### Summer Internship Interest Inventory

4. What areas of ministry would you most like to focus on during your time at St. Peter's? (Please be as specific as possible in answering this question.)
5. Briefly describe your interest in completing an internship at St. Peter's.
6. During your time at St. Peter's, you will be working with a supervisor. How could your supervisor be of greatest help to you?
7. Briefly describe your involvement in parish ministry thus far and what you have learned from this experience.
8. At present, what are your vocational goals?
9. How do you assess your seminary experience thus far? What do you perceive as its strengths and weaknesses?
10. Briefly describe what you consider to be your spiritual gifts.
11. Have you read the ACNA Catechism? If so, do you embrace its teaching?
