### Arkansas Quilters Guild Meeting Monday, November13, 2017

The Guild Board meeting was called to order at 6:07 pm by Alina Polta.

**Minutes**: Jim Gatling moved to approve the October minutes as published and Leah Sample seconded the motion. The vote was passed to accept.

**Treasure's Report**: Treasurer Mary Jane Beard provided a report regarding October's finances to all members for their review.

Expenses \$480.06 Income \$691.00

During the November Guild Board meeting the 2018 budget was scheduled for discussion and the new members had been encouraged to attend. Treasurer Mary Jane Beard provided an initial budget proposal handout which was discussed and modified before the Board voted to approve. This budget is available on the AGQ website under the Members Only section.

### **Committee Reports**

Challenges: Sherri Dodds, Chair said that there will be no further challenges during 2017. Feedback from the membership is requested regarding possible challenges for 2018. Sherri displayed two items that were left after the Guild meeting last month and stated that, if not claimed, they would become donation items.

Community Service: Alicia Bell, Chair, said that a total of 74 quilts have been donated during 2017. Alicia stated that she will be attaching the special labels to a couple of the completed quilts. She reminded the members that completed quilts are due in December. There will be a drawing for a prize during the December meeting among all those who have donated to *The Call*. Alicia has some batting available.

Membership: Judy Stewart, Chair, shared that Guild dues (\$25/year) are now due and announced that the guild is requesting an extra \$5 per year for printed and mailed copies of the AQG newsletter; the extra charge is not mandatory but would be appreciated if offered. When the dues are paid, each member will be given a card with the password for the guild website as this password will change in January.

Programs & Workshops: Cindy Barszczewski and Sue Womack, Co-Chairs. Carol Hart and Pam Brown, Assistants. Ms. Barszczewski said that during the December Guild Christmas party there will be a play presented, a dime social, and even a pincushion exchange for those who wish to participate. The pincushions are to be wrapped and can be home-made or purchased. The newsletter lists the snacks that members are to bring according to the alphabet (first letter of your last name). There are multiple bookings

scheduled during 2018, to include presentations by Katie Fowler and Judy Bower. Sue shared that Jim Gatling will be presenting a surprise workshop in March—and Jim agreed the topic is still a surprise to him as well!

**Fundraising**: **Boneta Hollis, Chair**, shared that she has some batting available. She stated that she enjoyed working this position but may be moving so a new volunteer for Fundraising Chair is needed.

Quilt Show: Mary Jane Beard and Judy Young, Chairs. Mary Jane informed the Guild that the Terry Library is posting pictures of the quilts, one each day, on their Facebook site. Voting for the Viewers' Choice Awards will make the decision for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> place. The voting for Creativity and for the Best Use of Color are restricted to AQG members only and must be done online and include information about the quilt(s) selected, the name of the guilt maker, and the e-mail address of the person voting. Pictures are posted on the AQG website of all the guilts entered in the show so that members can vote even if they are unable to attend the show in person. Voting starts Tuesday, November 14, and ends on December 1<sup>st</sup>. The show ends December 12<sup>th</sup>. Mary Jane displayed the prize winner's ribbons that were created by Frances Wade. Some of the money for the ribbons and the prize winners' awards came from Sharon Heidingsfelder (Creativity) and Sarah Ziegenbein (Best Use of Color). Alina Polta will be creating the prize ribbons for the miniatures competition. Cloie Morgan presented a class during the show that was well received and she received an applause from the Guild for this.

Mary Jane reminded everyone that there is a sit and sew held in this meeting room every Monday before the Guild meeting.

**AWOL: Leah Sample, Eddie and Melissa Landreth, Chairs.** Spring AWOL is scheduled for March 16, 17, and 18, 2018, at Ferndale. Registration opened last month and payments are acceptable but the final payment is due on March 1<sup>st</sup>. Leah reminded the Guild members that the Sit and Sew is still being held on the South West Campus.

**Sunshine: Pat Crawford, Chair.** Members were asked to please let Pat know if they learn of anyone who might benefit from receiving a card from the Guild.

Hostess: Sherry Williams and Heather Danridge, Co-Chairs. Sherry stated that there were 62 members present this evening as well as two guests: Mina Collins and Carolyn Tyson. There were three winners of the fat quarter fabric exchange. Door prizes were awarded to Eva Harrison, Joan Beard, and Debra Gordon.

Website: Alina Polta, Chair, shared that she is planning

Bibbs and Meg Cullum volunteered to attend a training session with her to learn about working with the website.

**Old business**: No old business items were mentioned.

**New business**: Judy Stewart will be the President of the AQG for 2018. She listed the new Board members as well as stating that she would appreciate it members considered helping by volunteering for the positions that are still to be filled.

### **SHOW and TELL**

**Cynthia Quick** brought two quilts on which she did the long arm quilting-one a panel of horses and the other a churn dash pattern in deep colors.

Sally Martens brought her half clam shell Licorice and Caramel. She wrote that she wanted to try the half clam shell template and worked on this for months and decided to finally get it done. She got really tired of cutting out the half clamshells and sewing them together---never again! She also completed the 6 month paper bag challenge but was unable to show it last month. She put the black and white colored quilt together at the quilting retreat. Her third quilt was Whirligigs. She bought the green and tan colored squares at a quilt yard sale and trimmed them. She then assembled them in to a donation quilt.

Jan Partain displayed Kaffe Fassett Crazy (KFC). She had a layer cake of KF fabrics however, 'nothing went together'. The result was a crazy quilt done as a quilt as you go.

Marilyn Weaver brought her green and white Christmas Wreath which she then quilted on an embroidery machine. It is to go to the female music director of Balloon Festival held every October.

Jaymie Crisel made her first baby quilt that was also her first time to use minky material. The Deer quilt was a panel of some deer done in a window pattern.

Robin Tyler showed a quilt done of pink flowers with yellow centers on a whit background with printed

sashing. There were flowers around the outer edge

that decreased in the number of petals as you looked around the edges—as if one petal was continually falling off. Robin wrote that when she was a child, her mother made her a pink dress of dotted swiss material. When her grandmother died in 2012, some of her belongings were sent to Robin. She ended up with a repurposed chest and inside the chest she found some of the fabric left over from making that pink dress. Robin used the fabric to make the petals of the flowers on *Momma's Flowers*. It was quilted by Eddie Landreth and given to Robin's mother for her birthday last September.

**Judy Bowers** brought *Fall Poinsettia*. She said it was a new Quiltworks pattern done in fall colors. *Waterwheel* was a beginning paper-piecing pattern done in three shades of red and three shades of white material. Judy plans to teach it soon.

The Why Knot group consists of Carol Hurt, Sue Womack, Pam Brown, and Cindy Barszczewski. These ladies created *Suzanne's Wild Horses* wall hanging as a gift for Suzanne, a fellow quilter who will be moving away soon.

**Sheila Simpson** is a member of the Piece maker's Knot along with Pat Crawford, Barbara Middleton, Karen Alexander, Judy Rickard, Frances Wade, and Cynthia **Quick**. Each month a member presented a different method for making ½ square triangles which were then used to create pinwheels. Sheila completed the quilt by doing the quilting and the binding. It will be used as a donation quilt. Sheila also brought Hungry, a quilt made for the music director at her church. He and his wife are expecting their first child in December. The hungry little caterpillar was featured on the guilt. Jim Gatling had a 'Tell'. He was returned four completed guilts this evening and will be showing them in March as part of his workshop. He was given a quilt made with red flannel and homespun material that a lady made for her daughter, Jim's god-daughter. Unfortunately, the colors ran very badly. Jim wanted to remind everyone how important it is to be aware when using strong, deep colors to set the colors.

**Alina Polta** brought a spritzer bottle that she learned about while at the quilt show in Houston. It emits a mist which decreases the fear of colors running. She also recommends prewashing strong colors.

AWOL (Arkansas Women on the Loose + guys, too) is held at the C. A. Vines Arkansas 4-H Center in Ferndale, Arkansas. AWOL is 3 days away from home where you can sew and quilt to your heart's content with lots of other quilters! Bring yourself, your sense of humor, your supplies and plan on spending a relaxing weekend away. We usually have a few mini-demos but plan on spending the time working on what you want. It's a great time to start a new project, finish a few of those old projects and get ideas and insight from other quilters. Any level of quilter is invited. You can select the whole shebang, one night or just the day option. Payments may be made in installments. Meals and 24-hour beverage service are included with your registration.

We have three work rooms starting at 9:00am Friday morning. If you've attended one of our past AWOL or Quilt Arkansas events, you know that these rooms are great!

Registration fee for each package includes beverage service, mandatory facility fees, and insurance. To reserve your spot, send at least a \$25 deposit along with your registration form (this applies toward your total due).

### **November 2017 Program**

### **Longarm Quilters**

Cindy Barszczewski moderated a panel of AQG longarmers: Eddie Landreth, Leah Sample, Alina Polta, Carol Hurt, and Debbie Haley. Their comments were especially interesting to those of us who guilt by check.

Their workspaces are in spare bedrooms, commandeered dining rooms and specially designed workshops. Longarm machines were Gammills, a Nolting, and a Handiquilter.

They bought their machines for various reasons, such as not enjoying quilting on a DSM, which is like shoving a paper under a pencil instead of holding the pencil to write. Leah intended hers to be her retirement plan. Alina's husband wrote out a business plan for her, with target dates for paying it off.

Prices ranged from \$10,000 to \$14,000, and the companies have good trade-up programs. The best way to shop is at national quilt shows, where different machines can be road-tested, since each one has a different feel, and what works for one person may not for another. There are good deals to be had, such as four-year, no-interest payments. Company technicians come to your house to set them up and get you started.

The panel said they basically service their machines, with Google and YouTube answering most questions. Alina's salesman is on speed dial and she sends him pictures and audios so he can see and hear what's happening. Pinwheels is now a Handiquilter dealer and provides service.

They said it's really necessary to have lots of customers to be able to pay for the machine, plus to learn how to use the machine competently and to work with different patterns and styles. It's very intimidating to get started, but they all said they learned and gained confidence with each quilt. If anyone is interested, they should not put it off, but just do it. You can give discounts to customers at first till you develop your skills.

Sometimes they've refused to take a quilt, like one done with chicken scratch embroidery, and lots with borders that weren't sewn on properly. But in general, the quilting can only be as good as the piecing. It's important for customers to iron their tops and backings. Guidance from customers is appreciated, such as not wanting heart designs or daisies for guy quilts.

Leah demonstrated how it's better to piece backing horizontally instead of vertically to keep the quilt taut on the frame. Wide backing is preferred, a ½" seam allowance, small stitches, no selvages (which shrink differently and are hard on needles), and at least four extra inches all around, which is necessary to load the quilt on the machine.

Batting preferences were Hobbs 80/20 and Warm and Natural, generally cotton, but also cotton and wool. Threads used were Glide and King Tut; Debbie likes variegated thread, but no one likes monofilaments. It can be a problem to have different color threads on the top and bottom. Most used stitch regulators, although Eddie doesn't.

Alina showed several tools: compression gloves, a spray bottle that mists just the right amount of water, a brush to get chalk out, a seam ripper, a flashlight to look under the quilt, a flexible drafting tool from Harbor Freight that marks feathers, and a framed piece of plexiglass that she puts over the quilt to audition designs with dry erase markers. She uses a tall saddle stool pneumatic chair, and her weighted Body Right back brace s a lifesaver.

They agreed that stitch in the ditch is the hardest thing to do, and rulers are awkward to use. Thread tension causes the most problems, and sometimes just a speck of lint can affect tension.

Prices depend of the complexity of the design, whether overall pantographs or custom work is used, and how many stops and starts there are - from \$.015 per square inch to \$02.-\$.03 per square inch, up to \$.05 for heirloom pieces.

A lot of us mere mortals who were in the audience are just happy to know we have so many capable longarmers to prettify our work – even though we must face that sometimes it's not possible to "quilt it out."

Thanks to everyone that has donated a quilt or your time and effort toward our community service project this year! It has been greatly appreciated!


