Malmo Plains AGM Sets Executive Board

The Malmo Plains Community League had its Annual General Meeting (AGM) on April 19. The meeting was well attended with League members, other Malmo residents, City Community Recreation Coordinator Michael Goth, and the City Councillor for Ward 10, Michael Walters all present. The meeting began with League President Murray Whitby and Treasurer Geoff Davidge each giving their annual reports.

Councillor Walters then provided updates on a number topics of interest to Malmo residents including city tax rates, city capital plans and infrastructure spending, crime statistics and crime reduction, reporting residential usage violations, and grant funding opportunities for community leagues. Councillor Walters then spent a good deal of time fielding

The Malmo Plains Community League questions from attendees on a wide had its Annual General Meeting variety of topics and concerns.

Executive Board elections came next. After six years of volunteer service to the Malmo Plains Community League, Geoff Davidge announced that he was stepping down from the role of Treasurer. Also stepping down was League Secretary Carrie Patterson.

Preventing Crime

Like all other neighborhoods in the city, Malmo residents often have to deal with instances of crime, like theft from cars. If your car has been broken into, or if you're concerned it might happen, follow these tips from Edmonton Police Services:

Remove all Valuables- Never leave anything on display when you leave your vehicle. Even loose change, cigarettes, cigarette lighters, sunglasses, CD's, cell phones, stereos, cameras, and clothing, if they can see it they will steal it.

Park Safely- If you don't have a garage, try to park in a well-lit, open place, even when parking at work or a mall.

Remove Portable Accessorie-

Removing stereo face plates and locking them in the trunk or taking them with you, will deter thieves.

Get an Alarm Installed-

Alarms can deter thieves not only from stealing items from your vehicle, but also from stealing your vehicle. Even if you have an alarm installed never, never, never leave anything in your vehicle.

Use a Steering Locking Device (The Club)- Use a steering wheel lock every time you leave your vehicle. A steering wheel lock will also deter theft of your vehicle.

Council seeks Neighbourhood Renewal

While the provincial budget passed without much fuss, this week our Council had to come face to face with some of the impacts of the provincial budget, specifically how it directly affected Edmonton's municipal property tax rate.

Our Situation

In November of 2015, Council worked hard to bring the property tax rate down to a 3.4% increase for 2016. We later found that we received more revenue from property assessments in 2015(~\$5.6 million) than we had anticipated, meaning the increase could be brought down to 2.8%. Considering the combined inflation (1.6%) and population growth (1.6%), is 3.2%, which is a reasonable guide for tax increases, I was quite comfortable with the 2.8% figure for the 2016 increase.

In last fall's provincial budget we received a commitment from the province for an extra \$20 million dollars from the Municipal Sustainability Initiative (better known as MSI). Council earmarked these funds for our vital neighbourhood renewal program. This allowed us to give property taxpayers a break.

But last week's provincial budget brought a reversal in that commitment, meaning we have a \$20 million dollar shortfall to tackle.

While I recognize that the provincial government is facing tough times right now, this type of turn-about is not what good intergovernmental relationships are made of. Municipalities need predictability and stability from provincial governments, and shifting commitments with little lead time doesn't provide cities with a solid foundation for budgeting and planning.

Our Decision and Commitment to Neighbourhood Renewal

In order to account for this \$20 million dollar hole in the budget, Council

agreed today to make an adjustment to the 2016 tax rate from the 2.8% back to the original 3.4% to maintain necessary funding for the neighbourhood renewal program to maintain the current pace.

I believe that raising the tax rate by 0.6% this year to cover neighbourhood renewal is the responsible thing to do. If we had not done it this year, it could have resulted in even larger increases down the line or a delay in the schedule. Neighbourhood renewal is also a large scale infrastructure project that employs a good number of Edmontonians in construction - if we are looking to keep the economy rolling, infrastructure projects are sorely needed.

Education Tax

Your property tax bill also includes a tax that isn't set by the municipality: the education tax. Last week's provincial budget also revealed that the province has increased the education budget while exempting certain provincially owned buildings from paying education tax, so this will be made up by all other property tax payers. The province is therefore collecting 8.7% more than they collected from Edmontonians last years for education property tax. This equates to a 1.5% increase for the average homeowner on this year's property tax bill. All in all, that brings the combined rate for the average property owner to 4.9%. This amounts to an additional \$109 per year, based on the 2015 average property value of \$401,000.

The Coming Year

Council is not going to stop looking for efficiencies through a full-scale service and program review just getting underway, while also investing in projects that will keep Edmonton's economy moving and building our city. It's a difficult line to walk, but I'm confident that barring anomalies in the economy, we should be able to make progress on achieving a fair tax rate for 2017 and 2018.

City Summer Daycamps


