

# Self-Identification of Race or Ethnicity in the Official California Voter File

Most U.S. states do not require residents to self-identify their race or ethnicity when registering to vote, creating challenges for researchers and policy makers to identify voting behaviors among racial and ethnic groups. In this fact sheet, we outline the limitations of the race or ethnicity data present in the official California Voter File as administered by the California Secretary of State’s office.

## Self-Identification and Voter Turnout Rates

Self-identification in the registration process is a common method of gathering the race or ethnicity of voters. However, since self-identifying race or ethnicity is optional, an analysis of voter files relying solely on voters who choose to answer the question becomes highly problematic. Self-reported race or ethnicity rates vary across states, with some having response rates over 90% (Georgia) and others having response rates below 30%, including California. In states with low response rates, relying solely on the sample of voters who self-identified their race or ethnicity on registration forms opens the possibility of misrepresenting the voting behaviors of voters.

In an analysis of the California voter file (VoteCal) as of March 2021, CID found that 29.5% of registered voters in California identified their race or ethnicity when registering to vote (Table 1).

CID also found that registered voters who self-identified their race or ethnicity had higher turnout rates (84.2%) than those who did not self-identify their race or ethnicity (76.6%) (Table 2).

Additionally, the relatively small sample of voters who did self-identify their race or ethnicity skewed young and Democratic. Registered voters aged 18 to 24, for example, represented a larger share of registered voters who answered the race or ethnicity question (18.6% of all registered voters who self-identified their race or ethnicity) than their share of all registered voters (11.9%) (Table 3). Registered voters aged 65 and over, on the other hand, were only 10.7% of registered voters who answered the race or ethnicity question, while representing over 20% of the total number of registered voters.

Registered Democrats represented 48.0% of voters who marked their race or ethnicity but were only 46.0% of all registered voters (Table 4). Relying on the sample of voters who choose to self-report their race or ethnicity limits analysis to an unrepresentative turnout and potentially skews findings about voting behaviors.

## Self-Identification by Registration Method

There are many methods to register or re-register to vote in California and the ways in which registered voters can input their race or ethnicity varies by registration method. As shown in Table 5, the rate of self-reporting race or ethnicity varies greatly depending on method of registration. The most used methods to register to vote are online and at the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV). Online registration (through the California Secretary of State's website) has a drop down menu for the individual to choose from, while paper forms have an open ended question which allows individuals to write in their race or ethnicity. The DMV does not ask registrants to self-report their race or ethnicity when registering to vote. Online voter registration has a notably high rate of self-reporting race or ethnicity by the registrant. Of those who are currently registered through the state's online system, nearly 79% self-reported their race or ethnicity, a much higher percentage than another other registration method (Table 5).

Note: The DMV does not ask registrants to self report their race or ethnicity when registering to vote. Self-reported race or ethnicity information is present in the voter file for some DMV registered voters who reported this information when previously registering to vote by a different method. Self-reported race and ethnicity information present in the voter file for some current online and paper form registrants may also have been submitted during a previous registration with a different method.

Young registrants aged 18 to 24 registered or re-registered to vote online at higher rates than senior registrants aged 65 and over, while seniors registered (or re-registered) through other sources at higher rates than youth. Table 6 shows that as of the 2020 general election, 41.2% of young registrants registered to vote online, compared to 11.5% of senior registrants. Comparatively, 55.8% of senior registrants registered to vote through other sources, while only 23.4% of young registrants did the same. In total, 88.5% of seniors used a method with low race or ethnicity rates (32.7% at the DMV and 55.8% through sources other than the DMV or online), while just 58.8% of young registrants used methods with low race or ethnicity rates (35.4% at the DMV and 23.4% through sources other than the DMV and online).

This difference in registration methods helps explain the gap between older and younger voters self-reporting their race or ethnicity. By only using the subset of voters who self-identified their race or ethnicity when registering to vote, the subsequent voting behavior analysis would overrepresent younger registered voters who registered to vote online.

As seen in Table 7, registered voters aged 18 to 24 self-identified their race or ethnicity when registering to vote at higher rates than registered voters aged 65 and over. Among voters registering at the DMV, 21.4% of registered voters aged 18 to 24 self-identified their race or ethnicity, while only 9.3% of registered voters aged 65 and over did the same. Among voters registering online, 84.3% of registered voters aged 18 to 24 answered the race or ethnicity questions, compared to 75.9% of registered voters aged 65 and over. Almost 16% of registered voters aged 18 to 24 who registered to vote through sources other than the DMV and online self-identified their race or ethnicity, while only 6.2% of registered voters aged 65 and over answered the question.

As of the 2020 general election, 38.0% of both registered Democratic and Republican voters registered to vote at the DMV, while 36.3% of No Party Preference registered voters registered at the DMV (Table 8). Nearly 21% of registered Republicans registered to vote online, while 24.0% of registered Democrats did the same. Over 41% of registered Republicans registered to vote through a source other than the DMV or online, compared to 38.0% of registered Democrats.

Republican and Democratic registered voters registering online self-reported their race or ethnicities at similar rates (80.3% and 80.4%, respectively), but both parties self-reported at higher rates compared to No Party Preference (75.4%) and other party (78.2%) registered voters (Table 9). When registering at the DMV, No Party Preference registered voters (13.1%) also self-reported their race or ethnicity at lower rates than Democrats (18.9%) and Republicans (15.6%).

## Research Methods to Identify Race or Ethnicity

There are multiple methods commonly used by researchers to identify registered voters’ race or ethnicities, including surname matching, geocoding, and a combination of the two (Bayesian Improved Surname Geocoding (BISG)). While these methods are generally trusted by researchers, each method has limitations as to who can be identified.
