



## Key Facts About High Tech High

- HTH's thirteen schools serve approximately 5000 students (63% are students of color and 42% qualify for free or reduced lunch).
- Students are accepted via a blind, zip code based lottery.
- HTH schools operate on effectively 85% of the public dollars of other California public schools, since there is a building cost for California charter schools.
- 96% of HTH graduates have gone on to college, 66% to four-year institutions.
- 86% of HTH graduates are either still in or have graduated from college (the national rate is about 59%).
- About 35% of HTH graduates are first-generation college students.
