

Chester County Decade to Doorways 2015 Data Report

January 1, 2015 – December 1, 2015

Emergency Shelter: Individual & Family

Overview

The 2015 Chester County Decade to Doorways report for Individual and Family Emergency Shelter reflected a total of 1,055 persons served.

Individual Emergency Shelter

- 565 persons were served in the individual emergency shelters.
- Within the Individual Emergency Shelters, 71% persons served were male and 44% of the persons served were between ages 45-61.
- Within the Emergency Shelter System, 38% of persons entering the individual emergency shelters were living with a family and friend prior to entering. 13% of people were going from emergency shelter to emergency shelter, and 11.6% of individuals that lost their rental unit.
- 59% of Individual Emergency Shelter exits were to destinations that were not permanent. The percentage of exits to permanent housing from Individual Emergency Shelter was lower at 41%. 77% of these permanent housing exits were 'Rental By Client, No Ongoing Housing Subsidy'.

Family Emergency Shelter

- 490 persons were served in the family emergency shelters.
- In the Family Emergency Shelter, 54% of the children served were from 0 to 5 years of age. The adult gender breakdown within the Family Emergency Shelters is females being 77%, and males being 23%*. 60% of family shelter parents are under the age of 35.
- 57% of persons entering the family emergency shelters were living with a family and friend prior to entering.
- In regards to Permanent Housing exits from Family Emergency Shelter, 66% of total exits were to permanent housing, with 77% of permanent housing exits were to rentals with subsidies.

Individual Emergency Shelter Information:

- Good Samaritan Emergency Shelter – Single Men – 7 beds
- Safe Harbor of Chester County Emergency Shelter– Single Men and Single Women – 40 beds
- WC Atkinson Emergency Shelter – Single Men – 22 beds

Family Emergency Shelter Information:

- Community, Youth and Women’s Alliance Emergency Shelter (CYWA) – Families – 25 beds
- Friends Association Emergency Shelter – Families – 21 beds
- Open Hearth Gateway Program (Emergency Hotel Vouchers for Families and Individuals)*

Key Information to Note:

Permanent Housing: Clients exits to permanent housing are measured using ‘2014 HMIS Data Standards’. Permanent Housing categories include: ‘Owned by client, no ongoing housing subsidy’, ‘Owned by client, with ongoing housing subsidy’, ‘Permanent housing for formerly homeless persons’, ‘Rental by client, no ongoing housing subsidy’, ‘Rental by client, with VASH housing subsidy’, ‘Long Term Care Facility or Nursing Home’, ‘Rental by client, with other ongoing housing subsidy’, ‘Staying or living with family, permanent tenure’, and ‘Staying or living with friends, permanent tenure’.

All demographic data in this report was compiled using the last transaction per client for entry/exits, services and/or shelter stays.

All exit destination information was compiled using a basic count of the exit destinations recorded for an exit record within the specified time frame.

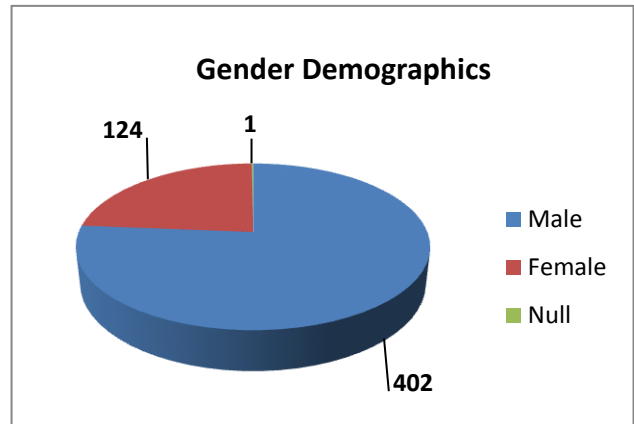
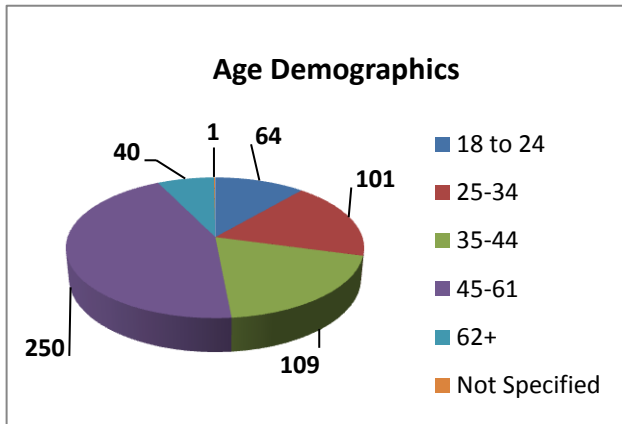
HUD-VASH Program: Combines Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) rental assistance for homeless Veterans with case management and clinical services provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). VA provides these services for participating Veterans at VA medical centers (VAMCs) and community-based outreach clinics.

*The Open Hearth Gateway Program is an Emergency Hotel Voucher program that is now being included in D2D reporting as emergency shelter for families and individuals.

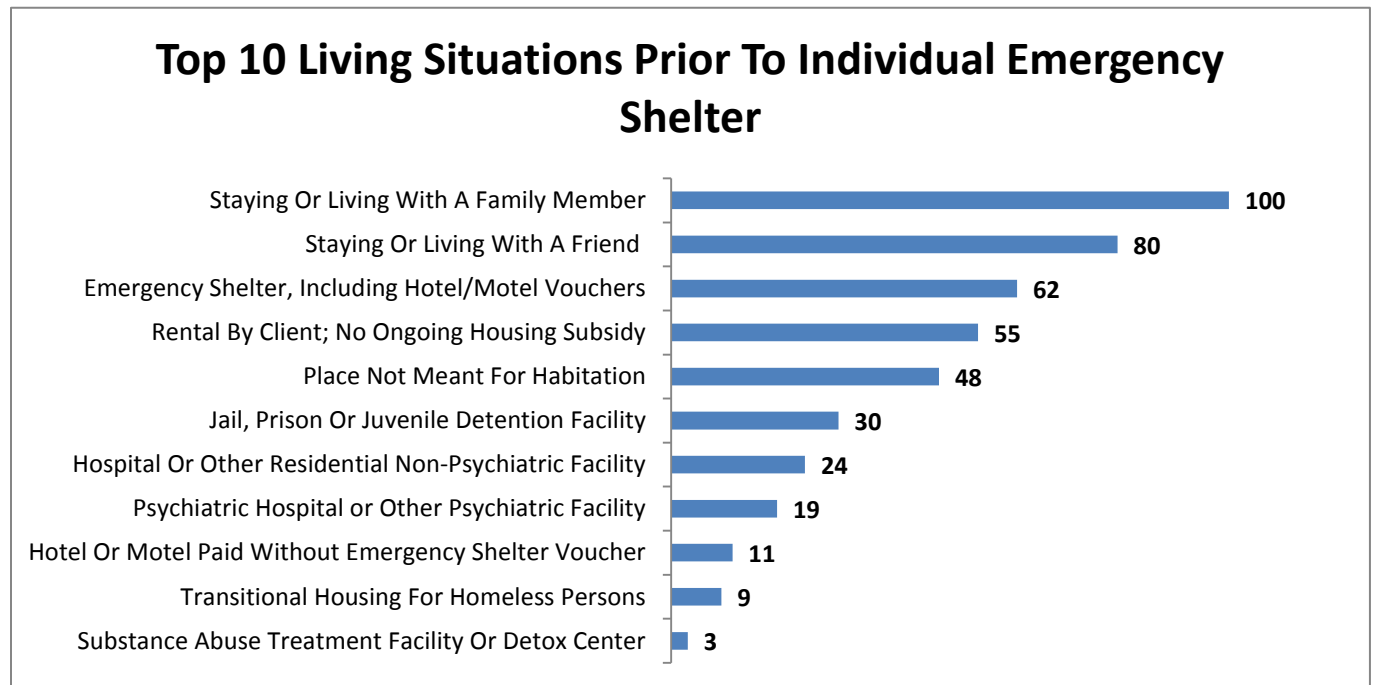

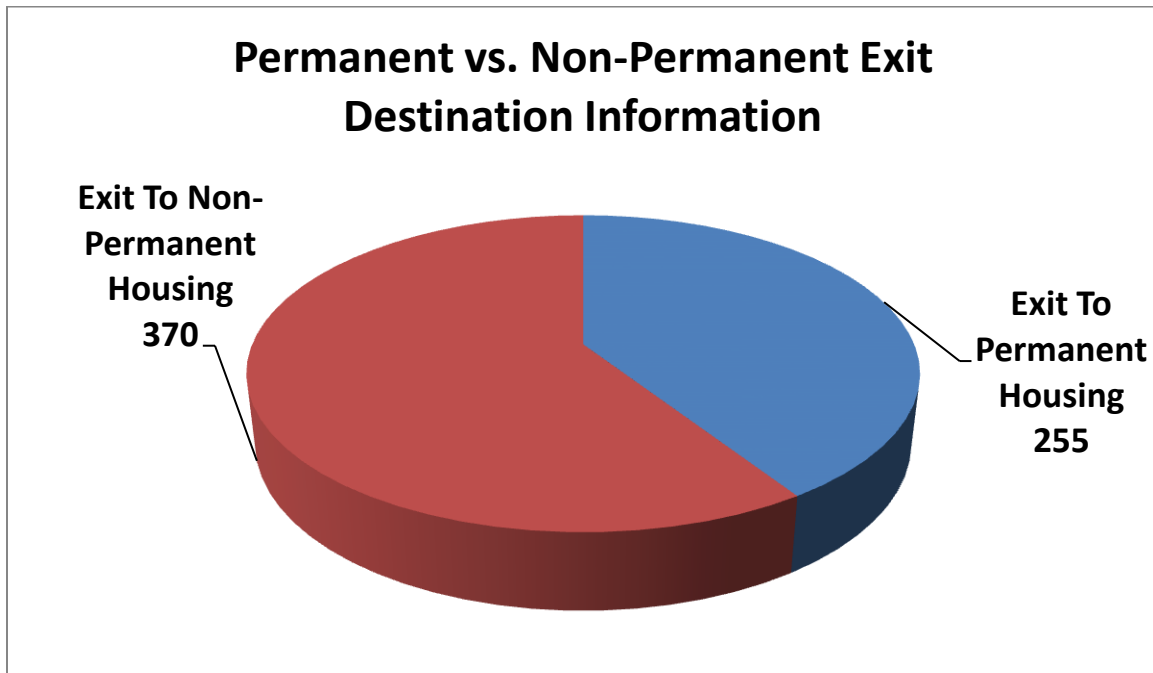

Emergency Shelter for Individuals Exit Destination Information

Between January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2015, there were 625 total exits from Individual Emergency Shelter. There were 41% of exits were to Permanent Housing and 59% of exits were to destinations that were not permanent.

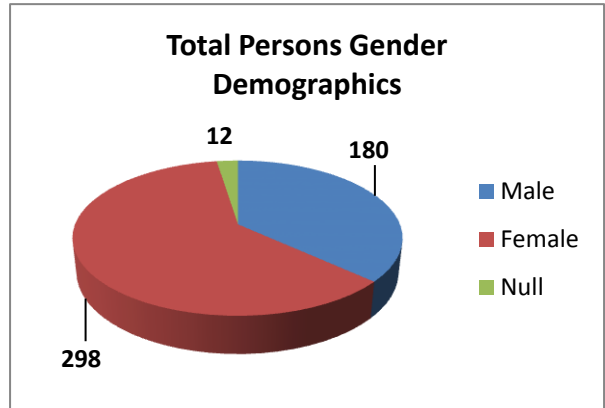
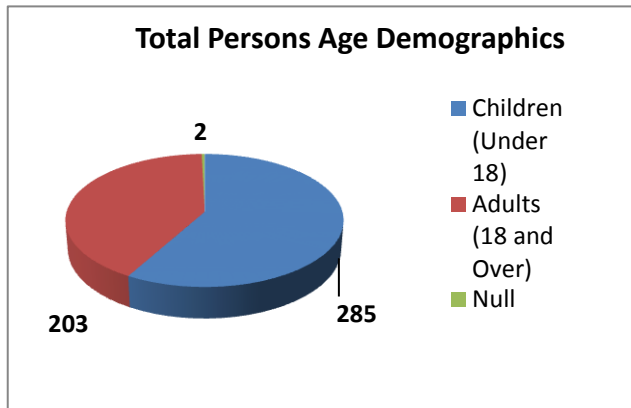

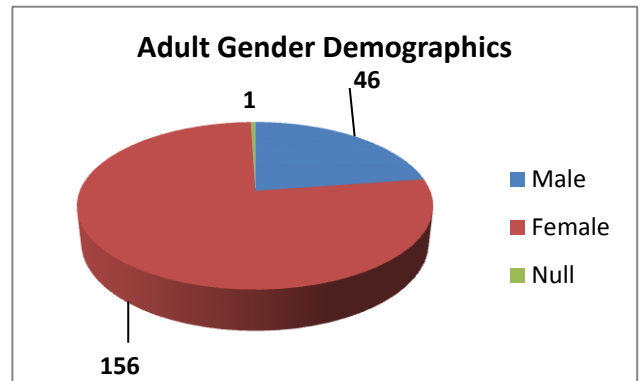
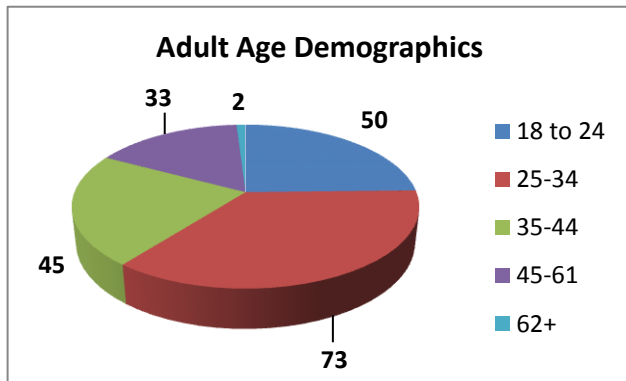

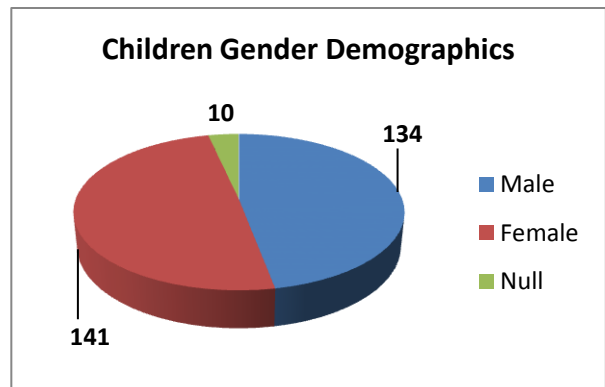
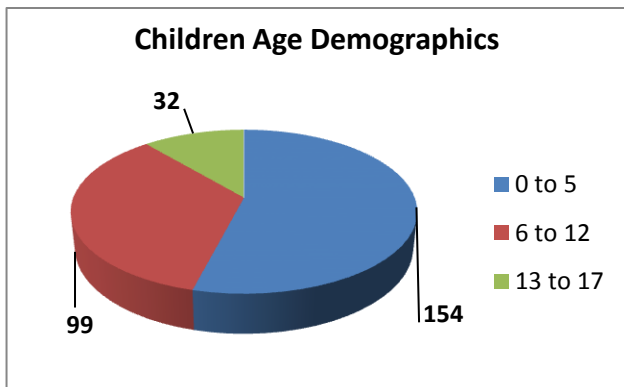

Adults Housed in Family Emergency Shelter: 203

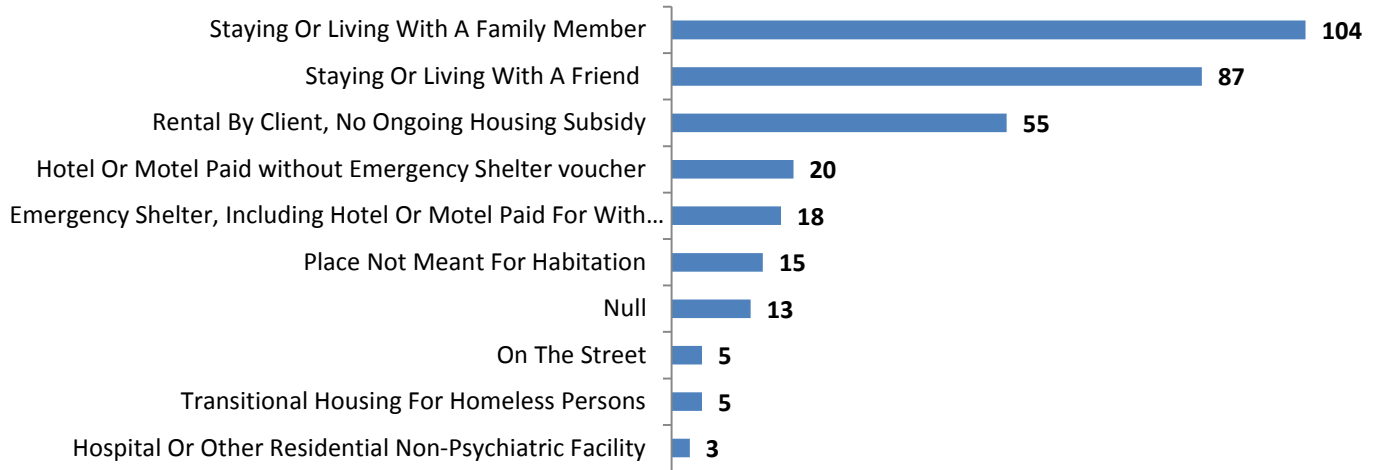


Children Housed in Family Emergency Shelter: 285

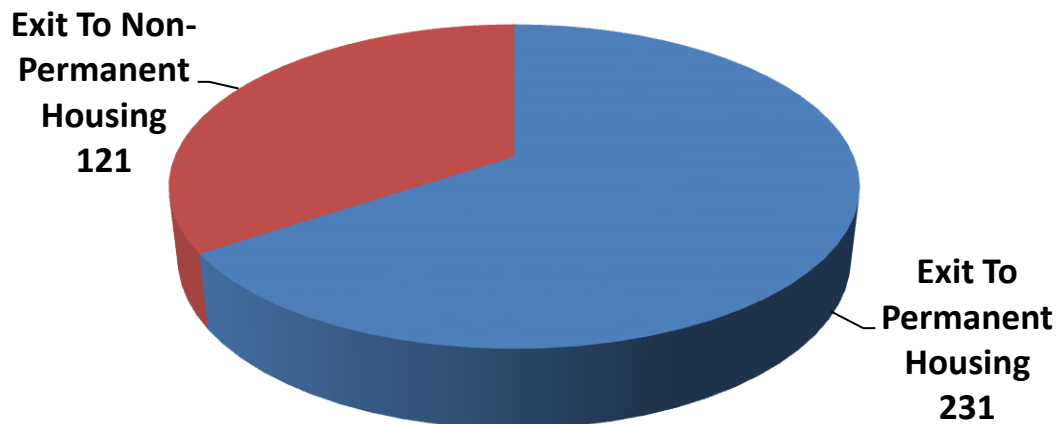
Top 10 Living Situations Prior To Family Emergency Shelter

Between January 1, 2015 and December 31, 2015, there were 352 total exits from Family Emergency Shelter. There were 66% of exits were to Permanent Housing and 34% of exits were to destinations that were Non-Permanent.
