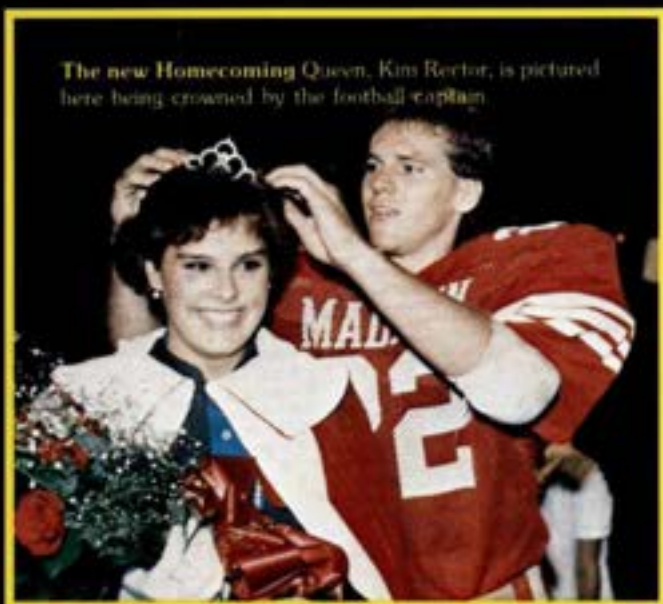

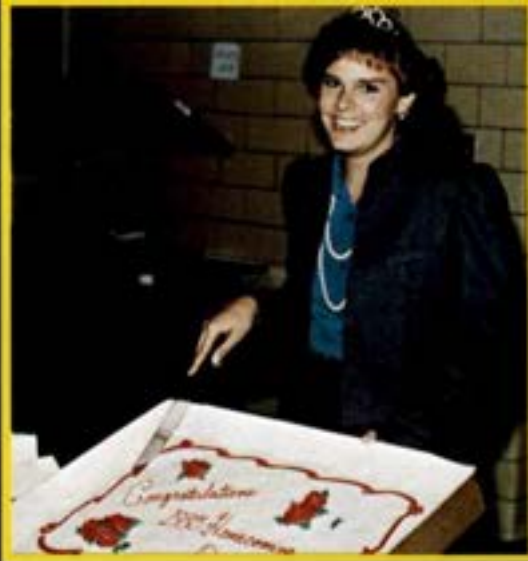

FRIENDS AND FUN INSPIRE LIFE

MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving), DADD (Doctors Against Drunk Driving), and TADD (Truckers Against Drunk Driving) are just a few organizations that were formed to prevent deaths due to drunk driving accidents. One of the most popular groups, SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving), actively came to Madison this year. Drunk driving is the number one cause of deaths among youth ages 16-24. In 1984, ten thousand 16-24 year olds died as a result of drunk driving.

High school SADD chapters in Indiana primarily result from the death of students in that particular area. Students here at Madison have decided to join the fight to save our young people from dying due to the mixing of alcohol while driving.

Here at Madison there have been no drunk driving accidents in the past couple of years that were seriously damaging to a student's life or health. However, former students of 1979 will never forget the very tragic alcohol related accident that seriously injured one student and stole the lives of two others. Fortunately, there have been no other such reported accidents from this area, but the students here don't want to take any chances.

HADD (Hoosiers Against Drunk Driving), is a program for Indiana high school students which was set up by governor Robert Orr. This program is sponsored by the Indiana Governor's Task Force to Reduce Drunk Driving and held a conference August 17 and 18 in which area high school students participated including two from Madison. This two day conference teaches safety and awareness on the use and abuse of drugs and alcohol. HADD is the only national group that is supported by the state and the only one of its kind. Students went to the HADD conference and brought back ideas to start their own SADD groups. SADD provides many services for students and their parents. The contract states that neither the student or the parent will drive or ride with some one while drunk.

Another major activity that SADD was involved in was partial sponsorship of a New Year's Eve "lock-in" to grades 9-12 with an opportunity to enjoy in a chemical-free atmosphere.

With a growing number of pressures put on teens today, students are taking a stand against the pressure to use drugs and alcohol. Friends can now tell each other if they have had a few too many, and they can especially say "Don't Drink and Drive!"

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla.—Ships and aircraft searched the sea today for debris from the space shuttle Challenger and the remnants of the five main and two auxiliary engines that fell as a "normal" hazard.

The shuttle is being orbited by America's largest private satellite company.

The investigation team includes NASA's Orbiter Recovery Team (ORT).

The ORT is led by James W. Smith, chief of the ORT.

The ORT is also looking for the shuttle's external tank and boosters.

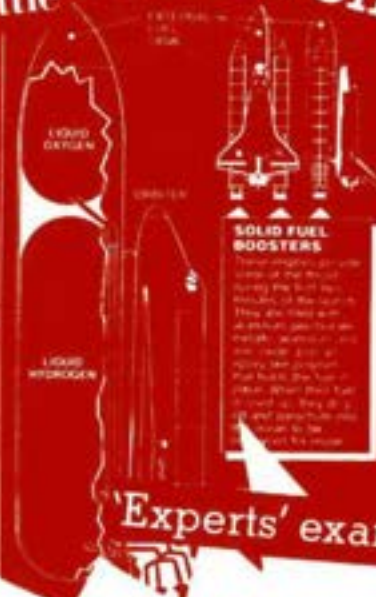

We asked several students their feelings about the Challenger explosion. Here are their answers:

Mike Connor, senior, thinks that the explosion is a "major set back, but we should continue to travel in space."

Mark Ayres, sophomore, says the explosion is "pretty bad."

Shannon Glass, junior, thinks the accident was "bad but we shouldn't stop traveling in space."

Tim Eversole, sophomore, thought that the explosion was "weird that the explosion occurred with the teacher on board."

The people above and other students said that they would travel in space except one. That person had several reasons for not wanting to travel in space.

The space shuttle Challenger was scheduled to lift off at 9:38 a.m. January 28, 1986 but was delayed 2 hours due to problems with ice on the shuttle's support structure and a failed fire protection device.

At 11:38 when Challenger began to rise from the launching pad which looked to be a normal lift off. Engines cut back

slightly and the shuttle approached maximum dynamic pressure when it broke through the sound barrier.

At approximately 11:39 a.m., Mission Control gave the orders "Challenger go with throttle up." Who knew the pilot Mike Smith would answer the soon to be famous final words "Roger, go with throttle up." 74 seconds after lift off Challenger exploded. The explosion killed all 7 members, one was a civilian. Those killed were: Christa McAuliffe, a teacher, Francis R. Scobee, shuttle commander, Michael J. Smith, pilot commander, Judy Resnick, Ronald McNair, Ellison S. Onizuka, Lt. commander and Gregory B. Jarvis.

Although no one is sure what caused this fatal explosion there are several theories. NASA and President Reagan have appointed people to a committee to find out why the explosion happened.

On January 31, 1986 President Reagan announced that day as a national mourning day for the seven brave and heroic people.

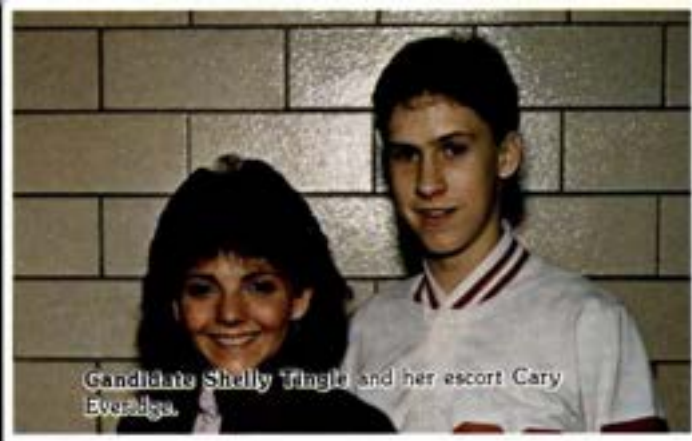

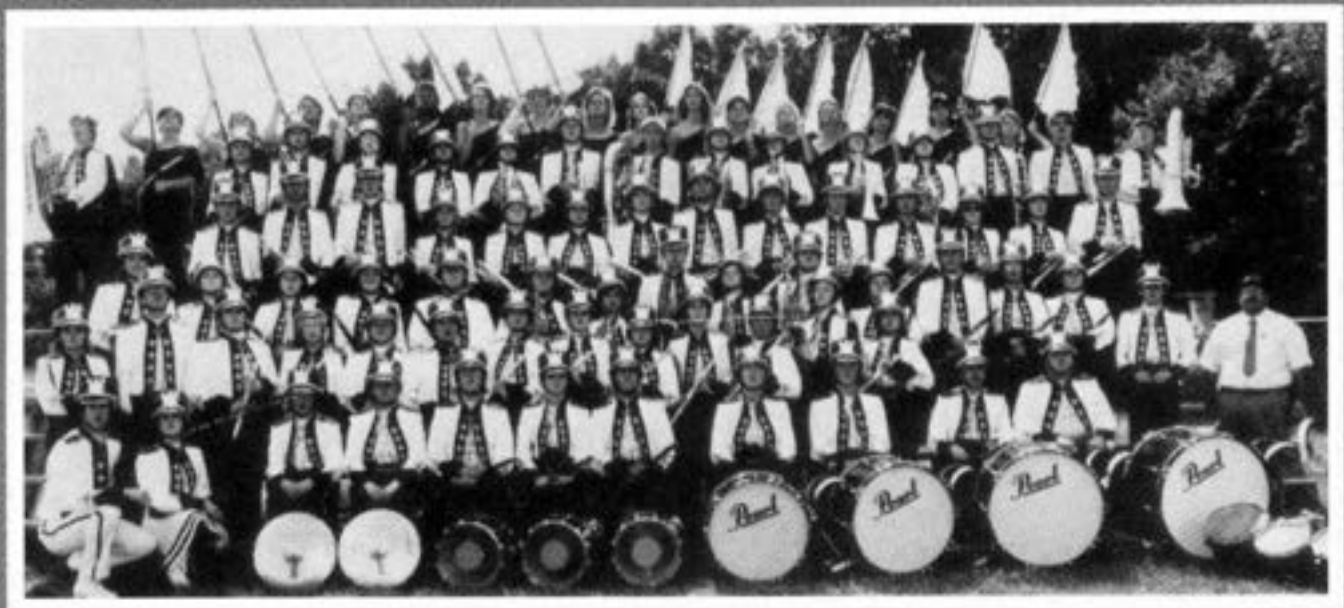

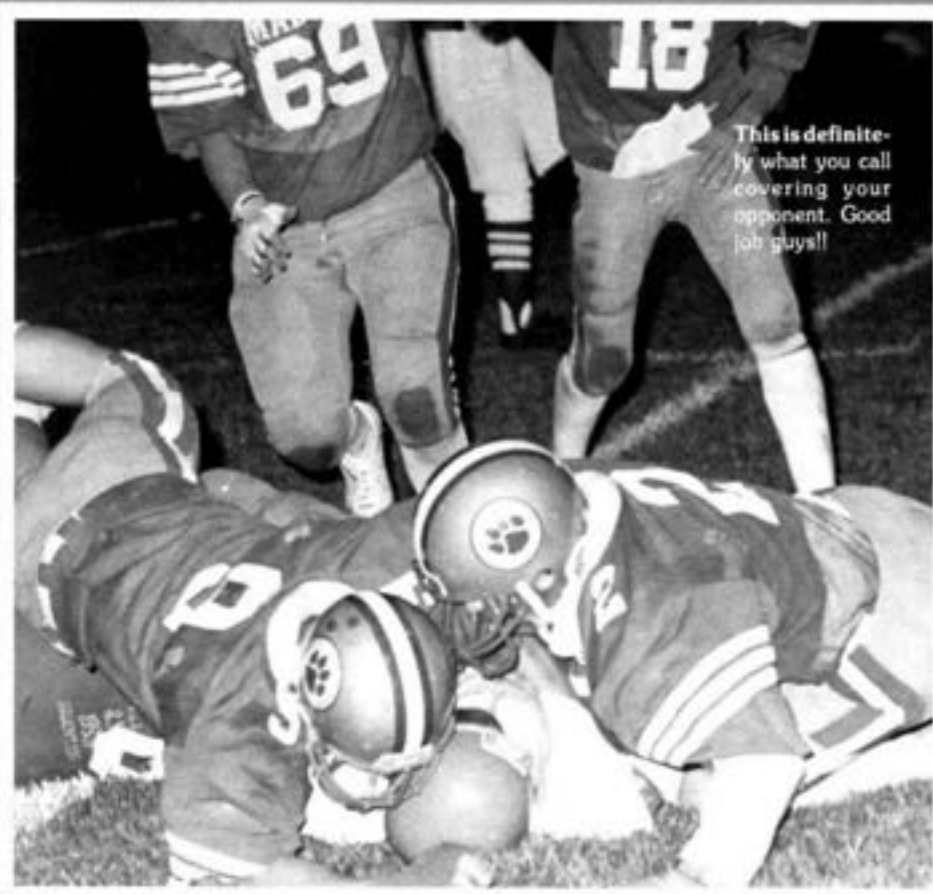

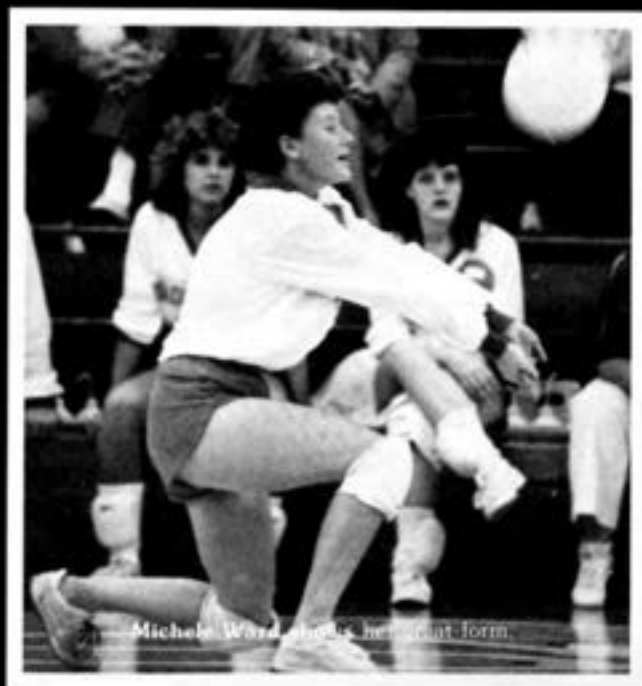

Junior, Greg Thomas received the hustle award. "He played extremely hard and showed a lot of hustle," Church said.

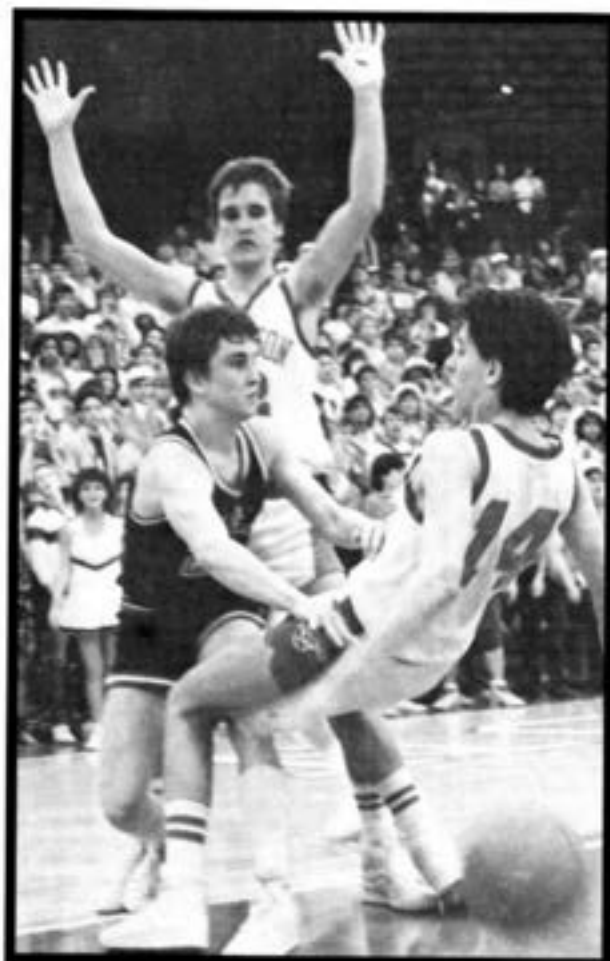

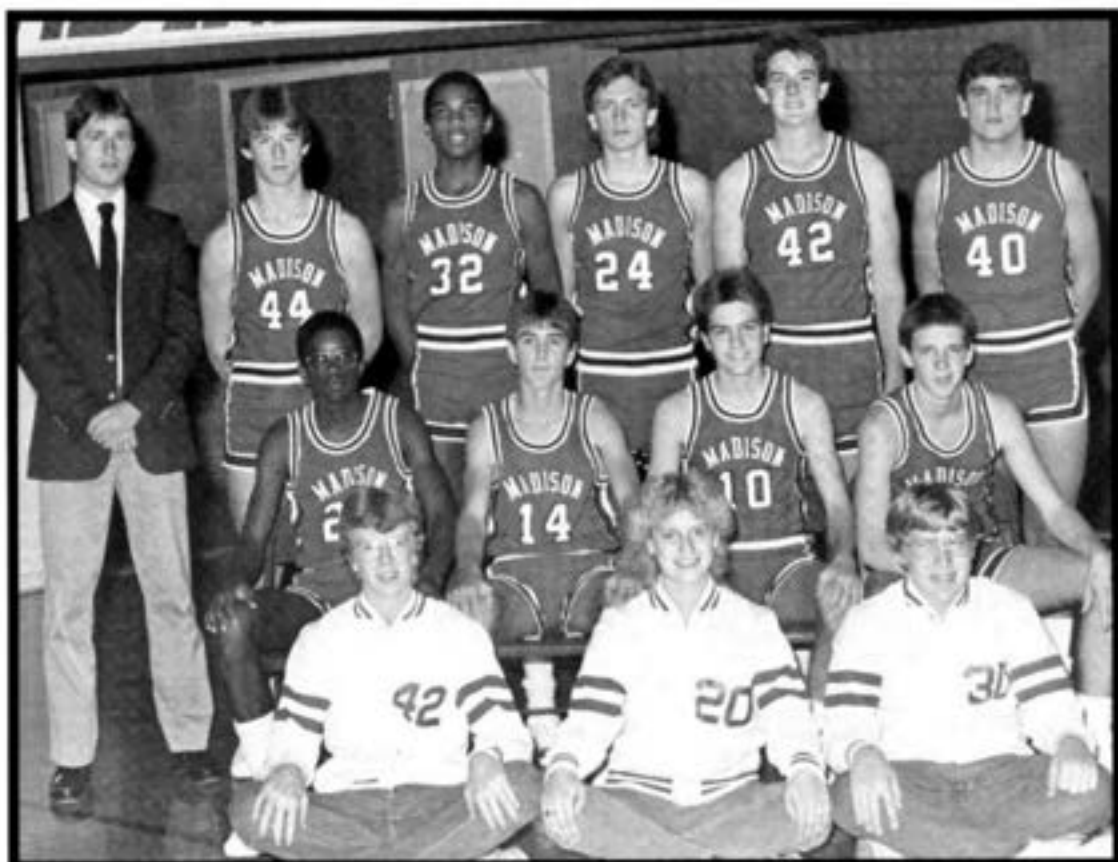

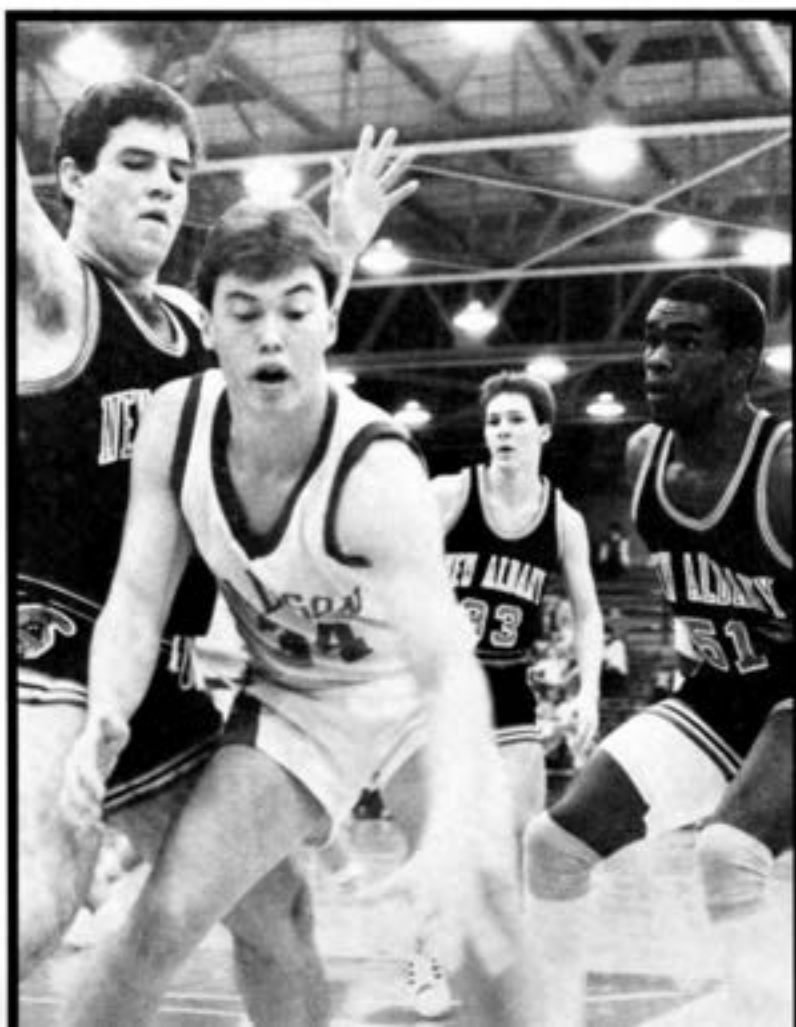

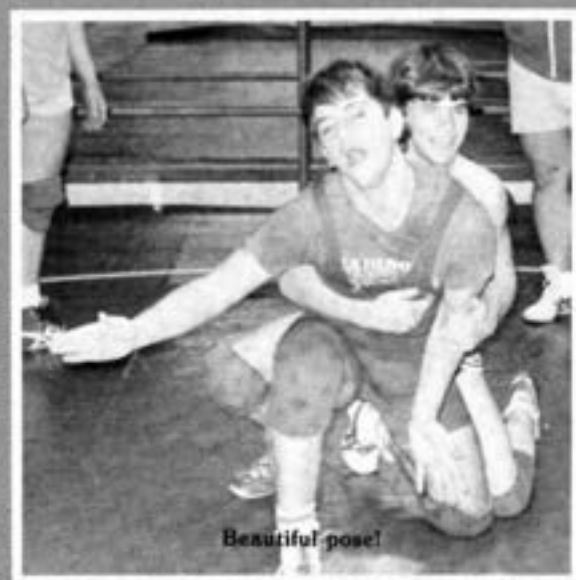

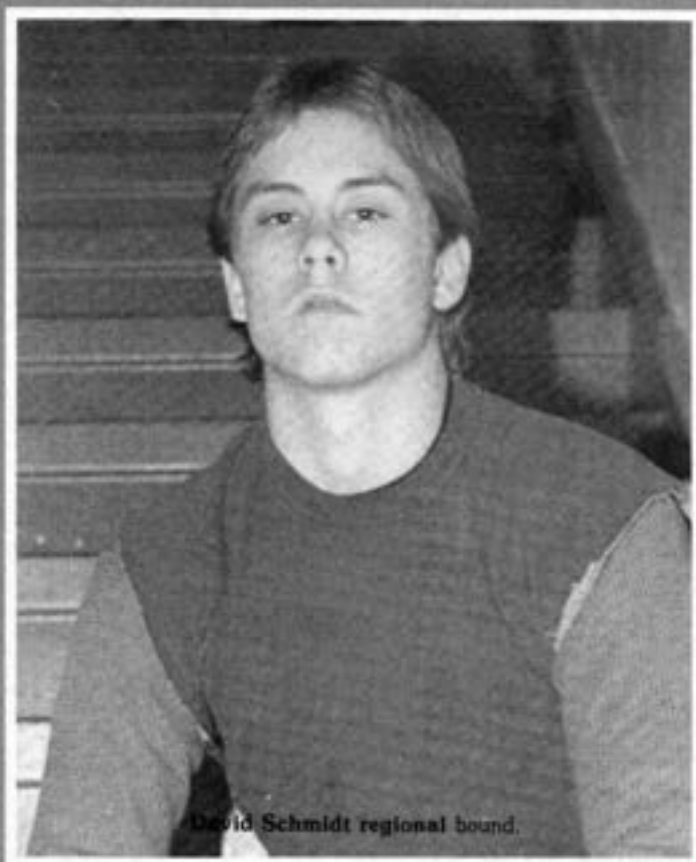
There were some good things that happened to Madison's wrestlers this year, but for most of the season it was bad news.

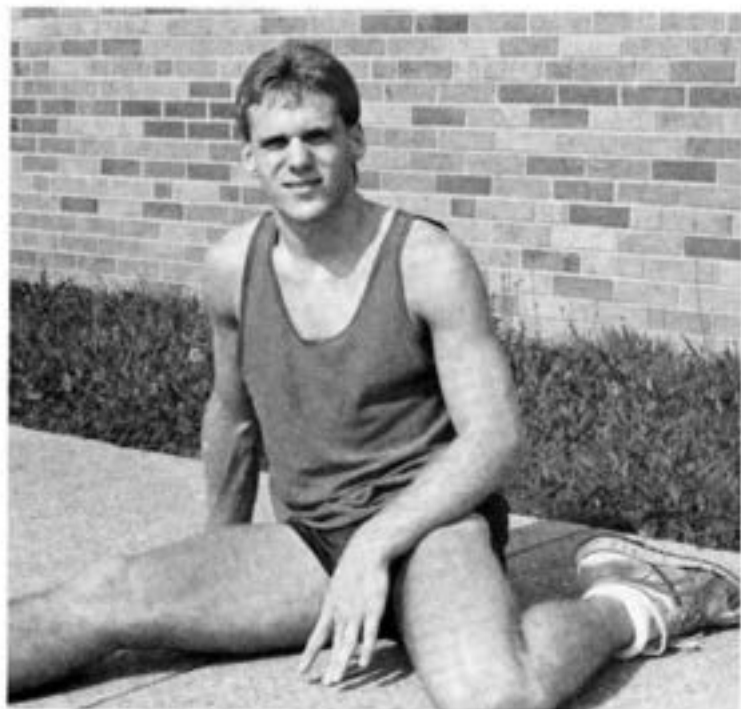

The girls' softball team ended the season with a very successful 18-7 record. They took a trip to the regionals for the second consecutive year in a row.

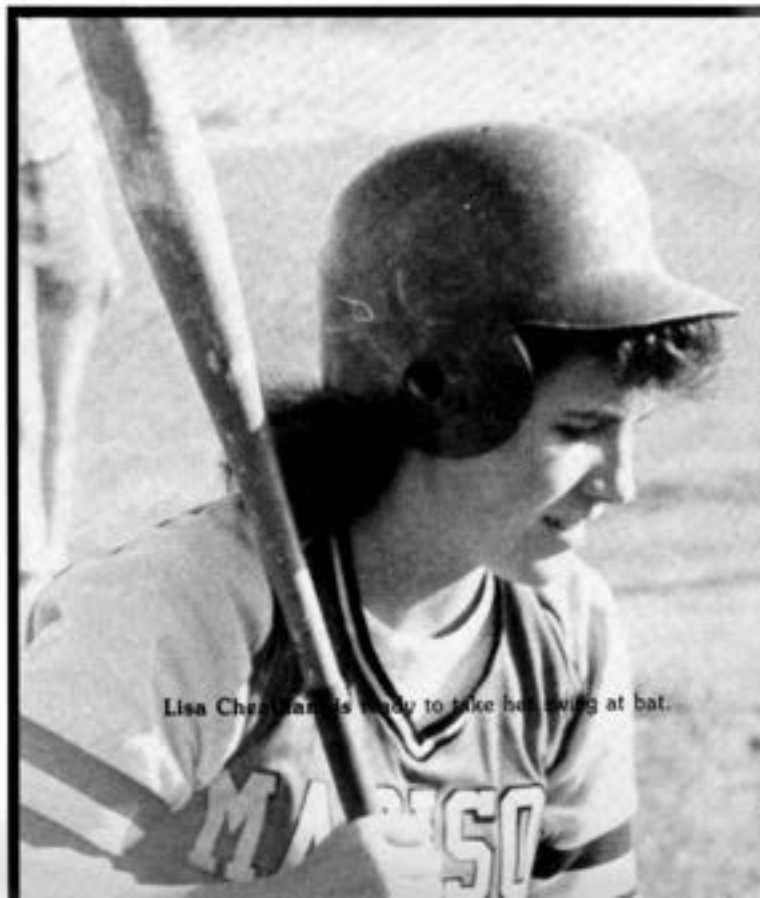

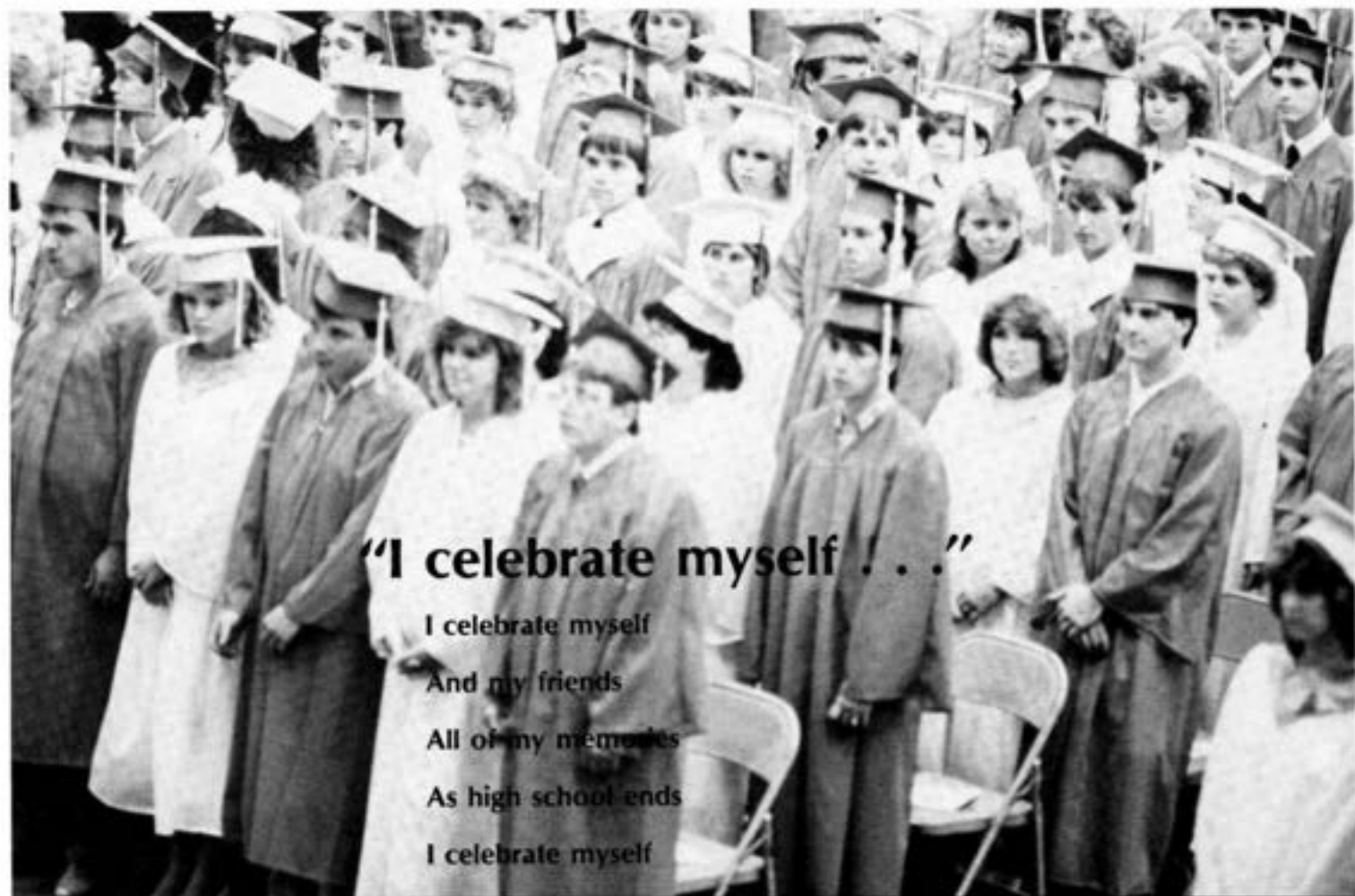
