

**Sample Description**

The Staff Council Needs Assessment survey was administered from February 29, 2016 to March 21, 2016 to 5,108 undergraduate students to gather information on a variety of campus concerns. The sample consisted of 1,323 students (1,206 people who completed the survey and 117 people who started the survey, but did not finish it). Approximately seventy-seven percent (77%) of participants were female and 23% were male. This yielded a response rate of 26%. A majority of participants in the sample were White (63%) and Hispanic/Latino (21%). Detailed information about these variables can be found on the following pages.

**Organization of the Report**

This report contains tables for each question and statement presented in the survey. Demographics such as gender, race/ethnicity, class standing, citizenship status, and major are included on pages two and three. This is followed by a combination of both open-ended and closed-ended questions as it appeared in the survey.

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**Please provide explanations here that would help us understand your answers above.**

- I believe that the new administration in the communications department (my major) has really taking a turn for the best. The last few semesters have really improved the quality of classes.
- Item 1: there are a good amount of classes offered and SOMETIMES multiple sections, but the class options are not broad and often do not offer a wider range of time options. There could be multiple sections but all within the same time frame. It does not help for those who want to work or intern. Item 2: some professors are open to students and are approachable but others are strictly closed off from students. I wish that they would be more willing to help students sometimes. Often they say that they are available to students and want to be involved, but more often than not they would shove it off and let it go. It makes it hard to build a relationship with professors outside of class and seek help out of class. Item 3: I was able to learn from each class but what is annoying is that many things often overlap or are repeated. A good amount of time (maybe even a third or half the semester) would be spent on what students already know or the basics, and then the rest of the term the newer subjects would be crammed and sped past causing more stress for everyone. In the end I would only have reviewed what I have already learned, and gotten a taste for the newer subjects without fully understanding sometimes.
- Art department needs more room and sub-focus mediums
- I have only taken prerequisites for the business school, and it has all been common knowledge. I have not had to stretch my brain to comprehend any topics taught in a business classroom. I am hoping that this is because I have not gotten to the core classes for my business degree. I am satisfied with the academic rigor of my general education classes.
- They definitely take faith integration to the next level and make you think about it a lot
- A lot of the classes focus too much on being different than other public universities, apu lacked acknowledging or appreciating public university system's time saving and efficient ways of teaching and studying
- Spiritual growth is not commonly facilitated in the classroom, and that seems like it would be awkward. More likely that a professor would spark spiritual conversations which happen outside of class and contribute to spiritual growth.
- Some of my science classes for my major were hard to get into or conflicted with the rest of my classes, forcing me to change my schedule multiple times in order to take all necessary classes.
- Professors are so committed to us. Pouring not only academic knowledge to us but also spiritual insight. It allows us to question our faiths. Classes are almost guaranteed for the Nursing major
- I have had some amazing teachers, some bad ones and some alright ones. Above all else I have grown so much here and I appreciate the amazing teachers I have had and their dedication, understanding and teaching skills.
- I am satisfied by the numerous opportunities and caring professors that are provided to me. Most professors are willing to help and genuinely care that I understand what they are teaching.
- All of my professors and classes have surpassed all of my expectations so I'm really happy.

- I've definitely learned a lot here at APU, and I love that my professors truly care. It's really great how many of my professors have been able to help us (the students) grow in our faith and inspire us through their own faith without it being forced.
- I think that with my major I was able to learn significantly and get impacted by my professors in very significant ways. I have loved my classes as well as what APU has offered me in regards to academics over the past four years.

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- Many of classes interfered with practices times and were only available once a semester.
- I have two majors. In one of my majors I have been very satisfied with how much I have learned. With the other I have not been satisfied.
- My major courses have WAY too much focus on Faith Integration. Nearly 40% faith integration, 60% course work related to marketing
- I have learned, and retained, more information in the classes at APU than at my former university. I have also been able to get majority of the classes I need by, with the exception of a few, which is normal and merely requires flexibility in your schedule.
- Everything and everyone in this school is perfect for my major needs.
- My major professors have been influential in my learning. I don't like to learn, but I feel joy going to class
- The sociology depart needs better teachers such as Terri Ubovich. All the other sociology teachers have yet to actually teach me anything while remaining completely neutral. Also the sociology department needs a guaranteed internship of some sort. Such as English has an internship during their class time or social work
- I am a social work major, and have been able to get all the classes I have registered for. In the classroom my professors have encouraged me extensively in my spiritual growth, but I have noticed that it is more in my bible classes than any other. In the current semester I have learned so much about the Bible and the different perspectives others have.
- Please allow more times and days for social work classes
- I think APU isn't selective enough with admissions in terms of academic requirements. My growth in the classroom is largely dependent upon the involvement and intelligence of my classmates, and I feel as though my peers are not at the level I would have expected them to be.
- there are classes that only have one option of teacher or class, so with all the students on campus i feel that there should be more classes available for students so we don't struggle just to get into the classes we need to take.

- Some classes are provided in the spring and some classes are only provided in the fall. Making the process to choose classes with classes only offered on some semesters made planning a little hectic at time, however the classes and professors all were amazing and life giving.
- As an art major, getting art classes is very difficult. There is usually only one or two selections per class, which is very hard to work without, especially if you're a commuter.
- Being a film major, the professors encourage us towards the film industry. However, through my education process, I have found that I do not want to go into the film industry (particularly Hollywood). Professors know this, yet they keep pushing me towards the industry and have a hard time facilitating growth for me because I am not headed in the direction that majority of the students are.
- I would love to see more faith integration in the classroom.
- I love my major- Global Studies! It is incredible how much I have grown in the field of Global Development and how professionally and personally geared the major is
- For my major, certain courses are only offered once a week at a certain time which makes it difficult to work with. There are also not a ton of options for professors.
- As a math major, there are little choices as to times for classes sometimes, but the classes that are needed are available to take. It is somewhat hard to integrate spiritual growth into mathematics, but other classes such as UBBL have been helpful.
- My professors are very hands on and apply their faith

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- Better advising is needed for Global Studies students as many of us are put into the wrong classes.
- For a science course I was enrolled in, the lab capacity was capped off even though it was required and I was enrolled in the course. As a graduating senior I was stressed about this and had to talk to a lot of people to finally get an independent study lab started, since the lab was required. I ended up having to pay more for this lab now and I was very upset at the lack of communication between offices and the different capacity for the course and lab.
- For Liberal studies there are a good handful of core classes that only one professor teaches, limiting my options, and classes fill up quicker.
- Film school is very helpful
- Professors guide me toward answers but never give them to me. They challenge me to find the solutions.
- Nursing faculty and classes are phenomenal
- I feel that professors did a very good job encouraging me in my faith and incorporating it into the classroom setting. You can tell that some professors are very genuine while there is an odd one that incorporates faith because it is required
- My honors professors are awesome and have encouraged me to explore my faith and stretch my brain. Without them I would not be the person I am today.
- Everything meets the goal, yet it is not perfect or too helpful for some majors.
- My major faculty English are spread pretty thin because of the new grad program. They don't get to teach as many varied classes as they used to. My professors do a good job of integrating faith without being obnoxious about it. My professors do their best to challenge you academically.
- Professors very personable and care for me to succeed.
- Professors are very passionate through their teaching and core values.
- I am a nursing major so my schedule has been pretty planned out since freshman year. Clinicals are never set in stone but I haven't had any problems so far. Most of the professors are wonderful and have really invested their time and love into all of us. The nursing program is very rigorous and most of the professors equip us with the information and support we need.
- Professors are highly dedicated to students academic, spiritual, personal, and professional growth. They are generous with their time and knowledge. They love what they teach.
- Some of the classes that I needed to take to stay on track to graduate on time were extremely difficult to get into which could have brought me back.
- The faculty and staff in my major have been challenging, in a positive way, where they desire me not only to grow not only in my field but as a person and spiritually as well. They are supporting and are great with communicating.
- I am satisfied with the availability of classes within my major and with the professors encouragement towards my spiritual growth because both categories I give an A in because I feel like APUs Science department Does a great job with classes and facilitating a spiritual growth aspect into every class! I am very satisfied with how much I've learned from my classes because I truly have learned so much since I've gone here!!
- My professors, academic major, and curriculum encouraged me in so many ways even beyond educational and musical growth.

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- I went to community college prior to APU and the relationships you build with your professors here is wonderful. In a class setting, professors show interest in cultivating a relational environment. I've learned more about life than I would in a different academic setting because of the investments that my professors have made to build their students into healthy and effective Christians.
- I am blessed with good professors in all of my classes.
- As a pre-engineering major, no one has really helped me move towards graduation as no one really knows what it's like to handle this program.

- Global Studies and High Sierra professors have been extremely helpful and encouraging in my experience. They have taken the time to meet with me one on one, mentor me, and pour into me intellectually, emotionally, and spiritually.
- Overall the professors, classes, and material in the Biology/ Chemistry department and the Honors College are doing well
- My major is relatively small, and has created an easy way to get to know the professors and also talk one on one with several of my professors. I have really learned a lot in my time at APU, and can not wait for the next few academic years here!
- I was very satisfied with the classes and faculty in my major during my years at APU.

- The school of Business generally offers multiple class options for each class needed. This is helpful in scheduling. Most of my teachers integrate faith easily because it is a big part of their lives, other seem to struggle for they are more focused on academics and don't see the correlation between religion and academics as well as other can. After studying abroad in a large public university I realized how challenging it was and the amount of knowledge and experience I was expected to gain. The experience was different due to the fact that classes consisted of 500 hundred students, which made learning much more difficult. However I feel that I walked away with a strong sense of business, whereas it took 3 or 4 classes with a great amount of busy work at APU to cover the same topics.

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- In my Spanish minor, I wish I was able to take more classes that would facilitate growth for me conversationally and in writing. While history and literature have been fine classes, I would appreciate a greater chance to improve my grammar or conversational or formal writing skills in Spanish. As a Business major, I've appreciated the School of Business and the opportunities they offer, though in some of the lower division courses in the Business program I felt the professors could've been better employed or that the teachers could have better used their opportunities in the classroom to teach us real life skills concerning job search, employable skills, personal financing, and presentation of self in the world of business.
- I don't try too hard. But the professors do. I would get more out of classes if I put more into them.
- Never had any trouble with getting the classes I needed. Teachers actually care for their students and the needs they may have.
- APU has been a great environment in enhancing my development both spiritually and academically. However, my major is a small department but is increasingly growing which makes getting classes difficult. On the other hand, my teachers have been very understanding which has tremendously helped.
- The classes I need for my major are available to me and I haven't had any problems registering for the classes I need. My professors really care about students learning the material. Depending on the class and professor, there may be more or less focus on personal spiritual growth. I have learned a lot of material that I find applicable to life outside of the classroom. I appreciate when I can connect the class with everyday life.
- I loved my psychology courses as they taught me a lot about the field along with theories and concepts that explained human behavior. My general education courses also taught me practical knowledge as I prepare to graduate.
- I work full time. The availability/variability of classes/class times for classes that are specific for my major are not as easy to work with while maintaining a job.
- Lack of what school stands for
- My classes have all taught me something valuable and my professors have taken an interest in me personally.
- My classes don't do a good job at talking about God they will do one assignment and check the faith integration off on their list and never talk about it again. I have learned nothing from my bible classes so far, yet my friends are getting a lot out of them.
- There were people that complained about the chapel time (9:30-10:20), so it was moved to (10:30-11:20 AM). That is great, however, the classes must be moved too for science classes, so that upper divisions can be divided evenly, and lunch time can be allowed for students, even if that is 45 minutes. For both my junior and senior year, my schedule has been a living hell with no time for meals for 3 days out of the week. It would be great if my health was fine, but I cannot simply skip meals. It is not just my case that is special as well, I have other friends that have similar issues with classes not being spaced out properly, and are now having 3 lecture days/week that are 8 to 12 hours long.
- I loved most of my professors, but many professors in the math department did not care about me as a student struggling. I took 2 classes twice and still couldn't get a good grade no matter how hard I tried and talked with the professor to explain it to me. So all my professors have been amazing, except my math classes, which was even more disappointing because that's where I needed the most help.

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- The professors and others on campus have highly motivated me to grow spiritually in and outside of the classroom. I feel that I can go almost anywhere on this campus and ask for help and am confident that someone would be more than willing to lend a helping hand and if not find someone that is equipped whether it be spiritually, emotionally, or academically to help one another.
- I believe the teachers really care about their students and each teacher has their own way of teaching, which makes it more enjoyable to learn.
- I have had no trouble graduating on time, and I have enjoyed the classes I've been able to take. When I needed to take classes over the summer, I was able to do them no problem. My professors in Biblical Studies and Global Studies especially have been mentors to me, and have facilitated my growth in such a way that I am completely different person because of these classes. I experienced a huge sense of belonging as a result of my Global Studies classes and my LA Term cohort. We are a family.
- I'm a nursing major, so I always get into my major classes. It's a little hard to fit my GEs in around my schedule though.
- With how small my major is (Global Studies) I have been able to get classes that I need with ease. The professors that I have taken in my major are extremely dedicated to not only spiritual formation but providing academics that are transformative as well. I am very grateful for many of the professors in my program.
- For the most part I am able to enroll in all the major classes I need with no issues. The professors here have always been a great inspiration to growth both academically and spiritually. I have learned a lot but I wish I would be learning more about what I would like to do rather than busy work.
- Although my major is one of the biggest on campus, the professors are a tight group of people so all of the students know them. They are extremely helpful with classes and talking about future plans.
- My professors have encouraged my spiritual growth through the things taught in class but not through personal one-on-one conversations.
- APU is one of the only Christian schools that offer a BFA degree for the Theatre Arts Program and I am very grateful for that. I have learned a lot while here at APU, but you can never push a student enough. I would like to see professors inserting themselves more in the spiritual aspect of life for us students.
- Every class I have been a part of has helped me grow spiritually in some way, as well as learn the material provided for my major! It's been an absolutely amazing experience so far at APU!
- My liberal studies classes are a joke. With my previous major, I had a horrible professor and didn't learn because he didn't teach.
- The teachers can only go so far on their part to teach me. It's up to me if I want to learn past what is taught in the class room.
- I have not been over worked at APU but I have still learned far more than could be learned in a class.
- Some Senior Classes are only offered during Spring semester
- My psych professors have made wonderful efforts to integrate the course material; while there have been some classes that I haven't gotten into, it was mostly my fault for registering late; there are a lot of easy classes at APU but there are also a lot of challenging courses.
- Professors like to make sure we understand the material as clear as possible before moving on to the next. Also, they encourage faith integration writing prompts and in learning objectives.

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- I am satisfied with the fact that i have been able to get into all the classes i have needed so far. however I am dissatisfied with them at the same time because they are at inconvenient times. sometimes i have days where i have one class and other days i'm in class from 7am to 9 pm and it is really frustrating id rather have classes that i can distribute easier throughout the week. i am very satisfied with the way my professors have tried to incorporate faith into the curriculum. i feel that i have learned significantly more this year than i have my freshman year. this year at apu i started taking more major specific courses so i feel that i'm really starting to make progress towards getting to where i want to be in the future.
- Sometimes it can be hard to find a class for my major that fits the time slots I have open, but I am usually able to find a way around that. Some professors really engage with their classes and find a way to connect spiritual growth with their subject, while other professors don't put in quite as much effort in that area. Some classes are more academically stimulating and challenging, while others are less so.
- We need more theater classes and class times available. At one point I only had one class time to choose from for each class because they only had one teacher teaching that class dying one time of the day. How is that possible in a university? In a community college there's far more class ones available in order to fit our schedule
- I plan to go to graduate school for occupational therapy after completing my undergraduate degree. I will have to take quite a few prereqs at my state college for graduate school because the allied health program here doesn't offer any specific classes for ot or pt.
- I often take away a few things that each professor shared that help me with faith and can help me help others as well. So cool that the professors can do that for students.
- Classes for my major are widely available some are just a bit more limited to get into because of space availability. All of my professors facilitate spiritual growth within the context of the course and the broader subject of the class. Most of my classes I have been able to learn a great deal because of the professor's passion for what they teach and their excitement to help us understand the subject matter. However, I have had a few classes in which the professor seemed to not care about our engagement and seemed bored in the class, this made it much harder to learn and pay attention in class. I mostly ended up having to go home and understand the concepts on my own from the book.
- My professors, especially specific to my upper division courses, have been so intentional about encouraging meaningful exploration, honest reflection and powerful action in applying my course work to the world at large. I do feel that they have provided the tools and resources for success, and now it's up to me to take them up on it!
- My professors are all very wonderful people. But the ratio of learning to reading is backwards; i.e. we do far too much reading for the amount that we actually learn. I have been assigned fifty pages to explain one simple concept. This is unnecessary. Professors tend to rely too heavily on reading, and in class don't teach much. Reading is important, but if it's relied on so heavily that class-time is useless, what is the point of coming to class? If all of the learning takes place outside of the classroom (i.e. in the texts), why even have classes? Of course, that is not what I am suggesting. I think that reading should foster discussion and learning, not that reading should be the bulk of the learning. If reading is going to be the extent of my learning, one might as well assign a bunch of books for me to read and hand me a diploma once I've read them. The texts that we read for class should be supplementary to the lecture, not the other way around.
- Most of my professors make it really easy to enjoy learning, and passionate about my future career.

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- Nursing classes can be tough to fit into other class schedules sometimes but overall it has been the most extraordinary experience of my life!
- Some of my professors provided an excellent example of Christian leadership. My favorite class was Christian Faith, Life, and Ministry with Kristen Oh. That class restored my faith and is one of the reasons why I rededicated myself to Christ.
- Political science was very difficult to take classes because they were only offered for specific semesters and always filled early.
- Comm. Studies just took away the Rhetoric and Public address emphasis and that is THE only reason I chose this school. Ifk would have known this was going to happen just one year before I intend to graduate and finish that emphasis, I would have never come to APU
- Coming to APU in general has allowed me to grow spiritually and academically. I have learned a lot from mentors and professors and even in the most unlikeliest places. I do not have any complaints and am satisfied with my time here at APU thus far.
- I feel I have learned a great deal here at APU and I work very hard in each class. I feel, in general my professors care about my individual growth, but on occasion it feels like my professors care more about making te class difficult rather than making it Ana environment that foster growth and academic gains
- I have learned a lot in my core classes, as I would have liked. For General Ed classes, I have learned the same amount which is good, but at the same time, I have not enjoyed how serious the Gen Ed professors have taken their classes. Professors are always open to talk about God and make themselves available to discussion and ministering.
- I have not only learned more about my major, but how to incorporate God into my field of study so that when I go out into the real world, I'll be able to be a light and be able to spread the gospel to others.
- APU faculty and staff have been very helpful in my spiritual and academic growth.
- All classes and professors have contributed to my academic and spiritual learning experiences
- Upper Division Psychology is extremely limited and even more so based on the professors I would prefer to take.
- The biggest reason I chose APU was the faith integration in the classroom and I'm very satisfied with it and my decision to come here.
- I'm a theatre major and sometimes the classes are too small and are cancelled or they are just at inconvenient times. Not a whole lot we can do about that, but that's my feedback
- The academic environment here is like no other. You have people who care about you as a student and as a person. My experience here at APU has been positively impacted by not only my professors, but the faith-based curriculum as well.
- I had kind of a hard time enrolling in classes needed for my major because there were only a few sections open and they filled up before I got a chance to register since I'm only a freshman
- I have been challenged both spiritually and academically but I have not developed relationships with my professors to the point where I would consider that they personally contributed to my spiritual growth.
- Not very a very challenging school. But I did learn some new information that will be useful in the &quot;real world&quot;.
- I'm mostly in introductory classes so there hasn't been much depth.

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- I find it unhelpful when professors rely on their syllabus to announce upcoming assignments for them and to not explain what each assignment means. Also I find that some material that I have been required to read has not had my best interest in mind when it comes to guarding my heart in literature. I do get to pray in the majority of my classes which I do appreciate but one of my courses I feel as though I am not led to even think about God.
- Nursing Majors are always taken care of when it comes to the classes you need
- I am an Industrial Business Psychology major and finding classes that are available for my concentration was pretty impossible as in some cases, there is only one class available (Group Process, I/O Psych, Conflict Mediation, etc.). As for the second question, in some cases I have had great Professors that have shown an interest in their students. I have also come across quite a few that did not. I feel like I have learned a lot. What prevents me from being very satisfied is the content of what I am learning. I feel that I am taking many classes that are unnecessary and will be unhelpful to my future career. Consequently, I do not feel adequately prepared to enter the work place.
- Some classes for chemistry majors are not offered every year. This has made some semesters very difficult. It was also difficult to arrange my schedule around the classes I would need a year out.
- Very competent teachers in accounting. I love that most (if not all) are accomplished professionals.
- As an AES major, there were typically only one or two sessions to choose from and since this major has grown dramatically in the past few years, the classes were more impacted.
- Not only do I feel comfortable in my classes, but I feel as though the information I am learning is valuable and relevant to my major and my spiritual life. I feel comforted in the fact that my professors care about me and are genuinely interested in me as a person.
- I think that the better professors should have more classes
- I think overall it has been a positive experience with my academic classes at APU. In some of my classes for liberal studies or psychology, I felt like the professors don't care as much but rather just want to give you the information & give you credit. Also for the liberal studies classes, I feel like there is way too much busy work.
- My major is not that popular so therefore the classes provided aren't a lot, but it's fine with me. I have learnt quite a bit from my classes. As APU slogan is God First Since 1899 a lot of the professors have emphasized my spiritual growth along with the class.
- I'm taking mostly GE's but it was easy to get classes. And my professors have been encouraging and very helpful which has caused me to learn a lot and actually retain it
- Professors generally seem like they genuinely care about each student and strive for academic and personal growth. The smaller class sizes make it easy to develop personal relationships with classmates and staff.
- I feel like my major has enough sections of most of their classes but a few of the classes have only one section and/or interfere with another class time for a class that also has one or two sections, so it can be hard to plan a schedule with all the classes I need to take. All my professors have shown interest in my personal and spiritual growth to some extent and it is really encouraging and helpful. I feel like I have learned a good amount of new information since I started attending here and I know this to be true because during regular conversation I am able to communicate in new ways with new information.

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- For the most part I got into the classes I wanted with the exception of freshman year when you're the last person to chose classes. However, in all of the classes I have been in, i have had excellent professors who show me Christ through the ways they have interacted with their students. This experience here has taught me so much more than just education!
- Most professors in the business department only have classes available in the morning time. It makes sense though because most double as a professor and work outside of APU as well. We are encouraged in class about our faith and to demonstrate it even in business. Stating it is possible to follow God in the office, and it is not necessary to be a theology major to demonstrate a Christ-like environment. Two good examples are Chick-fil-a and In-and-Out who demonstrate that it is possible to create a Christian setting or to follow God even in the everyday work force. I am always learning something new in business. There is so much to know and business is in everything, including non-profit. It is impossible to know everything, everyday is a learning process.
- The English Major does not offer as many courses as I would like, but it's a smaller major so I understand. But I'd like to see some growth in it.
- The nursing program here is amazing. Professors work with students to help them not only pass classes but really understand concepts.
- I am a double in Math and Physics. My department is very small and because of this we have a great sense of community and we all connect really well socially and academically.
- I am not satisfied with the availability of the classes offered for my concentration. I am currently a psychology major with a concentration in child life. The classes are filled when it is my turn to register and there are only about one or two different selections.
- Although some teachers are great there are LOTS of teachers that just aren't as good. You guys should really look at ratemyprofessor to see what teachers just aren't here to benefit our learning objectives. Those are our voices and they should be heard and something should be done about the teachers that aren't contributing to our success.
- I feel like I expected so much more from some of my classes. I would come with a 100% positive and ambitious attitude ready to do my best and learn as much as I could. But in some of my classes that decire was eventually discouraged because of the low expectations gay the professors teaching those classes had for their students. Not all of the classes were like that, but the fact hat I did have that experience I didn't choose &quot;very strongly&quot; for any of the questions

- The upper division psychology professors have such a love for what they teach and all the students they teach it to. I absolutely love that they have so much passion and that the passion carries over into what they teach us. I aspire to be like them.
- classes are okay
- Our professors are so available to be there to support you every step of the way. They really care about you as a whole person.

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- Some professors are really caring and understanding.
- I learned so much in all my classes and for the most part have been able to register for all the classes I need
- I'm an art major and most of my classes are 3 hours which wasn't a problem until my junior year. It made it harder for me to work because I have class from 9-4 twice a week. I just think studio classes should be set up differently especially upper level classes.
- My above answers are simple, I have learned a lot from incredible professors and a great curriculum at APU. I like the way the teachers are so invested in their students and the love that everyone has for each other (for the most part).
- Dissatisfied with the BFA Film program and how transfers can fit into it. I understand this is an almost impossible problem to fix because the BFA is so strenuous, but they could at least have more class availability (fall and spring) to help
- I have been learning a lot and I am excited to go into more of the upper division classes in order to learn even more with my major.
- The nursing program is fantastic! Even though my cohort has 45+ students the professors work hard to know each of us individually and help us to grow
- For the most part, I have always been able to get the classes I've needed/wanted in preferable time slots with only a few compromises over the years. I have had some amazing professors that have truly impacted my life and provided me with some extremely beneficial knowledge and life lessons that I will take away from this place. These professors have challenged me and my faith and have pushed me to look outside of my usual viewpoint. Despite taking some classes that I believe had no relevance or were of no interest to me, I am incredibly grateful for the classes that have molded me into a more knowledgeable student, a more faithful servant to God and ultimately, a better person.
- We need more Chemistry faculty so that classes can be offered more often, and more sections are available. In order to graduate within 4 years as a Chemistry major I had to get a minimum C- in every single major course the first time, otherwise the class wouldn't be offered again for a while, and most of the classes were prerequisites for other major courses. After a ridiculous amount of hard work and grace from God I'm set to graduate this semester, but of the 12 units I'm taking only one class is needed (or I would have graduated earlier) and if I don't get a C- or higher, I will need to wait until Spring 2018 for it to be offered again. Also, most of my major courses only have one or two sections when they are offered so it is a struggle to plan my GE courses around them or sometimes it is a fight for all the students that need the course to get in.
- I have close relationships with my professors and have learned so much thus far during my first academic year at APU.
- I enjoy learning from my professors and am overall, satisfied with availability of classes.
- Not enough professors teaching the same class. Sometimes I didn't learn well from one professor but that person was the only one offering the class.
- I personally think the Bible courses that I have taken so far with the professors of those courses as well, have been beneficial to my spiritual growth than any other class or group at APU.
- I have struggled with registering for several upper division classes but every class I have been in has been informative and challenging.
- Being a criminal justice major the amount of classes available to take is very restricted.
- Global Studies is a small program so some of the classes are only available in the spring. This can conflict with LA Term and Global Learning Term and can be quite inconvenient when scheduling ahead.

As a Philosophy minor, it has been a little more difficult since some classes are offered exclusively in spring or fall. That's all.
- I really love how professors demonstrate the life of Jesus in them and that's what encourages me everyday to learn more and more in this school.
- Due to the fact that I am undeclared, I have never experienced issues in finding classes for my major.
- Everything about APUs academics is awesome! Wish some professors would offer more availability
- Theater classes fill up really fast
- I feel like the department I am in tries to make the classes we need in order to graduate available. If it is not available, the department makes it available for people to independently study the course.
- I'm a nursing major.
- For the most part I got a good education here at APU. There have been some professors and some classes that I felt were a joke or terribly taught. But, overall, the faculty and academics were pretty good.
- It is difficult to even comprehend the amount of growth and transformation that I have undergone in my Global Studies and Sociology classes. I have experienced the freedom to question and learn with the support of professors who have both encouraged and gently challenged me along the way.

- I'm not learning as much as I would like in Baroque with Dr. Koops. This is his first semester teaching the class and he is very unprepared.

- I honestly feel like in some of my Communication classes my tuition money is going to me being asked to watch a YouTube clip for the entire class. I think that some of the professors I have had are not up to date and I could be learning the material by just reading the book. However, in other classes I have had respected professors go above and beyond to make the learning process interesting and I come out of every session feeling like I have gained a greater understanding beyond the reading material.
- So far as a Freshman, I have been able to get the classes I need for my two majors. This year it has not been difficult to get into those classes. All of my professors really do facilitate spiritual growth through referencing the Gospel and the teachings of Jesus throughout my classes, and that is ranging from my philosophy class to my acting class. I have learned a lot in each of my classes, but my FYS class lacked for me last semester because everything that was being taught I had already learned.

- not very many classes are available for certain subjects
- My major classes have been easy to get into so far and have been good learning experiences. Professors don't really talk about Christ all that much but it is refreshing when they do.
- I don't have trouble enrolling in the classes that are available. Unfortunately, there are only a few sections offered for the comm classes. It makes it nearly impossible to have a professional job and be a student. Offer more comm classes in the evenings and sections that are offered both MW and TuTh. As it stands now, it is impossible to schedule all of your classes on MW or TuTh. On another note, the comm faculty is amazing! Most of the professors truly care about their students and try to build genuine relationships with them.
- I wish that some classes would be offered more than once a year, or more than once every other year.

- The professor definitely makes or breaks the class. I have had professors that I have learned so much from and have encouraged me to be and think different. I have also had professors that are good, but I don't feel like I have learned a lot from them.
- The music faculty and program is wonderful. It is an intensive program that requires hard work, passion, and dedication.
- Necessary math and science classes are few and often conflicting
- I have a small major, so I wish there were more diverse topics in my major.
- All my classes, especially my Bible classes have really encouraged me to continue and dig deeper with my relationship with God. I've learned so much and feel confident in my knowledge after every class.
- My first semester at APU was very overwhelming due to the amount of classes I was taking, but the faculty in my major department were so helpful and encouraged me to not give up. Through last semester I feel like I became more comfortable at APU knowing that the faculty really cared about my performance. The support I received made me feel so much more comfortable this spring semester in the choices I made with my classes and made me realize how happy I am to be at APU.

- As part of the last undergrad cohort for athletic training, I feel like my professors focused more on the incoming group of entry-level masters students. Also, the way the undergrad program was set up, it did not allow time to cover everything in class.

- The willingness of professor and any of faculty members to reach out and help students.

- Some classes are only offered in one semester per year and it's hard to see faith integration in most of my classes.
- for me, the academic climate at APU is lacking. professors are well-educated, but seem limited by students who (in general) are not driven academically. intellectual atmosphere seems sub-par
- I have taken classes with excellent professors who have challenged me academically and spiritually but unfortunately, I have also taken a fair amount of classes that provided neither.
- I can't get into some of the business core classes I need
- I have run into trouble when it came to looking for classes pertaining to my major online because some classes are only available during certain semesters and that was something that was not told to me prior when making my academic plan with and without an adviser . None of my professors have really expressed an individual interest in my faith beyond what has been required of them because of the mandatory academic integration that the university requires. I have certainly learned new things but more so, I have developed the language to express what I already knew.
- Teachers are a disappointment for the amount of money that we spend to go here. I am very disappointed and disatisfied that I chose to go here.

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- I am in very introductory classes for my major, many of which I have already taken at a high school level. In addition, I spend very little time studying these topics, leaving me time to spend on campus but nothing to do (especially weekends) This leaves me disinterested in my studies, and anticipating a challenge from classes in the future.
- My professor for Social Psychology in Fall 2015, Professor Denise Batton, did a terrible job in organizing her class. None of us students learned anything from that class - and multiple students had complained to the department chair about it. It was so disappointing to not have learned anything in a subject that I was really looking forward to and hoped to learn a lot in.
- I have been completely satisfied with everything apu has offered me.
- All of my science professors have contributed to my learning more than I could ever imagine. They all care so much about my growth and my ability to do well.
- Majority of my professors do not encourage or facilitate my personal spiritual growth in class. However, for the few that have, it has been very enlightening and beneficial. Those couple of professors, I feel, do well integrating faith and education.
- The professors are very helpful and kind but they haven't all provided input on spiritual growth
- I wish there was MORE faith integration in classes.
- The professor and spirituality of the school is what makes it a good place
- Many classes are "easy" in terms of getting the minimum down to get a good grade. Very few are "hard" as in requiring a lot of busy work or huge assignments. Then there are a few professors that are "challenging." They don't necessarily assign a lot of time-consuming work, but they have high expectations and really invest in helping you learn the material in a useful way, applicable in real life. They help us understand why it's good to learn the subject they're teaching. Of the ~20 professors I've taken classes from at APU so far, Jeng, Glycer, Winn, and Bodell have been the challenging professors for me. The rest of my classes were only distinguishable from my Junior College classes by their incorporation of religion. (Don't worry, I came from a very good JC.)
- Although the level of academic learning has been significant in every class, I would have liked to see more faith and discussion of how to apply faith with the subject. I also would have liked to see more of the professors ( especially Biblical studies) to facilitate more discussion on how to address issues in faith and biblical studies because students leave the class feeling confused or discouraged by the challenging material.
- I am happy with the professors that are able to take the time to encourage me as I study for my classes and offer help whenever I need it. One of my professors reminded us that our grades do not solely reflect who we are as people and that she even struggled with that when she was in school. To know that I am not alone was comforting to hear.
- I feel that although I have grown in my faith, I have not learned anything new academically in my time here.
- I haven't had a professor inquire about my personal growth with Jesus. Or even ask in a classroom wide general sense like, "How are you guys doing spiritually, any prayer requests?"
- The teachers truly care about you and want to help you more than just academically
- Classes are most always available. Most all the professors link class with your faith which is awesome & I have learned a lot from my classes here at Azusa Pacific
- Not many students are in the Political Science major, so I have no issues getting my classes done. I have felt like the faculty isn't as helpful in cases where I have needed assistance in understanding course material or even at the level of communicating my illnesses & needs associated with them.

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- The faculty and staff are all very helpful and truly care about how I am learning - both in and out of the classroom.
- The amount I learned in my classes is based off of me and not how my professors or the environment was. I just wished I could have focused more and be in tuned throughout my college career here at APU.
- A few classes I wanted were canceled due to too few people signing up. If somehow that could be changed that would be awesome.
- The classes that I needed were always available, I love my profs and the fact that we talk about God in most every class is so special and important to me, and I have learned something from each class but mostly from the college experience and life lessons that come with that!
- I do not feel like I am in a better relationship with God because of anything my professors have done. My spiritual growth has really facilitated internally because I had to see what worked for me with all that change happening around me. I have not really learned anything from APU. The things in my class were common sense.
- Many of the classes that I needed for my history concentration were only offered once a year.
- I have come to really appreciate that all my professors in someway integrate faith in to class.
- We also have to take general education classes but nursing classes are hard to work around and are usually at inconvenient times and or places (Monrovia campus).
- I feel like a lot of the classes didn't challenge me within my major. Out of the 3 years that I have been at APU, only one class really challenged me and allowed me to learn things that I felt I could apply to my future. I hope that as APU continues to grow the professors will put more effort into ensure that students are getting what the pay for and are being challenged. Making a class easy is nice but it doesn't help us in the future and we don't gain anything when things are easy.
- My major only offers one class for a graduation requirement and usually there's a lot of people who need to take a certain class, but that class will get full and wait listed early on. Personally, I believe they should offer two classes for each requirement every semester. My professors do relate the material to our faith and what scripture says. Sometimes professors will share their personal experience and how that relates to the subject and I think that is especially important because we will be able to apply it to our walk with God. For each subject, I have learned everything, I think relates to that subject matter.
- I am a Classics minor and I have had serious issues getting into the classes that I need because of their availability. With that being said many of the people who are in the different departments that coordinate classes had me running all over campus and not offering any real help to my situation when I asked them about it just before this semester started. The theme of each discussion seemed to be "it's not my problem". No one cared to help me for greater than a couple minutes and didn't offer any real solution, they simply sent me off to the next person to ask my question. I have to take 3 classes in that minor still to obtain it, and I am trying to graduate a semester early. Along with this I pay a lot of money to be at this school and I was told that taking the classes I need would require an independent study where I have to pay even more money for the course which is extremely frustrating to say the least.
- Not encouraged in personal growth nor feel like I have learned much.
- My Major and Professors have exceptional at helping me get into classes I need and the information provided in class is not only professionally/technically helpful, but there is a lot of wisdom imparted and thought process development.

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- I'm in the psychology department, and I feel like they've done a great job at providing a comfortable space for me to learn and grow in!
- When I was taking the starting CS classes my teachers were not that good, so it was hard for me to learn the basics putting me behind others. Since this the department has changed the teacher.
- All my professors put our subjects in a Christian perspective which I love. I believe they push me to my learning abilities and provide help if needed.
- I have not been able to take many classes for my major so far but the ones I have taken I have learned a lot. I feel like they are preparing me for after college already.
- I like this school
- I think that a lot of the times the Professors may invest in spirituality but not OUR growth in it and what we can do to keep growing in our faith.
- My high school AP courses were more rigorous than courses here. My writing was challenged more in high school than college.
- I wish some professors were able to better explain concepts to Transfer students
- A variety of motivated Economics professors available for Business students would be helpful.
- As a music major, I spend most of my time in music courses with those professors. They all care very much about each individual student and their growth. My friends/roommates sometimes tell me about their science/math/language professors who can be very boring or so-so teachers, so I suppose I feel fortunate to be surrounded by an incredible music staff and faculty.
- I am satisfied with the spiritual development in my bible classes for sure. My science classes are a little lacking in that area often times, which isn't unexpected because science isn't really that spiritual.
- I am a Philosophy major and so I am VERY satisfied with EVERYTHING about the department, mostly because it is small and us Philosophy majors get all the attention we need to succeed. In terms of my experiences with professors outside of my major, I have had a wide range of reactions (both negative and positive).
- some curriculum is not applicable to preparing us for jobs in our major
- Most general eds provide new and interesting information however some feel like repeated high school courses
- In the classroom, there is a focus on building character as part of scholarship and education which is fulfilling and wouldn't usually be found to this extent in public schools, from my experience. Most professors care about this development in their students.
- Certain Professors have obviously checked out or in way over their heads.
- I think there's a sufficient amount of spiritual integration in those classes which are able to include it. Additionally, I find there to be a good take of classes available within the psychology department and professors of differing specialties who are qualified to talk in those specific subject areas.
- My professors have been very personal and encouraging. They take the time to get to know me so they can help me academically and spiritually. I have learned a lot that I know I will use in my future.
- So far, the majority of professors I have had have been able to not only teach me greatly in their subject, but also encouraged academic and spiritual growth. I love the integration of Christ into the classroom.
- It is great

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- Certain classes I feel that I learn a lot! Especially in my major classes. However, in certain General Education courses, I feel I was actually more challenged and learned more content in my high school classes in the same subject area.
- I appreciate the humility and openness of the professors in sharing their own struggles with their faith but overcoming those struggles with the disciplines they learned and the grace of God.
- All of my professors have helped push me in my faith and show me they care
- There was not a lot of variety of upper division biology Courses offered during my senior year. It was a struggle scheduling my senior year without taking a schedule that was really hard to manage. Other than that the classes were both challenging and transformative. I gained a lot of factual and problem solving knowledge. The biology department is amazing with an amazing set of faculty.
- I have learned so much and grown so much in the year and a half I have been here. teachers are incredible and I am guaranteed to get into my major classes.
- I really like how I am able to take courses that I need for my major, and have good professors that explain well in each course.
- I might not have been able to get the times or professors that I want, but I am taking the classes that I want to take. My professors are always bringing faith into the conversations in class and are open to me talking about it with them as well. I learn something new in each of my classes everyday and I am challenged academically by my classes.
- As a music major, I love how many music classes are available and how much i can attain from the experiences in each course. It is, however a little overwhelming to have so many extra mandatory classes that do not seem to cooperate with other courses a student might have. I am enrolled in three ensembles: Oratorio, Chamber Singers, and Men's Ensemble, the latter two under scholarship. I am also enrolled in Opera. All of these together is a lot to manage when stacked on top of the other freshman required courses. My schedule is knitted strictly around music courses leaving little to NO room for other interests such as theater. This leads me to my next issue. I absolute hate how inconsiderately separated the theater department and the music department are!! How frustrating it is to be a music major with intentions of being involved in more than ONLY music performance including theater and film acting, business and more! As a freshman, I did not experience the history of the relationship between the theatre department and the music department, but it frustrates me further to see and hear that neither department is doing anything to compensate in a fashion that supports the students. These two departments function side by side in the real world and in the eyes of many students. I had selected &quot;satisfied&quot; for the first selection, but now I am moving it down to &quot;neither satisfied nor dissatisfied&quot; to express not that I am neutral on the topic, but that I appreciate what I have experienced so far and how I am dissatisfied with how constricting it can be. On a more positive note, I am beyond grateful and amazed by the faculty AND student body as to how spiritually in touch and loving they are. It never ceases to amaze me that each and every professor is so loving toward their students and how invested they are in their success. I praise God for the strength and wisdom that flows through them. I have learned a lot and experienced a lot and I anticipate plenty more experience to unfold in the future.
- As a Computer Science student, I've consistently had difficulty organizing my schedule to make room for everything that I'm doing. Since most computer science classes are only offered once per year and the prerequisites are so confining, scheduling has been a really big pain. The classes themselves are great, but it's a really big problem when moving a single computer science class back by one semester during freshman year makes it very difficult to graduate in four years (as has been the case with my schedule)

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- I am a Social Work Major. The professors in my program are unsung heroes on APU's campus. They have an interconnectedness and although they are challenging, they care about my personal wellbeing very much. I am a better person and Christ follower due to the work done in the Social Work Department.
- My GE classes (psych, writing, etc) were all things I already knew well.
- I love most of the marketing majors! They have very practical experience and invest in me. A few professors are a little lazy but overall a great program
- In the beginning, I had a lot of difficulty getting the classes I needed for a Bio major but it all worked out in the end. Many of my teachers have encouraged my personal spiritual growth in the classroom but some rarely talk about things not pertaining to class work. I feel like I've learned sooo much at APU!
- I am not always super happy that Biology courses seem to be offered only in the morning. That is why I clicked neither satisfied nor dissatisfied. I have had professors that seem very encouraging to talk to, and others that are almost too scary to talk to. So I clicked a neutral answer. I have learned a lot here at APU, particularly in Chemistry. Very satisfied.
- I am mostly satisfied with the availability of my classes in comparison to other schools, however, I did not appreciate the moments when my language classes were dropped due to low attendance and I would have to pick a language that fit into my schedule rather than one I was interested in
- My teachers push me to apply myself in both spiritual and academic endeavors
- I was able to receive the classes I wanted to sign up for. The class curriculum is difficult and challenging, but the professors I have had are helpful and very useful for my learning.
- More practicality please!!
- I have been able to sign up for the classes I need. Most of my professors (esp. Dr. Hamilton) encourage spiritual growth. I have definitely been learning a lot.
- I have had more professors encourage and facilitate my spiritual growth than those who have not, and I have learned a lot in my classes and have not had problems enrolling in my classes.
- For class availability, I chose this answer because I am aspiring towards the animation program within the art and design major, but the program still requires development so the availability of the classes is still limited. My second answer is based on the fact that many of my professors do encourage faith integration to a level that helps without overshadowing the focus of the course. Finally, I am very satisfied with the amount I have learned in classes as I have been exposed to new ideas, art techniques, and was able to develop on knowledge and skills I had already learned.
- Staff and academics are second to none. Would be helpful for all instructors to lecture in part from their own knowledge and not just lecture from the text. Tuition is expensive, I wouldn't expect anything less from APU faculty. Also, parking is dissatisfying. As a commuter, I often spend 10-15 minutes searching for parking. Hope this was helpful.
- Some second half of classes aren't offered at opportune times. Physics 152 isn't available during May Term, gen Chem has to be taken consecutively fall to spring and so on and so forth
- The nursing program is great. Very tough but I've learned a ton and feel prepared for my future as an RN
- Most APU courses are very surface level, teaching you in a semester what you could learn online in a day. Very few of my professors have had any sort of successful career in the industry (screenwriting) and most rely heavily on a textbook to lecture. The amount of money we pay in tuition is nowhere near worth the education we receive at APU.
- I feel as though I have learned the material on a basic level. Along with that other than a faith integration paper they do not talk about spirituality all that much.

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- As I became close to graduating year, my registration date got earlier. Hence, I was able to register for my major and left-over GE classes. Some of the professors in my major classes helped me take entirely different perspective towards the society and my surroundings including myself along with my spiritual challenges. It definitely contributed my spiritual growth and maturity. In that sense, I have learned so much in my classes at APU educationally as well as spiritually.
- I understand that classes have small sizes thus are impacted, so sometimes it is difficult to get into classes. However, I love my classes once in them and have learned both vital academic and spiritual information from them.
- Some times it can be very difficult to register for classes because all the athletes in my major get to choose before me and they take all the classes. Therefore, sometimes I have to put a class off for a semester due to them being closed or full.
- Teachers pour into you. Some are hard to understand in classes, in the business program that make the learning process more difficult. But a good balanced workload an you know the teachers care.
- they suck
- Many of the professors here at APU, outside of the ministry or theology departments, engage in faith integration by including a bible verse or two at the end of class lectures or by asking us to write a paper. I wish that there would be more active engagement and integration through reading, discussions, videos, etc.
- For the youth ministry major, there are typically 1-3 classes for one course subject. Having more classes would be helpful; however, I understand there is a smaller amount of students for this major. There are a few professors I have taken where they rarely mention God and do not integrate faith into education.
- I believe that azusa pacific does a fantastic job with the availability of classes offered and quickly moves you along to get the classes you need in order to graduate on time. The professors also do a great job at explaining concepts as well as guiding you to deepen your relationship with God through your career path
- I'm satisfied in all three of these areas but there's always going to be room for improvement I believe
- Feel like I'm going to graduate and still haven't learned anything
- My professors are wonderful, and bring Christ into their lectures on a daily basis. They truly live out their faith.
- The classes are challenging and fun, and for the most part the professors I have are excellent.
- APU offers an experience that is devoted to the overall wellbeing of the student. Since it is a private university, class availability was not a problem. Since it is a Christian university, my professors in the AES department were genuinely interested in supporting all of the student's spiritual journeys, whether it was by asking for prayer requests, integrating Scripture in their lectures, or sharing their experiences with God. I love, loved, and will continue loving all of it. I have grown so much in my educational career at APU. I acquired experiences and practical knowledge for my future career.
- I learn a lot, but only the information that they review multiple times is the stuff that sticks.
- I wish there were more available classes for my major because I've had schedule conflicts with my major and my responsibilities in ROTC, but it's nothing too bad at all.
- The quality of classes and professors at APU are far beyond what I experienced at other colleges before transferring.

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- Nursing isn't really a good judge of availability. All of our major classes are available.
- Some classes that are for my major are offered during certain semesters(fall vs spring).
- All of my classes have been not only preparing me for my future occupation of being a nurse, but also integrating faith into everything making me really think about my beliefs!
- I am not always able to get into the classes I want to
- Faith integration in some classes is forced and very surface level, some courses it does not integrate well with others the faith integration was essential to the class.
- The Nursing program is very structured, and I am able to get the classes that I need for my major. Sometimes scheduling GE courses in the middle of the nursing schedule is difficult, but I have not really had any problems. The nursing professors and instructors are also great inspirations and role models for Christian nursing. I have learned an immense amount about nursing through the program, and I feel like this program prepares me to be an excellent, Christian nurse.
- As a Psychology major, I have been very satisfied with a large number of class sections for courses I have been taking. I have also been able to connect to several professors who are very intentional with building with students. But in many ways, I have felt dissatisfied with quality of the content that was taught in my classes.
- For some business class there is only one professor teaching and there is no time options. overall learning a lot from my major classes.
- My major is new so there haven't been any problems yet. We're all taking it step by step. I truly feel that my professors care about me and my education. I came in thinking I would be on my own but professors here at APU don't ignore their students and they understand that we are paying for an education so they will do whatever they can to help us out in the classroom.
- I am a psychology major. We are a huge department and make up a large population of the student population. Because of this, it is much more difficult to find classes that are available and preferable. Almost every semester, I have had to change my semester plan more than 4x before compromising certain preferences such as class time and professor. I have missed the opportunity to learn from certain faculty that I truly wanted to learn from.
- Inconsistency with professors that truly care about their students academics as well as their spiritual walk
- As a communication studies major I have found it to be incredibly difficult to be able to take the classes that I need in order to graduate on time. This has been an ongoing struggle and hardship for me because it is preventing me from graduating on time. I know many other comm. students who also experience this problem. I think the comm. department NEEDS to offer more courses, as well as sections for students to take during the school year and during summer.
- Some professors aren't as spiritually focused as others it seems
- I've taken a lot of classes for my major (cinematic arts) and they have all been very useful and informative!
- The nursing department has staff and faculty that are dedicated and hardworking for their students.
- Some of the departments on campus are very polarized with their degree of being conservative and liberal. I do not feel like I have gotten a completely holistic perspective in my department and likewise with my friends in other departments.
- English classes are offered at pretty much the same time every semester, and some that I need overlap with choir, which I hate missing because I honestly wouldn't still be here if it weren't for choir. I'm frustrated by this, and wish there was a way to take the classes I needed without having to miss any choir.

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- The staff have all been very encouraging, and if you actually do the work assigned in the syllabus, you will learn a whole lot! (what do ya know)
- I have been very satisfied with the way professors teach at APU. I believe the criteria will help me in the future academically and in my career.
- Although the homework is tough, my professors helps us to be better and learn as much as possible.
- Nursing education at APU is very thorough and excellent. All the teachers care about the students and challenge us to know our material.
- My teachers have made a great effort to be as welcoming and encouraging as possible. I will often have dinner at there houses and I even got to church with them.
- The professors in the social work department really make an effort to ensure that each student is understanding the material. They show not only above and beyond interest in the topics they discuss in class but also take an interest in their students.
- For the most part I have had terrific experiences with the professors at APU, especially with the Study Away professors (High Sierra). The professors at this university genuinely care for their students and seek to invest in and support any and all students who are willing to reach out. I have deeply enjoyed the classes I have been able to take and believe that they (some more so than others) have been crucial in forming and developing my sense of identity over the last few years.
- Faith integration assignments, and information is taught that is very competitive with other wchools
- Most of the classes for my major were available however, the professor I was hoping for was not always. In the majority of my classrooms I feel like the faith integration portion of the university is delivered in the classroom however at times it can feel like the professor is forced to implement it and that it is not actually genuine. - My experience at APU has been very fulfilling and has so far reached all my expectations while attending here. I am very satisfied with my academics and the community and residence life I am surrounded by.
- While my classes teach me, I feel that the clubs I am in actually allow me to practice what I have learned. I would not feel fully equipped to graduate and take on the workplace had it not been for the club I am in ( enactus).
- I would love for there to be more options in the Poli Sci department! I do not think this will happen, though, until the major grows larger. There are only a few professors as is.
- I am still learning to balance my studying habits. I am close to getting a stable schedule but, currently right now I am wasting a lot of time with other distractions.
- Maybe it's the environment I grew up in, but even my upper division classes are disappointing in terms of challenging content.
- I have accessibility to everything and it hasn't been difficult to acquire these thjngs with help from professors.

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- Study abroad programs are lacking; there are no programs for most of the STEM majors. The math & physics dept is quite small, so crucial classes are offered on a limited basis.
- I have never had difficulties registering for or getting into classes and most of my professors have integrated faith into our curriculum and encouraged spiritual growth through lessons and through their actions. I have learned so much at APU and am looking forward to learning more!
- Absolutely love professors here at APU
- Everything has been satisfactory. All of the profs I've had have helped me greatly--they value their students and help mold them into better people.
- My Theater and the Church class has made my spiritual life grown immensely, so has my Luke/Acts class, they challenge my faith and make me ask questions that I may never have asked before. The teachers also give me lots of resources which I use to my advantage.
- As a nursing major, the curriculum is intense and difficult, but the professors have been nothing but helpful and encouraging, and it makes a huge difference.
- As a freshman I could not register for classes until the very end of registration, by then the classes I needed to take were no longer available, so I have to switch around my 4-year plan and now that 4-year plan may be a 5-year plan
- I am generally satisfied with everything at APU.
- Registration at times can be frustrating as I have a very specific plan to stick to as a social work major and there are times where the classes I need to take are already full before I register.
- I have enjoyed my classes and faculty
- No problems! I feel content :)
- I have loved how my professors invest in me
- APU in general has helped me with priority registration for classes this semester.
- There are more than enough avenues available for my major that I can follow.
- Professors are one of the best parts of APU. Not all professors, but most are absolutely wonderful and life-giving.
- I almost always have trouble getting into classes I need. Many of my professors have made me feel discouraged in my faith rather than encouraged. I have learned an amazing amount in my classes.
- Some professors facilitate spiritual growth to a much higher degree than others. Some classes taught me much; some taught me nothing. Overall, I cannot discount the amazing professors I have had by the few who did not contribute to my education.
- I am Undeclared right now, so I am neither satisfied nor dissatisfied with classes offered since I do not have a chosen career path yet. Overall, the faculty I have encountered so far have been very encouraging.
- I wish professors made a stronger effort in keeping up with students walk through their major
- There was a lot of lower division SOC classes, but upper division classes were limited to the point where I was not even able to chose my classes, but had to take only what was available. I had to take a Senior Sem. outside my major because there was only one class available.
- Sometimes there are things that the professor dose not explain clear enough for students to understand and there are sometimes that I only understand part of the course material since I am an international student from China.
- My teachers are very caring and smart. I learn a lot about my major as well as myself in my classes
- Most professors are genuinely invested in the well being of the students.

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- In the Biology and Chemistry department, the faculty and staff are so amazing and willing to be helpful and interested in your interests as a student. I think the content that they teach in courses reflect this aspect. I wish some classes were available more often but that is understandable when the university and department is not enormous like other schools.
- The English dept rocks! The professors really challenge me.
- A Senior Sem class was Cancelled which is in my opinion should never be cancelled if someone signs up for it. They obviously need the class.
- I am a theater major and I do not get to choose the time slot for some of my theater classes. This is frustrating when there is a certain class or professor I am trying to take but my time slot for my theater class conflicts. In regards to my satisfaction to the amount I have learned from my classes, I would say I am pretty satisfied. I have been fortunate enough to participate in the High Sierra semester (which was amazing) and take other professors on main campus that were highly recommend. But, I am not satisfied with the general education curriculum. Classes such as health and foreign language do not enhance my education and take away units from classes I am interested in taking.
- The class opportunities and the faculty running them provide a strong and enjoyable learning experience.
- Class scheduling conflicts were a struggle for me with business classes.
- I am satisfied in the availability of my classes for my major, but not very satisfied because the lack of Variety of each class. Yes I was able to get the class, but sometimes there will only be one section of the class which is very limiting. I am satisfied with my learning but not very satisfied because I'm not entirely sure how we rank against many other universities in how challenging our classes are. The difference is our professors and I believe that every professor in my major has expressed how deeply they care about me as a student and a future professional but also about that they believe and love the content that they teach.
- Great professors
- I've always been able to sign up for the classes I've wanted to. My professors consistently mention God and his complexity during class. I'm a science major so I learn quite a bit in class
- Every professor that I have had at APU has taken the time to talk about how what we are learning in class impacts our faith and what we can learn from it. They have all been willing to listen to either students opinions on these matters and have expressed how they themselves grow from hearing the things that students have had to say. Not only are they interested in class material relating to God and our faith, but they have all been actively interested in seeking after the emotional and spiritual well being of their students. The professors at APU are by far the high light of my APU experience and in times when I have thought about transferring they were the strongest reason for me to stay.
- I feel like my professors for social work do not integrate faith into our classes in a new and challenging way. All the faith integration seems very surface level. I would like it if we were really challenge and encouraged by professors to talk openly about our faith and future social work practice.
- In the biology department, the professors only seem to acknowledge the best students and tend to discourage the other students from pursuing the major/degree in Biology.
- I have never had any problems scheduling classes for my major. I love all of my professors. They all take genuine interest in the well-being of their students. I feel that I have learned a lot of valuable information from my classes here at APU.

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- All of the APU professors and faculty care about each of the students and try very hard to make sure that we are successful not only in our area of study, but in our spiritual life.
- My professors have pushed me here at APU more than any professor I have ever had. I appreciate the small class room sizes, because it allows me to get to know my peers on a more personal level as well as my professors. I love that prayer and general talks about life and Jesus are encouraged in classes.
- As a social work major there a variety of classes that aim to prepare us to work with various populations. I appreciate that and I appreciate that the staff take the courses and assignments seriously. However, I do feel that with the exception of about two classes offered as part of the Social Work program, most of the classes focus on the micro perspective and not the macro perspective. Macro, although not very popular, is still very important and is included in the mission statement but is not really focused on. I'm in the middle of "Availability of classes" because of that reason.
- I only chose the satisfied option for the amount I have learned at APU because I feel like sometimes professors spend way too much time focusing on irrelevant group projects, busy work, or service learning hours, that the material we are supposed to be learning falls through the cracks.
- Some classes I learn a lot in, other classes I feel like I don't learn very much.

- Most of my professors show me genuine personal care which goes beyond just the classroom. I especially appreciate the few who are obviously passionate about living out their own faith and upholding integrity and consistency in the academic setting.
- My major classes have been very available for me except for the fact that I am one of the last to pick my classes which can make it a bit more difficult to get the teachers I want but that is expected. Many of my professors do devos before class or incorporate it into the lesson which is very beneficial to me to see how it all connects. I also feel that I am learning a lot more at APU than I did at highschool in a shorter amount of time.
- I am an allied health bs so classes are difficult sometimes to get in. My teachers are very encouraging and strive to help us succeed
- Most of my teachers love Jesus which is the best kind of teacher to have.
- My classes here at APU so far have been great and every encounter I have had with professors has been wonderful. This year I have grown a lot in my life/faith and I have learned things in the classroom as well as my life in general.
- APU makes it very hard to graduate on time. Whether classes are too full, classes aren't offered during spring/fall semesters, and the classes I need aren't offered during the summer.
- I really appreciate how nicely the nursing program has laid out the classes, and how available they are.
- Not many of my classes had faith integration but the concepts and basic fundamentals of each class has been extraordinary.
- Political science has the best professors in every aspect. They are about your growth academically but also as a person.

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- I have learned so much in my Bible classes and my faith has been challenged in good ways. I have also learned so much in my major classes and have been given different perspectives than my previous.
- All the professors are open to helping you personally and on the class level. The availability of my classes were great. Psychology is one of the biggest majors so I'm glad to say I got all my classes.
- The business school offers many options for professors and class times and it is convenient. Many of my professors show interest in helping students achieve spiritual growth and it is very encouraging! I have learned so much in just two years here at APU and I am excited for what's to come.
- I love my professors and the enthusiasm they bring to the classroom. They are all encouraging and relate the material to our daily lives.
- All the teachers I have had cared a lot and that's what I need in order for me to understand.
- I am grateful for the information I am learning. The professors I have taken are incredible.
- Most of my professors genuinely care if we are understanding the material, I do have one that just reads off power point and doesn't make the knowledge easy to grasp
- Upper division science classes can be difficult to get in to, especially when professors (who teach a specific and necessary class) leave/go on sabbatical. It makes scheduling for juniors and seniors complicated (e.g. clinical research, neuro)
- Prior to beginning a private college, my expectations were surrounding the idea that these courses would be similar to being in high school and that I was fully prepared to excel in each class. Not having the ability to extend daily classes of the same subject surprised myself and the other individuals placed in each course as well. Comprehending the idea that I have to purchase extra units that revolve around classes that were for free in high school does not sit well with me.
- Freshman and sophomore year I understand not getting into my major classes, but junior and senior year, I should be able to get into the classes I want with no problem. Every semester since freshman year I have had to switch my schedule around during the first week of the semester and that is incredibly stressful especially when I start off missing some of those classes because I had to switch. I am extremely dissatisfied with the availability of my major classes. The great part is that I will fill out this survey, and I am not going to see any change by the time I graduate.
- I have had to reshape my schedule many times previously, since I am a non-honors, non-athlete student, even though I had taken more units than my peers in previous semesters, which placed me higher on the registration scale. I realize athletes and honors students need priority, but it is extremely frustrating when an athlete or honors student of a lower class standing takes a spot in a class ahead of me or another non-athlete, non honors student.
- I am extremely satisfied with both the challenge and encouragement given by my professors within the School of Theology. I have been dissatisfied and unchallenged by general ed courses.
- I believe that having teachers that are so passionate about what they do and they are able to use real life experiences to help teach the students makes the BSW program so great. They know what they are talking about and are honest with the students.
- Some professors take the easy way out of faith integration. They pray before class or take a verse out of context and write it on the board. It's frustrating, I want to be a strong Christian in the workplace and none of these things help me. Let's talk about ethical decisions or what the true meaning of work means in our faith. Also the marketing department on campus need new professors. They are great people but the class content is outdated and I feel like I could have learned a lot more during my time at APU.

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- I am a nursing major and I have learned a plethora of information in all of my classes. From the nursing classes to the general education classes I have been privileged to get every class that I have intended to get and the knowledge that I have acquired I have been able to apply outside of school.
- The APU Nursing program is excellent!
- It is difficult to compare since I have only been to college courses here but I am satisfied with the education that I am receiving and confident that I am growing academically and spiritually as a result.
- I haven't had any problems getting into the classes I need, but sometimes I wish there were more options for my major classes, like not just one option late at night. The late night classes make me feel like I'm out too late, but sometimes that's the only option for a needed class. But either way, I learn a lot in my classes and I'm thankful for that.
- For the most part, I have been satisfied with the availability of my required classes, but there have been some instances where a class has only one offered time and it overlaps with another class with only one offered time.
- Being an athlete I get priority registration, this makes registering for classes a breeze. Classes for my minor however, at only scheduled at inconvenient times.
- Some of the classes are difficult to get into even though I sign up at exactly my register time. My professors don't discourage my spiritual growth, but don't necessarily encourage it other than required faith integration assignments. I've only had one professor discuss my faith with me. The professors/academics at APU have been extremely beneficial to my learning experience. The professors go over and above when it comes to investing in our academic success and are extremely qualified to teach their subject.
- Personal and professional encouragement
- Many of the business classes fill up quickly, so it is difficult to get into the ones I need at the time I desire. I have come across a handful of professors who genuinely care about their students. Spring semester has definitely been better than fall. I was not satisfied at all with the amount I learned in first semester. First year seminar and freshman writing seminar were not up to academic par. I did not feel motivated to try. This semester I am satisfied with the content I am learning and the professors I have.
- Classes should be available for both semesters, not just for spring only, or fall only
- Registration is so early, its hard to know if I will be able to take a class. Also, registration opens before class times/locations are settled. As such, when a classes moves to a time/place I can't make, I can't retake that class.
- There are a lot of class options that I have had the pleasure in taking for my major, however, I know if I went to a different school that had more of a foothold on the film program there would be many more options. My professors have all been extremely kind and understanding. They have made me feel more like an adult and wanting to learn and made me feel like I have belonged at this school more so than the students. I have learned a lot at APU, however, I believe that there shouldn't be as many mandatory GE's. It hinders the learning for my major at times, as my major is dependent on the outside experience I can get.
- There are some classes that we harder to get in and I had to wait another semester in order to take them. For the most part I have had good relationship with my professors. I think that the majority of the professors really do a lot for the students and then have tried to work with me. However, I can name two professors that should not be teachers.

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- My professors, esp. Bible class ones, have pushed me to challenge my own theological and biblical standings in ways I had never thought of before. Profs from my major have affirmed Christians' place and important role within the field I want to go into. I just wish there was more variety of classes open for the journalism major (more crossover with English and Film dept. classes)
- I am a social work major and a commuter so sometimes (because our major is smaller than other majors), I feel that there a limited class times for me to take the classes I need. As a commuter, I do not wish to come to school everyday due to other obligations, such as work or church responsibilities. However, there were times I needed to sign up for classes that were inconvenient for my other life schedules. My professors mostly stress presence ministry in social work, as we are ethically bound to not convert clients to Jesus but to act as Jesus in our workplace. This concept of presence ministry instead of vocal ministry has been very insightful to me in how I live my everyday life as well. Every class, I am constantly learning something new and interesting, so I can never afford to take a day off. I find my classes very stimulating and the content, interesting.
- I feel that my faith Can not be explained to logical arguments thanks to my classes
- -I am undeclared as of right now -Every professor I have had this 2015-2016 school year always made themselves available to help us students, whether it was academically or spiritually. They shared their faith, and explained how faith fit into the subject/field of study that the class covered.
- My professors have been great, but in some classes j don't learn anything
- The studio art classes are too clustered on the same days/times. It makes it very hard to take all of the right classes I need too each semester.
- Since, I am a football player, I get priority registration so I am unsure of how available my major classes are. The professors here are great. I feel like I am learning a solid amount but I think I could be learning more.
- I have never seemed to have a problem with getting the classes that I want. The psychology professors are very wonderful also.
- -
- My registration date was later than other people's, which meant that a lot of classes were already closed or wait listed. I appreciate that professors integrate God in the classroom though prayer and content of the material. I have learned about topics that apply to life, and are foundational for any career.
- My professors in both my major and minor have actively sought to instill growth spiritually as well as academically. They holistically look at my life as a student and a believer, and it has been awesome to see the growth I've experienced because of it.
- The Computer Science program doesn't have enough faculty to offer most classes more than once a year, and the variety of classes leaves some to be desired. That being said, almost every class I do take is very meaningful and helpful.
- For the most part, my professors have challenged me and I have learned a lot in their classes.
- Faith integration occurs everywhere I go. For that simple reason, I am very satisfied.
- I wish there were more upper division classes available for my major (music).
- I am happy about the amount that I have learned in my majors classes in comparison to my gen eds.
- All of my professors have been incredibly inspiring, kind, and encouraging in ways that aid my growth personally, academically, and spiritually. They made me feel like I really mattered and that all areas of my health were important.

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- School of nursing is excellent.
- Outside of Theology and Ministry courses, professors have done little more than pray in class in order to encourage spiritual growth in the classroom. This is not a bad thing, in my experience, as many of them model a Christian life in the way that they work professionally. Nonetheless, there is little explicit spiritual encouragement.
- I'm in the honors college, so I've never had a problem getting classes. The professors I've had have (for the most part) been very helpful in my spiritual growth and learning. Some have been really incredible.
- Many of the teachers here are intimidating because of the amount of knowledge they have about a certain subject however they all are extremely nice and care about their subjects succeeding. Most of the classes that I am taking are strictly reserved for nursing students so it is very satisfying to not have to worry about that.
- The professors I have had the privilege of having have all known their material very well, and have been able to teach it in a practical and relative manner. They are willing to go beyond the walls of the classroom to help aid students in learning from the course.
- Most of my classes are easy to get because it isn't super competitive. But sometimes classes are canceled because there isn't enough enrollment. That's pretty frustrating. The professors are pretty great though for the most part and I feel I'll learned a lot in the classes I've taken here.
- APU offer small sessions amount classroom, and give everyone a chance to engage with professor, such as ask question and communicate with student from their groups and class
- The computer science/engineering department is fantastic at exemplifying what it is to be a Christian within our field of study
- Teachers were very helpful and understanding when it came to learning new materials. They did everything a good professor would.
- My profs have gone above and beyond what is necessary. I have always been able to get into the classes that I want and need.
- The nursing classes are very easy to enroll in as we are cohorted. My professors are amazing, they generally attempt to facilitate spiritual growth, and are very informative courses.
- classes are difficult to get into, but I learn so much in the Communication department, and in my upper division classes have prompted much growth
- Professors and faculty continue to encourage me and work with me so I am able to get the classes I need.
- The professors are always trying to attend to the needs of their students and treat us more than just students, but as friends!
- I have obviously learned more in some classes than others, but overall a good amount. If I wasn't an Honors Student in the old program I WOULD NOT be saying this; Honors classes and professors are the best!!!!!! My Accounting profs are also super helpful and awesome and really want us to succeed and learn.
- I wish the communication department had more public relations classes offered while I was able to take them.
- Allow those that are less spiritual in faith to not be oppressed by the amount of faith related materiel thrown at them. Is a real turn off to the whole thing.

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- My major is Christian Ministries out of the Practical Theology department. The only issue I have had with availability of classes had to do with a paperwork issue between the department and one stop. Other than that, my academic experience at APU has been deeply formative. I have enjoyed connection with my classmates and professor's as well as been challenged to think deeply about the world and my faith.
- As a psychology major a lot of majors compete for the same classes, it is difficult as a psychology major to gain the classes you need. But once I got in the class, faculty and staff are great!
- I feel much more spiritually supported in the classroom when my professors gets to know me personally, thanks to small class sizes and effort on my part to get to know the professor. However, there is not much crossing over between spiritual life and academic life, which I would like to see more of. I realize that is a hard boundary to blur, but I think more conversation could help this issue.
- I don't think I have learned as much as I could have so far in my time at Apu.
- Killer classes. You get out what you put in.
- My teachers are very caring and aware of homework for other classes. I hear stories from my friends of how their professors don't really care about them or know much about them, and I love how APU is different about that.
- Professors have showed a personal interest my my growth both academically and personally/ spiritually, which has created mentoring relationships that I really feel will last a lifetime.
- My freshman year I had a professor that instead of encouraging me, tended to tear us down as a class. But I know that this is not the norm at APU and many including myself did go to the dean and complain about this professor
- I have been very satisfied in my Biblical Studies classes and moderately satisfied in my Sociology classes
- Some professors aren't very helpful
- The professors here make it their priority to help you grow spiritually, no matter where you are in your faith. And the professors in the AES department are not only very knowledgeable and really challenge your learning, but they are also very personable.
- Most professors are great. There those who shouldn't be teaching as well.
- For my particular major, it isn't difficult to sign up for classes. However, it can get difficult signing up for the general education classes because the classes fill up fast! I have had a positive experience with all of my professors so far, and I feel like I'm learning a lot in such a short amount of time.
- Professors encourage students to come by office hours and they were very helpful in directing students into the right path for them.
- My professors have gone above and beyond to ensure that I succeed that way I have grown so much over the course of the year.
- There was no personal spiritual growth in the classroom. I hope professors make mood to visit them to ask spiritual questions.
- My professors are all great. They are clearly explaining the concepts of the class while intertwining my faith into everything. It's an outstanding experience.
- Any class I have needed I was able to get into. I have had 2-3 professors that have made an impact on my life. I do not remember the majority of the information that was pushed on me during my time at APU.
- Too much faith integration, not enough learning.

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- My general Business Core classes have been some of the worst classes because the professors do not lecture. They do not take pride in their work but rather expect us to learn all the information on our own.
- High quality staff that provides high quality care and education.
- The teachers here are unlike anything I have had in my entire life of schooling. The support and kindness along with a great education that they offer is so motivating.
- Overall, I've always been able to get the classes I need. As a film major, most of my education has stemmed from my production classes, where the practical application of what I learn in class becomes a reality. Sometimes what I've learned in class is helpful, other times it's not quite as practically applicable.
- I feel like classes could be more challenging
- My classes are all in all pretty great, I try to get as much out of them as possible, and they generally are very key to growth.
- Some professors teach the class well and others just go on rants about random things and do not explain the material
- I feel like Christ isn't really brought up in class very often and when He is, its normally just in prayer before class.
- Some classes have been awesome and so really have not been. Honestly, have the good profs train techniques to the bad profs.
- English classes seem to be canceled at the last minute, constantly. It's very frustrating.
- APU did a great job at providing unique experiences and classes to broaden my intellectual spectrum
- All of the faculty and staff are very supportive and want you to succeed.
- At times, it was difficult fulfilling a major course requirement because the class size was unnecessarily capped at an unpractical number of students. It is a wonderful thing APU is growing in size and number, but the classes need to grow with it. An example of this is the international business course. Despite the number of sections offered, each class is capped at around 22 students which leaves over 100 uncounted for - forcing them to risk waiting until the very last semester of senior year to receive the credit.
- I have learned more in my year at APu than I had my two years at my JC.
- My major has more than a few weak classes
- As a graduating senior, I have been satisfied overall with my experience at APU.
- My professors do encourage spiritual growth but it rarely seems personal or genuine.
- I have had professors who have spoken just encouragement and wisdom into my life in the class room that has given me a reassurance to know that I am on the right path to where God has led me.
- The Political Science transfer requirement makes it extremely difficult for transfers to take the courses that they want. The higher credit total to graduate is also unsatisfactory.
- I have not had much trouble getting the classes I have needed. I have had an extremely positive experience with my professors, especially in my major classes. They have been both supportive and have reinforced why I chose my major. I have had a couple classes in which I thought that I could have been challenged more, but even those classes often had very engaging and fascinating content.

- The classes that I took challenged me.
- Personally I feel as though basics are often emphasized a bit too much and we stay reviewing past stuff because most people don't know or understand it. As a result we are unable to move forward in the class together and the professor often has to "dumb" things down or slow down and sometimes skim or entirely skip over important and big chapters. This is great because students learn what they did not learn but it harms others' education by not allowing them to move forward and learn more. Were requirements more difficult, it would make the university more prestigious but already allow a step ahead when it comes to learning. The students would already be prepared with the pre-requisite knowledge they are supposed to have.
- Mentioned in previous section
- Students have relatively low gpa so rather than focusing on making the courses hard, other parts of the system need to be developed
- My honors general education courses were very difficult and my non honors general education courses were extremely easy.
- I think APU accepts too many students per year with little admission criteria. It would be nice to up the standards so that a normal 3.5 cumulative GPA is Cum Laude, like at every other college/university.
- I haven't chosen my major for sure yet so the second question is up in the air. GE also doesn't apply to me.
- I wouldn't say that APU is an easy school to get into, but I think that the admissions requirements are helpful to those who want to further pursue their education but aren't sure if they have the opportunity.
- I am very smart when I put my thinking cap on and soar through the books. I love reading, writing and challenging myself through puzzles and obstacles. I did not do very well on my ACT, horrible actually, but I'm smart and I know I can do anything I set my mind to. Some stuff I just wasn't made for, and other things-academic wise-my soul burns brightly for.
- Although being prestigious can be important, I think it is more important to be available to different kinds of students. Not everyone can get a Christian education even if they wanted to.
- All of the classes I have taken were a lot harder than high school so it was definitely a challenge to stay on top of my game but professors help immensely with that
- Do not make admission guidelines harder. There are many bright students who have a heart for the Lord that want to go here but may not have the best ACT/SAT scores.
- I have been very satisfied with the relationships I have been able to build with my professors and the love that they show their students. Not only do professors at APU care for their students, they make it known that they are available and praying for their students. I have loved the role my professors have played on my faith and spiritual journey. They encourage me and challenge me, and that is something rare in the University setting.
- I think that the general education program is a little bit rough for many people because the hardest classes I have taken have been 100 level general education classes and I think that if that is what has brought down my GPA that is a poor representation of how I have taken on my classes since it has nothing to do with my chosen major.
- I think I've gotten to know my professors pretty well because they have shown interest in my success in the class which makes them approachable.

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- I feel like some professors want to have a relationship with their students while others don't. Some don't because they're adjuncts. Others might not try because they're not on campus a lot. I feel like some departments don't push for office hours. Some classes are hard, while others are easy-just depends on the subject matter. The GE requirements are you extremely easy, but they're good in that they help the transition from high school to college smoother. I feel like a lot of people assume it's easy to get into APU because of our acceptance rates; however I appreciate the school admitting more students of minorites.
- APU should continue to admit the students it finds to be a best fit. This school is not some amazingly prestigious school and that is because the goal of the school is God first. The students that come here want to in some way serve the Lord and they also take their academics seriously, this is what makes APU special, and why you shouldn't try and change the focus of the school.
- My major classes have been some of the most challenging classes I've taken here at APU, but they push me in a way that has helped me grow stronger in the skills I need to succeed in my industry. The GE's were neither difficult nor easy. Each class had its struggles and its benefits. I learned so much through classes I wouldn't have taken otherwise and I've been given wonderful instruction by wonderful professors.
- Every class demands more than what I expected.
- My major academic classes are difficult, but not impossible. There is always an application or instance to analyze using what I learn.
- I generally agree with the top three statements. I feel like I can build a relationship with my professors, because they are all so approachable. The course work also challenges me to think about what I believe in as well. In regards to making APU harder to get into I do not really feel like that is my place to choose the opportunity others get.
- APU makes the required Bible courses a little more difficult then expected for a General Education but overall am satisfied with my experience so far!!
- I feel that it depends on the major that you are in and the professor you have for each course that makes the classes hard or easy. So far I have had a mix of both hard and easy but I feel like I have been able to learn a lot and take with me a lot from each class.
- YES TO THE LAST QUESTION!!! Everyone gets into this school!!!! It's frustrating to feel like I'm in public high school again.
- This system is pretty good
- Acceptance rate is too high if APU is looking to be labeled a prestigious university
- Most of my professors genuinely cared about their students and developed a rigorous yet exciting curriculum that I felt comfortable with.
- As a TA I have seen a lot of freshmen come into Exodus/Deuteronomy not able to read or even write with a competence.
- There are people here solely because of their athletic talents and some of their lifestyles are not beneficial for APU nor its students. I feel that APU should have more requirements for admissions and that goes for athletes. No exceptions for star athletes who will benefit our sports teams! It's ridiculous that they not only receive admission, but also get offered huge scholarships!
- Academic prestige comes from the academics, not the admissions policies.

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- Most of the Professors I have had have been very receptive to me as a student and have wanted to participate in my academic success, there have only be a couple who have been standoff-ish. Most of the classes for my major are academically rigorous, but there always seems to be that one professor who simplifies the material too much. I do not know how i feel about making the university admissions more competitive. I had a 2.9 GPA graduating from High School and my college GPA is now a 3.7; therefore, I do not think it would necessarily behoove the university to raise standards to SUCH a high degree.
- I'm still navigating what is looks like engage more with professors and develop relationships with them, which I think will come with time. Right now, I've only done intro courses for my major which haven't been too difficult, but I know they will get more challenging going into upper division courses. I don't take GE as part of the Honors College. APU admissions requirements don't really seem selective at all, but some more selectively might increase the academic atmosphere among students and make the academics more engaging.
- If my professors have been open and welcoming people, I've generally been able to meet and converse with them outside the classroom. I think that the school is not too difficult to get into, however I do think that there is an acceptable level of course rigor once you do take required classes within a particular major.
- I think APU lets in a lot of students that don't take their academics seriously. I think APU should make requirements harder for students. The general education classes have furthered my knowledge about a lot of subjects, but have not necessarily challenged me academically.
- I am a physics student and my classes have challenged me significantly. I appreciate the rigor. At times it is difficult to get to know the professors, but nonetheless it is worthwhile.
- My General Education courses are some times harder than my major classes, which frustrates me.
- If you make the classes "harder", than the University will want to make it more expensive to go here because its more "prestigious";
- we are very competitive
- I feel like many GE classes are designed just as a requirement and not to inspire students to be life long learners
- Some general education courses challenge me academically, others do not. It depends on the specific course and specific professor. I don't think APU should make its admissions requirements harder to make it more prestigious because even though we aren't one of the most "prestigious schools" around, we do produce many high-quality students. I appreciate how APU gives more students who didn't necessarily do the best academically in high school the chance to attend, learn and grow, and even get to know Christ!
- I do not think the admissions process to APU would necessarily make it more prestigious or not. The letters of recommendation i feel is what shows the true authentic quality to the student you are accepting, because there is no bias, its someone's true opinion
- I don't necessarily reach out to my professors outside of class.
- I believe it's easier to get into APU than other schools.
- I do not support the idea of admitting students on probation. I feel that it is fairly easy to get accepted to the university, however once here the classes can be rigorous and challenging, setting students up for failure or having to work immensely harder than expected. If admitted on account of being on academic probation, the chance that you will not be able to maintain the grades needed to stay are increased.

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- I am in the Honors program so I do not have experience with GE's. My courses do challenge me and I have learned so much from them. I don't really think much should be changed in regards to the application process.
- my classes are challenging for my major, but I appreciate that because I learn a lot. General Ed classes are not super challenging but I still feel I learn a good amount.
- The difficulty in some classes allowed me to become a stronger person.
- I think sometimes I am intimidated or scared to meet with my professors outside of class. My major classes give me so much information which challenges me. My gen eds, especially science and bible classes are truly challenging because of the way that they make me think. I think people think that "everyone" gets into APU which makes it seem less credible to outsiders.
- They are General Ed classes. They should not be too hard because not everyone is a writer or a historian. They have other strengths.
- As mentioned before, I am impressed and grateful with how intent the professors are in having a relationship with the students. The classes for my major are very challenging. They are without a doubt a higher caliber of work and new style of academic work. My general education courses are challenging enough. I have had very few over the course of the year, but while I focus on my major, it is a challenge for me to give my efforts to the classes I (quite frankly) do not care too much about. I would also like to point out that it would be nice to experience a more innovatively interactive style of learning for GE classes. I shadowed an arts appreciation class this semester and one of their text books was written for the sole purpose of being destroyed and forced into disorganization. This was to demonstrate the opening of the mind and heart to the expressive release all artists need to face. My english professor relates the topics being taught in class to personal experiences and personal or random stories giving us interesting ties to help both memorize and understand at the same time what is being taught. I believe that it is possible, and sometimes more effective, to teach/learn by interactive techniques as oppose to just making slideshows with bullet points that are as memorable as the "did you know?" column on the side of some random textbook. I do not believe making courses "harder" will make the university academically prestigious. I believe that creative learning and learning by experience in any topic will give students a unique upper hand mentally and physically in the real world and even in our spiritual journeys.
- I'm in the Honors College and don't take GEs. I don't think APU should make admissions harder because then we wouldn't have as diverse of a student body. Also, that would put unnecessary pressure on the students to be extraordinary.
- I enjoy APU because not only is the student population motivated academically but also for the fellowship feel on campus. This school is about much more than academics and making it harder to get in to sound more prestigious would potentially deny prospective students that are interested in the school for the Christian atmosphere and not solely for the academic part.
- Because of the pretty small class sizes, I have been able to get to know most of my professors pretty well. Nursing is definitely a tough major so my classes are always challenging. Clinicals provide a different kind of challenge that involves many emotions. The clinical instructors have done a great job at helping in these areas as well. The hardest Gen Eds are probably the Bible classes. They always seem to require a lot of work. Although I learn a lot, I wish they were more discussion based.

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- General Ed classes often are repeats of high school classes. In fact GE classes often feel like a way for universities to earn more money teaching what has already been taught. I think the information is beneficial but not necessary if taught 2-3 times between middle school, high school, college. As far as making requirements more rigid, I think because we place God first at APU who comes into our school is less important than the quality individuals who graduate from our it. The Kingdom of God has view requirements, primarily accepting the invitation to the wedding banquet. Whether you were from the streets or one of the original invited is unimportant.
- A few of my general education courses were not very helpful including my reading class that I should have tested out of. My freshman year I didn't understand the process of testing out of courses and I wasn't presented with clear information about the process so I took a pointless class. All we did was read a book as a class everyday and I can guarantee there wasn't a student that learned a thing in that class.
- As a transfer student it was hard for me to enjoy my general classes because they were not as challenging and I didn't have that connection with my classmates.
- The admission requirements are fine just the way they are because we are not an exclusively academic school. We are called by the Almighty God so we have other things to be learned here. If we were at a school that didn't care about striving to put "God First", then I would say "yes, we need to be more academically prestigious."
- Some professors are not as easy to build relationships with because they don't seem to be overly approachable. Biochemistry is extremely difficult, so I do believe that I am being stretched to the limit with it. Honors is very challenging for me; however, that being said, it is not GE. I think the last question has poor motivation to it. This university should not be concerned so much with prestige as its mission. Part of that mission is having students who care and try their hardest, so if the standards must grow more difficult to discourage students who are not here to work hard at a Christ centered education, then so be it. But if the only purpose is to try to become better looking and have a more inflated reputation, then I believe this question needs some more careful and reflective thought.
- APU does have challenging classes and I feel I am being challenged in a very positive way academically. I believe APU could make it harder to come here but that would also mean less students could experience how brilliant it is to be here and experience a God first atmosphere which is the key center of an APU education!

The GE professors make it seem like they are what matters most and while I understand that English and pub comm are important, other classes aren't necessary. Psych doesn't matter to a science major!
- I have had a great time relating to my professors and have enjoyed getting to know them very much. I also have grown as a result of all my classes. I would not be opposed to making APU harder to get into to make it more prestigious.
- I love that I can have a personal relationship with my professor if I so choose! I know APU isn't the most academically rigorous school, but I think there are still outlets for students who want to be really challenged academically to find those challenges and plug in. i.e. Honors, Oxford, upper div classes, etc.
- I spent a year at High Sierra. the gen ed classes there were great and very challenging. I had a sociology class that was great--not too difficult but learned a lot. Pub Comm was not helpful for me, regardless of its difficulty; it had so much busy work, which was kind of a waste of time in my opinion. Get rid of busy work in Ged Ed classes. That's what was great about High Sierra Gen Ed! You can find academically challenging classes and professors, and you can find easy ones. I don't think APU should try and change who it is with academics; be you APU! Well, being an honors student, I have found my Global Studies major to be academically rigorous. I have heard other departments could improve in rigor/challenge (e.g. business).
- My major classes have really helped me understand the world around me better. They have highly trained me to be a better Christian in this world that we live in.

- There haven't really been any professors that aim for that type of relationship with their students, maybe only two have began to go into that area because they are more relaxed professors so students feel more comfortable going up to them for a normal discussion. My major classes do challenge me, they just sometimes don't feel like such a challenge because I'm interested same with the general education classes, I don't necessarily like them so they're harder for me.
- APU should make the university requirements harder, not just simply in terms of GPA. Currently APU has an incoming GPA of about 3.5-3.6, which can be increased, but one of the most important things is testing. An example would be requiring AP scores and SAT subject tests scores. They do not have to be perfect 5s or 800s, but I believe that this is a method for differentiating different prospective students that may all have high GPAs. I have had many peers get into the major they want in nursing and science with 3.9 and higher GPAs, but many dropped out or failed, because the academic rigors were too high. This can be attributed to a lack of an academic challenge in their high school years. Good AP scores (3 or 4 and higher) and SAT subject test scores (600 and higher) do not mean better academic success in college, but they can increase "academic survivability" in college.

I took specific classes that I knew would develop me into academic rigor (such as Women in Biblical Tradition taught by Kay Smith) but without those I would not have had the same amount of preparation work for grad school.

Classes for my major are all repeating because I have taken most of the classes the credits didn't transfer so academically I am not very challenged. I only took public communication this year, but the class was taught poorly and the teacher was degrading. Making admissions harder isn't going to help the prestige of a school. That should be done by having a higher GPA standard and quality professors.
- My major classes are challenging but the general education classes are not that challenging
- I generally haven't developed relationships with my professors. My higher level major classes challenge me academically. The general education work challenges me academically in subjects that are difficult for me, like the sciences. I do not believe we should make apu harder to get into because it creates a more diverse environment the way it is.
- I am already drowning in homework and studying being in the nursing program. If they made it harder I would fail and drop out.
- I was able to develop relationships with my professors because they were so approachable. The classes are definitely difficult but help me gain knowledge.
- I've loved all of my major classes and have learned so much. The professors have challenged my thinking and stretched my understanding.
- Everyone is challenged in one way or another. There is no need to make it harder to enter APU.
- Most of my classes provide an academic rigor and allow me to expand my work ethic.
- The only GE class that challenged me was by Bible classes. I think APU is already academically respected and thought of highly.
- I like how APU is more open to students of all academic ranges, especially since we are a private Christian university and we are not only providing academic growth but also spiritual growth.

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- Some of the professors seem to be too busy to meet with students, although sometimes they encourage office hours they aren't always available at convenient times. The academic rigor at APU is not very challenging, but it may just be because I'm in what is considered an easier major. I do believe the admission requirements should be more difficult, academic prestige is pretty important to me and fortunately APU had other benefits that outweighed this need for me, otherwise I probably would have chosen another university.
- There are some students who do not have the intelligence of the collegiate level. They should not have been accepted.
- In regards, to the fourth point, what matters is the content that is covered in classes as this prepares students for their professions.
- If this university was more academically prestigious, I most likely would not have been admitted. It allows for a larger variety of people from different backgrounds, religions, and intellectual standings.
- The general education requirements are rigorous enough and sometimes even too rigorous depending on the professor.
- Obviously college is hard. I try to balance the hard classes with the less time consuming classes.
- There should be a higher GPA (3.8) and other academic and non-academic activities in order to be considered for admission to APU. However, the GPA should not be the only thing considered for admission.
- Some courses required to my major do not coincide with the classes I am obligated to take in order to graduate, and some professors merely recite their information rather than teach it.
- Science, in general, is challenging. I've heard from USC graduates that attended APU that the Biol department prepares students well and even at excess in certain areas. General education courses are not equal difficulty and some seem unnecessary if they are not challenging or exciting in the slightest
- Only one professor has ever seemed like they didn't want a relationship with students, and that same professor I strongly disliked, all the others have been quite open. Prestige is not earned by making a school harder to get into, a university is academically prestigious when their faculty, facilities, and projects provide the best learning environment for students, and when said students can graduate and succeed in their fields. Academic prestige is the result of alumni genuinely being prepared for and excelling in their field and attributing that success (at least in part) to their university. I felt insulted at an event for networking with JPL because they don't seriously consider graduates of the science program at APU, especially compared to other programs in the area. Perhaps if more money went to Biology and Chemistry research and lab equipment, and APU had better relations with the scientific community (not just medical and academic) APU would be considered more prestigious.
- Most of my classes have challenged me academically and intellectually. I have been able to grow personally through this, and I have enjoyed all my classes, excluding two at the most.
- Although I have really enjoyed my major classes, General Education courses have been ones I have sometimes dreaded. For the most part, they are sometimes difficult for me to remain engaged with, because they often have a lot of busy work. It also becomes difficult for to stay motivated when other students slack off, since it makes me question if my efforts are even necessary. As far as admissions requirements, it might be good to raise them, not so much for the prestige, but more so for students entering to have a better idea of the rigor of the courses they might be taking.

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- APU challenges me academically and being a nursing major is a privilege. I have learned more than I could imagine.
- I addressed previously that the content from my classes is outdated and most of the work in the marketing major is more busy work than things that actually help me learn.
- Concerning the last questions: I don't think you should make it harder to get into APU, I think it is awesome that students can be given a second chance to do well academically at APU after high school. If anything just make the courses harder.
- All of my classes have been very rigorous and I am blessed to have gone through them. With that, the professors that I have had, I have been able to develop a student-professor relationship with each and every one of them. Some closer than others, but nonetheless, I have yet to experience any difficulties with my professors. The general education classes do challenge me for the most part. There are the occasional few where I have searched for the "easier" general education classes just to balance out with my nursing classes, but then sometimes, those classes end up challenging me a bit more than I thought they would have. APU has a great reputation and I think they should do whatever they can to maintain their prestigious reputation.
- I do not believe I am learning anything I do not already know in my major I wish it would expand a bit more. I do believe the requirements to get into the university should be a bit tougher so those that greatly value education can be surrounded in a more scholarly oriented environment and not just people forced to go to college.
- I am a hard working student and it is more motivating for me when my peers are around the same level of academia. I do not do well when my classes are not stimulating and it is also difficult to gauge my own learning when the level at which professors are teaching has to account for varying levels.
- I believe APU does a good job at challenging us academically and spiritually
- I like how small the classes are because it makes it really easy to get to know the professors and grow relationships with them. I don't really think that APU needs to make admission harder. I think that the people that end up here are meant to be here and that God has put them here at the school for a reason.
- There have only been a couple of professors that I have had a hard time connecting to, and all the classes that I have taken have been challenging according to the subject and some more so because of the professor. It would be nice to be a more academically prestigious university, but I have friends that barely hit the admissions requirements due to bad test scores and yet they have thrived here. Everyone should be given the chance to learn and grow at APU, and that would be awful to deny someone that opportunity based on a bad test score.
- As a psych major, I have been taking overarching classes, ones that go 10,000 feet above and observe the topic studied. We only get a general overview. I wish I was able to study more into the specifics of each class and have a more academically rigorous course load. APU has honestly felt like high school part two. There are still people in the classes that don't know anything and pass with a high grade, and those who know a lot that are struggling to pass due to not being as charismatic as others.
- I don't have problems getting to know my professors, they are generally friendly. My major classes are extremely challenging yet interesting. Some of my general education courses were fairly challenging, while others were too easygoing. There is a mixture of academic motivation throughout the university; there are people who are extremely dedicated to their education and others who don't care for their grades whatsoever.
- AES isn't the hardest major, so the classes aren't that academically challenging

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- Some professors make themselves available and approachable more than others. It just depends. Last semester my major class did not challenge me academically, I did not think it was difficult enough thus was unmotivated. This semester my major classes are definitely challenging. GE courses like philosophy and CLFM challenge me academically while courses like freshman writing seminar and first year seminar do not. APU should raise their standards instead of accepting what seems like anyone. It will only better the institution.
- The rigor of the courses is already tough enough. Where we are making B's and C's other institutions make A's and B's. It's hard to compete with those schools when your grades look 'worse'. We should wait, let our own record prove itself.
- APU should offer a variety of classes that are interesting
- All my professors have let themselves be open to knowing their students, which I appreciate. My major classes challenge me in more ways socially and challenge my experience. I have to do plenty of research beforehand to match my other fellow classmates. My GE's do challenge me academically, however, there are times where I feel even more overwhelmed as it hurts my major at times where I have to choose to not go to an event where I can gain more experience in my field and stay home instead to do my GE homework that could consist up to full 30 page reports. I do believe that APU should raise the admission requirements to a slightly higher GPA and be more in depth about what the corner stones are so that the prospective student understands fully of what kind of school they are being committed to. (Chapel requirements, service hour requirements)
- I found myself challenged in my honors GE classes, and in most of the classes that are in my major. However, I definitely don't see a sense of motivation or rigor in a lot of APU students, which can pull the energy of the classroom down, esp. when students are entitled or disinterested.
- I have enjoyed relationships with most of my professors, whether they are in my major or not due to their care for the students and their love for God. I am constantly inspired in different ways by different professors. The classes for my major of social work are academically very challenging and also stimulating. I feel I am learning a lot and am being equipped for the future. My G.E. classes were half-challenging and half-easy. Most of the G.E. classes were more enjoyable than challenging in my opinion and allowed me to adjust to college life during my Freshman year. I have a friend who did not do academically well in high school, but was motivated by APU to study hard and do well so that she can succeed in the future. She got into APU, despite her low academic GPA and SAT score but is currently working hard to graduate and is taking her academics seriously. Seeing her makes me believe that everyone should have a chance to attend a wonderful university such as APU, if it encourages them to do better with their lives.
- I believe that some classes were challenging and others were not, however I do try to keep up with my work and not let myself overload with work. This could be why I do not feel too stretched, I also realize I have had some significant take away's from each class I have taken at APU.
- -The professors I have had have been open and have made sure that they seem approachable to their students -I am undeclared, so I'm currently taking G.E. classes -My G.E. coursework does challenge me in academically healthily -I personally don't care about this one. If the current students of APU are retaining high grades, then, to me at least, the school is academically prestigious. Just because you make it harder to get into a school because of grades, does not mean that it will inherently reflect once the student is admitted into APU.
- APUs academics are excellent. We shouldn't damage a person's chance to come to APU based on the fact that they don't excel to a certain standard academically. APU should embrace students of all diversities culturally and academically, by challenging them to push themselves

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- I would say that my relationship with my professors is improving as I finish out my time at APU. Also, the professors in my department challenge each student to live out what they are teaching and to practice it in our internships.
- I care about learning far more than prestige. The amount of progress experienced over the course of university is far more important than having enough merit to get into a prestigious university. I value my learning experiences at APU far above any accomplishments in high school that made me a strong applicant.
- I'm a nursing major
- Look, I'm actually pissed that Gen Ed's were so hard. We should be challenged more in classes for our major rather than classes we'll just toss out of our heads the second we pass them.
- Art professors are the best.
- As a Christian school, APU is uniquely diverse. This incredible school should not be reserved for the academically elite, but rather strive to be identified as a hospitable environment where students from a variety of backgrounds can learn and grow together.
- I feel like a lot of the GE classes are repeat of things we learned in high school or things we learned about in high school AP classes.
- I like the standard that APU has now.... And for those who choose, the Honor's College is a great opportunity to be pushed harder with higher expectations. I think the School of Music should have higher standards so that we a more prestigious school of musicians. APU is known for a good music program... I would like for it to be GREAT. Our graduate & doctoral program for the school of music is not adequate either. We can absolutely step up our game.
- I've always excelled when it's come to school, and so my GE classes were sometimes easier than high school courses I had taken. I think that the major plays a huge role in how academically challenging APU is for each student.
- Like I said before, the majority of my classes for my major do challenge me academically, but there are a couple professors that I do not feel are motivated to teach us beyond the text. It is very discouraging to show up to class knowing that I am most likely not going to be taught relevant information and it is also difficult when there is a language barrier and I cannot understand my own professor clearly. I have been able to develop great relationships with the majority of my professors but again there are a couple that are very harsh and opinionated and I have heard from multiple students that they don't even try to give their opinions in the professors lectures because they shut them down a majority of the time. It is one thing to be challenged in order to learn and grow, but it is another to be shut down time after time. I want to reiterate that these negative experiences have only been from two professors. The rest of my classes have been wonderful, challenging, and at the end of the semester I have gained a great appreciation for the material I have learned and for the professor as well.
- Only some teachers have reached out beyond the classroom. Some classes aren't necessarily academically challenging.
- There were some general education classes that I thought were somewhat of a waste of time, and then others that I thought were way too hard.
- I am doing well as a international student in apu.
- The General Education coursework is all over the place. It was hard for me to stomach the amount of debt a required course such as health was putting me in. However, courses such as Exo/Deu and Freshman Writing Seminar changed my life.
- Nursing is a challenging major.

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- The level of academic rigor at APU is less than I had hoped upon enrolling in the institution. Although I am satisfied with my career here, professors have consistently been satisfied with significantly less than my best effort. Raising the admissions requirements may not do the trick, but I had hoped to receive more of a challenge in my undergraduate experience.
- Sometimes it seems like some students hold back others from being challenged academically, so it might be helpful to have harder requirements.
- The professors at APU are very nice, I just personally struggle with talking to someone who is so smart. I have learned so much from my major classes and because the classes are somewhat difficult I have learned how to be a better student and I have learned how to better manage my time. I do not think that the GE classes here are difficult but it is nice to go to a nice, easy GE class after a long day of physiology. The nursing school here is very prestigious but it is frustrating to see some people who don't care about their education and complain about the hard classes they have to take when I am taking harder classes.
- I think I've been able to build great relationships with almost all of my professors in my major. They're great. That being said I don't think the work in my major classes and gen eds have been too bad. There are times when it's pretty challenging (in major classes) but it's only for a little bit and then things kind of die down for a bit. And I mean the fact that it's not the hardest thing ever has allowed me to do other things on campus and with Young Life and other ministries.
- While I feel that my major courses challenge me academically, I find that General Education courses are easy in comparison and do not challenge me in the ways that I wish they did.
- I've heard students on campus say, "Are there people that don't get accepted to APU?" That's not what I want to hear about my university, and I assume that's not what the university wants to hear either. I am a transfer student so I did not take many GE courses here.
- GE classes were what I expected. My major specific classes were harder and I loved the challenge!
- The general education courses do not challenge me academically, however, I believe that they are challenging for some freshman level students.
- I enjoy the difficulty in classes that helps me expand my knowledge. I do believe APU does not seem as academically prestigious as I know it is because of the acceptance rate
- I don't think it is that great if a school is known as academically prestigious. It just matters how you use what you learn and how you work with the people you meet.
- I struggle a lot trying to maintain class work and spiritual obligations at this school
- Professors are friendly and take their jobs seriously to ensure that students are learning and not just taking pointless classes.
- The classes are difficult both in the general education and in my major, but that doesn't mean they are impossible. Classes are supposed to be hard because this is college, but not outrageously impossible.
- I really like my Honors and Accounting professors. My business classes are not very challenging (when you're an Honors student some things are pretty easy), but overall I think that it was a good load. My GE's, specifically theology and bible, do challenge me because they are HONORS!!! I love them because they make you think, rather than just complete assignments. I am the biggest fanatic for the Honors Program. However, I don't think that the admissions requirements should be tougher. Many other people are able to come here because our academics are not too hard. **JUST KEEP THE HONORS PROGRAM FOR THOSE WHO NEED IT.**

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- Major classes challenge me academically because it is all new information and it takes time to understand it. GE classes aren't very academically challenging for me because I took a lot of the same classes and learned the same information during high school, so it is just basically an elongated review. I think APU already has done a fine job keeping their name academically prestigious, so I believe the requirements should remain the same and shouldn't be altered in either direction.
- I love all my professors and so appreciate that they know who I am! I am challenged within my major and enjoy knowing that I am learning. Some General Education teachers are easier than others which makes it hard to strongly agree! :)

- Some of my general education coursework was much more difficult than others. - Once you get into your major you are challenged because generally it is new material (upper div's). But GE's usually just seem to be full of busy work.
- Coursework has proved very challenging in certain classes and a walk in the park for many of my Gen Ed requirement classes. It is largely the basic science classes I have had trouble with, although that is where my interest lies. I think the Gen Ed classes should be, not rigorous, but not a piece of cake. They are the only exposure to many subjects that any of us will receive.

- The film major classes are not necessarily academically challenging. Certainly, they can be challenging, but more in practicality and technical skill, and not as much academic rigor.
