RE: Ensuring Equal Access to Academic Supports by Including Updates to the K-12 Education Tax Credit in the Omnibus Tax Bill

Dear State Leaders,

The educational needs of Minnesota students have changed significantly in the past 25 years. The opportunity gap has widened. Sustained state funding for out-of-school time programs has evaporated. And now the recovery from the pandemic and distance learning is threatening to grow the existing disparities between low-income and more affluent learners.

The one thing that hasn't changed in that quarter century is the income limit to qualify for the maximum K-12 Education Tax Credit to get help paying for afterschool programs, computer devices, school supplies, and musical instruments.

<u>Updating the income limit for the K-12 Education Tax Credit is an urgently needed step that has bipartisan support</u>. It will help level access to the academic supports Minnesota students need right now before COVID-related learning loss becomes more severe.

A recent report from McKinsey & Company detailed the emerging "K-shaped recovery" from distance learning. Students from high-income families, who have access to services like tutoring, are on track to recover unfinished learning by the end of this school year. Meanwhile, low-income students and students of color could remain up to a grade level behind their peers.

The National Science Foundation reports an equally alarming finding: the pandemic could reduce the quantity and diversity of STEM professionals with only those students whose families can afford academic enrichment being able to persist in STEM education programs.

Minnesota does not have to resign itself to this future. The K-12 Education Tax Credit is one of the best tools our state has to reverse these trends. It covers 75% of the cost for academic enrichment programs, like tutoring. **Think of it like "educational first aid."** However, the income limit for the maximum \$1,000 per student credit is \$33,500—regardless of household size—and has not changed since 1997.

You can help by taking three important steps to improve access to this tax credit:

- Updating the income limit to restore access to families who have lost it over the past 25 years
- Indexing the income limit to inflation to avoid a similarly outdated limit in the future
- Simplifying the claiming of the credit by shifting to using federal adjusted gross income rather than the cumbersome "household income" definition to calculate eligibility.

A bipartisan group of House and Senate members support these proposals, and Governor Walz and Lt. Governor Flanagan have included them in their proposed budget. Tens of thousands of Minnesota families would benefit.

With a \$9.3 billion surplus and an urgent need to help our lower income learners catch up academically, please prioritize these overdue updates as you negotiate the joint omnibus tax bill.
