Scripture

Genesis 18:1-8

A Son Promised to Abraham and Sarah

18 The Lord appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. 2 He looked up and saw three men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them, and bowed down to the ground. 3 He said, "My lord, if I find favor with you, do not pass by your servant. 4 Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree. 5 Let me bring a little bread, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on—since you have come to your servant." About the Music

Recognizing the **African American History Month** today you will hear a selection of instrumental works based on vocal music by African-American composers.

Clarence Cameron White (1880 - 1960) was an African-American composer and concert violinist. During the first decades of the twentieth century, White was considered the foremost African American violinist of his time. He studied at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, with Franz Micki, Joseph Douglass, Michael Zacharewitsch, and with Samuel Coleridge-Taylor in London, and Raoul Laparra in Paris. White's compositions contain a similar aesthetic to contemporaries and mentors such as William Grant Still, Florence Beatrice Price, R. Nathaniel Dett, and Samuel Coleridge-Taylor. White drew upon thematic and harmonic content from African American and other African diasporic musical styles and traditions.

David Hurd (b. 1950) received his education from Oberlin Conservatory, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and Yale University, where he taught as a visiting professor (1982-83). He served as Professor of Church Music and Organist at General Seminary in Manhattan, Director of Music at All Saints Episcopal Church in New York City, and on the Standing Commission of the Episcopal Church, which produced the 1982 Episcopal Hymnal. He currently serves as the Director of Music at the Church of Saint Mary the Virgin in Times Square, NYC. With over 100 choral and organ works in print, his compositions have appeared in numerous recordings in both the United States and England. Hurd is regularly sought out by congregations and organizations seeking to commission new anthems and organ works.
