## COMMANDER GENERAL'S REPORT TO THE ORDER

My Fellow Companions,

Two major Naval Order events will soon take place and still need *your* strong support. First of course is our dedication of the D-Day Monument in Normandy on 27 September. Through the outstanding leadership of Greg Streeter, Monument Chairman, his devoted committee, your own individual financial support and that of friends of the Naval Order, the first phase of our Monument Project will go as planned. Fundraising continues for the bronze basrelief panels for the Monument's pedestal. We also want to fund a documentary film to chronicle the Monument Project along with the heroic story of the Navy in Normandy. Your continued financial support will be critical in reaching these next milestones.



Just before the Monument was readied for shipment to France, I joined sculptor Steven Spears, Companion Marshall Cloyd, and Immediate Past Commander General Carter Conlin at the artist's studio in Loveland, CO. More about our trip on the back cover!

Plans for the Monument dedication have enormous interest both here and in France. I am pleased to announce that the Hon. Gordon R. England, Deputy SECDEF, has the date on his calendar and—barring national crisis—will provide the keynote address. You will want to be part of this moment in history!

Our second big event follows shortly thereafter, with the 2008 New Orleans Congress on 13-15 November. The number of early registrations indicates this is going to be another great one! Gary Bair and his Commandery have put together a program featuring the finest in New Orleans hospitality. The tour and briefings at the National World War II Museum, including a report of our Monument Dedication, are among the highlights of this year's Congress.

The awards presentations are also high points of our annual Congress and especially so this year. The *2008 Distinguished Sea Service Award* honoree, Gen. James L. Jones, USMC (Ret), 32nd Commandant of the Marine Corps, and his wife Diane, will join us for the DSSA Banquet on Saturday evening. ## **GEN. JONES TO RECEIVE DSSA**

The Naval Order recently named Gen. James L. Jones, USMC (Ret), as its 2008 Distinguished Sea Service Award honoree. From July 1999 to January 2003. Gen. Jones served as 32nd Commandant of the Marine Corps. He then held the positions as Supreme Allied Commander, Europe (SACEUR) and Commander of U.S. European Command (COMUSEUCOM) until December 2006. Following his retirement after 40 years of active duty service in February 2007, Gen. Jones chaired the Independent Commission on Security Forces of Iraq. He is President and CEO of the Institute for 21st Century Energy, an affiliate of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, and serves as a Director on several corporate and philanthropic boards. During the course of his long career, he worked closely with government, business, and civic leaders to protect and advance U.S. and allied interests around the world.

Gen. Jones received a Bachelor of Science degree (1966) and an Honorary Doctorate of Letters (2002) from Georgetown University. In June 1985, he graduated from the National War College in Washington, DC. He is a decorated combat veteran who commanded at all operational levels during his military career, earning national and international awards. To see Gen. ## NAVAL ORDER FEATURED AT MARITIME CONFERENCE

The history of the Naval Order and its most significant current project were highlighted at the joint annual conference of the North American Society for Oceanic History and the Council of American Maritime Museums. The meeting took place in Pensacola, FL in May.

Mr. Ryan Wadle is the doctoral candidate at Texas A & M Univer-

sity responsible for accessioning and preparing a guide to Naval Order records on deposit in the University's archives. Mr. Wadle delivered a presentation at the conference on "The Naval Order of the United States and Naval Public Image." He traced the history of the organization from its founding to the present, describing the Order's work in influencing American naval policy. His talk featured a number of NOUS projects through the years to support and celebrate naval history, among them the memorials erected around the country to honor naval leaders and commemorate significant events.

Dr. Dean Mosher, past Historian General of the Order, spoke on "Destroyer Actions at Normandy" at a conference lunch. He gave a superb PowerPoint presentation, describing the incredible gunfire support provided by the "tin cans," and noting how close they maneuvered to the beach to maximize their firepower. Dr. Mosher was followed by CAPT Gregory Streeter, USN (Ret), who

Florida First Coast – Our March meeting featured a talk by Life Companion Billy Ray Morris from St. Augustine. Billy Ray is a marine archeologist who's made many expeditions to explore the underwater historical sites around Florida. He briefed us on the wreck of USS NARCISSUS, a Civil warera federal tug that ran aground at the approaches to Tampa Bay in 1866. The vessel split her hull in the grounding and the Gulf waters exploded her boilers, killing the entire crew of 27 men! At the same meeting, RADM George Hutching, USN (Ret), give us a few words on the satellite recently shot down by USS LAKE ERIE (CG 70) in the northern Pacific.

On 17 May we held the annual memorial service to honor 37 U.S. sailors lost in the Iraqi *Exocet* missile attack on USS STARK (FFG 31). ADM Harry Ulrich, USN (Ret), a former CO of STARK was guest speaker, with CAPT Pete Wynkoop, USN (Ret), another former STARK CO leading the ceremony.

Later in the month, a number of Companions joined the crowd of over 1,000 to mark Memorial Day at the Jacksonville Memorial Veterans Wall. They included RADM John Gavan, USNR (Ret), Jim and Gail Morgan, and Bill and Ute Wirth.

## **CATCHING UP WITH THE COMMANDERIES**

Texas – The Commandery held its annual Midway Luncheon in Houston in early June to commemorate the 66th anniversary of the Battle. The featured speaker, CAPT Norman J. "Dusty" Kleiss, Sr., USN (Ret) was an SBD Douglas Dauntless Dive Bomber pilot in Scouting Squadron Six (VS-6), serving on USS ENTERPRISE (CV 6) in June 1942. He described his bombing attacks on the Japanese aircraft carriers Kaga and Hiryu and the cruiser Mikuma, which all sank during the Battle. CAPT Kleiss, who was awarded the Navy Cross, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medals and Presidential Unit Citations for his gallantry during World War II, helped to develop two very significant systems in his later years of naval service. The steam catapult system for launching aircraft and the Mirror Landing System, that replaced the landing signal officer aboard the first nuclear carrier, USS ENTERPRISE (CVN 65), greatly reduced the numbers of landing and launching accidents

on carriers. CAPT Kleiss received a plaque from CAPT Kerry Magee and a framed NOUS certificate from CAPT Carter Conlin. CAPT Conlin wrapped up the luncheon with a status report on the Normandy Monument Project, and introduced fellow Companion, Marshall Cloyd, the Project's most generous contributor.

## MANILA BAY REMEMBRANCE

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On 1 May, National Capitol hosted its annual ceremony to mark the 1898 victory by then-Commodore George Dewey over the Spanish Fleet at Manila Bay. This year, along with Companions and spouses, attendees included the Philippine Military Attaché, COL Rolando Tenefrancia, and the Naval Attaché, CAPT Roland Recomono, who spoke briefly about US-Filipino friendship. Deborah Mullen, wife of CJCS ADM Mike Mullen, was there along with the Chairman's Chief of Protocol, CDR Karin Vernazza, USN. Mrs. Mullen served as sponsor to USS DEWEY (DDG 105) at the ship's commissioning in January 2008.

Mr. Jack Green of the Naval History Center addressed the group, describing Admiral Dewey's role in establishing a formal peacetime structure for the U.S. Navy. The PCO of USS DEWEY, CDR Warren Buller, USN, told about the ship's crest for this new-

est namesake vessel and how its design elements relate to the two earlier ships and to the Admiral himself. CAPT Vance Morrison presided over the ceremony, CDR Dan Felger led the opening and closing prayers, CAPTs Jim Brooke and John Rodgaard introduced the speakers.

The commemoration took place in the Bethlehem Chapel of the Washington National Cathedral, above the crypt where Admiral Dewey lies. Dewey played an important role in the early days of the Naval Order, serving as Commander General from 1907-1917. Several years ago, a National Capitol Companion donated the American and four-star flags that stand by his crypt.

At a luncheon following the ceremony, Mr. Peter Hsu, an artist and warship design engineer, presented the Commandery with signed prints of his drawings of USS DEWEY and USS GRIDLEY (DDG 102).

## HONORARY FLAGSHIP FEATURED IN NEW EXHIBITION

For Companions visiting Boston, a visit to both USS CONSTITUTION and the USS Constitution Museum is practically a given. As Honorary Flagship of the Naval Order of the United States, the iconic warship with her modern-day crew of 70 active duty Sailors, draws naval history enthusiasts like a magnet. The ship is currently undergoing an extensive, two-plus year restoration to bring her closer to the 1812 configuration, but is still open to the public for visiting and tours. For information about ship tours, see **www.ussconstitution.navy.mil**.

The USS Constitution Museum, adjacent to the ship in the historic Charlestown Navy Yard, presents CONSTITUTION's long history from her building and launching through the present day. Now the Museum has newly acquired a very special series of paintings at a Sotheby's auction. The four works of art show USS CONSTITUTION in battle with the British frigate GUERRIERE on 19 August 1812, when CONSTITUTION earned her enduring nickname, Old Ironsides. The paintings are among the earliest images of this seminal battle. They illustrate the first sighting, engagement, GUERRIERE's dismasting, and her ultimate destruction. Such paintings were akin to photographs in newspaper accounts of the day.

The artist, George Ropes, Jr. of Salem, MA, was one of nine children of a ship's master. A deaf-mute from birth, young George became a student of Michele Felice Cornè, the era's premiere American maritime artist, at age 13. After his father died, Ropes supported the family through his painting. Ropes was about 25 when he completed the paintings now in the Museum's collection.

The USS Constitution Museum is showcasing all four paintings as part of a larger exhibit, *Old Ironsides in War and Peace*. The free exhibit is open daily through 14 November 2008. After that, the Ropes paintings will be rotated on and off display. For more information about the exhibit, or to plan your own visit, see www.ussconstitutionmuseum.org.

## HORNER FOUNDATION NAMES AWARDEES

The Illinois Commandery sponsors three separate *Maurice L. Horner Memorial* awards annually, for the top midshipmen second class at each Illinois NROTC university. The 2008 recipients are: MIDN 2/C Nicholas Motyka, University of Illinois; SSGT Michael Ehlert, Illinois Institute of Technology; and MIDN 2/C Craig Miller, Northwestern University. Each of these outstanding students received a \$750 scholarship grant and three-year membership in the Naval Institute.

The awards honor CDR Maurice Horner, who held several national NOUS positions after WWII and was a leading figure in our Commandery for many years. The Horner Foundation was formed in 1965 within the Illinois Commandery to provide oversight for the awards. The current Horner Foundation directors include CAPT Charles S. Downey, CAPT Victor S. Gulliver, CDR Allen Lipscher, DNC William B. McLane, CAPT Roman "Pete" Piotrowski, CAPT W. Bruce Walker, and RADM Robert L. Zralek.

## **Armstrong Award Presentation at** University of California, Berkeley

The San Francisco Commandery presents the *Rear Admiral Henry J. Armstrong Award* each year to the outstanding midshipman in the NROTC unit at the University of California, Berkeley. The award, an officer's sword, is especially competitive since mids from all the Bay Area universities participate in a single NROTC battalion, located at U.C. Berkeley.

This year, RADM Douglas M. Moore, Jr., Judge Advocate General of the Naval Order, made the presentation to MIDN 1/C Jacques Suyderhoud from Stanford University. The award was based on MIDN Suyderhoud's exceptional performance in several billets, including NROTC Battalion CO. He has orders to Navy flight training in Pensacola.

Until his death, RADM Armstrong presented the sword himself. He was a former CO of USS SPENCE (DD 512), part of Arleigh Burke's famous Destroyer Squadron 23, the "Little Beavers." This squadron of FLETCHER-class destroyers took part in 22 battles over 17 weeks at the close of the Solomon Islands Campaign.


A naval hospital in Idaho? How close to the ocean would that be? It happened!

"An Ounce of Prevention is Worth a Pound of Cure." An old saw, but true...In med school, I was taught that 80% of illness is self-inflicted – we are largely the cause of our own health woes! Does this surprise you? That's in this issue's *Notes from Sick Bay*.

#### **HISTORICAL HALF MINUTE**

Naval Hospital Farragut, ID came into being when the Navy built a huge training center at the south end of Idaho's Lake Pend Orielle ("Lake Pond Array"). Located 300 miles from the Pacific Coast at a time of fears of Japanese invasion, the Training Center would train over 300,000 sailors during its short life.

The hospital was built initially to care for those recruits, but by late 1944, thousands of sailors and Marines injured in the Pacific war began to arrive in waves. Constructed for 2112 patients, the hospital's capacity was 4384 by the end of 1945.



Doctors performed over 11,000 surgical procedures while the hospital was active. Hospital dentists provided for more than 58,500 individual sittings or visits. The laboratory performed more than 317,500 tests. The Pharmacy compounded and dispensed nearly 88,000 prescriptions. The hospital cared for military dependents as well; more than 480 babies were born at Naval Hospital Farragut!

With the end of the war, the need for its services rapidly declined. The hospital was reduced to a handful of patients and staff by May 1946, and decommissioned on 15 June 1946.

Farragut State Park now owns the land formerly occupied by the Naval Training Center and hospital. Located about 30 miles east of Coeur d'Alene, ID, the Park maintains a Training Center Museum. The Navy still operates a facility there, using the deep lake for secret submarine research.



#### **MODERN HALF MINUTE**

By far the most deadly (and costly) diseases are related to cigarette smoking and to obesity, both of which we as individuals can control.

According to the U.S. Surgeon General, about 438,000 Americans will die this year of diseases that could be prevented by eliminating tobacco use. Moreover, the diseases of tobacco use cause untold misery—pain, desperate breathing problems, heart attack and stroke.

Obesity is the largest cause of diabetes in the U.S. Diabetes-related illnesses include heart disease, kidney failure, visual problems including blindness, and many more. Obesity can be prevented by proper diet and moderate physical activity.

So what to do? If you smoke, do whatever it takes to quit! Most health plans cover smoking cessation programs, and most are reasonably successful. Staying stopped is up to you! If you're overweight – defined for most people as weighing more than 10% above what you did when you graduated from high school – begin a program *right now* to lose 10% of your current weight over the next two to four months, and then keep working at it! Your health plan probably covers a weight loss/weight control program.

All Americans should institute a program of moderate exercise. It doesn't have to be fancy or expensive. Walking (not a saunter, but a brisk walk) 30 minutes a day, three days a week, substantially reduces the risk of death from heart attack. Convince your spouse or a friend to join you. Here's to a healthier, longer life, and to reduced health care costs!

## **Monument Patron Gets Up-Close View**

Late in June, shortly before the Normandy Monument was to be crated up and shipped to France, Texas Companion Marshall Cloyd, along with CAPT Carter Conlin, the Naval Order's Immediate Past Commander General, boarded a private jet in Houston for the trip to Loveland, CO.

Mr. Cloyd, the Monument's major sponsor, made the trip to meet artist Stephen Spears, who designed and created the sculpture, and to inspect the nearly-completed work. The men were joined on-site by NOUS Commander General, CAPT Ken Johnson, for a tour of Mr. Spears's studio and to look over the pieces that will soon be mounted 5,000 miles away, at Normandy, France.

The sculpture itself, with three larger-than-life figures, is 8 ft high and weighs considerably more than one ton. Its five-sided pedestal –roughly 4 ft by 12 ft – represents the five beaches of the D-Day invasion: Utah and Omaha (American), Gold and Sword (British), and Juno (Canadian). One panel on the pedestal displays this dedication:

TO THE OFFICERS AND SAILORS OF THE UNITED STATES NAVY WHOSE COMPETENCE, COURAGE AND SACRIFICE ENABLED OPERATION OVERLORD, THE GREATEST AMPHIBIOUS INVASION IN HISTORY. THEIR SELFLESS CAUSE WAS TO DESTROY TYRANNY AND RESTORE FREEDOM AND SELF DETERMINATION. THE FALLEN WILL NEVER BE FORGOTTEN; THE VETERAN WILL EVER BE HONORED. IN GRATEFUL APPRECIATION, THE NAVAL ORDER OF THE UNITED STATES The pedestal's four other sides give the names and hull numbers of the major U.S.N. ships that took part in the invasion—battleships, cruisers, destroyers, LSTs, LCIs and others. Still in the planning stage are five bas-relief panels to be mounted on pillars around the Monument base.

The NOUS visitors agreed that the sculpture beautifully illustrates the U.S. Navy's heroic role in the Normandy invasion of 6 June 1944. And as from 27 September 2008, our Monument will stand at Utah Beach to honor Navy service and sacrifice there for many years to come.
