


# 2018 Garden Tour Map

## 2018 Secret Gardens Of Strasburg Tour

### 1. Shroy House - 122 South Decatur Street

Enjoy a walk through this historic house which is being restored. This house and the two to your right are owned by the Strasburg Heritage Society. Stop at the fireplace where dyeing cloth and egg decoration will be demonstrated (Saturday only). Enjoy free drinks and cookies on the porch.

### 2. Chris & Joe Wachter - 295 Wilton Drive

If the weather is nice, you just may see Chris on the patio engaged in writing. The beautiful overlook shows many trees, Black Tupelo, Fringe, Weeping Cherry, River Birch, Bald Cypress, Magnolia, Oriental Spruce and underneath them are Hellebores. The couple places an emphasis on selecting native plants to surround their fountain enhanced patio and deck. A nearby cutting garden, highlights a variety of Lilies, Peonies, Dahlias, Crocosinas and Gladiolas.

### 3. Bob & Dolly Dettinger - 319 Wilton Drive

Imagine sitting by a cooling fish pond with a waterfall and enjoying a tranquil farmland view. This is where the Dettingers enjoy entertaining family and friends. Country primitive accents add personality to the 1 ½ acre slice of heaven.

### 4. Dale & Stephanie Kauffman - 43 West Main Street

“Dun Rovin” and nature were the guiding theme for the homeowner’s father as he started planning and planting on the one third acre lot 75 years ago. Through the years, the space evolved into a shady refuge with many (50) outstanding tree species, a sanctuary for birds, family history and memories. The Kauffman’s enjoy a natural space with room for many family activities. The main focal point is the hour glass shaped perennial bed in the center, changing with the seasons - Lilies, Astilbes, Ferns, Hellebores, Hostas and Grasses. Enjoying the delights of the gardens at each season. The Kauffman’s have lived here on Main Street for 32 years.

### **5. Flere and Paul Bomba - 16 Miller Street**

Informal - Tranquil - Colorful - All describe the lovely gardens at the Bombas. Annuals and perennials are blended together to insure continuing color throughout the seasons. A lovely wooden garden shed accents the welcoming landscape. The Bombas have dealt with the challenge of a Black Walnut Tree which produces toxins, therefore they have used plantings which tolerate this substance. "Gardens are always a work in progress" quotes Flere.

### **6 Steve & Terri Williams - 11 Creekview Lane**

"Go big or go home" is the mantra of the William's and their evolving gardens. Steve, a 30-year veteran of his landscaping business and Terri, with a passion for gardening make an amazing team. From the purchase of the home 19 years ago with only 2 yucca plants, 3 rose bushes and lots of stone surrounding the pool - to 4,700 square feet of outdoor living space and gardens, the William's created quite a haven. Kousa Dogwoods and Hollies provide a backdrop for a full sun garden with 50 different Daylilies, Iris, and other sun loving plants. Forty kinds of Hostas have been happy there for ten years.

### **7. Jim & Cheryl DuPrey - 10 Creekview Lane**

The Pequea Creek could not find a prettier place to meander than thru this property. Shaded by many interesting Pine, Sour Gums, Stewartia, Japanese Maples, Hinoki Cypress, Scarlet Oak and Hickories, the creek continues on its way. The area is being groomed for a bird sanctuary and the DuPrey's are working on a transition to native plants. A lovely gazebo and small ponds near the house add to the scenic setting.

### **8. Glenn & Brenda Book - 655 Strasburg Pike, Lanc.**

Ardent bird watchers, the Books created a small bluebird trail with 6 bird houses. Also welcoming nearby are 10 chickens in their cozy house. A garden shed and fountains compliment the farmhouse's two raised beds containing flowers, vegetables, strawberries and pungent herbs. Picnics, bird watching, cut flower arranging and entertaining all fill these spaces with delight. Summer annuals add spots of color throughout the gardens.

### **9. Lin & Susan Moedinger - 1835 Pioneer Road, Lanc.**

"I just plant what I love - and love what I plant" says Susan. Is there any better way to be surrounded by beauty your care about? Their house, built in 1763, provides the backdrop for many garden areas. Over 100 Hostas, 400 Daylily cultivators, a very rare white Rose of Sharon, beautiful species of trees and a very old Red Bud tree will capture your attention. 12 acres of Chesapeake Watershed trees are also on the property.

Feel free to stroll through the Strasburg Community Park which features total native plants to our area. In addition, the Lancaster County Art Association showcasing art of all types will be open on Saturday from 11 am - 4 pm and Sunday 1 pm - 4 pm for your enjoyment! (no admission fee)
