Whoever is kind to the poor lends to the Lord, and will be repaid in full. (Proverbs 19:17)

For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me. (Matthew 25:35-36)

Homelessness and affordable housing are two the most urgent issues facing our community these days.

And while it may sound like a lot of progress has been made over the last few years getting more people into housing, especially when it comes to helping veterans, there are still way too many people who are struggling, too many people without a place to call home, and too many people barely getting by.

It's hard to hear about people experiencing homelessness when I sit here in a warm church office knowing I have a bed and pillow to lay my head upon each night.

It's hard to hear that 51% of those who find themselves homeless are under the age of 24.

And its really hard to hear that 1/3 of those people who find themselves homeless are children.

But this does not mean all is lost because there is always hope and there is always something more that can be done.

And that something begins with each of us. It begins with you.

Now, at first glance it may seem overwhelming to even figure out how you, as an individual or family, should even start if you wanted to help alleviate homelessness.

I know that this was my initial reaction when I was first exposed to the issue of homelessness. But then, as the executive director of homeless shelter, I came to realize that help comes in many forms.

It comes from small donations that can add up over time and really make a difference. It comes



from little prayers lifted up to God. And above all it comes from simply acknowledging that there is problem in the first place.

And maybe acknowledging the issue is the first and best place for each of us to start.

We need to not ignore the issue, but look this problem right in the eye, face it down, and understand that each of us has had a role, even if it's simply been as a passive observer, in perpetuating homelessness.

So in this season of Advent, as we anxiously await celebrating the birth of our Savior, let us not forget that Jesus came into this world to save the lost, the least, and the last.

Jesus came into this world to call us to action and to join him in a ministry of reconciliation: a ministry where he reminds us that those who we often look down upon or simply try to ignore are the ones who are truly blessed.

Now, John the Baptist understood the need for us to change our ways and broaden our outlook of the world and that's why he spent all his time calling for people to change their ways, to repent, and be baptized. John, like a "voice of one crying out in the wilderness" rallied people to "prepare the way of the Lord."

And so, during this season of Advent, as we prepare for Jesus' birth we must also prepare for his return by continuing the work he began so long ago.

Beginning and continuing the work of loving God by loving and helping support everyone who has found themselves, for whatever reason, without hope, without peace, without joy, without love, and above all, without a place to call home.

View from the Pew

Every two weeks, our very talented Bruce Lindquist has been writing a column called "View from the Pew". These are available in the weekly email blast, and will be here and on the website going forward. Here is the latest edition from November 12th:

40-year balsam fir tradition continues in 2017 -- "I felt that if we had a bad artificial Christmas tree, it was better to have no tree at all." And from those sentiments 40 years ago as a member of Ascension Lutheran Church, David Latvala began a tradition that continues to this day at SOC. Every year, joined by wife Pat, he heads for the old Latvala family farmstead near tiny Tamarack, Minn., and State Hwy. 210 in Aitkin County, to search the wooded land around the property for a balsam fir deemed worthy enough for placement at the head of his home church. After cutting, the popular fir is strapped to the family van for the 150-mile trip to St. Louis Park, and placed in its stand -- the same day. With regular waterings, the evergreen remains a healthy holiday staple for an appreciative congregation during December's sacred season. "Pat and I have always brought back the balsam, except for one year, when we bought a Fraser fir," Dave said. But the beautiful pyramidal, dense-needled tree that sits left of the alter during the final weeks of the year is only one obvious sign of their service here. It only takes a few minutes at SOC to see the Latvalas' influence on many aspects of church life, from cutting grass to making lefse. But the smell of a fresh-cut tree is the best!

Minnesota's unofficial king of the church basement -- Some of you may remember the late WCCO Radio morning personality Roger Erickson a little like I do: The voice of the stereotypical Minnesota Lutheran. With a heavy dose of humor, Erickson would weave you-betcha skits and stories throughout his broadcasts, for decades,



centering on tuna casseroles served by faithful church ladies to a full basement of Sunday congregants eager to consume many calories -- despite zero visibility and large snowdrifts on rural roads in every direction for miles.

For many, Erickson, who died recently, was the face of Lutheranism in Minnesota popular culture, even if his persona had little to do with church doctrine or reality. Still, his folksy stories often struck a chord in us, and we identified with the hard-working rural portrayals of our ancestors, relatives -- and even ourselves. I met him once at some long-forgotten newspaper gathering -- but I do still recall the personable Erickson, and his engaging smile and firm handshake. We exchanged a couple of southern Minnesota news items, and laughed about a certain New Ulm area road that doesn't seem to lead to anywhere. But that was a long time ago now. His radio tales of driving from the farm down dirt roads, watching the church steeple rise above ever-present corn fields on Sunday morning, apparently aren't relevant to anyone anymore in our urban landscape. And I suppose some are quick to dismiss his corniness in a world of smart phones and the internet. But like "Fargo" and Lake Wobegon, Erickson spoke for many of us "of a certain age" -- and it was great fun. Now, just north of Winthrop, Minn., at the Bernadotte International Airport, all flights have been cancelled. RIP, Roger.
