## The Silent Actor

Supernumeraries, or supers, are actors that serve as background characters in movies, shows, and operas. The word comes from the Latin term supernumeraries, which means “a person no one cares about.” However, this is far from the truth. While supers play silent roles (meaning they have no lines or words to say or sing), their presence often makes the stage feel more believable and full of life.

Cincinnati Opera’s supernumeraries come from many different places. Once a year, we hold an audition, and anyone who is interested in being in an opera is welcome to attend. In the past, we have had supers come from our Cincinnati Opera staff and Board of Directors, including many children of staff members. We have also had audience members audition and star in operas. Sometimes, supers come to us with no knowledge of opera, but become big opera fans after being on stage!

If you have ever been interested in being on stage, but aren’t quite ready to audition for the lead roles, look into being a supernumerary. It is a fun and fulfilling experience, and at the end of it all, you will always be remembered as being **super**.

## About the Composer

The composer, or person who wrote *Don Pasquale*, was named Gaetano Donizetti. He was born in Northern Italy on November 29, 1797. Here are some personal characteristics about this highly prolific musician.

**Amicable to a Fault:** Donizetti was a pleasant guy, full of good humor and energy, and mostly indifferent to the professional jealousies and squabbles of the Italian opera world. Some of his students at the Naples Conservatory remembered him as warm and friendly.



**A Great Mentor:** Because of his great personality, Donizetti stayed away from rivalries and competition, unlike others in his field. He valued the work of composers younger than himself, and often helped to educate them. He even did work as a professor for a while. He believed that younger composers had just as much right to create masterpieces, like he did.

**Lost family:** Donizetti was tall, relatively handsome, and very popular with the ladies! He eventually married, but lost all of his children and his wife to disease.

**All Work and No Play:** Donizetti was known for being a workaholic. From 1822-1830, he wrote nearly 30 operas—an average of almost four operas per year! At the end of his career, he composed over seventy operas.

**Life in the Fast Lane:** While most Italian opera composers slowed down or retired once they became successful and earned high fees, Donizetti thrived on his busy and overcrowded schedule. In his letters of the 1830s, he joyfully recounts his many activities and commitments. He famously wrote *The Elixir of Love* in a little over a week.

**A Sad Ending:** Sadly, Donizetti's last years were filled with illness, including fevers, headaches, nausea, paralysis, and dementia. He was confined to an asylum outside of Paris before finally returning home to Italy, where he died.

# Create Your Own Mask


Howl like a dog at the opera by creating your own dog mask.

## Materials:


Stencil                      Coloring tools  
Paper plate                Pencil  
Scissors                    Glue/Tape

## Steps:

1. Cut the stencil and trace stencil over paper plate. Be sure to trace the three lines at the top of the mask. Use top of plate for the mask and bottom of plate for ears.
2. Cut all shapes from paper plate. Ask an adult to help cut the eyes.
3. Cut three slits where the traced lines are in the mask.
4. Decorate your mask before assembling.
5. Glue/tape the top of the mask together, using the right side of the cut to overlap the left. Repeat for all three slits. This will give the mask a rounded shape.
6. Glue your ears on the top left and top right of the mask, and enjoy!





# Mask Stencil
