It has been a pretty exciting April, from a weather standpoint. I'm sure we've all stepped up our watering and fertilizing (especially for our trees in the developmental stage instead of the refinement stage), and now we're starting to see the fruits of our labors: lots of growth!

Speaking of growth, it's clear that the Bonsai Society of Portland is growing by leaps and bounds in our collective skill level, as evidenced by our show at the Japanese Garden last month. Michael Hagedorn, who critiqued our show, pointed out a very compelling thing: that not only were the trees and especially accent plants reaching a level of excellence that's rare for a Western bonsai club, but that many of the best trees in the show are in effect second-string trees. What he meant by that was that some of our members who always display trees in the show have already shown their best trees in the past few years, and that they prepped their next best for this show so as not to show the same tree too many years in a row. So if our second-best trees are among the best in the West, then we're really onto something here in Rose City, in Stumptown, in Rip City, in Bridge Town, in Bonsai Land! (There! Think the name will stick? Has a ring to it, doesn't it? Maybe Bonsailandia would be more relevant to the times.)

May meeting details : I digress. Our esteemed newsletter editor, Peter Pelofske, recently flew to Yangzhou China to attend Bonsai Clubs International's 2013 conference. And he took pictures. So our May program will take a break from the usual demo presentation for some inspiration as Peter shows does a brief presentation on his travels there. Besides that, bring a tree

or two, and some tools, for a whack n chat. What's a whack n chat, I hear some of you say! A whack n chat is the opportunity to hang out and work on your trees. It's a great opportunity to ask questions either about your own tree (What side do **you** think should be the front?) or answer questions about the tree you're working on. Whack n chats are a great way to build community, to relax together and do what we enjoy doing most, make bonsai! And don't forget to bring some cash, because we'll be silent-auctioning about 25 bonsai pots, tools, etc. that have been donated to the club. The whole evening should be pretty fun!

And don't forget the inspiration area! Have a tree, kusamono, or accent plant that's looking particularly good? Bring it for the back table Inspiration Display. April gratitude: I sure wish I could have been there to see Greg, Dennis, and Lee share their wisdom about selecting good bonsai material. I heard they did a great job, and I am so grateful to Chas for taking the reins for me.

June and beyond: It looks like we'll have John Thompson from Northern California as our guest presenter in June. John is well known for his work with oaks, among other things. We're not sure what the presentation will be but it will be fun. And even though BSOP has in the past taken the months of July and August off, we intend to bring you some programs to help you get your fix of bonsai and bonsai community.

Artisan's Cup postponed: Many of you have already heard that the Artisan's Cup has been delayed. We're all kind of bummed, but hey you can get plenty of bonsai inspiration from your own club. TIME FOR MIDGE PATROL

Following up on the "Go Get 'Em, Midges" article in the September 2012 Newsletter, it is time to think about ordering *Aphidoletes aphidimyza* if past history indicates you have aphid-infested plant material.

This is a safe and effective treatment for annoying aphids without injury or death to the huge host of our necessary pollinators. (We heard rumors the people of China are hand-pollinating their food crops from results of over-use and mis-use of harsh pesticides – job security for their ag industry, I guess.)

Count on ordering *Aphidoletes aphidimyza* to allow time for shipping and emergence and then for release around summer solstice (late June) when their food supply (aphids) is optimal. Contact Evergreen Growers Supply, 503-908-1946, or www.evergreengrowers.com.

May Mentorship News

It looks like we have skipped spring and jumped right into summer. With 80 degree temperatures forecast for the next 10 days or so, daily watering is already upon us. I am already considering getting my shade cloth into place, a chore that I do not usually have to consider until early June.

Our May Mentorship Program will be another Whack and Chat (by popular demand), so if you missed our April session, you can still get some help with design, wiring, pruning and development planning. Bring a couple of trees you would like some help or advice about and join in the discussion. We will be meeting at St. Philip Neri Church on Saturday, May 18th from 2:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. Also, this time we will have some maple trees donated by Roger Case for everyone to pick from and to add to their collections. These are pre-Bonsai trees that Roger has had for a while and wanted to pass along.

For those of you who like to plan ahead on your calendar, our June Mentorship Program (June 15, 2013) will be about fertilization and we will be making Poo Balls. Scott Tice will be our host and will be preparing the mix in advance for the program. There is a small fee for this program, to cover the costs of materials. By the first of June, we will be asking for people to let us know if they are attending the program so we can gather the appropriate amount of materials, so watch your email for a notice.

The June meeting will be our last meeting as we break in July and August for the summer. When we start back up in September, (September 21, 2013) we will be offering a workshop to make your own turntable. This was a very popular class at the convention last year and we have had many requests from people who could not fit the convention class into their schedules. There will be a fee for this class to cover the costs of materials, so if you are interested, put the date on your calendar.

As we will not be engaging in a detailed discussion on fertilized, I will close this article with a tip from our fall discussion on Winter Prep and Feeding. Use a balanced liquid fertilizer (20 - 20 - 20; or 10 - 10 - 10) mixed at half strength for your early spring feeding. Trees are getting very active now with all of the new growth pushing on and will need extra feeding. At this time of the year I have not yet introduced fertilizer cakes into my feeding routine but I am applying liquid fertilizer mixed with fish emulsion every 10 days.

So until next month, may the Bonsai God smile upon you and may your trees prosper and grow.

In Our Own Backyard...Pat Foldi

As I head toward Pat Foldi's house, the wooded hillsides ripple gently down to the banks of the Willamette River. Houses nestle in wooded dells on quiet lanes with names like "Hidden Springs," "Lazy River," "Shady Hollow," and "Underhill." There is no sound or sight of the big city in West Linn. Pat's home is one of the many charming older homes in the town. The interior has a gracious, inviting atmosphere that flows toward the back deck, the bonsai and the koi pond with its waterfall. The house is a lot like Pat—warm and welcoming, easy-going and beautiful, filled with memories that come with a smile or a chuckle.

Pat is a strong, remarkable woman who embraces life with confidence and a wonderful sense of humor. She appears to be a delicate flower, but she is so easy to under-estimate. Here is a woman who helped rebuild a half-ruined 1935 rental house, extending it and adding a garage and the pond. Here is a woman who has collected bonsai from the wild while hunting mountain goats. She is a retired teacher and social worker who collects friends, plants and funny stories. Pat has been a member of BSOP since 1997, and has filled a number of volunteer roles in the club. She started by providing refreshments. Then she was drafted to serve as Vice-President for Membership. She recalls how challenging that was, since she had never used a computer before. We share a laugh at her memory of Jan Hettick trying to teach her basic computer skills, discovering Pat had done all the corrections to the membership roster but did not know to save them!

Pat credits her husband Frank for encouraging her to pursue her passion for plants. He has always been supportive, and waters her trees when she is away on her travels. Whenever Frank is asked if he too is involved in bonsai, he replies, "Yes, I carry the trees from the stands to the car and from the car back to the stands."

Her first tree, a mountain hemlock, came from a garage sale and is still thriving. A friend took her to a lesson with Ed Wood, and then she studied with Masa Furukawa. Chris Julhes brought her into BSOP. There she discovered the joy of raising deciduous and shohin trees through Ann Spencer. She still favors junipers, but seems to have a green thumb for all kinds of trees. Pat recalled going to an early exhibition and feeling her heart race when she saw elm bonsai. Whenever she walks into an exhibit of bonsai she says there is a deep feeling of joy that flows through her, right down to her toes. Over the years she has spent a lot of time with the Oregon Shohin Kai group and has attended all the Santa Nella shohin conventions with her BSOP friends since she joined the club. Convention memories trigger another funny story—at the last one, the ladies discovered that the hotel had changed hands and their reservations had disappeared, and they ended up being given a derelict room that looked and smelled like it had been a crime scene. They stayed anyway, and discovered that, if you use enough of it, Febreze really does work. Pat has also traveled to China for an international bonsai convention, which brings back the memory of the blind massage therapists....

For Pat, bonsai means wonderful friendships. Although she did not say it, I believe it also means adventure, because Pat is a lady who looks forward in life, who enjoys exploring each new opportunity as it arises.
