Cala Mariolu – Sardinia

The beach of Cala Mariolu opens out into the Golfo di Orisei, in the locality of Punta Ispuligi. The name is connected with the monk seal, nicknamed by the fishermen "mariolu" (thief) because it took fish out of their nets. Its waters are of a changing blue for the plays of light created by the sun reflected on the seabed characterized by sand mixed with round, pink-colored pebbles. [READ MORE](#)

Pelosa Beach – Sardinia

La Pelosa Beach with its shallow turquoise waters and salty white sands, it is a true Sardinian oasis and arguably one of the best beaches in the world. La Pelosa is just 2 km away from the harbor village of Stintino, in Capo Falcone, in the province of Sassari. The beach is 300 meters long – and up to 60 meters wide in some spot – and faces north-east, offering marvelous views of Isola Plana situated 600 meters off the coast and the larger Isola Asinara behind it. Tropea

Spiaggia dei Conigli

The Island is protected, given its loggerhead sea turtle population that lays its eggs here. This work of nature is absolutely captivating and can be reached even by non-swimmers – it's only 328 feet from Lampedusa coast, over a stretch of water just a little over 3 meters deep. Attempt to get to the other side of rabbit Island if you want to spot its submerged natural arch, colonized by orange Madre pores, colorful sponges and rockfish and moray eel burrows.



Bay of Silence

Located just a short distance from Genoa, Bay of Silence makes out list of the top beaches in Italy since it truly offers quiet serenity as well as crystal clear waters. If you're looking to get away from it all and enjoy the most beautiful views that Italy has to offer, then Bay of Silence is a must visit. La Cinta



La Cinta is the most well known and visited beach of San Teodoro. It is located on the northern outskirts of the town and has a beach that stretches out in an arched shape for around 5 km. A narrow lip of land, rich in low vegetation separates the beach from the lagoon. Dunes of white sand and centuries old junipers adorn the landscape. On your left you will see the Torre dell'Alto, instead on the right you can follow the paths and discover the zone. There are some places where it's possible diving from small heights.
