The Guild Board meeting was called to order at 6:32 pm by President Alina Polta who started with

Judy Stewart had a "Tell". Last year at the AQG fundraising garage sale, she purchased a weekend at Angie Heifner's lake-house. Twelve members of Judy's family attended and she reported that they had an excellent time. She hopes that others might remember and quickly make similar purchases in the future as she had such a wonderful weekend.

Jim Gatling stated that he finished 30 blocks of a black funeral guilt that he has been working on for 30 years (hope he brings it to show at Guild). He also reported that he has sent 15 quilt tops to be quilted.

Alicia Bell demonstrated a quilt that Sammye Sue Harrill donated for the Community Service, The Call.

Pam Brown brought Gage's Big Boy Bed Quilt. This huge brown, tan, and cream colored guilt was made for a 2 year old who has moved from his rib into a big bed since sometimes one of his parents lays down with him and then falls asleep. His room has a nature theme and this quilt will be perfect for his room as it has a deer in the middle surrounded by feathers (learned in Shannon Young's class).

Sally Martens bought blue and cream colored squares at a Quilt Guild vard sale in Chevenne, Wyoming, for about \$15 for 16 blocks—roughly \$1/block! She put them together into Blue and Yellow China Plates and then Eddie Landreth did the quilting.

Wanda Cockrell stated that she took a class from Donna Robertson on 3 yard guilts and has made 3 guilts from this pattern and all turned out different. Byzantine Door is a

Susi Olson created Entwined for a friend who is legally blind but asked her to make a colorful quilt for him. He found the pattern and let her select the fabrics. This king sized quilt has 30 different fabrics in a bargello design and required her only 3 months to make. Alina Polta did the quilting on it.

Sherry Williams used scrap material in a contemporary quilt of multi colors on a white background. Her quilt is called Prisms.

naturally she changed it to reds and black. She laid out the rows differently that the pattern to create slanted diamonds. Alina Polta provided the quilting.

Judy Pearlstein made a patriotic Log Cabin for her son-inlaw that featured diamonds and circles done in red, white, and blue. This complex pattern required much time to complete but was clearly worth the effort. It was quilted by

Shelia Simpson created Winter Skies using a pattern from Quilty; Winter 2016 page 66, by Tanya Finken. She used primarily fabric from her stash of lavender, purple, black, gray, and white. Committee Reports

Treasure's Report: Treasurer Mary Jane Beard reviewed the data for June and July. July's information: Assets \$41.039.95 Expenses \$55 (a refund for Quilt Arkansas 2017) Income \$641.46

Quilt Show: Mary Jane Beard and Judy Young, Chairs.

Mary Jane spoke about the variety of prizes to be awarded at the show. First, Second, Third place, and a Viewer's Choice are open to the public, however only members can vote for Creativity and Best Use of Color. She requested volunteers to assist with the day of hanging the guilts (no ladder climbing involved) as well as help on the day of taking them back down on December 11. The entry forms are due by the September Guild meeting and she asked that everyone pay attention to the rules, especially the maximum sizes. There will be a drawing for a prize among the entry forms submitted by the final date.



AQG Challenge/BOM

BOM for September - Blocks may be any size as long as it is divisible by two. Four inches, up to 12 inches will work. (4" - 6" - 8" - 10" - 12") The theme is "School" or "Autumn Colors". Make the block size of your choice, using a school theme or autumnal theme. Golds, browns, muted greens, etc., are great color choices. Bring your block(s) to the September meeting to enter for a chance to win all the blocks that are turned in!

The Six Month Challenge projects are due in October. You do NOT have to have finished your project. There will be prizes for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places. Judging will be done by the members present at the October meeting.

Magic Measurements For Rotary cutting

To determine rotary cutting sizes for a variety of shapes, use this Chart. All measurements assume a $\frac{1}{2}$ seam allowance.

- 1) Strips: Cut finished width + ½"
- 2) Square and Rectangle: Cut finished size + 1/2"
- 3) Half-Square Triangle: Cut finished width + 7/8" then sew on either side of diagonal and cut
- 4) Quarter Square Triangle: Cut finished width + 1 ¼"
- 5) 60 degrees Equilateral Triangle: Cut finished height + 3/4"
- 6) Center Isosceles Triangle in a Square: Cut finished width of triangle + 7/8"
- 7) Side Triangle in a Triangle in a Square: Cut finished width + ¾", finished height + 1 ¼" (but must be made in mirror images)

August 2017 Program Notes Apliquick Tools

Jane Bell, co-owner of The Stitchin' Post with Linda Bolby, presented yet another way to applique. She said there are so many ways: raw edge, fusible, turned edge, freezer Apliquick, a turned -edge method developed by Rosa Rojas from Spain. There's a complete tool kit, including two stainless steel tools, micro serrated scissors, a special formulated glue with a longer drying time, tweezers, and stabilizer. One of the tools holds the piece down, while the

The pieces can then be machine stitched, using invisible thread with Superior Bottom Line in the bobbin, with a blanket or narrow zigzag stitch – not a satin stitch. Or they can be hand stitched with a silk or fine cotton 50 weight thread and a #10 or #11 long applique needle that bends to

The Apliquick method improves dexterity and is good for arthritic hands. The micro serrated scissors grip the fabric, improve accuracy and prevent hand fatigue. Because of its longer drying time, the glue allows more working time. Overall, Apliquick increases speed and improves

Jane had several samples, including table runners. She then sold the products with a 20% discount.


