Isaiah 40:1-5

Reflection

The Israelites had been imprisoned and oppressed for a long time and they were in desperate need of hope. The words of comfort in Isaiah 40 are hopeful – the end of the suffering is near and they are to prepare a way for God's presence. In what ways should we be more hopeful, particularly as the Christmas season approaches? How can the presence of hope change our lives and our commitment to bringing God's kingdom to Earth?

God, we thank you for giving us a reason to hope. Even when the darkness of winter closes in, we know that a light is coming. Thank you that we can celebrate the coming of Jesus Christ together. Amen.

Prayer


