While we've had much success in cleaning up the Delaware, we still have trouble crossing the lines of our coalitions, alliances, networks, and initiatives. Whether it's the Coalition for the Delaware River Watershed, Alliance for Watershed Education, the Circuit Trail Network, or the Delaware River Watershed Initiative, there are several large-scale initiatives and even more small collaborations and impactful efforts underway. How can CDRW's policy work perform to advance the protection goals that are engrained in the DRWI? How can monitoring efforts contribute to storytelling to engage the outdoor recreation community, which can then advance policy and inclusion/equity efforts? Why is it so hard to get us to work in concert? This session will highlight what our collective strengths are, the challenges we face, and will get your input on what it will take to start working together toward the same broad goals. Whether you're neck-deep in an initiative, a part of a smaller collaborative efforts looking for support, or a group looking from the outside-in, there's space to discuss how to embark in a wide-spread coordinated effort to make this watershed even more powerful in its efforts for healthier lands and waters.
