

## **Epiphany** Standing In The Light of the Christ Child's Presence

The snow-capped mountains cradled tall open stands of aspen, all aglow under the fullness of an early January moon. Soon the "swishing" sounds of three munchkin snowsuits and a duo of goose-down parkas began to break the still winter's night. ... Meandering trails were being formed behind them

in the exhaust of freshly fallen powder – especially those made by the small but impressive footprints created by the munchkins' pint-sized Patagonia boots.

Yes, it was a "winter of mostly contentment" and Epiphany's "more" (John 1:5; 10:10) ... as our little family was taking an evening stroll out under the big starry night of Bozeman, Montana. Our neighborhood was close to the outskirts of town. And so, as we wandered south, it quickly became dark, very dark - except for the guiding light of the moon. Our little pack of snowsuits and parkas started to form a huddle – not only for gathering warmth, but for reasons of living "where the buffalo roam" as well as an occasional moose-on-the-loose! (Earlier in the fall, a physician friend had been "treed" by one of the latter critters. And this before cell phones. Fortunately he was On Call. No, not the moose. And people came looking.)

Well, after making a big southerly loop, moving slowly in parabolic fashion toward the foothills of the Rockies ... we then turned back north, making our way home. An hour or so later, we turned the final corner of our block moving off of Kagy Avenue onto Spring Creek Road. There, a large street lamp shined its big, beaming beacon of light down upon our stocking-capped heads - casting long...liquid... shadows on the snow-packed street.

Our little trinity of munchkins began to run around – trying to jump on each other's shadows. A New Revised Standard Version of the old classic: "Playing Tag." Suddenly, our then five-year-old Sarah experienced the wondrous living symbol of epi-phany (Gk. "light-upon"). "Wow!" she exclaimed. "Look how tall I am when I stand under the light. I feel SOOOO BIG!" Catching the light just right, she stood with arms outstretched - quickly pointing-out to her little urchin brothers that they were now in the grasp of *her* shadow.

Recently, I was taking another mid-winter's stroll through a newly published edition of *The Poetry of Robert Frost* (New York: Henry Holt and Co.). As the serendipity of the spirit would have it, I opened the book to page 303

(literally the heart of this 607 page masterpiece) and my eyes were met once moreby the genius of Frost's poetry. The poem is entitled, "Afterflakes." I share this marvelous poem with you, in the newness of this Epiphany Season, because it pictures the wondrous way in which earthly experience points ever heavenward through the questioning of the human spirit; especially for our "winters of dis-content" (ala William Shakespeare's opening lines of "Richard III").



"In the thick of teeming snowfall I saw my shadow on the snow. I turned and looked back up at the sky. Where we still look to ask the why Of Everything below

If I shed such a darkness, If the reason was in me, That shadow of mine should show in form Against the shapeless shadow of storm How swarthy [and powerful] I must be.

I turned and looked back upward. The whole sky was blue; And the thick flakes and floating at a pause Were but frost knots on an airy gauze, With the sun shining through."

(R. Frost's "Afterflakes." Emphasis added.)

Now ... if I'm quiet, I can still hear that little voice of my daughter, Sarah singing in mid-winter's wonder: "Wow! Look how tall I am when I stand under the light. I feel SOOO BIG!"

Friends and family of First Lutheran Church ... in the many moments that our lives can feel rather small and insignificant, may the Light that spirited these words enfold you in the warmth of a wondrous bene-diction; that is, God's gospel "good-news" word that's especially for you ... as you enter into this New Year. Here it is: "The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face to SHINE ON YOU and be gracious to you." In this Season of Epiphany, and always ... You have God's Word on it: "I am the light of the world," says Jesus (John 8:12; 9:5)

Go, tell it on the mountain!

## "What Does the Star of Epiphany 'Shine on Us' ... 'Tell Us' ... Where Does It 'Lead Us'?"

"Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, saying, 'Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the East, and have come to worship him ..." (Matthew 2:1-2)

The story of the magi ranks right up there with the Christmas and Easter stories in terms of snaring the human imagination. Poets as diverse as William Butler Yeats and Garrison Keillor have sought to wrap words around the visit of the Magi (i.e.the Three Wise Men). Henry Wadsworth Longfellow even gave them names: *Melchior*, *Gaspar*, and *Balthasar*. Hundreds of artists as well have sought to capture the mystic scene: including Botticelli and Rembrandt. So much has been made of this story of which we know so little ...

And yet, a very telling commentary can be found in a faintly drawn sketch by Leonardo Da Vinci, entitled, "*The Adoration of the Magi*." Its backdrop is that of a ravaged world – with ruined buildings, fighting horsemen and war. Like the star that hangs overhead, the picture's meaning is clear and manifest: the world into which the Messiah comes is in chaos and decay, a time filled with war 'n ravaged rumors of war. Yes, our world is ill, terminally ill. It needs a Savior.

So, let me ask you ... where does the star lead the wise men and their camels in St. Matthew's nativity account ... and yes, us? Bethlehem? ... No. It leads the wise men to Jerusalem. For based on their reading of many of the Old Testament prophecies, Jerusalem would make all the sense in the world. Why? Listen in with me to Isaiah 60 for example ...

"Arise [Jerusalem], shine, for your light has come (v.1) ... all the nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your rising (v.3) ... the wealth of the nations shall come to you. A multitude of camels shall cover you (v.5-6a) ... They shall bring gold and frankincense and shall proclaim the praise of the LORD" (v.6b; emphasis added)

Wow! Sound familiar?! ... Jerusalem. The capital city of Judah. Right? This is where they thought they'd find the new king of peace and prosperity. Only the king they found in Jerusalem was old and fat and he had terrible

breath! King Herod. His skin was so yellow as if not only his bile but also his guile had gotten the best of him. And then come the only words in this little story from the wise men: "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the East, and have come to worship him?" (Matthew 2:2). Note the radical undoing of human pride and presumption here. I mean, how wise were these guys anyway?! Really?! Going to King Herod, the poster child of paranoia – who had killed off many of his own family members for fear he'd lose his crown – and asked about a NEW KING?! Herod's reputation for brutality had traveled even as far as Rome. As Caesar Augustus even observed, with a play on words: "Better to be Herod's pig [hys] than his son [huios]" (Frederick Dale Bruner; Matthew I:65).

Asking the wise men if they'd please excuse him for a moment, while he took a powder, Herod conferred with his think tank of clergy. They began to whip out their scriptures and concordances. And out of fear of losing their jobs, if not their heads, they told Herod what he wanted to hear. "King. These wise guys are off by a mile! Actually more like nine miles" (cf. W. Bruggemann; "Off By Nine Miles" in The Christian Century, Dec. 19-26, 2001, p.15). "Close, but no rubber cigar for our visitors!" Incensed, Herod shouted: "Wipe that smirk off your faces and tell me what you're blabbering about." And they started to tremble as they pointed to a text in the 5th chapter of Micah. There was a little something there about a promised ruler for Israel, to be born in the dinky sheep-town of Bethlehem... But nothing for King Herod to get excited about. It had been there for a long, long time; but sure ... why not? Send the wise guys to Bethlehem to do the reconnaissance work and save a bit on the budget. You know, they were in a Recession after all. Can't do much or give much. You know. Gas prices. Even though King Herod had plenty of that!!!

So, after hearing from the clergy, Herod gargled, combed his greasy hair and went back to tell the wise men they should go to Bethlehem at once – with his blessing – on the condition they come back his way and tell him who his successor was so he could send flowers. Herod's breath smelled like *Pine-Sol* and the wise men left feeling queezy; but once they were out in the night air they could see the star clearly again ... moving their gaze further south. And so they finally arrived in Bethlehem and saw Jesus and his mother, Mary (v.13).

Ponder this with me: How far south can our gaze go but to our feet in humility ... When the gravity of God's grace weighs on us so amazingly ... So that we can't help but bow in worship before the manger? ... Look what happens to people when they finally come into contact with the living Christ. What does the Bible say? "When they saw the star [over Bethlehem] they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy" and "they fell down and worshiped him ... opening their gifts of gold, and frankincense and myrrh" (Matthew 2:10-11).

Family of First Lutheran Church, and all who have ears to hear 'n' eyes to see ... Let's take a step back, out under the star of Bethlehem that is the lead-in for this Epiphany Season ... What does this light "*shine on us*," and "*tell us*"? Where does it "*lead us*"?

- 1) That to do the work of ministry is to do the work of the star. "And the star came and stood pointing and shining toward the place where the Christ child lay" (Matthew 2:9). My friends, point people to where Christ is present: in worship, in baptism, in the Lord's Supper, in the Word that is read and proclaimed, in the needs of others ...
- 2) That we ask ourselves what it is we lay before Him who is the greatest gift-giver of all ... Who's given his very life for us ... Do we come on bended knee? Do we offer our finest? ... "And opening their treasures the wise men offered him gifts: gold, frankincense, and myrrh" (Matthew 2:11). Let us begin this New Year by giving the Christ Child our very hearts ...
- 3) That when we do this ... we continue in the journey, the very steps of the wise men and their camels, as they "go home by another way" (Matthew 2:12) humbly, thankfully, with comfort and joy ...

May the Lord's face SHINE ON YOU and be gracious to you,

## Stretched out hands and hearts

The women of First Lutheran Church have their hands and hearts in many activities of our church, their homes, our community, our nation and the world. Some of these events and adventures take interesting turns. They involve God's work in amazing ways. This past year gave us several experiences.

**Sleeping Bag.** At a rummage sale of daily and seasonal use items, a lady appeared and asked for a sleeping bag. None was available, but in visiting we learned her husband was hospitalized at Sanford with West Nile and she was in need as she slept on the floor of a friend's home. Sharyl Wolf said she had one at home and she could bring it in about three hours. The lady agreed to return.

The Hannah Circle members working that day all agreed we were a Mission Project and that we should give her \$25 when she returned. Two hours later she returned to tell us that she had obtained a sleeping bag and she wanted to thank us for our concern for her. We, in turn, gave her the money and she began to cry as she said, "This is the second time." Questioning her meaning, she went on to explain that Lutheran Social Services had helped her at a younger age when her child was adopted. (Today, he is happy with his adopted family in Georgia; and they are still in minimal contact.) Tears flowed in joy and relief as she left. Not knowing her name we prayerfully wished the lady and her husband the best.

**Yarn.** Many things happen at the bazaar each year, but what happens to the remaining yarn? Some goes to on-going projects of the quilters and volunteers who again begin the making of next year's treasures. (Yes, the FLCW Board voted in November to have the Bazaar in 2018.) However, according to Lillian Carlson, three full bags of yarn will be taken by Intern Pastor Jeff Backer to the Penitentiary for their inmate knitting program.

Wedding Dress. Now for the tear jerker involving a seriously ill child, a doting grandmother, and a caring nurse. The rummage sale was in progress as a customer asked if we had a wedding dress for sale. Not having one, we asked about the nature of the need. The grandmother told us of her ill granddaughter's desire to have a "fairy dress with puffy sleeves," and that she thought she could remake a wedding dress to fit the child's desire. All of this sparked WELCA member and nurse, Lisa Bean's attention because, when recently cleaning a closet, she had found her wedding dress, removed a stain and left it hanging, wondering what she should do with it. With what was like a nudge from God, Lisa offered her dress if the

grandmother would wait as she went home to get it. Sympathy and concern was with everyone as Lisa tearfully, but willingly, gave her dress to the grandmother knowing it would cheer a sick child. Weeks later, just after the bazaar, Lisa received a letter with pictures of the skillfully redesigned "fairy dress" and a description of the joy it

Another afternoon, the rummage sale was visited by members of a Twin Cities Church Youth Group who were witnessing in Sioux Falls. The mission of the FLCW was explained and, appropriately, the important role of Lutherans and Martin Luther was discussed as they seemed completely unaware of the Reformation. Before they left, there was prayer together, thanking God for our mutual service in His Name.

So goes some amazing examples of God's use of *stretched out hands and hearts*. God gives us so many opportunities. - Finances look good and pledges are coming in.
- The recent church shooting was discussed and how we would plan if something would happen at FLC. Marilyn has been in contact with the police department about this and is working on a plan.
- The custodial staff was commended on their hard work during the busy fall of Reformation, Hymn Festival and the Bazaar. The Bazaar was very successful and money will be dispersed to many ministries.
- The Luther House fund has \$16,680. Several people have pledged for next year. The first funds won't be needed until July of 2018 or January of 2019.
- The Governance Proposal was discussed. To change the Bylaws of FLC, the Constitution had to be updated. The Constitution and By-Laws are now one document. The ELCA has certain requirements what to be included in the By-Laws and Constitution. The Constitution of FLC has not been updated since 1977. The Council took a significant amount of time going over the proposed new language of the document. The proposed deletions and additions were discussed and agreed upon.

A resolution to recommend approval of the Proposed Constitution and Amended and Restated By-Laws to the congregation of First Lutheran Church:

Whereas First Lutheran has been engaged in discussion about reorganizing church governance structure to accommodate our First and Foremost 2016 Strategic Plan; and

Whereas the Church Council, Executive Committee, and Leadership Task Force have approved a revision of current Constitution and By-Laws that supports this reorganization and adopts required language from the ELCA Model Constitution; and

Whereas the Church Council has reviewed and approved of the draft,

Therefore, be it resolved: That the Church Council recommends adoption of the Constitution and Revised and Restated By-Laws by the Congregation at a special congregational meeting to be held on December 3, 2017.

I can't turn back the water, the water of change." That's the chorus to a song by Larry Olson. It's been a special song for our family; it was one of the songs for both our boys' baptisms. I remember when we were baptizing our oldest son, we were super excited because

the pastor was using water from the River Jordan – hot diggity! This was going to be extra special. Except... not really. I mean - it was still cool - but the water wasn't extra special, he wasn't MORE baptized than I was with

my regular old tap water. Wait. What? Are you sure? - Martin Luther says in that nifty little Small Catechism, "Clearly the water does not do it, but the word of God, which is with and alongside the water and faith, which trusts this word of God in the water. For without the word of God the water is plain water and not a baptism, but with the word of God it is a baptism, that is, a grace-filled water of life and a 'bath of the new birth in the Holy Spirit',..." Titus, chapter 3.

A "bath of new birth" – what a wonderful image that is! That we are made new! In this season of New Year's and resolutions, we can rejoice! Luther continues "it signifies that the old person in us with all sins and evil desires is to be drowned and die through daily sorrow for sin and through repentance, and on the other hand that daily a new person is to come forth and rise up to live before God in righteousness and purity forever." So each morning we rise, and if we missed that alarm for our 5:30 a.m. work-out time or a late-night snack is weighing heavy, or we are just too exhausted from being up with the baby, or life is overwhelming for any number of reasons, we can get up and know that God has given us a new birth and we might walk in newness of life (Romans 6)! I've been washed in the water! And so have you. And we will never be the same.



## **Community Update**


On December 3, at a special congregational meeting, changes to the First Lutheran constitution and bylaws were approved. This had been in the works for at least two years with the work of many teams and task forces, in addition to First Lutheran's Council and Executive Committee, and was asked for by the congregation through the strategic planning process of the CAT (Church Assessment Tool) and First & Foremost. Here are a couple outcomes resulting from these amended governing documents:

#### • An adjusted board structure.

All board descriptions were adjusted to give flexibility toward carrying out ministry. That is the goal of each board. Ensuring that a ministry area is well executed and is part of the whole ministry of First Lutheran.

- **New Board Created.** The Board of Welcome & Community is being established, and will begin working and learning how to best encourage Christian community among members as well as welcome new people into the congregation.
- **Council.** Council will be made up of the Executive Committee, Board Chairs, and the presidents of WELCA and the Foundation. Council will be a "meeting of the minds" from across the congregation, where the leaders of various ministry areas interact and work together in a supportive way, to lead boards in carrying out ministry.
- More behind the Scenes. In addition to the board changes, we have also begun restructuring staff positions, the nominating process, and the budget creation to better reflect ministry goals for next year.

As much work has been done to get us to this point, however, will mean very little for the congregation if we don't live into the hopes that are behind all of this. Changing words on paper doesn't make the changes, they only express how we expect to be. The expressed hope in the CAT to be a more welcoming congregation does nothing to make us more welcoming. Creating a board to lead us in welcoming, is only a step toward actually carrying out ministries that support welcoming and building



community. So what is next? What can you expect to see?

Time to learn. All the boards will need time and training to operate differently. In some ways a 'new' board has more freedom than a 'changed' board, but both will need some time to set new direction and goals for the year.

More Intentional Cooperation. For example, the Board for Evangelism & Outreach has been hosting new member orientation and welcome. A partnership between Evangelism & Outreach and Welcome & Community will give this important ministry a focus that spans inviting, welcoming and connecting new people into the ministries of First Lutheran.

**In-Reach.** Better skills, gifts, and ministry passion inventory will be needed, and a better way of using this information. As we get better at integrating new people, it will be useful to also find out about current members.

Thanks be to God for all the people he has called into the community of Christ at First Lutheran Church, for even as we make changes to the way that we operate, the grace of God continues to be known and shown through the ministry that you are a part of.

I will always remember how all that we met were gracious and welcoming both those that work in/for the church and those that were recipients of the blessings extended by the Evangelical


Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO).
