Welcome to Christ Church! Today's service begins with The Great Litany, and then continues with the form for Holy Eucharist Rite II. The music may be found in the blue *Hymnal 1982*; numbers beginning with "S-" are service music, located at the front of the hymnal.

Our celebrant this morning is the Rev. Cathy Zappa, and our preacher is the Rev. Richard "Max" Maxwell.

Welcome to Episcopal worship! During Lent, you will find here brief explanations of different aspects of our Sunday services.

Our service today begins in a special way: with the Great Litany sung in procession. The word "litany" comes from a Greek word meaning "prayer" or "supplication." Over time, the word has come to refer more narrowly to an intercessory prayer in call-and-response form. Several of the Rite II forms for the Prayers of the People are in litany form.

First published in 1544, the Great Litany is the oldest English-language liturgical rite that we have. It is especially appropriate during Lent, and it is especially appropriate for it to be sung in procession. This procession is linked to the processions of Palm Sunday, the Easter Vigil, funeral processions, and the many processions we make every Sunday. Liturgical processions remind us that we walk the way of Christ, with one another and with Christians across time and around the world.

The Great Litany connects us with all who have prayed this prayer before and with all the people and concerns remembered in its petitions, which are quite comprehensive. Because it includes intercessory and penitential petitions, it takes the place of a Confession and Prayers of the People later in the service.

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have



suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in

Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

The Episcopal Church is a constituent member of the Anglican Communion, a fellowship within the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church of those duly constituted dioceses, provinces, and regional Churches in communion with the See of Canterbury. The fellowship upholds and propagates the historic Faith and Order as set forth in the Book of Common Prayer. The current church building was constructed in 1838 and is the third one on the original site.
