



1 Quilt Name: Colonial Flag
 Owners: Monty & Verdi Abdullah-Montgomery
 Location: On Sierra College Blvd.
Between King Rd. and Taylor Rd., Loomis
The family wanted to honor their son who served in Iraq, and all the men and women serving in the Armed Services.



7 Quilt Name: The Red Road
 Owners: Judy Grayson & Jerry Brunner
 Location: 5684 Cassell Lane, Loomis.
The owner, Judy Grayson, wanted the barn quilt to reflect her Native American heritage. Native American's represented by the red road followed the philosophy that the Creator teaches that we must live a life of truth, humbleness, respect, forgiveness, spirituality and honor Mother Nature and all her creations.



9 Quilt Name: Alpaca's All Around
 Owners: Tom & Susan Petersen
 Location: 4300 Hansen Rd., Loomis
The Petersens own and operate an alpaca farm, and sell alpaca fiber products in their gift store on the property. The rainbow of colors surrounding the alpaca silhouette represents Peru where the alpaca originated, and where many of the items in their shop were handmade.



2 Quilt Name: Lonestar
 Owners: Ken and Barbara Mackey
 Location: 6731 Horseshoe Bar Rd., Loomis
The barn where the quilt is displayed was built in 1890's by Barbara's great grand parents, George & Mary Turner. Mary Turner owned a quilt with the Lonestar pattern, which was passed down to Barbara.



10 Quilt Name: X Mark's the Box
 Owners: Jim & Jan Struble
 Location: Struble Ranch
Can be seen at the corner of Dick Cook Rd. & Hansen Rd., Loomis
This quilt pattern represents the wooden packing boxes marked with a blue and white X on the end, which identified them as belonging to the Struble Ranch. Wooden boxes were used when picked fruit was taken into the Loomis fruit packing houses in the 1940's.



3 Quilt Name: Hunter's Star
 Owners: Pete & Stacy Jenson
 Location: 7165 Horseshoe Bar Rd., Loomis
Both Stacy and Pete are avid bow hunters, and they felt this quilt represented their favorite pastime. The new barn displaying the barn quilt was built in the footprint of the original barn which was built in the 1970's.



4 Quilt Name: Fish Circle
 Owner: Alaire Outlaw
 Location: 7455 King Rd., Loomis
Just west of Val Verde Rd.
Alaire grew up fishing with her dad and painted this quilt to honor her parents sense of adventure.



5 Quilt Name: Highland Thistle
 Owners: Steve & Mary Suthers
 Location: 7613 Wayland Rd., Loomis
This quilt is in honor of Mary's Scottish heritage and Steve's Washington family where thistles are abundant and colorful.



6 Quilt Name: Monkey Wrench
 Owners: Ron, Kathy & Jim Black
 Location: 7435 Wayland Rd., Loomis.
At the corner of Val Verde Rd. and Wayland Rd
Made in honor of the previous property owner, Bill Onga, who was a master mechanic; and the current owner's, the Black family, who are of Italian heritage represented by the red, green and white colors of Italy's flag.



8 Quilt Name: Mandarin Fruit Basket
 Owners: Todd & Janet Nelson
 Location: 3945 El Monte Drive, Loomis
This fruit basket pattern was chosen to feature the original Poirier families mandarin fruit packing shed built in 1946. The racing banner border represents the families passion for race cars and motorcycles. They also have been involved in the 4-H community for many years, thus the corner 4-H symbol. Their property is a registered historic landmark known as "Rock House Ranch".



13 Quilt Name: Four T's
 Owners: Steve, Elinor Budrow & Jacque Sady
 Location: 8935 Tudsbury Rd., Loomis
This barn quilt honors four generations of Tudsburys on the same land since 1911. Steve, Elinor and Elinor's sister, Jacque Sady, each live on 10 acres of the original 80 acres which was owned by their great grandfather, W. H. Tudsbury.



14 Quilt Name: Caroline Lily
 Owners: John and Ann Bowler
 Location: Flower Farm Café
9280 Horseshoe Bar Rd., Loomis
The Flower Farm's land has been farmed continuously for over 100 years. The quilt pattern was chosen as a representation of the flowers that are abundant at the farm's location.
