High School Profile, 2016-17

Green Meadow Waldorf School is an independent, college preparatory co-educational day school that is part of the international Waldorf school movement based on the educational principles of Rudolf Steiner. The school was founded in 1949 and graduated its first high school class in 1976. Green Meadow cultivates individual thinking and social awareness through academic, artistic and practical work, preparing students for college and beyond. Pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade levels share a total enrollment of more than 350 students. The High School (9-12) enrolls over 80 students. Admission is open to all qualified students regardless of race, creed, gender, or color, and is based upon a review of academic transcripts, personal interviews, and faculty recommendations. The school is accredited by the New York State Association of Independent Schools, registered by the Board of Regents of New York State, and is a member of the Association of Waldorf Schools of North America. The student/faculty ratio is 9:1.

Our students pursue a rigorous, mandated curriculum including academic and artistic study. Some students choose to take advanced science and math as electives. In grades 9-12, students begin each day with a 90-minute main lesson block period, followed by year-long classes in English, mathematics, history, world languages, as well as music, art, and physical education.

Exchange: In their sophomore year, one third of our students pursue a cultural/language exchange to a German or Spanish speaking country. Exchanges range from 3-5 months.

SENIOR YEAR PROGRAMS

Independent Projects

All seniors conceive their own independent senior project in May of their junior year, and then work with an outside mentor as well as a faculty mentor throughout their senior year until their school presentation in April. Some recent projects include Russian icon painting, building a printing press, game design, music composition, becoming an EMT, writing and producing a documentary film, and wildlife rehabilitation.

Senior Internship

Students are required to do an internship for 3-week period during the spring semester of their senior year. They are expected to have a meaningful work experience for a full working day, five days a week. Students keep a daily journal describing their experiences and reflecting on them. They have on-site supervisors who complete an evaluation at the conclusion of the internship. Recent internships include Lamont Doherty Earth Observatory, United Nations: 100 Resilient Cities foundation, and work in the banking industry, fashion design, and the music industry.
