To continue the tradition of celebrating the African-American History Month, the organ music selections in February are by African-American composers.

Robert A. Harris (b. 1938) is currently a Professor Emeritus at Northwestern University's Bienen School of Music. He also serves as Director of Music and Choirmaster at the Winnetka Congregational Church in Winnetka, IL. He received his degrees from Wayne State University in Detroit and Michigan State University, and pursued post-doctoral studies at the Eastman School of Music and the Aspen Music School in Colorado. Harris works as a conductor, choral clinician, and adjudicator throughout the US and abroad. Solemn Processional, with its beautiful harmonies and a striking melody appearing halfway through the piece, is his first work for solo organ.

Florence Beatrice Price (1887-1953) is the first African-American female composer whose large-scale symphonic work was performed by a major American orchestra. Born in Little Rock, AR, Price received her first musical training from her mother, an elementary school teacher and later a successful businesswoman. After studying at the New England Conservatory in Boston, MA, Florence Price established her career in Chicago as a well-respected Presbyterian church organist, concert pianist, studio teacher, and a nationally acclaimed composer. She was an active member of the Chicago Club of Women Organists. Composed in 1927, First Sonata for Organ is heavily influenced by the writing style of the well-known French composer and organist, Alexandre Guilmant (1837-1911). Borrowing ideas, imitating styles, and mixing them with a composer's original language has been a common practice for centuries. Until the rise of copyright law in the late 20th century, it used to prove eloquence, education, knowledge and skill of the borrower, and often was a point of honor for the composer from whom the ideas were borrowed. In Finale, a powerful toccatastyle piece, Price shows off her strong compositional skills while utilizing syncopated rhythms and exciting harmonic changes.
