Welcome to the 2016 Lake County Fair Competitions! We offer hundreds of opportunities to participate and showcase your livestock.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

- Competitions are open to all Lake County and non-Lake County residents.
- If you have any questions about your specific department (judging criteria, presentation, etc), please contact the department Superintendent.
- Entries cannot be changed once they have been submitted. No refunds.

#### **ENTRY FEES**

- All Livestock Exhibitors, <u>INCLUDING 4-H members showing in Open Class</u>, must purchase a membership (18 or older only) <u>OR</u> purchase a season pass (Adults 13 and older \$35.00 and Child 12 and under \$15.00). OPEN CLASS LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS ONLY: Livestock open-class participants that purchase a season pass will receive one commercial/livestock season parking pass in order to accommodate daily feeding.
- Entry fee per animal: \$5.00
- Pen fee: \$5.00 (New in 2016—All 4-H members also showing in Open Class must pay a pen fee)

#### STEP BY STEP INSTRUCTIONS

STEP 1: Review the Livestock General Information (page 9) and rules for your department

**STEP 2: Entries open on Tuesday, June 7 at 9:00 a.m.** Entries must be registered by Wednesday, July 6 at 3:00 pm unless otherwise stated in the department rules.

There are three ways to enter:

Option #1: **ONLINE**: This is the easiest and fastest way to enter! Visit www.lcfair.com and click on the "Competitions" link on the Lake County Fair page. A credit card is required to enter online.

Option #2: **BY MAIL**: Fill out an entry form (entry forms can be downloaded from www.lcfair.com or are available at the Fair Office) and mail in your entry. Checks only. Mailed entries must be postmarked by Friday, July 1, 2016.

Option #3: **IN PERSON**: Fill out an entry form (entry forms can be downloaded from www.lcfair.com or are available at the Fair Office) and bring your entry form to the Fair Office Monday-Friday from 9am-3pm. Check or Cash only.

STEP 3: Livestock Entry-Tag Pick-Up: An entry tag is required for each livestock animal

**Entry tags can be picked up from the Fair Office** (located in the Event Center):

Thursday, July 21 & Friday, July 22: 9:00am—3:00pm
Saturday, July 23: 10:00am—1:00pm
Sunday, July 24: 10:00am—4:00pm
Monday, July 25 & Tuesday, July 26: 9:00am—3:00pm

STEP 4: Premium checks will be available at the Fair Office from 4:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 31.

All winners must sign for their check and have a social security number on file—no exceptions.

#### LIVESTOCK: GENERAL INFORMATION AND REGULATIONS

- 1. All entries must be registered online, or delivered in person by 3:00 p.m., Wednesday, July 6, 2016, unless otherwise stated in the department rules. Mailed entries must be postmarked by July 1, 2016. Registration forms are available online at www.lcfair.com or at the Office.
- 2. All livestock exhibitors must purchase a LCFA Membership or Season Ticket
- 3. All livestock entries are \$5.00 each, unless otherwise stated.
- 4. Entry blanks must be legible and completed in full. Per IRS regulations, the exhibitor <u>MUST</u> provide a valid name, address, zip code, <u>social security number</u> and phone number on their entry blank.
- 5. Entry tags and Season Tickets are not mailed. Please pick them up in the Fair Office before you deliver your livestock.
- 6. Any medications administered during the Fair must be with the approval of the Department Superintendent and the Fair Veterinarian.
- 7. All livestock must be delivered and arranged in place per the Livestock schedule.
- 8. No animal may be shown in more than one department—plus Jr. Show
- 9. No exhibitors under five (5) years of age may exhibit in the livestock classes.
- 10. New in 2016—4-H Club members are required to pay stall or pen fees if they are showing in Open Class.
- 11. 4-H Club members are required to pay entry fees if entered in open show.
- 12. Livestock vehicles must be parked in the designated parking area or premium money will be withheld.
- 13. No equipment (wheelbarrows, lawn chairs, etc.) may be left in the walkways of livestock buildings at any time. Cattle Barn exhibitors are only allowed one fan per two head of cattle. Minimum of 12 gauge cord for all electrical needs.
- 14. If animals are being fed and cared for by someone other than the exhibitor, Superintendent must have name and telephone number of the caretaker.
- 15. All Champion Beef, Sheep, Swine & Goats (Open & 4-H) will be subject to drug testing. Random testing will be done on other selected market animals.
- 16. If any Exhibitor has their animal tested positive, auction money will be returned to Buyer and all expenses will be the sole responsibility of Exhibitor. The exhibitor will be banned from showing at the Lake County Fair for a period of three years.
- 17. Not more than two monies will be paid in any one class to one exhibitor.
- 18. General security will be provided throughout the period of the Fair, but the Lake County Fair Association and of any of its agents, officers, directors or members will not be responsible for loss or damage to any property, nor will the Lake County Fair Association be held responsible for personal loss or injury from fire, theft or injury to exhibitor of livestock, livestock, or any other cause in connection with or during the Fair.
- 19. Premium checks will be available at the Fair Office from 4:00 p.m. 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 31. All winners must sign for their check and have a social security number on file—no exceptions. Checks will not be released until the Department Superintendent has verified that your stall/pen is clean and free of all furniture and equipment.
- 20. RV/Camping is available Additional charges apply. Please inquire with the Fair office for information.

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- 21. No appliances are allowed in the cattle barn.

# MARKET ANIMAL SALE RULES 2:00 p.m. - Saturday, July 30, 2016 - Lake County Fair & 4-H Show

#### RESTRICTIONS

**Sheep:** Any market lamb less that 100 lbs will not be able to consign to auction

Beef: Any Steer weighing under 1000 lbs will not be able to consign to auction. Any Steer over 1350 lbs will be

allowed to sell, however, will be sold at 1350 lbs.

Swine: Market Swine less than 210 lbs or over 280 lbs will not be eligible to show or consign to auction.

#### Qualifications for exhibitors to consign animals to the sale:

- Open Steers: Limited one (1) animal per exhibitor unless he or she has Champion and Reserve Champion. No other tags allowed.
- **Open Wethers:** All wethers to be consigned will be Fair ear tagged before or during showing of the wether class. They must have the Fair ear tag in place at time of the sale and at delivery time to the buyer. No other tags allowed. Only one market animal per exhibitor unless the exhibitor has champion and reserved champion. No animals showing signs of prolapse will be allowed to sell.
- Market Swine: There will be a set number of 120 market swine to be sold. Included in the 120 market swine are 4-H, Lake County residents and a selected number from each weight class. Only one market swine will be allowed to sell per exhibitor in open class unless the exhibitor has champion and reserved champion. Any market swine showing signs of scars or scar tissue will be disqualified from the sale. No other tags allowed.
- **Goats**: Sale limited to the 4-H Champion and Reserved Champion Wether and Open Champion and Reserve Champion meat goat Wether or Doe.
- 1. The Superintendents and Auction Committee will check all consignment forms and animals to be sold. Any animal may be disqualified from sale for not meeting requirements.
- 2. The Champion and Reserve Champion market animals in the open class are required to be entered in the sale. Champion and Reserve Champion market animals in the 4-H Club classes are required to be consigned to the sale. However, they may only be pulled from the terminal auction if they have been tagged for Illinois State Fair and with the intention of showing their animal at the Illinois State Fair.

- The 4-H Champions will sell first, followed by the Open Class Champions. The sale order for each animal will be made by drawing numbers, 4-H then Open.
- 4. All stock eligible for the sale must have been shown at the 2016 Lake County Fair.
- 5. Exhibitors consigning animals to the sale must fill out a form furnished by the Lake County Fair Association.

  These forms must be in the hands of the Superintendent of your Department by 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, July 28.
- 6. All purchases must be paid for at the end of the sale. Checks should be payable to "Lake County Fair Association"
- 7. Auction checks will be distributed 21 days after the last day of the Fair.
- 8. The order of the Sale will be Goats Beef Sheep Swine.
- 9. The time for weighing the livestock will be at the discretion of the department Superintendent.
- 10. A fee of six (6) percent will be withheld from the sale price of each animal sold. This fee will be used to assist in the sale promotion for the coming year.
- 11. All animals entered in the sale and sold must be delivered to the holding area on Sunday, July 31, at 5:00 p.m.
- 12. Any member of the immediate family of any exhibitor offering animals for the Auction Sale is prohibited from bidding on the same animal.
- 13. All market animals from the auction must be assembled in one location as designated by the Superintendent of the Barn. The owners of all animals offered for sale are responsible for the care of the animals until 5:00 p.m. on Sunday evening. No unethical practices will be allowed in the care or showing of animals or premiums will be withheld. Decisions of the Superintendent and Auction Committee will be final.
- 14. The decision of the Lake County Fair Auction Committee is final in selecting and screening of animals for weight, according to breed type, and also for conducting the animal sale.
- 15. The Lake County Animal Auction is a terminal sale. If the animals is to be shown again, it cannot be entered in the auction sale.
- 16. Each exhibitor <u>must be at their pen/stall</u> (or have a person at their pen/stall) on the day of the sale in order to sell their animal at auction. Each exhibitor must sell his or her own animal.
- 17. All Champion Beef, Sheep, Swine & Goats (Open & 4-H) will be subject to drug testing. Random testing will be done on other selected market animals. If any Exhibitor has their animal tested positive, auction money will be returned to Buyer and all expenses will be the sole responsibility of Exhibitor. The exhibitor will be banned from showing at the Lake County Fair for a period of three years.

# 2016 Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements County Fairs

#### **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS**

- 1. Exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with all rules applicable to their exhibits.
- 2. All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: <a href="http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php">http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php</a>
- 3. All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) which shows that the animal meets all health requirements for the State of Illinois. CVI's shall be made available to Bureau of Animal Health Personnel on request.
  - CVI means a legible record made on an official form from the state of origin which has been issued, signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian and which shows the name and address of the animal's owner or exhibitor and the results of all required tests or vaccinations. A CVI shall list only one animal identification per line; shall be presented on the form on which it was initially issued; and shall not be corrected, changed or altered in any manner.
- 4. All animals shall be officially identified. The animal(s) official identification shall be recorded on the CVI.
- If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated herds, the identifying herd number(s) along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the CVI.
   CVI for out-of-state livestock shall be void thirty (30) days after issuance.
  - CVI for Illinois-origin livestock shall be void ninety (90) days after issuance.
- 6. All livestock shall be subject to examination upon entry to any Illinois fair or exhibition. Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall be immediately withdrawn and held in quarantine at the owner's risk and expense until properly treated and recovered, or until the animal is released to return to the owner's premise.
- 7. Any livestock infected with scabies, mange, active lesions of ringworm, soremouth, or multiple warts which are easily visible without close examination shall not be permitted to exhibit and are subject to quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
- 8. Sheep and goats with caseous lymphadenitis as evidenced by draining abscesses shall not be exhibited and are subject to immediate quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
- 9. Illinois Department of Agriculture personnel or designee may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs or banned substances. New examination techniques, such as ultrasound, may also be used at anytime while the animals are on the grounds of any Illinois fair or exhibit.
- 10. The Illinois Department of Agriculture or designee may collect urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.
- 11. All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animals(s) will be excused from exhibition and ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited.
- 12. Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, shall constitute a violation of show rules and may result in the animal(s) disqualification and removal from the fairgrounds.
- 13. Any Illinois cattle, bison, cervidae or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated from the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days post-entry.

#### **CATTLE**

#### Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be either a fully healed and legible tattoo, approved official ear tag, registration number (can only be used if the tattoo is recorded on the registration certificate or for breeds where pictures are acceptable), or individual brands, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate.

#### **Illinois Cattle**

- Brucellosis: Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.
- Tuberculosis: Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis- Free State. Tuberculin testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Please note: Illinois calves under 6 months of age, and Illinois steers are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

#### **Out-of-State-Cattle**

All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php

- Brucellosis: Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
  - Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.
  - Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.
  - Animal originated from a "Class Free" state (if entire state is so classified)
  - Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.
  - The negative brucellosis test shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days prior to exhibition.

#### • Tuberculosis:

- Accredited Tuberculosis Free States: No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating
  from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when accompanied by a CVI
  issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.
- Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free): Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
- The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to an additional tuberculin test conducted within
   30 days prior to exhibition.
- Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60-120 days from the last official TB test date.

#### **Illinois Swine**

- Identification: Swine shall be identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch. Ear notch
  identification is acceptable for barrows, crossbred gilts and breeding swine. (Note: Ear notch identification of
  crossbred swine does not satisfy USDA identification requirements for interstate movement or official testing.)
- Brucellosis: Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine.
- Pseudorabies: Pseudorabies testing is not required for Illinois swine.

#### **Out-of-State Swine**

All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may

also be obtained online at: <a href="http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php">http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php</a>

- Identification: Individually identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch. Ear notch identification **is not** acceptable for crossbred animals.
- Brucellosis: Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
  - Originate immediately and directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd.
  - Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.
  - Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.
- Pseudorabies: Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage IV or V state are exempt from the pseudorabies testing requirement.
  - Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage III state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
  - Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage I or II state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the 10 days prior to entry.
- Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.

#### **SHEEP**

#### Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

- Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.
- When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

#### **Market Lambs**

All wethers must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

#### **Illinois Sheep**

Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.

For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

#### **Out-of-State Sheep**

All out-of-state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. - Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

#### **GOATS**

#### Identification

- Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- Tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.
- When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

• Ears should be used for tattooing when possible. If there is no space in the ear, the flank or tail fold may be used.

#### **Illinois Goats**

Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.

For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

#### **Out-of-State Goats**

All out-of-state goats are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: <a href="http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php">http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php</a>

- Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- Tuberculosis- Goats from areas or states that are not Accredited Bovine Tuberculosis Free, must be accompanied by a CVI indicating that the goats originated from a herd where a complete negative herd test has been conducted within the past twelve (12) months and the individual animals are negative to a tuberculin test conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.



#### IAFE - International Association of Fair and Expos National Code of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock events shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE" National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited form future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United Sates and Canada.

#### The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events.

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a live-stock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in events, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medications, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with burden of the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show premises, all treatment involving the use of drugs, and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5. Any surgical procedures or injection of any foreign substances or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. This application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitors, fitter, trainer or participant whether or note he or she was actually instrumental in or had knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notice to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorized with jurisdiction over such infractions.

- 2. Equipment of any kind, including butt fans, wheelbarrows, lawn chairs, will not be allowed in the walkway. Only one fan allowed per two head of cattle. Minimum of 12 gauge cord for all electrical needs.
- 3. Exhibitors must have their stalls cleaned by 9:00 a.m. daily.
- 4. All trucks, trailers or other vehicle must be cleaned and disinfected before transporting beef cattle onto the fairgrounds.
- 5. Tie outs allowed—Exhibitor responsible to bring own tie out panels. Description and approval by Superintendent needed prior to Fair. Lake County Fair Association (LCFA) and any of its agents, officers, directors or members will not be responsible for loss or damage to any property, nor will LCFA be held responsible for personal loss or injury from fire, theft or injury to exhibitor of livestock, livestock, or any other cause in connection with or during the Fair.
- 6. After sale, each exhibitor is **REQUIRED** to post buyer's sign above pen. If buyer's sign is not posted, exhibitor will not be allowed to show at future Lake County Fairs. Each exhibiter must be at their stall (or have a person at their stall) on day of sale in order to sell their steers at auction. **Each exhibitor must sell his or her own steer.**
- 7. Please read LIVESTOCK: GENERAL INFORMATION AND REGULATIONS (page 7), before making an entry.

#### AGE CLASSIFICATIONS

- 1. Junior calf is one born January 1—April 1 of exhibit year. The calf must be at least 4 months old.

#### **SHEEP RULES**

- 1. Registration papers for purebred stock must be shown to superintendent once animals are penned. If discrepancies between papers and animals found, said animals may not be exhibited and fee will not be refunded.
- 2. All animals must be registered as owned by the exhibitors at least 30 days prior to opening of the Fair.
- 3. Association ear tags or other ear tag numbers must appear in the health certificates. Owner's name must appear on each. Scrapie tags (Premise ID tag) must also be on each animal.
- 4. In judging sheep, breed standards as set by respective associations will be followed closely as possible.
- 5. Entries are limited to available facilities. Class without completion may be combined at the discretion of the superintendent. Entries are limited to 2 single class numbers and one for pairs, pens and flocks.
- 6. Owners of market lambs are required to deliver lambs to market pens & truck on Sunday at 4:00 p.m.
- 7. A map showing locations of assigned pens will be displayed in sheep barn. Check location of pens before unloading and locate accordingly. This assignment must be adhered to and no alterations will be allowed.
- 8. Classes may be combined at the discretion of the superintendent depending on number of entries.
- 9. There will be no changes allowed after entries have been made. No Artificial Coloring Allowed.
- 10. Each exhibitor <u>must be at their pen</u> (or have a person at their pen) on day of sale in order to sell their sheep at auction. Each exhibitor must sell his or her own sheep.
- 11. After Sale, each exhibitor is REQUIRED to post buyers sign above pen.

#### **DAIRY GOATS RULES**

This show is sanctioned by the American Dairy Goat Association and their rules shall govern. These rules state that the exhibitor shall be the owner or owners whose name(s) appear as the owner on the registration or recordation certificate or stamped supplicate application.

- 1. There will be a separately sanctioned Junior and Senior dairy goat shows with separate championship legs given in each: A Junior Doe Show will be held Thursday at 9:00 a.m. A Senior Doe Show will be held on Friday at 9:00 a.m. Breed will be shown in order as listed in premium book.
- 2. Animals must meet State and County requirements: check general health requirements.
- 3. All registration papers will be checked by 12:00 p.m. Tuesday.
- 4. Exhibitors please check in at INFORMATION CENTER in front of goat barn.
- 5. Age shall be computed from show date.
- 6. All dairy goats exhibited must be tattooed and registered with a recognized Registering Association and the certificate approved by the Superintendent in charge before entering the show ring. The original registration certificate is required for all animals 6 months of age or older. Animals under 6 months of age may show with the original registration certificate or with a duplicate application stamped by the ADGA office. ALL GOATS ENTERED IN THE MILKING COMPETITION NEED TO BE CHECKED IN BY 10:00 P.M. TUESDAY, JULY 26.
- 7. All goats must be properly fitted (clipped, clean, hoofs trimmed, etc) to be allowed to show. No clipping will be allowed in the barn.
- 8. Signed transfers will not be accepted as proof of ownership.
- 9. No pre-show milk out.
- 10. All animals must be penned. Pen space is to be utilized for animals only. This will be enforced. Pen size is 5x7 and will hold 2-3 mature animals. All pens must be cleaned at the end of the Fair. Premiums will be withheld until all pens are cleaned and violators may become ineligible to show at future Fairs.
- 11. All exhibitors must furnish own feed, bedding and equipment.
- 12. No vending of animal feed allowed in the barn.
- 13. Show order is subject to change as needed in order to keep the show moving.
- **14. Non-sanctioned Meat Goat Market Class.** Limit of two champion meat goats to be consigned to auction. Final determination of entry into auction will be approved by the Livestock Committee to ensure high quality entries. Minimum weight for Meat Goat is 60 lbs. Market goats will be weighed and tagged. Market goats may not be shown in any breeding class as both wethers and does may be entered in the market class. Judging time to be determined by the Superintendent.
- 15. Please read LIVESTOCK: GENERAL INFORMATION AND REGULATIONS (page 7), before making an entry.
