Our organization is also busy with the maintenance and stewardship of our existing properties, collaboration with partners, grant raising and spreading the word about EALT. It is an exciting time to be a member of the EALT board of directors. In the past year, EALT has continued to grow and find opportunities to celebrate our success. A brief summary of the year's highlights include:

- Celebrated the securement of our sixth property, named Boisvert's GreenWoods, an 80 acre parcel north of the Town of Morinville in Sturgeon County.
- Continued to steward over 1,200 acres of natural areas in the Edmonton region.

We have quickly come to realize that the opportunities, energy and desire to preserve natural areas in the region are plentiful. Land Stewardship and Securement Activities

Securement

2014 marked the securement of our sixth property, named Boisvert's GreenWoods, after the family who donated the land. This 80 acre property north of Morinville is a valuable refuge for wildlife and a stepping stone for their movement throughout the landscape. We already have pictures of moose and deer roaming this beautiful forested place, taken with a wildlife motion sensor camera, and launched our field season enthusiastically by installing nest boxes for chickadees, with the 111th LDS Scout group.



Stewardship

We continued to steward over 1,200 acres of natural areas in the Edmonton region in 2014, with several large projects completed. Our Glory Hills property received a brand new fence along the east boundary, funded by a grant from EPCOR, with several gates and stiles installed at strategic points to allow foot access. Our very helpful local stewards maintain the network of trails on this property all year long, making it a beautiful place to enjoy hiking, photography, snowshoeing, and cross-country skiing. Our resident loons return year after year to the lake at Glory Hills, and visitors are bound to catch a glimpse of them or hear their haunting yodels during a visit in spring or early summer.



This year volunteers removed barbed wire from fences that aren't appropriate for wildlife, because the wire is either too high for animals to jump over or too low for young wildlife to crawl under, or grown into trees or vegetation. An amazing 9.5 klms of old barbed wire was removed from our Glory Hills, Golden Ranches, Ministik and Boisvert's GreenWoods lands! Removing and modifying the fences on our lands in this way makes them safer for wildlife as they move in and through our properties.

Invasive plants are always a concern, and need annual work. We tackled these weeds at several of our properties this year with a variety of methods and with the incredible help of our dedicated volunteers. Keeping invasive plants in check on our lands ensures that the native vegetation continues to thrive, providing important habitat for wildlife for nesting, foraging, and shelter.

In a new partnership with the Wildlife Rehabilitation Society of Edmonton, we launched *Wildlife into the Wild*, where rehabilitated wildlife are released into the wild to make our properties their home. This year we released fox kits, muskrat, ducklings, skunk kits and young ravens onto our lands. We also began a partnership with Leaf2Wing and planted milkweed seeds at our Pipestone Creek property, to create habitat for butterflies such as Monarchs.



In 2014, we began the process for several more property securements that we expect to come to fruition relatively soon. This included many discussions with landowners, site visits, report preparation and grant applications in anticipation of a busy year of natural areas securement.

Natural Areas in the City of Edmonton

In early 2014, an Order in Council enabled a Conservation Easement to be registered against the Larch Sanctuary lands within Whitemud Creek Nature Reserve. We are working with the City of Edmonton to

implement this. EALT commissioned the required Baseline Documentation Report and submitted this to the City in mid fall. We now await the registration of the CE on title with the City, and thereafter will collaborate on the development of the Natural Area Management Plan.

Land Stewardship and Securement Activities

Education

EALT staff and volunteers are proud of creating a <u>Children's Activity Booklet</u> which complements our <u>Species at Risk in Alberta Guide</u>. This booklet spreads awareness about many species at risk, and is a learning tool for conservation for young people and both are the first such guides in Alberta.

EALT and volunteers also produced a <u>Butterfly Identification Guide</u> to help visitors of EALT Conservation Lands identify common butterflies. The brochure aims to spark interest in butterfly species and conservation.



We worked with several classes from the University of Alberta through the Community Service-Learning Program, completing projects related to a variety of topics, including communications plans, ecological and Aboriginal history of the Golden Ranches area, snowmobile use around Pipestone Creek, and environmental toxins. EALT continues to build on relationships with educational institutions for our mutual benefit and practical learning.

EALT also teamed up with the Serving Communities Internship Program to recruit student interns to assist in researching options for a spring fundraiser, and examining methods for testing water quality.

Communications and Outreach

We continue to improve our communications. Our e-newsletter and volunteer network emails are now mobile friendly and we are continually updating our website. EALT also joined LinkedIn to add to our network of social media sites: Facebook, Twitter, Google+, Flickr and YouTube.

EALT engaged in many education and outreach activities in 2014. Staff and volunteers hosted information booths at the City Market Downtown, Old Strathcona Farmers' Market, Seedy Sunday, Earth Day Festival, Migratory Bird Day, John Janzen Nature Centre, Blue Dot Tour, and Edmonton Timeraiser. Presentations were made to the Canadian Bar Association, International Right of Way Association, Fort Saskatchewan Rotary Club, King's University College, Master Naturalists' Program, Strathearn Scouts, and Goldbar Preschool. EALT also hosted the North Saskatchewan Watershed Alliance's Sturgeon

Watershed Committee Tour at Boisvert's Greenwoods Conservation Lands, to discuss private conservation benefits and partnership possibilities.

EALT's 2nd Annual *Nature's Nourishment* event was another great success! The event was promoted by The Tomato Magazine, CORUS Radio, and numerous community event calendars. EALT welcomed 108 guests at a local farm, who all enjoyed a gourmet, wine-paired meal, creatively crafted by award-winning Chef Blair Lebsack and his culinary team.



Fundraising and Grant-raising

Fundraising Campaign

In 2014, we extended our fundraising focus to include crowd-funding campaigns including the successful Give Wildlife a Home, Giving Tuesday campaign and three charitable gift item campaigns for the giving season. We also promoted our charitable profile through ATB Cares, which matches donations by 15% and covers transaction fees.

Our main fundraising focus was an electronic appeal in late fall. This is increasingly successful, and we very much appreciate those who have chosen monthly support via Canada Helps, including those who gave anonymously.
