Southern Illinois can feel like a world away from the northern part of the state. Hilly, forested, and lush, dotted with cypress swamps and cut through with rivers, both the landscape and the birds have a distinctly southern flavor. We found almost all of the southern birds that we hoped to see, including summer residents like Mississippi Kite, Prairie, Prothonotary, Yellow-throated, Hooded, and Cerulean Warbler, Louisiana Waterthrush, Blue Grosbeak, Acadian Flycatcher, Summer Tanager, and Chuck-wills-widow. We found the year-round southern residents as well, like Black Vulture, Carolina Chickadee, Carolina Wren, Pileated Woodpecker, Barred Owl, and Red-shouldered Hawk. Migrants weren't super common, but we did find some, including Gray-cheeked and Swainson's Thrushes, Veery, and a smattering of migrant shorebirds and warblers. It was a wonderful few days with a great group in the beautiful landscapes of the far southern part of our state.

Very nice views several times, first at Heron Pond.

Heard frequently; we had nice views a couple of times, best was at Cave Creek.

A male was singing away at Cave Creek, but we only got brief views.

Common and well seen at Cave Creek.
