

CREATING CADELS with Vivian Mungall An IAMPETH Class Review

What are Cadels? I had seen these ornate capitals used with forms of blackletter and fractur in images of historic documents. In 2010, at the IAMPETH conference in Orlando, Vivian Mungall showed samples of Cadels during the Round Robin session.

In the past five years, Vivian has figured out how to make these intricate strokes and she did a full day workshop on Cadels at the conference this year. The earliest forms are found in late 1400s and early 1500s. They began as more simple double stroke letters with some flourishing. Later the Lombard capitals were used to form the basic shape and then the cadel patterns were incorporated to decorate the letters. They were mostly found in titles and initial letters. They could be simple cadels or flourished cadels, even illuminations around the cadels.

True cadels are designed of parallel lines (straight or curved) that can be traced completely from beginning to end without retracing any part. The original French term for these decorated letters was cadeau, or gift. They said that each cadel or cadeau resembled a gift wrapped up with a bow. Sometimes, you see a figure made up or unconnected strokes that are called false cadels. The historic documents of the 15th and 16th centuries show letters composed of parallel lines that interweave and knot together in true cadels, false cadels, or a combination of both.

Various lettering styles were used with cadels. In northern Europe, they used the gothic style, while in the southern part they favored rounder rotunda letters. Cadels also look good with Gothicized Italic.



So how do you do these cadels? Vivian showed us that the straight or curved lines are parallel to each other and not widely spaced apart. The white space should be about the same between the strokes. The connecting hairlines should be balanced with the heavier broad strokes, forming the diamonds of each cadel. Some cadels are straight, others curved, some condensed, others elongated. Curves may be added in the corners of stretched out or condensed forms.

Letters can be formed of strokes and cadels and then flourishes can be added. Spaces in between two parallel lines can be filled in with diamonds made with diagonal strokes of the broad edge pen. The resulting letters can be used to make spectacular names for friends and family or can be used as initial letters in a short piece. Vivian will be publishing an e-book all about cadels this fall. We'll keep you posted so you can order it if you want to pursue these fascinating creative letters.

FUN W/ SPLIT NIB with Bob Hurford An IAMPETH Class Review

One of my favorite sessions at the IAMPETH conference was Bob Hurford's Fun with the Split Nib, and boy, did we have fun! We started out with two pencils tied in tandem with a rubber band to create large letters. Later, we would see how the hollow center of those letters could be filled with colored pencils, watercolor, color ink, or even gold.

Next, we explored the variety of split nibs that are available. Most of us had a variety of the Mitchell Scroll Writers. The 10 has a broader stroke on the right, while the 60 has a broader stroke on the left. The others in the series have even finer tines. Some of us had Automatic pens with split nibs.

We even looked at the effects that could be made with the Music Nib. This nib with 5 tines, originally designed to ink the staff for music compositions, can also be used effectively for letters. Bob also mentioned how chisel markers could be cut with a V in the center to fashion split nibs.

Split nibs are used primarily for headings, posters, and displays, not for text. Split nibs can be used for any broad-edge alphabet. The best tip in Bob's class was to plan the letters so that no strokes cross each other. Whenever a stroke crosses over another, you can stop just at the line and pick up the stroke on the other side. This method leaves a clean space inside the letter. The resulting outlined letters can be filled in a variety of imaginative ways or left open. I had used the split nibs before and this tip really helped me produce a lovely open letter.

The second great tip that Bob emphasized was cornering. Even with these split nibs, tilting the pen to one tine or the other can create a lovely thin line as an entry or ending stroke or an element of flourished capitals. The split nib would be a great way to create a first name for a friend. You can fill in the letters with colors, gold, or even Zentangles for a personalized effect. If you want to have fun, try out split nibs!

JOYCE SIEVERS' WORKSHOP

"BOOKS: INTIMATE VESSELS"

IS FULL!

Edward Johnston's last major manuscript hand, developed in 1924, was a compressed Foundational characterized by a rich, dense texture quite similar to a Gothic Textura. The name Gothicized Italic is, however, somewhat misleading, because the forms themselves bear little, if any, affinity to Italian Renaissance styles. Yet because of its compressed, pointed character, and when written on a slight slope, it does take on something of the lively rhythm of Italic, culminating in an evocative, often sumptuous style of writing. It is most effective for wedding invitations, formal documents, and some poetry.

In this workshop we begin by looking at Johnston's forms and their historical antecedents. Then we zoom into the 21st century and consider the forms stripped of anachronisms, and apply modern techniques to make them more viable. Day 1 deals with the minuscules and the rhythm of writing and spacing. On Day 2 we will work with the variables that create an entirely different feel, as well as with the bounty of styles that permit us to create an endless repertory of Capitals.

Prior experience, and some fluidity in Foundational and Italic is essential. There will be demonstrations of pen manipulation and pressure, elements critical to the proper structure of the alphabet and to the sophistication of the forms.

TIP FROM VICKI BRANDT

"I just bought (Bed Bath & Beyond) a Wondergel Extreme Seat Cushion. It is a 2" gel cushion to prevent pressure hot spots when sitting for long periods of time. I needed the extra height of the 2" cushion (which was more pricey at \$80), but they also had ones in 1" - 1 1/2" that were much less (almost half the price). The cushion comes in a nifty cover with a handle so you can carry with you (to workshops?). I debated on the high price, but finally decided my butt, back & legs deserved better care and attention. I love it! As calligraphers, we are guilty of sitting far too long once we start working. If you are experiencing a similar situation, you might want to consider the Wondergel Cushion (I did not look online to see if it was available for less). Your lower body will thank you. Photoshop For Calligraphers

WRITING ON A CIRCLE

Draw a circle using a compass. That circle will be the baseline for your letters. Next, determine the x-height of your letters. Using the same center point, adjust your compass out & draw a second, larger circle and that will be your waistline. This will determine the size of your letters. If you have a specific quote or alphabet, you may find it helpful to divide your circle either in half or quadrants to help with spacing. This will also help keep your letters straight & upright.
