Rick Rodriguez garners local support in bid for **Downey City Council**

DOWNEY – Downey City Council hopeful Rick Rodriguez promised to bring both commitment and integrity back to city government during a speech at his official campaign kickoff fundraiser last

Surrounded by friends, family, and community leaders at the Rio Hondo Event Center, Rodriguez stressed the need for steady leadership and experience in a time of dramatic development and change for the city of Downey.

"I promised to work hard if elected," he said. "I'm not the most educated guy in the room, but I will be the most truthful guy in the

Rodriguez, 55, is founder of RMI International, an international security firm that operates in 18 states and three countries. The company is currently contracted to patrol Downtown Downey.

The son of migrant farm workers from Texas, Rodriguez grew up in El Monte.

Rodriguez, who is running to replace Councilman Roger Brossmer, is vying against Frine Medrano for the District 3 (northwest Downey) seat. Medrano, a staffer for state Senator Kevin De Leon, recently received the endorsement of both state senators Tony Mendoza (D-Artesia) and Ricardo Lara (D-Bell Gardens).

Nonetheless, Rodriguez said he's ready to show voters his record of achievement and local leadership.

"I'm not afraid of the big political machine I'm running against," he said. "We don't need state and federal people telling us how to run our business here."

Brossmer and Mayor Alex Saab echoed those sentiments as they threw their full-throated support behind Rodriguez at last Thursday's kickoff fundraiser.

"We've learned that doing this

ob means also finding a good person to come behind you," said Brossmer. "Integrity is doing what's right and doing what's best for the city, not one's own self interests.

"Rick has business smarts his church. He will keep the city's positive momentum going."

Saab also doubled down, ensuring Downey voters Rodriguez is the "real deal."

"By supporting him, our city is in good hands," Saab said. "You can't just simply learn ethics; it's who you are and it's something you bring to the job and you learned from your parents while growing up."

"There are no skeletons in my closet," Rodriguez said. "My wife is here, my kids and grandkids - we're God-loving, God-fearing people."

City council candidates can officially submit nomination forms on July 18, just four months ahead of the general election on Nov. 8.

CalChamber Issues Statment on Brexit Vote

The California Chamber of Commerce issued the following statement following the Brexit vote.

"California has a lot at stake," said Allan Zaremberg, CalChamber President and CEO. "We are the sixth largest economy in the world and a major trading and investment state, and no one in California can be immune from dramatic changes in the international economic structure.

"In order to mitigate the uncertainty and instability, the exit, which requires approval by Parliament and the EU, must be orderly and consider the global consequences. The Trans-Atlantic relationship is one of the most important in the world, and the United Kingdom is one of the most valued trade and investment partners for our country and state.

"This will probably make America and the dollar safe havens for international investments, which unfortunately could make California exports more expensive. Finally, because of California's reliance on the income tax, market volatility can put the government's revenues at risk, and that is one more reason to have an orderly transition."

UK Trade Stats

Two-way trade between the United States and the United Kingdom was \$ 114 billion in 2015, and the UK was the fifth largest importer of US goods with a total value of \$56.3 billion, according to the US Department of Commerce. The United Kingdom is California's 10th largest export destination, with over \$5 billion in exports in 2015. Computer and electronics products accounted for approximately 26.5% of exports – more than \$1.3 billion. Transportation equipment brought in \$667 million, or 13% while both chemicals and non-electrical machinery each accounted for approximately 8.5 % of the total, with over \$ 436 million in exports each.

In 2015, imports from the United Kingdom to California were approximately \$4.5 billion, with top categories being transportation and computers.

European Union Trade Stats

The UK is the entry market into the European market for over 41,000 US exporters.

Total bilateral trade between the European Union and the United States was \$698.7 billion in 2015, with the United States exporting to \$ 272 billion worth of goods to the 28 EU member nations.

California exports to the European Union totaled \$29.2 billion in 2015. California is the top exporting state to Europe. Computers, electronic products, chemicals, miscellaneous manufactured commodities, and transportation equipment are our leading export sectors to the region. European Union countries purchase 17.6% of all California exports.

Investment

Per the US Department of Commerce, the US-UK investment relationship is the largest in the world, valued at over \$1 trillion in 2014 and creating over two million jobs, about one million in each country. British investment is specifically vast in California where it supports approximately 90,000 jobs in our state according to the British Consulate General.

LABOR LAW CORNER

Request to 'Cash Out' Unused Sick Leave Raises Questions for Employer

Question: Last July 1, my company gave all of our employees 24 hours of sick leave in a lump sum in order to comply with the new sick leave law. I have had several employees approach me and ask if they can be cashed out of the sick leave hours they have not used this year. Can I cash out the remaining sick leave balances, or must the employees lose their unused sick leave hours?

The Healthy Families, Healthy Workplaces Act (Act) does not require employers to cash out sick leave either during employment or at the time of separation from employment.

The Act does not directly address the situation in which an employer might wish to cash out employees for their unused sick leave. The Act, however, does state that sick leave which is accrued must be allowed to carry over to the following year (Labor Code Section 246(d)). The Act goes on to state that an employer may limit the total accrual of sick leave to 48 hours (Labor Code Section 246(i)).

In the situation where the employer has provided its employees with a lump sum of sick leave, there is nothing in the Act that would specifically preclude an employer from giving its employees the cash value of the year's unused sick leave once the employee has been provided with the next year's lump sum of sick leave benefits.

This can be done only once the year is over and the employee already has received his/her next year's benefit. It cannot be done before the completion of the year in which the employee is entitled to use the sick leave.


Accrual-Based Sick Leave

If you were an employer that utilized an accrual-based method for providing sick leave, and your policy limited accrual to 48 hours a year and use of sick leave to 24 hours a year, the issue would be more complicated. If you were to cash out an employee's accrued sick leave such that the employee had less than 48 hours of sick leave in his/her sick leave account, you may be in violation of the Act.

Labor Code Section 246.5(c) states that an employer shall not deny an employee the opportunity to use his/her accrued sick leave. In that the law requires employers to allow employees to accrue up to 48 hours of sick leave, if the employer provides cash in lieu of the sick leave time off that is allowed to accrue under the law, the employer may be considered to have denied the employee the opportunity to use the sick leave. As a result, before cashing out accrued sick leave, we strongly recommend consulting with legal counsel.

Due to the uncertainty in this area of the law at the current time, we suggest consulting with your company's attorney if you have a paid sick leave policy that allows employees to cash out those benefits during employment.



The purpose of the IS is to provide decision makers, public agencies, and the general public with an objective and informative document that facilitates a basic understanding of the proposed project and understanding of the proposed project and fully discloses the potential environmental effects associated with the proposed project, including direct, indirect, and cumulative environmental effects. Based on the studies performed and information contained in the IS, DSH is proposing to adopt a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND). DSH will use the IS/MND to obtain permits, agreements, and approvals from necessary agencies to and approvals from necessary agencies to nent the project.

Project Location: The MSH campus is State of California property located on approximately 155 acres, in the City of Norwalk, Los Angeles County. The site is north of Imperial Highway, west of Bloomfield Avenue, east of Norwalk Boulevard and south of Lakeland Boulevard. The project site is on a 23-acre portion of the overall MSH 155-acre campus, located south of 6th Street, north of 9th Street, west of Bloomfield Avenue, and east of Balsam Street. street address is 11401 Bloomfield Avenue, Norwalk, California 90650.

Project Description: The proposed project is for the partial modernization of MSH, which includes upgraded security features and improvements to accommodate additional patients. The project includes the demolition and construction of roads and parking areas, demolition and relocation of utilities, replacement of an existing 1,500 square-foot visitor center with a new 3,500 square-foot visitor center and the construction of a new sallyport. The project would install 4,500 around two buildings and the existing park, both internal to the site and not visible from the adjacent public roadways. In addition to the new fencing, other security features include anti-climb mesh and anti-tamper sensor cable/internal alarms for the security fences, pole-mounted security cameras with a closed circuit TV on the new light poles. six security/guard stations, a new restroom building, and other associated utility work. The proposed security and facility upgrades would allow the hospital to increase its patient capacity by approximately 250 patients. However, because MSH's license s for up to 1,106 patients, the analysis in the Draft IS conservatively assumes the project would result in 361 more patients compared

Potentially Significant Environmental Impacts: Potentially significant impacts to biological resources, cultural resources, geotechnical, and traffic resources were entified in the Draft IS. All impacts would be reduced to a less-than-significant level with the incorporation of mitigation measures.

Public Review Period June 28, 2016 through July 28, 2016: In compliance CEQA, DSH has established a 30day public review period beginning June 28, 2016 to solicit comments and input on the Draft IS/MND. M.S. in Journalism. Eric Pierce, the previous editor of the Norwalk Patriot, will remain



NORWALK -- Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) transferred control of Line 270 - a key bus route connecting students to Rio Hondo College – to Norwalk Transit and Foothill Transit on Monday.

Man charged with attempted murder of 10 sheriff's deputies

BELLFLOWER -- A Burbank man was charged Tuesday with the attempted murder of 10 Los Angeles County sheriff's deputies followed by an eight-hour standoff in Bellflower late Thursday night.

Juan Manuel Martinez, 40, was scheduled to be arraigned Tuesday at Bellflower Superior Court. Prosecutors asked that his bail be set at \$11 million.

Martinez is suspected of shooting and wounding a motorcycle deputy who pulled him over during a DUI checkpoint on Lakewood Boulevard. After abandoning his vehicle, Martinez allegedly fired on four other deputies who arrived to assist the downed deputy.

Martinez then allegedly wounded a second deputy as he fled the scene, firing at a second set of deputies before hiding in a small structure for nearly eight hours. He was arrested after a SWAT team fired tear gas into the structure.

Martinez is charged with a total of 13 felony counts, including 10 counts of attempted murder of a peace officer, and one felony count each of false imprisonment of a hostage, dissuading a witness by threat of force and possession of a firearm by a felon. The complaint alleges he discharged a firearm causing great bodily injury to two

If convicted, Martinez faces up to life in state prison.

Paul Tanaka, former LASD undersheriff, gets 5 years in prison for jail beatings



GARDENA - Paul Tanaka, who was the second in command of the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department, was sentenced Monday to 60 months in federal prison for his conviction on obstruction of justice charges stemming from him leading the LASD's efforts to derail a federal investigation into corruption and civil rights violations by sheriff's deputies at two downtown jail complexes.

Tanaka, 57, a resident of Gardena who left the LASD in 2013 when he was the undersheriff, was sentenced by United States District Judge Percy Anderson.

In addition to the five-year prison term, which Tanaka was ordered to begin serving on August 1, Judge Anderson ordered him to pay a \$7,500 fine.

In sentencing Tanaka, Judge Anderson recounted Tanaka's career at the LASD, his role in the scheme to obstruct justice, and "the incalculable harm you have caused this community."

While he was the assistant sheriff in charge of the jails, Tanaka "perpetrated an environment of excessive deputy conduct," according to Judge Anderson, who said Tanaka's actions led directly to an increased number of use-of-force incidents against inmates at the jails. The obstruction of justice scheme was designed "to derail the federal grand jury investigation" and constituted "a gross abuse of the public trust."

A federal jury on April 6 found Tanaka guilty of two felony offenses conspiring to obstruct justice and a substantive count of obstructing justice. After a 10-day trial, a federal jury deliberated for only a few hours before convicting Tanaka of being the head of a broad conspiracy to obstruct the federal investigation, a scheme that started when the LASD learned that an inmate at the Men's Central Jail (MCJ) was an FBI

Tanaka directed a conspiracy that has resulted in the conviction of other former LASD officials who received sentences of up to 41 months in prison.

Tanaka supervised a scheme to obstruct the FBI's investigation into corruption and civil rights violations at the jails," said United States Attorney Eileen M. Decker. "Mr. Tanaka was the ringleader and the driving force behind a plot that concealed an FBI informant, tampered with witnesses and led to the threatened arrest of an FBI agent for doing nothing more than her job. In addition to being a top law enforcement officer who was personally involved in the obstruction of justice, Mr. Tanaka was responsible for a culture that unfortunately led to the widespread abuse of inmates at the jails that he personally oversaw."

Tanaka was the undersheriff the number 2 in the LASD - until 2013, and he ran an unsuccessful campaign for sheriff in 2014. As he rose through ranks during a 31year career with the LASD, Tanaka became well aware of problems with deputies at the jails, allegations of rampant abuse of inmates and insufficient internal investigations into deputy misconduct.

"During his time as an executive, defendant threatened to discipline supervisors who frequently referred deputies to Internal Affairs, transferred captains who tried to reduce deputy abuse and break up cliques, instructed deputies to work in the 'gray area' of law enforcement, and expressed his desire to gut Internal Affairs," prosecutors wrote in a sentencing memorandum filed with the court. Tanaka's "actions caused deputies to believe that they could act with impunity, which, unfortunately, they did much too frequently."

"Mr. Tanaka swore to serve the county of Los Angeles, but disappointed the people through his corrupt actions, as well as many in the department under his command and influence," said Deirdre Fike, Assistant Director in Charge of the FBI's Los Angeles Field Office. "As this investigation comes to a close, the department's law-abiding deputies who serve honorably can put this behind them under new leadership at the L.A. Sheriff's Department."

The scheme to disrupt the federal investigation started in August 2011 when deputies recovered a mobile

phone from an inmate in MCJ, linked the phone to the FBI, and and civil rights investigation. The Anderson on July 11. phone was given to the inmate as part of an undercover investigation by a corrupt deputy, who subsequently pleaded guilty to a federal bribery charge and was recently sentenced to federal prison.

In response to the federal investigation, members of the Tanaka-led conspiracy took steps to hide the cooperator from the FBI and the United States Marshals Service, which was attempting to bring the inmate to testify before a federal grand jury. The evidence presented during Tanaka's trial showed that the deputies altered records to make it appear that the cooperator had been released from jail, when in fact he had been re-booked into custody under a fake name and moved to an LASD patrol station. Members of the conspiracy prohibited FBI access to the informant, and then told the cooperator that he had been abandoned by the FBI.

Over the course of several weeks, members of the conspiracy sought an order from a Los Angeles Superior Court judge to compel the FBI to turn over information about its investigation to the LASD. After the judge refused to issue the order because he had no jurisdiction over the federal law enforcement agency – and even though it was clear that the FBI was acting legally - two LASD sergeants confronted the lead FBI agent at her residence in an attempt to intimidate her. The sergeants threatened the agent with arrest and later reiterated this threat to her supervisor, stating that the agent's arrest was imminent.

Tanaka oversaw co-conspirators who told fellow deputies not to cooperate in the federal investigation. Members of the conspiracy engaged in witness tampering by ordering fellow deputies not to speak to the federal government and telling them that the FBI would lie, threaten, manipulate and blackmail them to obtain information about the Sheriff's Department.

Tanaka was indicted last year along with William Thomas Carey, a former LASD Captain who headed the Internal Criminal Investigations Bureau. Carey pleaded guilty last year and is pending sentencing. A total of 10 members of the department including former Sheriff Leroy Baca have been convicted in relation to
