AQG Guild Meeting Minutes June 11, 2018

The Guild meeting was called to order at 6:32 pm by President Judy Stewart.

Minutes: Marilyn Wheeler moved to approve the May minutes as published and Sherry Williams seconded the motion. The vote was passed to accept minutes as published.

Treasure's Report: Treasurer Mary Jane Beard provided report regarding May's finances.

Treasure report has been posted on-line.

Committee Reports:

AWOL: Leah Sample, Eddie and Melissa Landreth, Jim Gatling, Sally Burrup, Chairs. Leah Sample announced fall AWOL will be held at C. A. Vines Arkansas 4-H center in Ferndale on October 12-14, 2018. Registration forms are available tonight at the meeting as well as online. A deposit of \$25.00 is required to register, and registration will be due by October 1, 2018. 7 have registered thus far with a limit of 30-40 registrants.

The 3rd Saturday sit and sew scheduled June 16, 2018 at the Baptist Health Southwest campus is cancelled.

Challenges: Sherri Dodds, Chair. Sherri collected 'ugly fat quarters' that was due tonight. This challenge ran from March-June 2018. Members that participated 'exchanged' an ugly fat quarter and created a 12" disappearing ugly block. There were several blocks turned in and she thanked all those that have participated. There were 7 winners that won ~5-6 12 inch blocks: Cynthia Quick, Sherry Williams, Janice Watson, Jenny Shumate, Alicia Bell, Mary Jane Beard, and Debbie Lewis. She announced the upcoming challenge which will be due in August: Summer Flower Garden Challenge. She has further details tonight regarding this challenge, and details will also be posted on the AQG website and in the newsletter.

Community Service: Meg Cullum, Chair shared that she will be collecting quilts to be donated to Brookdale, a senior living community in Conway. There are over 80 residents that are wheelchair bound. Therefore lap size quilts will be needed. Quilt sizes range from 36x36 to 50x50. Population of the senior living community consists of women, men, and some veterans. A community service project link can be found on the AQG website. Links to free patterns for those that want to donate a quilt can be found on the AQG website as well. She has 16 kits available for members tonight. 21 quilts have been donated thus far. Anyone that donates will be given a ticket, and there will be a drawing at the end of the year for a prize.

Any remaining donation quilts from juvenile fabric unsuitable for an adult are welcome and can be donated to The Call foster care program.

Fundraising: Chair needed. Judy Stewart shared to contact her if anyone was interested in purchasing a name tag. Sherry Williams, membership chair will also be collecting money for name tags which are \$12.00 each. License plates with AQG logo are also available to purchase.

The yard sale will be held in July. Guidelines regarding the yard sale can be found in the newsletter.

Hostess: Cynthia Quick and Meg Cullum, Chairs. Cynthia Quick shared that there were 59 members present this evening. Cynthia also reminded members to bring white, blue, red (Americana themed) fat quarters for the July fat quarter exchange, and there will be more details in the newsletter. She also reminded members to visit the 'freebie' table. Business cards for quilters are available on the membership table as well.

Membership: Sherry Williams, Chair welcomed two new members that joined tonight. There are 110 members. Name tags are available to purchase.

Newsletter: Jackie Bibbs, Chair. The deadline for the newsletter is the Monday after the guild meeting, 5/21/18. Jackie will out of town for the next three months. Wanda Cockrell and Debbie Lewis have volunteered to help with the newsletter during the months that Jackie Bibbs will be out of town. Programs & Workshops: Cindy Barszczewski and Sue Womack, Co-Chairs. Carol Hurt and Pam Brown, Assistants (2017). Cindy Barszczewski and Sue Womack announced there is still a need for a chair/committee to take over programs and workshops. The program tonight will be given by Sue Womack, How to make a T-shirt quilt, and why you don't want to. Future programs and workshops scheduled for 2018 are as followed: AQG yard sale in July, Antique Quilts in August, Meet your Members in September. A volunteer is needed for a second 'meet your member'. Round Robin Demos will be held in October and Judy Bowers in November. We will have our Christmas party in December. The Round Robbin demo was further discussed tonight as well. There is a plan to have a couple of teams to be assigned a sewing project in hopes of creating a small quilt.

Becky Butler shared LSU Tigers, for a wonderful graduate student who was from Louisiana. She and her husband are ardent LSU fans and graduates. She purchased LSU trademark fabric and used yellow as an accent and border. She free-motion quilted 'LSU TIGERS' up and down the quilt.

Pamela Davis shared a quilt she made in a Margaret Miller class in about 1997, she just completed it.

Debbie Haley shared 4 pieced bathmats. She shared she is making 'pretties' for her new house and thought it would be fun to make quilted bathmats for her bathrooms.

Shannon Young shared Arkansas is Home, a quilt inspired by Sue Womack's quilt and she used Violet Medina's pattern (Stitchery Sewist Shop in Cabot). She won first place in machine pieced/quilted category and judge's award at Ouachita Quilt Show in Mena earlier this month.

Meg Cullum shared several quilts, first Sharon's Dream, a quilt she made for her husband's boss who helped her out. Made quilt from a Missouri Start pattern/kit. Second, Rainbow Bright, her husband bought her a sampler of fabric and she didn't know what to do with it. His friend's daughter was diagnosed with cancer, so she created a bright quilt for her. Third, Sirius, she originally made the quilt for Quilt Arkansas and she finally completed the border. Fourth, Rainbow Bars, a quilt made from scrap strips from a Grayscale

quilt. She plans to donate the quilt. Fifth, Scrappy Diamonds, a quilt made from fabric she got from Bobbie Sample at AWOL. The pattern is available on the AQG website. Sixth, Nut Meg, a quilt made from the 'Crazy Tula' pattern by Carl Hentsch using bright fabrics.

Sue Womack shared House of the Rising Sun, a quilt she created after taking a class with Jim Gatling, enough said!

Debbie Spinks shared a donation quilt made from a Rain dance pattern.

Jenny Shumate shared a purse that she made using her favorite color, avocado green.

Bonita Hollis shared a t-shirt quilt and Old St. Nick Rag Quilt created at the Old St. Nick Rag Quilt workshop in June.

PROGRAM: How to make a T-shirt quilt, and why you don't want to by Sue Womack.

Program notes from June 11, 2018

The June program was presented by Sue Womack and was titled, "How to Make a T-shirt Quilt, and Why You Don't Want To"!

Your program scribe has not laughed so hard in a long time. Sue began by stating that she is a SAVER. Her dear friend, Cindy B., is NOT. So in the quest to make a T-shirt quilt, Sue had plenty of shirts to work with. Cindy does not.

The steps to make a t-shirt quilt are:

- 1. Find a shirt
- 2. Cut out the design leaving plenty of room around it for piecing
 - 3. Back the shirt with interfacing
- 4. Trim design to desired size (there will be a variety of sizes)
 - 5. THE PROBLEMS START!
- 6. Then you need sashing in a variety of sizes......

Before you start, you must have the recipient sign an agreement stating absolute secrecy on who made the quilt! Sue digressed for a moment to tell us the origin of her "smart mouth". In junior high, Sue was quite the athlete - running track, playing basketball, etc. In order to get a jump on their new inexperienced coach, she developed a smart mouth because she was not developing breasts like the other girls! She had to have a way to distinguish herself.

Anyway, this smart mouth is needed in order to put off the relatives that come out of the woodwork when they find out that you have made ONE t-shirt quilt!

Sue also explored many other uses of vintage t-shirts. She Googled "what can you make out of a t-shirt" and received a plethora of ideas. She actually made up the items to show and demonstrate to us. They include dust cloths, a Swiffer-type dusting wand, a mop, and cancer caps (these are actually very soft and loved by those who need them). You can make headbands out of the material that will keep the hair out of your face when putting on makeup - Sue say, if you wear makeup!

Other ideas include a mini-skirt which just takes two small strips of fabric. You can cut the front of a shirt leaving the neck-band on to make bibs. These are useful to wear while brushing your teeth to keep the toothpaste off your clothes, food off your shirt while you eat, etc. The possibilities are limitless.

But Wait, There's More! You can cut off the sleeves to make handles, sew up the bottom and use a shirt to make a very useful bag. These can be used to transport almost anything!

The sleeves can be used to make Santa-hat pin cushions for your friends!

Sue also Googled, "what can you make out of a half of a t-shirt". This did not find the responses Sue was expecting........

SUMMER FLOWER GARDEN CHALLENGE

Our next challenge might sound scary to some of you, but remember this is from the CHALLENGE Committee. You should expect to be challenged! Please give this one a try. If you don't I might be out of a job!!! Please read through all the directions before you start cutting.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

 The template page with hexagons printed on it. You can get this from Sherri at the meeting or print one out from the guild's website. You may also email Sherri at <u>se-wangelic@sbcglobal.net</u> and she will email you a copy to print at home.


PLEASE NOTE: The template paper will have 12 usable hexagon shapes on it and two that are cut off at the bottom. You only need seven of the hexagons for your block. When you print your hexagon papers, be sure your printer is set to print at 100%. Do not let it "Fit to page" or "Scale to size". **BE SURE to MEASURE** your hexagons after printing to be sure they measure correctly: 2.5" from tip to tip and 1.25" on each edge

- 2. One 3" (or larger) square of yellow fabric (Sherri will have some at the meetings to share with you if you need)
- 3. A piece of fabric, approximately 3" wide by 20" in a color of your choice
- 4. Stick pins or a fabric safe glue stick
- 5. Thread that matches your secondary fabric color

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Cut out seven hexagons from the template paper (there are 12 usable ones but you only need seven)
- 2. Pin one hexagon onto the wrong side of your yellow fabric OR you can use a glue stick to hold your paper in place instead of pinning. If you use a glue stick be sure it is the type that washes out of your fabric. You only want a little dab in the middle. Do not put glue out to the edges of the paper. If you put too much glue on, it will be harder to remove the papers later.
- 3. Pin or glue six more hexagons onto the wrong side of the second fabric you've chosen
- 4. Carefully cut around your papers, leaving about a quarter inch of fabric beyond the edges.


- 5. Thread a needle with your thread of choice and knot one end.
- 6. Carefully finger-press one edge of the fabric over the hexagon paper. Hold the fabric in place as you press the next edge over and then baste in place, at the corner folds only. Do NOT sew through the paper. You only need to catch each fold at the corners to hold it in place.



1 **NOTE:** You do not have to remove the papers. The papers should be left in your project and turned in that way, at the August meeting.

SEWING INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Take your yellow hexagon (center) and one of your other hexagon petals and put them right sides together, matching up an edge. Using a whipstitch or flat-back-stitch, hand-sew them together along one edge.



- 2. Grab another hexagon and sew it to the center yellow hexagon and to the other petal. Proceed around the yellow hexagon until all your hexagons are attached and your petals are also joined together. Do not remove basting stitches.
- 3. There are many tutorials online. Search for English Paper Piecing or EPP.






