B of A deposits nearly \$900K to local nonprofits

Fresno, Tulare County nonprofits receive monetary, volunteer support from Bank of America and its local employees

Bank of America awarded multiple nonprofits in the Fresno and Visalia areas with various grants throughout 2023, contributing to the company's goals of creating local impact and promoting economic opportunity.

Nearly \$900,000 went to 10 organizations, including five Fresno County-based nonprofits, four Tulare County-based nonprofits and the Central California Food Bank, which serves the broader San Joaquin Valley, according to a Jan. 18 press release from Bank of America. Organizations in Kings, Made-

ra and Merced counties also received grants through the Bank of America Charitable Foundation. "The funding came from philanthropic grants, employee matching gifts and sponsorships to help nonprofits remove barriers to

economic mobility, specifically through programs addressing housing, food insecurity, health and mental health services and workforce development," the press release said. Nonprofits funded in Fresno County included the Marjaree Mason Center, the Poverello House, Habitat for Humanity, Live Again

Fresno and the Boys & Girls Clubs of Fresno County. In December 2023, Bank of America named the Boys & Girls Clubs of Fresno County as its 2023 Neighborhood Champion and provided the clubs with a multi-year grant of \$50,000. Tulare County nonprofits that received grants include the Visalia Emergency Aid Council, Family Services of Tulare County, Self-

Help Enterprises and Community Services and Employment Training (CSET). The press release said CSET is using the grant to help fund its youth internship program. Funding provided to the Central California Food Bank went spe-

cifically to the Groceries2Go program, Bank of America said, which is an appointment-based food pickup program that allows families and individuals to access a full box of shelf-stable foods and fresh "Nonprofits understand the needs and obstacles the greater Fres-

no region faces, uniquely positioning them to develop solutions and services required to promote economic opportunity," Mark Riley, Bank of America Fresno and Visalia president, said in the release. "Bank of America will continue to deploy capital and resources to tackle the barriers embedded within our community and create real

impact in the lives of the individuals and families we serve." Local bank employees also contributed 11,000 hours of volunteer service to area causes in 2023, according to the release. Bank emplovees assisted with food distributions, provided toys and clothing to children in need and hosted free financial education workshops—in both English and Spanish—as part of the Better Money

Habits program. Bank of America provides grants and volunteer services to organizations that apply to a variety of programs the company organizes. In 2024, local nonprofits can apply for grants through a request for proposal (RFP) process that looks at two areas of supporting

Organizations that focus on contributing to their community's economic mobility based on the needs of individuals and families such as through workforce development and education—can apply between Ian. 22 and Feb. 16.

Organizations that contribute to economic mobility with a focus on the needs of the community—such as through affordable housing and neighborhood revitalization—can apply between May 27

According to the Bank of America web site, this RFP process is a refined version of a local grant application, allowing committees composed of local bank officers to award grants based on local needs and allocated budgets. Grant amounts depend on the region's mar-

Looking back, looking ahead With 2024 undercommercial activi-

way, we can look back over 2023 to tally the final numbers and note the progress made in economic growth. On the sin-

gle-family residential side, 2023 brought a total of 335 permits issued, the lowest count since 2012. Attributable to higher interest rates and part of a nationwide trend, Visalia continues to flourish as a growth opportunity in California. With many annexations and subdivision maps again moving forward with the adoption of the Ag Mitigation Program, single-family activity looks to pick back up in 2024. Along with it is the forecast of numerous, new multi-family or single/multi-family mixed

On the commercial front, 2023 brought 51 new commercial permits issued, equating to over 1.96 million square feet. This marked the fifth straight vear of over one million square feet of new commercial space. While the bulk of the square footage comes via new industrial development, this new

ty has been widespread with new retail leading the Similarly, way. commercial alteration and addition activity saw a busy year with 280 per-

mits issued.

Commercial permit activity of note this year includes Cap-Rock's 3rd building, which will initiate industrial development activity west of Plaza Drive, G4 Enterprises moving forward with their 310,000 square foot spec industrial space, numerous local industrial expansions, redevelopment of the Sequoia Mall, buildout of new retail at Visalia Parkway and Mooney, Family HealthCare Network expansion downtown and a new TownePlace Suites by Marriott, near Adventure Park.

As 2024 rolls on, it's expected to bring continued buildout of major shopping centers across town, additional industrial growth in the Industrial Park, additions downtown with professional facilities, dining, and entertainment and, hopefully, new permitting activity for other commercial areas across the city.

Innovation to take root at ag expo

International Agri-Center gears up for the World Ag Expo from Feb. 13 to 15 to present the year's Top 10 farming products

The World Ag Expo is making its annual return in February to bring together farmers, ranchers and industry professionals to observe the latest tech and news of agriculture.

Tulare will host the 2024 World Ag Expo from Feb. 13 to 15, at 4500 S. Laspina St. The event will be open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Tuesday

and Wednesday, and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Thursday. Tickets are on sale now at www.worldagexpo. com for \$20 each while children under the age of

According to the World Ag Expo website, the expo is one of the largest agricultural trade shows in the world with over 1,200 exhibitors on 2.6 million square feet of exhibit space. The show offers a wide range of ag-related exhibitors, seminars, products, wine and cheese, agricultural

Every year the event showcases the World Ag Expo's 2024 Top-10 New Products Competition winners. Products ranged from simple solutions to autonomous robots. The contest judges consisted of farmers, ranchers and industry professionals.

Here are some of this year's winners:

Amiga V7 by Farm-ng

Amiga V7 by Farm-ng is an electric, configurable, 1.3HP platform—software—that allows farmers, developers and researchers to haul, tow,

essential roles. The platform is the erector set of farm tools where the same machine can be configured over the row, wide, narrow, with intelligence and tools that lift or rotate.

The intelligence platform has an open API allowing students, developers and even elementary school students to code and configure the machine to collect data, integrate with other tools and perform repeated robotic tasks. With the GPS guidance system, it can perform precision steering and weed the same plots it seeded earlier in the year with minimal or no operator interven-

Blue Spray by Bluewhite

BlueSpray brings autonomous precision spraying capabilities to growers in orchards and vineyards. BlueSpray leverages Bluewhite's autonomous tractor sensing capabilities to provide plant-based spraying in high resolution that can integrate into any existing sprayers, adjusting spray volume and pressure in real-time based on plant size and density, reducing the amount of chemicals used and reducing spray drift without compromising on coverage.

The BlueSpray data feeds into the Bluewhite data platform and is immediately available to the grower and to an agribusiness ecosystem for data insights, compliance and business optimization.

Burro Grande, plus Atlas Online Route **Creation by Burro**

As a fully autonomous robot powered by AI and outfitted with computer vision plus LiDAR, Burro Grande is the 'Big Brother' to the existing Burro platform and boasts a 5,000-pound towing capacity and 1,500-pound pallet scale carry capacity. When paired with Atlas, Burro's online route

Zurek steps down as chamber CEO

Gail Zurek reflects on her legacy at the Visalia Chamber of Commerce as she readies to embark on a new path toward helping local businesses

Gail Zurek, who has dedicated herself to serving the local business community as CEO of the Chamber for almost a decade, is stepping down from her role to pursue a career in law, leaving behind a legacy of transformative leadership and a deep commitment to the well-being of businesses in Visalia.

Zurek is resigning her duties as the Chamber's CEO to pursue a career in law, that way she can continue to help local businesses in other ways. From helping the Chamber recover from effects of the 2008 recession, to staying dedicated to businesses during the pandemic, Zurek has surely left her mark on an institution that has unified the community for years.

"To work at the Chamber, you have to have a passion for local business, and I've been incredibly blessed to be surrounded by staff—and frankly—a board of directors whose passion and heart really is making sure that we have a strong vibrant local economy," Zurek said.

According to the Chamber's announcement of her departure, Zurek's impact has extended beyond conventional business counsel. Through her leadership, she has shaped local policies and legislation and fostered support for the business community in Visalia.

"Gail's departure leaves a void that will be felt throughout the business community," Nathan Halls, chair of the chamber's board of directors, said via the announcement. "Her transformative leadership has set a high standard, and we are grateful for the positive impact she has made during her tenure."

Some of the chamber's accomplishments under the leadership of Zurek include championing

the creation of a microbrewery district—which helped create jobs and revitalize the east side of the downtown district—updates to the city's sign ordinance, devising common sense solutions for commercial vehicles in residential neighborhoods and ensuring food trucks had access to custom-

Out of all of the things Zurek has done at the chambers, however, she said she is most proud of the one-on-one conversations she's had with business owners during rough times.

"My proudest moments are the phone calls that I received during COVID from business owners," she said. "What a tremendous honor, that in such a scary time, people were willing to reach out to (me) for help.'

From Zurek's account, the Visalia Chamber

Leadership Visalia dives into healthcare

From mental health to simulation labs and all the healthcare legislation you can handle, this past Friday was informative, eye opening and at times disappointing. The 2023-2024 care, and topics such as navigating a mental health crisis, a dislab at Kaweah Health, pending legislation related to healthcare, recruitment and retention, technology and even a brief visit from the Sheriff made for some great conversation and learning. The entire day was devoted to what leaders should know as it relates to healthcare accessibility, affordability and quality of care.

Social issues, substance abuse, the stress of everyday life and physical causes are just some of the reasons why one might undergo a mental health crisis. Dr. Natalie Bolin, Carey Hayes, RN and our very own Petra Gaytan LMFT helped us learn and understand the aspects of a mental health crisis and the limitations and challenges of the local system. The effects of COVID-19 on the local mental health system can result in a long discussion, but knowing how it was affected by the pandemic is certainly important. Additionally, a tour of Kaweah Mental health was provided, to help further understand the process for improving Psychiatric health both during and after a mental health

"The trained nurse has become one of the great blessings of humanity, taking a place beside the physician and the priest," said Dr. William Osler, Canadian physician, and founder of Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Kimberly Sokol and David Marks from the Kaweah Health simulation lab walked us through the high-tech simulation possibilities made available to Kaweah Health employees and resident Physicians. Efficiencies in healthcare can make it more affordable and we discussed something like patient charting software and its ability to communicate with other platforms can make it less costly and improve the speed in which care is communicated and subsequently delivered. Related to the shortage of primary care Physicians locally, If you've ever had to find a new primary care provider, you may already know there's a shortage of them in California. JC Palermo and Daniel Baker from Kaweah Health discussed some of the local strategies used to recruit Physicians to help fill the growing need for both primary care and specialty care Physicians locally.

had to adapt a lot with the rise of the pandemic. Rewinding back into 2020, when everything went into lockdown, municipal laws and regulations on businesses were constantly undergoing change—something Zurek kept up to date with to ensure the Chamber was giving its members an accurate account of what to do during the pandemic.

"We were working with city and county leaders to understand what the state has said, and what does that then mean for us locally," Zurek said.

It was that consistent work to review the most updated COVID laws during the pandemic that sparked her interest in pursuing a career in municipal law. During that rough patch, to help members stay up to date with the changing economic impact of the pandemic, Zurek hosted a Facebook live every Wednesday morning to review changes, answer questions and talk to people.

"I wanted to show people to be optimistic and to look forward," she said. "I was really concerned as a community that we wouldn't be investing back in local businesses and nonprofits and doing all the things that made Visalia special."

Zurek went on to explain that the same love she has for local business, which now is leading her to law, is what brought her to the chamber initially. She took over in the role of CEO from Glen Morris, who had held the Chamber together during the 2008 recession as well as helped in establishing their own

Chamber building.
"They were under some pretty significant financial constraints...My predecessor had done a really great job of making sure the chamber kept its doors open," Zurek said.
She explained that the finan-

cial constraints and lack of financial reserves are what required her to build a strong fiscal policy during her time as CEO. This helps designate the reserves and will make it easier for future chamber leaders to make "decisions based on vision and strategic purpose."

As for one of the other achievements Zurek is most proud of, that would be the Chamber's Jr. CEO program. This is an innovative entrepreneurship course for fourth to sixth graders that introduces students to fundamental business principles to prepare the next generation of leaders and entrepreneurs.

The course is a collection of online video resources available for educators to get children interested in starting a business. This idea was one of the projects Zurek wanted to pursue during the pandemic. She hoped to combat the repressions COVID had on local business, which she was worried would keep the community's youth from pursuing business later on.
