On Learning Bonsai

One really fascinating and great thing about bonsai is that when you become a student of the art, you may find that you are part of a direct lineage going back many generations. Here's what I mean: When you learn directly from someone who teaches you, you learn techniques and approaches that were handed down from master to student, who became a master, who then taught a student, who in turn became a master, and so on until you learned that technique yourself.

Here in Portland, we are rather fortunate to have several lineages available to us: Michael Hagedorn, who teaches here in town, apprenticed with Shinji Suzuki, one of Japan's most preeminent masters, who in turn learned from Motosuke Hamano. Mr. Hamano also taught Masahiko Kimura, who taught Ryan Neil, who teaches here in town from his remarkable bonsai garden, Bonsai Mirai. Some members of our club have studied with Boon Manakitivipart, who studied in Japan with Kihachiro Kamiya. Word has it that Matt Reel, another Suzuki student, will take up residence in Portland early next year. So that will make three bonsai teachers going back to Suzuki or Kimura, then Hamano, and if you learned anything last month from Scott Elser, you have a connection to Kamiya. And their teachers before them. Cool, huh?

All of which brings me to our November meeting. We will be honored to have Ted Matson, from Southern California, for a "bring your own tree" critique session. Before I get into what that's about, the tie-in is that Ted Matson was my first bonsai teacher when I initially did bonsai as a Los Angeleno in the 1990s. Although I had to let go of my bonsai collection at one point (only to take it up again when I moved to Portland in '07), it was under Ted's tutelage that I first got serious about it. Ted, by the way, was a member of Nampu Kai, John Naka's study group. And John Naka is known somewhat as the grandfather of American Bonsai. So come to our meeting on November 26 and get a little bit of American bonsai lineage in your learning!

About the Tuesday night meeting: The "bring your own tree" critique session format works like this: First, don't think of it as bringing your tree to be criticized, so much as critically evaluated. Do you have a tree that needs an expert opinion? The tree should be somewhat developed as opposed to raw stock, and should be one that you have questions about where to take it. Pondering the correct front or apex? Puzzled whether to keep, cut, or jin a branch? Which pot works better for this tree? Bring one or two trees that fit this criteria and Ted will get to as many of them as he can. If you attended 2012's PNBCA convention in Vancouver and saw the Western Hemlock he styled, you know that Ted is an engaging teacher with a great eye for bonsai.

About the Wednesday morning workshop: Bring a tree or two to work on with Ted. Make sure you have your own tools and wire. Deciduous, shohin, conifers--Ted will help you out! The workshop goes from 9-noon and costs \$40. To reserve your seat, send a check payable to BSOP, care of Al Polito, 2506 N Ainsworth St., Portland, OR 97217. 
Please bring trees that you want help on for both winterization practices as well as trees for styling tips, wiring or any other reason.

BSOP Monthly Program October 2013

Here are half of the results from our October meeting, a co-demonstration with Ryan Neil and myself. Both of us styled a Douglas Fir - Ryan's was collected in Colorado, and I collected mine on the Oregon coast. Consequently they are slightly different varieties.

The photos below give you a good idea of where my tree is headed for now. In the future, I plan on eliminating quite a bit of the lowest foliage as upper portions develop. There may also be some more carving/dead wood in the middle of the trunk as well as shortening of the jin as the character of the tree starts to come out. They tree is now back in it's usual place on the bench, with the pot propped up in the position you see here. A few of the branches got bumped out of place on the way home and I didn't get them back before a quick photo in nice October weather.

Scott's Tips

This month we are bringing a new, regular series to the Treeline. I will be presenting a bonsai tip every month to help improve your bonsai experience. The tips may be on styling or horticulture, long or short, pictures or no. But hopefully, all will be useful. Here's to more fun with bonsai.

Flow

By far the number one challenge we have when setting up one of our shows at the Japanese Gardens is one of flow. Does the movement of an individual tree flow to the left or the right? What does this mean and why is it important? Flow is a term to describe the overall direction that the tree moves toward. In other words, which direction does it lead your eye to? In a normal display, the flow leads you naturally to the accent plant, and that planting points your eyes back up to the tree. In a shohin display with multiple trees, the flow leads you from one tree to another on the stand.

There are several elements that contribute to flow; trunk movement and direction, main branch position, direction of crown, and overall foliage mass. Where we run into trouble is when we have conflicting elements within the design of the tree. Frequently, the main branch goes in one direction, and the top goes in another. This is the most fundamental rule – The apex must move in the same direction as the main branch. The trunk may or may not move the same way, but these two elements – the main branch and top - must agree. The movement can be very subtle, but you can still spot it in balanced tree styles like formal upright and broom.

Obviously, the main factor contributing to movement is the trunk. A slanting trunk is pretty obvious, but most of our trees fall into the informal upright category, where they start one direction and switch to another. The other factor is foliage mass. Where this is located and how strong it is can sway an otherwise balanced tree.

I encourage you to take a look at each tree in your collection and give it a good evaluation to see which direction it's moving in, and more importantly, that all the factors agree and are in balance. Doing so will improve each tree and make it feel much more harmonious. We don't have enough space here to talk about how to make corrections; we will have to leave that for another time. Have fun with your trees.
