A NEW CURATE

On Sunday 3rd July Max Bayliss will be ordained a Deacon at St Albans Abbey and will be coming to join us as our new curate. Although the main focus for his ministry will be at All Saints he will also be involved in various ways in parishes across the team ministry. When you get to meet him, I'm

sure you will give him a warm and friendly welcome.

Much has changed with regard to the training of curates since I was first ordained thirty six years ago. I was a little bit younger than Max is now and the Vicar I worked along-side was the same age that I am now. I feel as though I have gone "full circle"!

Back in 1980, the training I received was rather like osmosis. You took in what the Vicar did at services and then you simply got on and did the same yourself. As far as I can remember my boss never attended any baptisms or funerals at which I officiated to check on whether I was doing them right and he only ever made comment about one of my sermons — which he didn't like! You may think that this "go it alone" approach would have left me with a negative impression of parish life but the truth is that I was very happy as a curate. This was mainly due to our parishioners were very supportive of all their clergy and especially knew how to look after young curates.

My Vicar may not have had time to train his curates but nowadays those who are privileged to be entrusted with the care of a curate are required to make time for them. We are called Training Incumbents and over the past few months we have been required to attend training events ourselves so that we are better equipped to encourage the newly ordained in these early years of their ministry.


The watchword for all Training Incumbents is "supervision". It is expected that we will set aside specific times during each month when we will meet with our new colleague. It isn't only about "showing them the ropes" but it's an opportunity to help them reflect practically, pastorally and theologically on their ministry. Constructive feedback is all important. In addition, Max will also have to attend regular meetings with his fellow curates from around the diocese and must commit to regular in-service training courses as well. In addition, we will both be involved in an annual review process through which the Bishop will decide whether he is ordained as a priest next year and ultimately on his suitability to run a parish of his own.

As you can imagine, I am greatly looking forward to Max's arrival and having another colleague who will share in ministry alongside me together with the other team members. But you can also see that there is far more to his role as our new curate than simply getting on with the job or being an extra pair of hands. At his ordination we pray that the grace of the Holy Spirit will be conferred upon Max. But it's also up to us to help equip him for both his present and future ministry. As his training incumbent I will have specific responsibilities in this regard but we can all provide him with the encouragement and support he needs to be happy and fulfilled in his ministry. It is this ingredient above all that has sustained me in my ministry for the past 36 years and I hope that Max will also find this to be so as well.

The Villager

In 1916, the villagers had begun to realise that the War was going to last for a much longer time than many had thought at first and would not be the easy victory that they had imagined.

"The War Budget" publication of January 1916 had advice for soldiers' wives:

'For the home folks, who have somehow to carry on the domestic arts as usual and need a few intervals of relaxation which shall not be mere waste of time, it is safe to prescribe a little household reading. Few periodicals can meet this special need as it is met by *The Mother's Magazine*, a bright monthly, crammed with interest and information.

But there was really no time for relaxation as food shortages were being felt and it was realised that with the men going to war, there would be a shortage of labour on the land. At the behest of the Board of Trade and the Board of Agriculture, working in co-operation with the War Agriculture Committee, villages were being urged to mobilise women to take on some of the tasks. Lectures were given in each village explaining some of the jobs that could be undertaken. It was considered that women could do milking, dairy work and drive milk carts, feed cattle of all sorts, help to thatch, plant beans, trim hedges, spread manure, gather fruit, dig up docks and weeds, hoe turnips and all such work. With regard to horses, some women were afraid but there was no need to be afraid of farm horses. They were really nice animals and one could manage them easily with kindness and a gentle hand. Much preferred to speading much I should have thought!

What tasks were considered to be unsuitable work for women?

Pitching hay or corn but as elevators for both stacks and carts were now on some farms, a woman could perhaps learn to load and stack. I was reminded of this when I visited Pitstone Green Farm Museum on May Bank Holiday Monday and saw an example of the 'Coronation' elevator made by Davis and Bailey of Hemel Hempstead around 1910. This was used with a horse gear or small engine to drive it and hay and sheaves of corn could easily be lifted on to the tall ricks.

Were there any women willing to do something? The food supply of the country was in danger unless women could help replace the men on the land who had gone to fight for their country. The Board of Trade and the Board of Agriculture, who had the matter in hand, would supply suitable boots, leggings etc. for the use of women while at farm work. Women must be suitable clothed and the need not fear the roughest weather.

Many farmers did not welcome women on their farms and some considered a woman's place was at home and many had large families to look after. I have been unable to find out how many worked on farms in Heath and Reach after that call 100 years ago but perhaps in your family archives you have photos of one of your female ancestors, complete with Wellington boots?

More from the Good Old Days.....

Houses had thatched roofs, thick straw piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained, it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying "It's raining cats and dogs."

There was nothing to stop things falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom, where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. Hence a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. **That's how four**-poster canopy beds came into existence.

The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt. Hence the saying "dirt poor". The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread "thresh," or straw, on the floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they added more and more thresh until when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entrance. Hence a threshold

Bread was divided according to status. Servants got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle and guests got the top, or "The Upper Crust".

Lead cups were used to drink ale, the staple drink of the poor as water was often unsafe. Too much of the strong drink would sometimes knock the imbibers out for a couple of days. Someone walking along the road might take them for dead and prepare them for burial. The were laid out on the kitchen table for a couple of days and the family would gather round and eat and drink and wait to see if they would wake up. Hence the custom of "Holding a Wake".

England is old and small and the local folks started running out of places to bury people, so they would dig up coffins and would take the bones to a bone house and re-use the grave. When re-opening these graves, one in twenty five of these coffins were found to have scratch marks on the inside and they realised they had been burying people alive. So they would tie a string to the wrist of the corpse, thread it through the coffin and up through the ground and tie it to a bell. Someone would have to sit out in the graveyard all night (the graveyard shift) to listen for the bell; thus someone could be "Saved by the Bell" or was considered a "Dead Ringer".

And that's the truth!


