About the Music

To celebrate Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and the African American Heritage Month, most of the music selections today and this month are by African-American composers. Florence Beatrice Price (1887-1953), whose orchestral compositions recorded by the Philadelphia Orchestra were awarded a Grammy, was also a notable organist. You will hear many of her compositions this month.

Pinnacle Men's Quartet performs a well-known African American spiritual "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot." Its text is attributed to Sarah Hannah Sheppard, a slave in Tennessee, who was sold to a plantation in Mississippi and separated from her daughter. The motherless daughter grew up to become Ella Sheppard Moore, the pianist for the original Fisk Jubilee Singers. After the group's first tour, Ella was able to find her mother, whom she brought to live with her in Nashville.

The composer of the choral anthem today "He Never Failed Me Yet" is Dr. Robert Ray. He is a composer, conductor, clinician, and Professor Emeritus of Music at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. He is a graduate of Northwestern University and received an Honorary Doctorate of Music from Vincennes University.
