The Liturgy of the Word

Celebrant Bless ★ the Lord who forgives all our sins.

All His mercy endures for ever.

The Celebrant welcomes everyone and introduces the service, after which we listen to a setting of the Kyrie Eleison (Greek for 'Lord, have mercy') – an ancient Christian hymn of penitence set here to music by the English Elizabethan composer, John Merbecke, in 1549.


Celebrant Let us pray.

The Celebrant prays the Collect - a prayer reflecting the theme of the day.

Gracious Father, whose blessed Son Jesus Christ came down from heaven to be the true bread which gives life to the world: Evermore give us this bread, that he may live in us, and we in him; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen**.

Please remain seated for a reading from the Old Testament.

The people of Israel, led by Moses, have escaped from slavery in Egypt and are heading towards Canaan - the land promised to them back in the time



of Abraham. In the end, this journey takes them through the Sinai Peninsula over a fortyyear period, during which time they endure many physical hardships, including a lack of food and water.

Earlier in the book of Numbers, we read that in response to their hunger

the Lord gave them 'manna' to eat. What exactly this manna was remains debated – there are several possibilities, ranging from tree resin, to lichen, to mushrooms, and was evidently ground up into a flour and baked into cakes. Whatever it was, after eating it – and very little else – for a long time, the



Israelites have come to the end of their tolerance for it and complain to Moses that it is 'miserable food'.

As if these privations were not enough, they then encounter another problem: one common in that part of the desert – poisonous snakes. These caused painful and, often, slow deaths to those they bit and this had become a major issue for Moses.

His response, after consultation with God, is to fashion a bronze snake which, simply by being looked at, will provide the antidote to a bite.

Although this might appear like something a shaman would do, it is important to remember that it is neither the bronze snake nor Moses who is doing the healing – it is God. Looking at the bronze snake is simply a ritual which acknowledges they have enough faith that God will heal them.



Lector A reading from the book of Numbers.

From Mount Hor the Israelites set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died.

The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us."

So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live."

So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

A Litany of Penitence and Confession

Celebrant

Let us now let us call to mind and confess our sins against God and against our neighbor.

After a long silence, the Celebrant begins the following prayer.

All Most holy and merciful Father:

We confess to you and to one another, and to the whole communion of saints

in heaven and on earth,

that we have sinned by our own fault

in thought, word, and deed;

by what we have done,

and by what we have left undone.

Celebrant We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind,

and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.

We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven.

All Have mercy on us, Lord.

Celebrant We have been deaf to your call to serve, as Christ served

us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have

grieved your Holy Spirit.

All Have mercy on us, Lord.

Celebrant We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness: the

pride, hypocrisy, and impatience of our lives,

All We confess to you, Lord.

Celebrant Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our

exploitation of other people,

All We confess to you, Lord.

Celebrant Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those

more fortunate than ourselves,

All We confess to you, Lord.

Celebrant Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and

our dishonesty in daily life and work,

All We confess to you, Lord.

Celebrant Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to

commend the faith that is in us,

All We confess to you, Lord.

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Celebrant Accept our repentance, Lord, for the wrongs we have

done: for our blindness to human need and suffering, and

our indifference to injustice and cruelty,

All Accept our repentance, Lord.

Celebrant For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward

our neighbors, and for our prejudice and contempt

toward those who differ from us,

All Accept our repentance, Lord.

Celebrant For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our

lack of concern for those who come after us,

All Accept our repentance, Lord.

Celebrant Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us;

Favorably hear us, for your mercy is great.

Accomplish in us the work of your salvation, That we may show forth your glory in the world.

By the cross and passion of your Son our Lord, Bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.

Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desires not the death of sinners, but rather that they may turn from their wickedness and live, has given power and commandment to his ministers to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the absolution and remission of their sins. He pardons and ♣ absolves all those who truly repent, and with sincere hearts believe his holy Gospel.

Therefore we beseech him to grant us true repentance and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him which we do on this day, and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy, so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Great Thanksgiving

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

All And also with you.

Celebrant Lift up your hearts.

All We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All It is right to give him thanks and praise.

Then the Celebrant continues.

It is right to thank to you at all times, Father, Creator of heaven and earth.

Because through Jesus Christ our Lord, who was tempted in every way as we are yet did not sin, we are able to triumph over every evil, and to live no longer for ourselves alone, but for him who died for us and rose again.

And so we join the saints and angels in proclaiming your glory, as we sing:

Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of hosts, heaven and earth are full of thy glory: Glory be to thee, O Lord Most High.

Blessed is he who cometh in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Please sit or kneel. The Celebrant continues.

And so, Father, we bring you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ our Lord.

On the night he was betrayed he took bread, said the blessing, broke the

bread, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper, he took the cup of wine, gave thanks, and said, "Drink this, all of you; This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.



Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate the memorial of your Son. By means of this holy bread and cup, we show forth the sacrifice of his death, and proclaim his resurrection, until he comes again. Gather us by this Holy Communion into one body in your Son Jesus Christ. Make us a living sacrifice ♣ of praise.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

Anyone baptized into any Christian church is invited to receive communion.


During this time of Covid-19, only the bread will be distributed.

Please sit for the prayer, as we give thanks for this holy communion.




Celebrant Let us pray.
