Grazing on Grace

When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight.

They said to each other, Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" Luke 24:30-32

Nervously, I looked down at my two-year-old daughter and wondered if I was doing the right thing. She was kneeling beside me at the altar and looking expectantly at the minister. Having grown up in a church tradition that rarely practiced Communion and even more rarely included small children in any act of worship, I was uncertain if I should even allow my daughter to take Communion. Would the minister scold me? What would the church members think? Our minister made the first step easy – He stopped, bent over and gently smiled as he placed a piece of bread in her little hand. She gobbled it down quickly and turned her big eyes toward the tray of juice. After receiving my bread and juice I looked over and saw my little girl: head thrown back, tongue stuck inside the communion cup, turning this way and that trying to get every last drop of juice. At that moment I knew I had absolutely done the right thing because my daughter had just taught me something very important about receiving Communion – to yearn desperately for every bite and every sip of the body and blood of Jesus.

Scripture tells us that Jesus was known for the breaking of bread and sharing of cup...he took, he gave thanks, he shared. The breaking of bread was such a trademark that after his resurrection, Jesus was recognized only after he broke bread along the road to Emmaus. When the church gathers to break bread we are doing much more than “remembering” what Christ once did. We break the bread because we know in that glorious act we once again come face to face with Jesus. The very presence of Jesus is with us at the table in a way that we can touch and taste. It is there that we recognize him.

I am often asked why we celebrate communion “so often.” Honestly, if I had my preference it would be a once a week meal. John Wesley intended the weekly meal to be our standard but a shortage of ordained clergy in America meant only quarterly Communion.

Some say, “It loses its special meaning if we do it too often.” My response is, not if you are “doing it” with the right attitude. Maybe there is a reason Jesus encouraged us to have a child-like faith....perhaps he knew we would need reminding that we should be so eager to experience Christ’s presence that we couldn’t wait to gobble down the broken bread of grace and eagerly seek out the very last drop of his sacrificial love.

If this holy meal is so special, why do I take up time preaching instead of simply communing? I do so because in our faith tradition Word and Table are vitally linked together. To find your way to Christ’s table without the proclamation of God’s word is like trying to go to a party to which someone mailed you an invitation but forgot to include the details. How will you know what kind of party it is? What is the purpose? How should you respond?

I preach because we are proclaiming that there is meaning to this sacred meal...and in that meaning we find our invitation to come to the table and feast with Jesus....hungry for His presence, thirsty for His love.

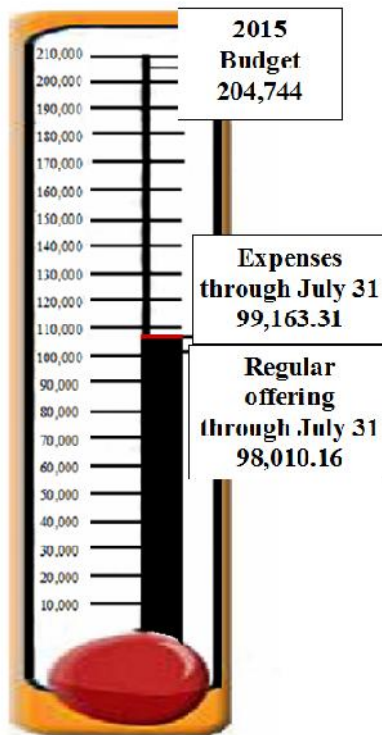

Our regular offerings for July were \$12,738.64. This was up \$600 from June; but, with expenses of \$13,923.45, we still had a deficit of \$1,184.81. We did pay our \$1,000 pledge to the Crisis Ministry of Davidson County this month, so our deficit would have been smaller without this expense,



but we still would have had a deficit. For the year ended July 31, 2015, our total offerings were \$98,010.16, and our total expenses were \$99,163.31, for a loss of (\$1,153.15). Hopefully our offerings will continue to improve in the coming months, and we will eliminate our current deficit. May we be as faithful to God as He is to us! Thanks to all who give so generously for the support of God's church here at Mt. Olivet.
