She has over 30 years of experience in behavioral health, with roles encompassing senior level administration and therapeutic practice. Szafran has served West Virginia, participating in many state-wide initiatives and with a variety of appointments, including the Comprehensive Behavioral Health Advisory Board and the “home team” for the National Governors Association Three Branch Institute on Child Social & Emotional Wellbeing. She has presented at Congressional briefings related to gender response and trauma focused care for marginalized girls. She is a national presenter and teacher. Under her leadership, Szafran has integrated innovative trauma treatment practice into residential and community-based health services at Crittenton.

She is the past president of the WV Child Care Association, a reviewer for the Council on Accreditation, and an active advocate with the National Crittenton Foundation. She has received the Commissioner’s Award from the US Department of Health & Human Services, Committee on Sexual Abuse. Szafran earned her master’s at WVU. She recently completed the Multi-System Integration Program from the Center for Juvenile Justice Reform at Georgetown University. This past September, she gave a presentation at the White House, serving as an expert panelist at the “Trauma-Informed approaches in School: Supporting Girls of Color and Rethinking Discipline” Conference. Szafran presented insights on trauma-informed practice and treatment of underserved populations, especially focusing on rural communities and the special needs of girls.

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More Than Words:

Techniques and Applications of Art Therapy

Art therapy is for projective purposes to aid clients in dialogue. As a non-verbal form of communication, art often brings in personal themes, concerns, and conflicts to the forefront, as it bypasses verbal defenses. The client can speak about an art project rather than speaking directly of the self, which can make talking about difficult subjects more comfortable. During this session, participants will learn about:

- Methods of applying art therapy to treatment
- How specific art media affects brain processing
- Specific media and interventions to promote cognitive, emotional, or sensory functioning
- Ways specific art interventions can address emotional and cognitive disturbances caused by trauma
- Developmental benefits of increased cognition and sublimation
- Current trends in art therapy
- Current development in neurology and trauma related to art therapy

Bianca Benson is the residential art therapist at Crittenton Services. She earned her MA in art therapy and counseling at St. Mary-of-the-Woods College. She is the former associate director of the Marian House in Wheeling.
