Thank you to my fellow Board Members, including those who has served. Paula Broeders, Star Nahwegahbo, Kerry Weaver and absolutely Bonnie Johnston who served for a long time.

We have seen many changes and challenges in the Shelter and Nekenaan. One of our biggest issue is with funding, we are always on a budget. This year we hope our new fundraiser and fundraising committee will be able to help us fundraise and secure grants. There has been a deficit since the daycare closed in 2010.

Thank you to the staff who work with very little and smile through it. I want to thank Management staff, who are doing an amazing job. Our occupancy rates have increased from 70 percentile to 90 percentile. We have a waiting list, and the women are finding permanent housing. The second floor has been rented to the City of Toronto for the next five years.

Thank you to all our funders, Ministry of Social Services (MCSS), Miziwe Biik, Toronto Social Housing Unit (TSHU), and Homelessness Partnering Strategy (HPS).

Throughout the year we have had an environmental scan done by Clearshift Inc. to identify challenges in process management. One thing we need is a new shelter. Thank you to Dianne LeBreton, Victoria Grant, the Board and Staff for their participation.

Shelter Report – Pamela Hart & Lisa Powell

Lisa Powell: This past fiscal year we have had many successes. We serviced 325 women and 63 children within the Shelter. Additionally our Outreach programs serviced 627 women and 7 children. With that said, we are excited to report that 23 women have achieved permanent housing however, while we applaud the numbers for those who did secure a residence, the lack of housing in this City has led to the decrease from the 32 women who were successful last year.

During the past year we have had the opportunity to experience the kindness and generosity of many. The York students through Professor Peter Dawson's various classes have continued to work closely with the Shelter to raise both awareness of the challenges many Indigenous women and children continue to face as well as donate various food items and personal hygiene supplies. Bank of Montreal (BMO), continues to partner with Anduhyaun through Impact Day. Their group of Volunteers worked on beautifying our gardens as well as organizing our closets, while also providing us with the required supplies.

At this time we would like to acknowledge the Etobicoke Rotary Club and Basketeers, for their continued commitment to our Clients by way of donations. Anduhyaun Shelter would also like to thank the Ministry of Community & Social Services for their continued funding and support.

Anduhyaun Shelter's successes and growth will continue to be best echoed in the lives of the women and children who have passed through our doors. We look forward to supporting former, current and new women and children as they move forward in maintaining their' cultural identity, self-esteem, and their' economic, physical and spiritual well-being.

Lastly we would like to thank our staff. It is the passion and dedication of the clients we service that is the foundation of the Shelter success and growth. With strong will and determination we look forward to assisting our clients with all challenges they may encounter in this upcoming year.

Nekenaan Second Stage Housing Report – Star Nahwegahbo

Over the past fiscal year it has been a very exciting/busy time here at Nekenaan. We were able to maintain an average of 93% occupancy rate for the year. We have welcomed 12 new families to Nekenaan, and successfully assisted 10 moved on, many of them acquiring permanent housing. At year-end, March 31, 2016 there were 17 households occupying 22 units.

Nekenaan's successes and challenges will always be best reflected in the lives of the women and children who come to live here. We look forward to another year of being a part of these journeys of healing and empowerment.

Director of Resident Support Services Report – Cathi Porciello

The DRSS strives to meet Anduhyaun's mandate, and with this focus, there has been much growth this year in programming and resident supports.

New programming that has been implemented includes traditional ceremonies with Elders new to Anduhyaun, more family activities such as a group trip to the ROM and hosting an Indigenous author reading traditional stories. Other new programming has included planting workshops, legal aid, budgeting and resume building workshops, healthy eating community cooking and recipe swaps, free general admissions to the ROM, an onsite food bank and an onsite new clothing bank.

New partnerships created have been with Brands for Canada, The Stop Community Garden, West Toronto Community Legal Clinic, Royal Ontario Museum, Credit Canada, Aboriginal Services of CAMH, The Elspeth Hayworth Centre for Women, Toronto Public Library, Aboriginal Housing Support Centre and the North York Women's Centre.

A key focus has also been developing better working relationships and partnerships with housing providers, such as Wigwamen and TCHC, now under Toronto Housing, which

will greatly assist with housing advocacy. Another factor of support implemented this year is there is now a key contact person for all Ontario Works recipients at the office local to Nekenaan. This will assist with ensuring that there is consistent communication and support between residents and case workers.

We had to say farewell to our Housing Administrator, Tanya Trimble, as she decided to move on. We thank her for her years of dedicated service, and wish her well on her new path.

The next year is anticipated with optimism and excitement. There are many changes coming with the Housing First initiative from the City of Toronto, and the DRSS focus on more traditional Indigenous teachers/Elders and supports to be available to the residents.

There is much gratitude and appreciation for the direction and support of Anduhyaun's Executive Director, Blanche Meawassige, and the Board of Directors. Along with a passionate dedicated management team whom I have the honour to work with, I look forward to the next year.

It has been an exciting year. Exciting in the sense that we achieved the following, to name a few:

- For the first time, tobacco seeds were planted (later harvested). The seeds were gifted to Anduhyaun by Joce Tremley, The Stop's Farmers' Market, Artscape Wychwood Barns
- The second floor, Nekenaan Second Stage Housing (NSSH) was rented to the City of Toronto to operate a daycare
- Mno Bimaadiziwin Draw was held where \$9,000.00 was raised to purchase Client items, such as, mattresses, blankets, clothes and TTC tokens
- Cash donations exceeded last year's contributions
- Volunteerism rose as well – from 5 the previous year to 21.

This past fiscal year the shelter has serviced 298 women and 37 children within the Shelter. This past fiscal we saw that women were staying longer and working on their care plans while we offered a safe and secure place to reside while gaining resources, being provided counselling and life skills workshops. The Outreach programs serviced 475 women, and 55 women have secured permanent housing.

We have had the great honour of having elders, grandmothers and teachers provide circles and ceremony to our women and children thus providing an opportunity to reconnect with one's culture.

During the past year we have had the pleasure of experiencing compassion and generosity of many, including the students from York University in Professor Peter Dawson's classes. These students have continued to work to raise awareness about the barriers our Indigenous women and children face. Furthermore they donated supplies and workshops for the children each week, including revamping the play room with new paint and toys.

We would like to acknowledge the Etobicoke Rotary Club and Basketeers, for their continued commitment to our Clients by way of donations. Anduhyau Shelter would also like to thank the Ministry of Community & Social Services for their continued funding and support, City Hall for their kind support through the Shoebox Project, which provided personalized gifts for Christmas time. We would also like to include and acknowledge all the individual kindness from various community members that have gave back to us in some way and their continued support through donations and awareness sharing.

The STOP Community Centre gifted sacred medicine plants and their time in assisting residents and staff in producing a memory garden and mural to honour all Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and for all those who have entered and moved on from the Shelter.

We would like to thank our staff for their ongoing support in assisting our clients on their personal journey.

Anduhyau Shelter look ahead to another strong year in supporting women and children as they move forward in maintaining their cultural identity, self-esteem, and their economic, physical and spiritual well-being, while providing safety and security for all.

The past fiscal year has once again been very rewarding and busy here at Nekenaaan. Over the past year we have maintained an average occupancy rate of 86%. We welcomed 13 new households and helped 10 families move from Nekenaaan to permanent and or affordable housing. At the end of our fiscal year, March 31st 2017 we had a total 18 families occupying 22 units with a 96% occupancy rate and no arrears.

A special thank you to ALFDC – HPS funding. There have been several improvements here at Nekenaaan, including placing standard sized refrigerators in the single units. This allows tenants to store more food, save money, and reduce theft. As well, the common room stoves have also been upgraded and replaced. The second floor has been rented to the City of Toronto for use as a daycare.

With the addition of the Housing Administrator Assistant position, our ability to assist the new and existing clients has greatly increased. Nekenaaan's successes and growth will always be reflected best in the lives of the women and children who come to live here. As we continue to grow and change, there will be challenges to face, but, we will become stronger and wiser because of them. I look forward to working together with our Nekenaaan staff, to continue to provide support to the women and children who access our services

The DRSS strives to meet Anduhyaun's mandate, and with this focus, there has been ongoing growth this year in programming and tenant supports.

On a monthly basis, the DRSS services an average of 18 – 22 women, and hosts approximately 2 to 4 programs. 10 residents secured permanent housing this fiscal year.

Programming has been focused on providing traditional teachings from Traditional Teachers/Elders. Other programming has included healthy eating community cooking, children's programming with Mt Dennis branch of the Toronto Library, an onsite food bank and an onsite clothing bank. New initiatives include a resource room with computer access for the residents, a Housing Support worker coming from Native Women's Resource Center of Toronto (NWRCT) monthly to Nekenaan, and now Ojibwe language is being used in written and spoken forms during some workshops. Also a Reiki practitioner is donating her services on a monthly basis.

New relationships or partnerships with agencies or organizations continue to be created, along with nurturing existing ones. For example, we were approved a second term as ROMCAN partners which results in 500 free admissions annually to the Royal Ontario Museum. Relationships that support housing searches continue to be a primary focus in maximizing existing resources and researching new ones.

A special mention for a long-time volunteers and supporters of Anduhyaun goes to Gillian Dugas, her husband Andre, and their family, especially grandson Lincoln. Gill was recognized by receiving a Legacy Award from Volunteer Toronto for all the volunteer work that she and her family do. We, at Anduhyaun are grateful recipients of the amazing gifts the family put together, from baking beautiful cupcakes for the clients on Mother's Day, to gathering 12 bins of new clothing for the clothing bank on site at Nekenaan. Plus so much more. We are so grateful for their long standing passion for giving to the tenants and clients we serve.

We have to say farewell to our Housing Administrator, Star Nahwegahbo, as she decided to move on to further her education. We thank her for her time of dedicated service, and wish her well on her new path.

The next year is anticipated with optimism and excitement. There is much gratitude and appreciation for the direction and support of Anduhyaun's Executive Director, Blanche Meawassige, and the Board of Directors. Along with a passionate dedicated management team whom I have the honour to work with, I look forward to the next year.
