski gave a reminder that Hickory Hills confirmed that they will present a program during the May meeting. Aileen Anderson's wool in-service will be in June and Violet Medina will be displaying new fabric patterns during the July meeting.

Challenges: Sherri Dodds, Chair, was pleased to tell the Guild that nine appliqued blocks of Sunbonnet Sue and/or Overall Al had been turned in this evening. The winner of the blocks was Kathy Jones. The challenge for May is to create a 12.5 inch block with a floral theme using any style or pattern. The background is to be white so the blocks can be combined more easily. There is also a brand new six month challenge that runs until October! Sherri has individual bags each containing a quilt block of material that is to be used, in its entirety, as part of a project. The block can be cut into smaller sections but must include all the material. There will be prizes for the six month challenge that will be presented and judged by the guild members at the October 2017 meeting.

Quilt Show: Mary Jane Beard and Judy Young, Chairs. Ms. Beard stated that the Terry Library Quilt show will begin on October 12 and the quilts will be taken down on December 12th. There will be a micro quilt challenge. The rules will include that the quilt must be made in a micro scale, a maximum per side of quilt of a 12 inch or less, each block must be two inches or less, and there must be both a two inch hanging sleeve and a label included.

Hostess: Sherry Williams and Heather Danridge, Co-Chairs. Sheri welcomed the four guests who came this evening as well as the 63 members present. She said she was pleased at how easily people have adapted to highlighting their names on the computer print-out and stated that there was no special meaning to the different colors of highlighters provided. She pointed out that there were several printed announcements on the registration table as well as a form for those who would like to join a knot. Sheri thanked the people who have brought in the copious amount of "freebies" available on the table. The fabric exchange for May is to be a 5 inch square in blue. (continued on next page)

The fabric exchange winners this evening were Judy Stewart, Shannon Young, Sharon Weinsinger, and Riley Middaugh. The door prize winners were Danette Devlin, Carol Hurt, and Eddie Landreth.

SHOW AND TELL

Beverly Phillips brought two quilts to share. Her *Tropical Quilt* was made of large brightly colored Kaffe Fassett materials with a turquoise background. Her Valentine runner focused on peach and pink colors.

Lynn Fletcher created *Nick's Birthday* quilt using flannel with a snowball pattern. She stated that Leah Sample quilted it for her.

Marilyn Wheeler shared that she had been collecting Kaffe Fassett material for many years and finally found a quilt pattern to use with only his patterns and fabrics—she even used his fabrics on the back of her quilt!

Renee Zermattern's daughter has been diagnosed with severe anxiety issues and her therapist recommended a therapy quilt. That type of quilt is a very heavy quilt composed of individual 'pockets' of polyester beads resulting in a total of 12 pounds of beads sewn into her quilt. This pink and floral quilt looks like it is made up of lots of little puffy biscuits, or squares, where the weights were included. Renee stated that the weighted quilt can be wrapped around the person for added feelings of comfort and security and these quilts are helpful for other issues, such as autism.

Heather Danridge wrote that she likes to do applique and she did machine applique on this quilt pattern by Amy Bradley due to number of flowers it involved. Her quilt was bright and cheerful with a boarder of prairie points of red polka dots.

Sally Martens wanted to make just one block using a 13 ½ inch square to donate for a *Quilt of Valor*. Her block turned out to be 16 inches square so she went ahead and made the entire quilt top of red, white, and blue material. Half the blue material had fireworks printed on it and the border was printed with blue and white stars. Someone is sure to be very pleased with it.

Martha Fewell made a baby quilt for her neighbor's first great-grandchild. The neighbor loves baseball so Martha used red baseball printed material for the binding and the back of *Landon's Sport Quilt*.

Jackie Bibbs used a Moda Layer Cake ad one Charm pack of coral, blue, and red material to make a quilt using the plus sign pattern. Naturally, she has named it *On the Plus Side*! She also shared a *Contrary Wife* patterned quilt that she said was made several years

ago by the Knot she belonged to and was donated. It has an impressive label on the back and the quilt was displayed at the Historic Arkansas Museum for years. One member of the knot bought the quilt and recently returned it back to the Guild along with some other donated material.

Jan Partain brought *Life's a Beach*. She had her friend who really loves being at the beach pick out the colors. Jan planned to make this quilt as a gift for that friend for her June wedding. She did not finish it time for the wedding – but she did get it done in time to make a baby quilt for May. Jan stated that it was quilted by Alina.

SIX MONTH CHALLENGE

Each person gets a quilt block from me and must make something that incorporates that block. It can be a quilt, a bag, a mug-rug, or anything you want to make, as long as you use the block you're given. You must use the whole block, however, you may cut the block up into smaller pieces or even take it apart. You can add as much of your own fabric as you want.

This challenge runs from April through September. At the October meeting, members bring in their creations to be judged. Projects do not have to be finished in order to be judged. Prizes for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place!

APRIL 2017 PROGRAM DONNA LYNN THOMAS

Donna came from Kansas to present an eye-opening program about how to enliven our quilts. She had just conducted workshops on Saturday and Sunday, and class members showed the really beautiful blocks they had made.

She had two life-changing events in 1975: she fell in love twice, with her husband and with quilting. In spite of how her future hubby specialized in annoying her when they first met, she made him a quilt that paid him back, one made with cut-up scraps from her home ec sewing class. The result, with all sorts of 1960s fabric including polyester and denim, was heavy enough to hold him down.

She began her quilting teaching career in 1981 and was writing books by 1987. When her Army husband was stationed in Germany, she taught in a quilt shop there and in guilds throughout the county. She has authored 14 books (including *Small Talk*, a book on miniature quilts which could really come in handy for this year's Terry Library display-case entries.)

Donna said that quilts generally fall into two categories: those with a fixed palette using a limited number of colors; and those with a scrappy palette using a variety of randomly placed fabrics with dark, medium and light values placed with no regard to color. She has combined both palettes through the use of three "fabric recipes."

The **Rainbow Recipe** is the liveliest one, using a range of color families and prints, a block at a time, with each being different, *e.g.*, one in the pink family, another in the green family, another in the blue family, etc. The **Color Family Recipe** provides more control in where colors are placed, but still offers lots of variety in fabric choice. The **Mixed Recipe**, the loosest of the recipes, combines elements of both the others – basically, you can just do whatever you want to do. Highly recommended: Buy her book *Patchwork Palette*, which explains these different approaches.

The advantages of using these recipes are that you don't have to make all your blocks at once and can work on them over time, using a few fabrics rather than having to buy lots of yardage of any particular one. Your pile of blocks can just keeps growing until you have enough for a quilt.

She also advised to vary backgrounds with different prints, not to overmatch colors but combine all shades for interest, and to use leftover pieces in borders (although not every quilt requires a border). We enjoyed her huge trunk show of quilts that demonstrated each approach.

Donna loves using shot cotton, which is made by Pepper Cory and Kaffe Fasset, although her favorite is the one made by Michael Oakshott http://www.pinwheels.com/brands/Oakshott.html. And she recommended Quilters Dream Orient batting.


