



About the Music

Hymns "Beneath the Cross of Jesus" and "Amazing Grace" are some of the favorite hymns chosen by the congregants during the Epiphany Hymn Festival.

2022 marks the 200th birthday of the Parisian composer, César Franck. He is one of the first to explore the organ as a symphonic instrument, and exploits the many tonal colors the organ can create.

The choral anthem is a little gem composed by Mozart in the last year of his life. We welcome Dr. Calvert Johnson to the organ bench for the postlude. Dr. Johnson is Professor Emeritus of Music, Agnes Scott College (Atlanta), and retired Organist, First Presbyterian, Marietta, Georgia.

# Luke 13:1-9

## **Repent or Perish**

13 At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. 2 He asked them, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? 3 No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. 4 Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them—do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? 5 No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did."

## The Parable of the Barren Fig Tree

6 Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. 7 So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?' 8 He replied, 'Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. 9 If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.'"
