

A Note From Our CEO...

Did you know in 2012 the Center saw 729 child abuse victims in Okaloosa and Walton counties? Did you know 59% were girls and 41% boys? Did you know 74% were between the ages of 0-12 (263 of the children were under 6) and 23% were between the ages of 13-18? Of those numbers, 236 were cases of child sexual abuse and 166 cases of child physical abuse. Although the numbers were sobering, there is a ray of hope. We only see those reported cases of abuse. We know seeing more children equates to more cases of child abuse being reported.

We can only do the work we do each day because of our community, our community leaders, our agency partners, volunteers and people like you. In April 2012 we shared an incredible milestone. We opened our doors in Walton County. It is a quaint, wonderful child friendly building on Hwy 90 East in DeFuniak Springs. Initially, we began by providing therapeutic services to child abuse victims, but just recently began conducting interviews of the children. The long range plan is to build a stand-alone, co-located facility providing the same services as we do at the Niceville Center. I would like to personally thank Sheriff Adkinson for his leadership, support and commitment to children. He has been instrumental in helping us reach our goals.

In 2012, we continued to build our programs to better serve child victims and their families. We began working towards developing a therapeutic program for parents/caretakers of child abuse victims. We have had a wonderful staff of interns who have been working with us. The long term goal is to identify funding and implement a formalized program. By taking a more holistic approach, we can better help children and families heal from the hurt, resulting in healthier, happier families.

In 2012 news from the state level for the Florida Network of Children Advocacy Centers was more than impressive and impactful for children



in Florida. As President of the State Network, I worked alongside Network staff and great Center directors in Florida to educate our legislatures and leaders in Tallahassee about the work of Centers for children. It all began with a fish tank of 30,000 goldfish representing child victims served in Florida displayed at the Capitol during children's legislative week. We began our fight for those 30,000 children. Several months later without even asking, the Network was awarded an historic \$3.2 million dollars to fund the 28 centers across Florida. A very special thank you to Senator Don Gaetz and Representative Matt Gaetz for their instrumental role in making this a reality. They not only are committed to our children locally, they are committed to children throughout Florida. Our work will continue in 2013 to retain the funding and position ourselves as a leading loud voice and advocate for child abuse victims at the state level in Tallahassee.

In 2013 we know we will see another 729 child abuse victims, and sadly probably more. We know for certain the children and their families are counting on us to be there for them to help heal from the hurt.

We hope we can count on you to help. Although you will never see the faces of the children we see each and every day, I assure you they thank God for people like you every day.

In closing, I would like to dedicate this year to Kieran May, an incredible advocate for our children. In 2012, he lost his life to cancer but I am certain Heaven gained a guardian angel. I have no doubt he is watching over our children. In the end, we all should aspire to be like Kieran. He gave so much of himself to make lives better for children and his legacy will continue to live on in the work we do for each and every child every day. We miss you.

Summer Safe ty Tips

a. adult Supervision

Adults need to have visual contact with children around all forms of water (including pools, bathtubs, buckets, beaches and ponds) at all times.

b. Barriers

With the use of barriers, parents can add layers of protection. Barriers include fences, alarms, door locks that are out of the reach of children, self-latching hardware on doors and fences. Barriers on other forms of water include lids on buckets, locks on bathroom doors and toilet locks.

c. classes

Adult CPR classes can help prepare you for an emergency and often make the difference between life and death when a child is in danger of drowning. Children (at the appropriate age) can take aquatic classes to help them gain swimming and water safety skills.
