Paul Mangeles District Governor spoke to Westport Sunrise Rotary on September 23, 2016

I have an absolute burning passion for Rotary

Paul Mangels, our District Governor, introduced himself to Sunrise Rotary last Friday. He joined the Milford club in 1998, and has held a number of club and district leadership positions on the way to becoming governor.

At 40 he realized he had spent his entire life looking inward. He attended a Rotary meeting and realized that with Rotary relationships he could do things he could never do on his own.

Talking about membership, he said that only 15 percent of Rotarians invite others to attend meetings or volunteer at an event. "If you enjoy it, share it... Share a Rotary story, tell everyone why you enjoy it... how you make a difference in your community."

Invite them to be a part off it.

He told the group about a celebration for the clubs in the lower four counties of Connecticut to recognize the 100th anniversaries of the New London, New Haven and Waterbury clubs. He added that 41 of the district's 60 clubs grew out of those three.

And the International Convention will be in Atlanta this year. 26,000 people have already registered, largely because it is the 100th anniversary of Rotary Foundation.

Today's Foundation arose from a \$26.50 contribution in 1917, in Atlanta, to initiate an "endowment to do good in the world... Since then \$3 billion has been given out for literacy, clean water, peace and conflict resolution, polio and many other similar projects."

He told a personal story about his road to becoming Major Donor. He promised himself when he joined that he would give \$1,000 per year ("I didn't tell my wife"), "because their values were mine."

By year three he saw that he had failed, terribly. So he enrolled in Rotary Direct, a process that automatically debits whatever donation you choose every month. "After 15 years it's one of the best things I do."

Rotary Foundation is one of three charities in the world that received a rating of 100 out of 100 from Charity Navigator. They know what we do, as does the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, which has given us several hundred million dollars for End Polio Now.

He said polio is almost eradicated. There were only 25 cases this year. "After seeing 350,00 cases in 1985, the year Rotary started it program, we hope to see the last case this year.

Sunrise Rotary sends four high school students to the World Affairs Seminar at Carroll University in Waukesha, Wisc. every summer. The seminar is a week long program bringing together more than 300 high school delegates from across the US and from many foreign countries to learn about and discuss a significant world problem.

The seminar was founded in 1977 by a Waukesha Rotary club with the underlying belief in "Peace Through Understanding." The 2016 issue was "Water: a Global Resource to Share and Protect."

Two of the student delegates represented Staples - Gus Cardello and Renee Weisz, and two represented Bridge Academy - Kyleigh Curtain and Stephanie Naar. Bridge Academy is a 240 student charter school in Bridgeport for which Sunrise has provided both financial and hands on support for the past few years.

The students recently joined the club to share a presentation about their experiences.

They called the academic experience primary - "Through lecture and group projects we learned about environmental impacts on water, human impacts on water, varying water crises throughout the world, and how we can use our resources to limit water related issues."

Delegates came from across the country, and from as far away as Nepal. All four commented that "sharing different perspectives, whether related to water usage or not, broadened our global horizons."

Each was assigned to a different project. Gus's group learned how mussels help re-oxygenate and purify water. Renee's went to the nearby University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee's School of Freshwater Sciences to learn about the dangers of pollution on Milwaukee's water.

Kyleigh's learned about LifeStraws, "personal water filters" used in parts of the world where water is not drinkable. A LifeStraw enables a person to drink right from a stream as well as from a water bottle. Her group learned about their use in the Philippines, "where 55 people die every day due to polluted water."

Stephanie's group learned "how we can preserve water... be more resourceful, do what we do using less water, like taking shorter showers."

But the takeaway for all was social and cultural. Stephanie said "Yes, it was a big eye opener to what I take for granted and don't realize that I do." While Kyleigh wasn't sure the week changed her, "it helped me better understand how to use and save water and also how to open up to meet new people."

Renee said her "global perspective was enhanced and I am more careful with my water usage," while Gus commented that "This experience made me a lot more aware and understanding of my consumption of not just water, but of all of the resources I use daily."

Altogether a great experience for the students, and another example of how Rotary contributes to improving our world.


