



**21st International Summit on Violence, Abuse, & Trauma
Summary Report
August 25-31, 2016 - San Diego, CA**



“Our vision is a world free from violence, abuse and trauma.”

The theme of the 21st International Summit on Violence, Abuse, and Trauma was **“Linking Research, Practice, Advocacy and Policy to End Violence and Abuse.”** The Summit was held at the Town & Country Hotel in San Diego August 25 – 31, 2016. The Summit included presentations and symposia by researchers, practitioners, advocates, policymakers, and consumers/survivors concerning family violence, child maltreatment, human trafficking, elder abuse, youth violence, services for people with disabilities, trauma in the military, sexual violence, legal and criminal justice issues, healthcare, multicultural training, services for vulnerable populations and trauma in general. The Summit was hosted by the Institute on Violence, Abuse, and Trauma (IVAT), the Family Violence & Sexual Assault Institute (FVSAI), and the National Partnership to End Interpersonal Violence Across the Lifespan (NPEIV).

Attendees

Over 850 people were involved in one or more Summit activities throughout the week at our Pre-Summit Trainings, Think Tank, Summit, and Post-Summit workshops. Forty-seven people attended the Pre-Summit Trainings August 25-26th, and 195 people attended the Post-Summit workshops on the afternoon of the 26th. In addition, 126 people attended the NPEIV National Think Tank. 354 attendees were from California and 162 people represented the San Diego County area. From across the country, 47 states were represented. We had international representation from 13 additional countries/ US Territories (Australia, Benin, Canada, Guam, Hong Kong, Japan, Norway, Philippines, Qatar, Sweden, Uganda and the United Kingdom) and 57 international attendees. Summit attendees included social workers, psychologists, marriage and family therapists, advocates, attorneys, judges, law enforcement professionals, probation and parole officers, clergy, nurses, physicians, policy makers, administrators, students, former victims/survivors, parents, and others.

Presenters

Approximately 300 submissions were received from all over the world, on a wide range of family violence, child/teen/elder maltreatment, trauma, and sexual violence issues. The **11** tracks offered included presentations on **Adult Survivors of Maltreatment/Trauma, At-Risk Youth, Child Maltreatment/Adverse Childhood Experiences, Intimate Partner Violence Victims/Survivors, Legal & Criminal Justice Issues, Offenders: Intimate Partner Violence, Sex & Labor Trafficking, Sexual Assault /Abuse & Victimization, Trauma in General, Trauma in Military Personnel, Veterans & Their Families, and Vulnerable & Underserved Populations**. Presentations covered best practices, research, treatment, prevention, policies, and program information. There were more than 315 presenters involved in this Summit, including more than 95 invited speakers and approximately 20 international presenters. Highlighted sessions are noted below.

Co-Sponsors and Collaborating Organizations

Collaborators provided publicity through their own websites about our Summit by posting our website links and flyers. Collaborators also received a free space at the take-one table along with a listing on our website including their company or organization description.

This year, special sessions included the **Mid-Summit Plenary Roundtable Discussion: *Promoting Bystander Intervention Across the Lifespan***, with: Joan Tabachnick, MBA, DSM Consulting; Erin Runnion, Joyful Child Foundation; Bonnie Brandl, MSW, National Clearinghouse on Abuse in Later Life, a project of End Domestic Abuse WI: The Wisconsin Coalition Against Domestic Violence; Alan Rosenbaum, PhD, Northern Illinois University, NPEIV Board Member; Sandra Alexander, MEd, Carter Consulting Inc.; Kelly Dauk, MD, University of Kentucky, Department of Pediatrics, University of Louisville, American Academy of Pediatrics, Kentucky Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, Kosair Children's; Renee McDonald, PhD, Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences; Moderators: Robert Geffner, PhD, ABN, ABPP, IVAT, FVSAI, NPEIV President, and Jacquelyn White, PhD, University of North Carolina, NPEIV Founding Co-Chair.

Eleven **keynote panels** provided training and discussion on the following topics: What Do We Mean by Trauma Informed Care?; Junk Science and Abuse Deniers: How Junk Science Becomes Accepted and How to Combat it in Court; Systems and Criminal Justice Issues in Child Fatalities; Controversies and Power and Control Issues for Victims of Intimate Partner Violence; Technology Facilitated Crimes; Trauma Informed Treatment of Intimate Partner Violence Offenders/Ethical Issues in Treating Offenders; Vulnerabilities and Risk Factors for Human Trafficking; Issues of Risk Assessment and Disclosure in Child Sexual Abuse;

Child Sexual Abuse Research/Assessment and/or Treatment Panel; Issues of Risk Assessment and Identification of Adult Victimization; Treatment of Trauma in Military Veterans; and Childhood Aggression to Adult Violence: Issues and Developmental Pathways.

Parallel Plenaries covered the following topics: Traumatic Bereavement, Building Civic Engagement in Interpersonal Violence Prevention; Blending Science and Tradition in Healing Trauma; Intersectionality and Intimate Partner Violence; Immigration, Domestic Violence and Child Abuse; and ABCs of NHZs: Why Organizations Need No Hit Zones, Building Blocks and Longevity Tips Addressing Corporal Punishment.

Summit Opening Plenary and Ceremonies, Sunday, August 28th

The Summit Opening Plenary and Ceremonies featured a Color Guard performance by the Navy Regional Maintenance Center Southwest and welcoming remarks by **Sandi Capuano Morrison, MA**, Institute on Violence, Abuse, and Trauma, and **Viola Vaugh-Eden, PhD**, Norfolk State University School of Social Work. Opening Plenary Speakers were **Joan Tabachnick, MBA, DSM Consulting**, who presented on “*Challenges of Bystander Intervention: A Missed Opportunity for Prevention*”, and **James A. Mercy, PhD, Centers for Disease Control & Prevention**, who presented “*Making Violence Prevention Urgent*,” Casey Gwinn, JD, who presented “*Changing the Ending for Trauma Exposed Children*” and special guest, Jamie Turning Holly from the Oglala Tribe, performed “Bear Stories”. Welcoming Reception and Poster Session, Sunday, August 28th

This year 68 posters were displayed while people networked, asked questions, and discussed the presentations. Appetizers and beverages were available for attendees, as they enjoyed the information and materials presented. Approximately over 400 people attended this Poster session and Welcoming reception. For the 14th consecutive year, IVAT presented the *B.B. Robbie Rossman Annual Memorial Child Maltreatment Research Award*, which was established to honor Dr. Robbie Rossman, a pioneer in research focused on family violence, child maltreatment, and the impact of intimate partner violence on children. Each year, the award recipient receives a scholarship to attend the Summit the following year, and is recognized at the Poster Reception; his/her paper will then be published in one of the journals edited by IVAT. The winner of this year’s *B.B. Robbie Rossman Annual Memorial Child Maltreatment Research Award* was **Molly Ellenberg** for her poster, “*Emotional Abuse as a Predictor of Internalizing and Externalizing in LCPD Youth*.” IVAT also presented the *NPEIV Founders Award*, which was established by the NPEIV Board to acknowledge significant contributions to the prevention of interpersonal violence that exemplify the goals of NPEIV to be integrative in research, practice, policy or advocacy. The winner of the *NPEIV Founders Award* was **Winnie Fong** for her poster “The Relationship between Ethnicity and Dual Diagnosis to Received Outpatient Treatment on a National Level.” The *NPEIV Murray Straus Interpersonal Violence Original Research Award* was given to **Megan Hawker** for her poster “*The Experience of Posttraumatic Growth in Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans*”. This award is presented annually to individuals or organizations making significant contributions of original research conducted on the integration of multiple forms of interpersonal violence, interpersonal violence prevention, or intervention efforts.

Awards Recognition Luncheon, Tuesday, August 30th Multiple awards were given this year at the Awards Luncheon attended by over 200 people. The *Distinguished Service & Excellence in Film Award* was given to **James Redford, MA**, for his films, “Paper Tigers” and “Resilience.” “Paper Tigers”

follows six troubled teens over the course of a year at Lincoln Alternative High School in rural Walla Walla, Washington. It is a testament to what the latest developmental science is proving: that one caring adult can help break the cycle of adversity in a young person's life. "Paper Tigers" has a companion film titled "Resilience: The Biology of Stress and the Science of Hope," which delves into the neuroscience research and includes portraits of other practitioners putting that science into action. Both films call attention to the lingering negative effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences on adult health and the birth of a new movement to treat and prevent toxic stress, which is now understood to be one of the leading causes of everything from heart disease and cancer to substance abuse and depression. The *Linda Saltzman Memorial Intimate Partner Violence Researcher Award* was given to **Dr. Jeffrey Edleson, PhD**, whose career spans almost three decades in which he has continuously made significant contributions to our understanding of intimate partner violence. The *Lifetime Achievement Award in Family Violence Advocacy* went to **Paula Lucas** for her lifetime achievement as an activist and advocate for victims of domestic violence, work which began in the early 2000s after having suffered emotional and physical abuse at the hands of her husband, while living in a foreign country with her three children. The *William Friedrich Memorial Child Sexual Abuse Research, Assessment, and or Treatment Award* was presented to **Nahid Fadul, MD**, for her years of dedicated work in the field of Child Sexual Abuse. The *Donald R. Fridley Memorial Award for Excellence in Training and Mentoring* was presented to **Ruth Gillis, MFT**, who has trained and mentored numerous MFT interns over the course of her career. The *Rosalie S. Wolf Memorial Elder Abuse Prevention Award* was given to **Bonnie Brandl, MSW**, who has exemplified the dedication and commitment to the ideals for which this award was created. She has made it her life's mission to end violence and elder abuse. **Katherine Platoni, PsyD**, received the award honoring a *Returning Veteran's Resiliency in Response to Trauma* for serving her country in the military for more than 32 years as an expert in PTSD and war trauma and her excellence as a clinician, author, and editor in the area of trauma and stress. One additional award was presented on Sunday, August 28th: The *National Partnership to End Interpersonal Violence Across the Lifespan (NPEIV)* Paul Fink Interpersonal Violence Prevention Award to **James Garbarino, PhD**, who has made significant contributions to our understanding of how multiple forms of violence are related and the importation of addressing them through development and implementation of an integrated violence prevention approach. Finally, The *IVAT Community Volunteer of the Year Award* was presented to **Sally Lokey, PsyD, MFT**, who has supported the Summit Planning Committee in just about every category possible! She has helped for several years serving on the planning committee, and is very active in all areas related to both the Hawai'i and San Diego Summits.

The Closing Plenary and Ceremonies, Wednesday, August 31st

The Summit concluded with a number of impressive Closing Plenary speakers. Closing comments were given by **Dr. Ervin Staub, PhD**, who presented "*Bystander Intervention: Prevent Violence, Address Trauma, Foster Altruism Born of Suffering.*" Being the founding Director of the Doctoral program in the Psychology of Peace and Violence for the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, Dr. Staub discussed the evolution of aggression and violence – learning by doing, and perpetrators justifying harmful actions by increasing devaluation of victims – among peers in schools, adults physically or sexually abusing children, and in genocide. Bystanders can provide information that generates positive images of the "other", and foster significant contact. Dr. Staub also mentioned "Training Active Bystanders" which he has developed and used in schools discussing how bystander actions and healing experiences can generate "altruism born of suffering" in survivors. Additionally, members from the nonprofit organization **ImpACT on Stage** gave a special performance. ImpACT on Stage uses live theater to do programming in schools, colleges, workplaces, and community centers about bullying, sexual assault,

and substance abuse issues. Lastly, **Erin Runnion**, founder of The Joyful Child Foundation, presented *“Imagined Communities – Creating a National Movement to Stop Violence.”* Erin concluded the ceremony by sharing her inspiring story about uniting communities to protect children and challenge us all to leverage our important work by sharing our own stories about what we have done and what everyone can do to stop violence in our world.

Pre-Summit Trainings

A total of **47** attendees were present for the **4** Pre-Summit Trainings in the days prior to the 21st International Summit. These trainings were held on Thursday, August 25th and Friday, August 26th and included a two-day *“Tips on Testifying: Direct and Cross Examination.”* Other trainings included *“An Ethically Attuned and Healthy Therapist;”* *“DSM-5 and ICD-10: Trauma and Stress-Related, Paraphilic, and Personality Disorder;”* and *“Specialized Risk Assessment Training: Assessing Sexually Abusive Youth MEGA²: Empirically Guided Inventory of Ecological Aggregates for Assessing Sexually Abusive Children and Adolescents Ages 4-19.”*

Volunteers

This year **64 volunteers** from different community organizations donated their time and energy during the seven days of the Pre-Summit Trainings, the Summit and Training, and the Post-Summit, as well as in the planning prior to the Summit. Volunteers assisted in a variety of roles, including room monitors, registration support, CE Desk assistance, IVAT Bookstore, Summit bag and ID badge assembly, location guides, and many other tasks. Collectively, the volunteers provided the Summit and Training with more than **600 hours** of crucial support. The commitment and contribution of the volunteers were invaluable. As expressed by many of them, this was an enriching opportunity to be part of this unique training and networking event. Many were enthusiastic about returning next year to work for the 22nd International Summit and have expressed interest in joining the Planning Committee.

Continuing Education

168 professionals received continuing education credits for attending Pre-Summit Trainings, Training Summit, or Post-Summit workshops. IVAT is a recognized provider and sponsors continuing education for psychologists, social workers, marriage and family therapists, nurses, substance abuse and other certified counselors, and attorneys. IVAT also provided continuing medical education credits for physicians. The Judicial Council of California approved the Pre-Summit, Summit and Post-Summit for child custody evaluator credits. The San Diego Domestic Violence Council (SDDVC) Treatment and Intervention Committee sponsored continuing education for Domestic Violence Offender Treatment Providers (DVOTP), and the Association of Traumatic Stress Specialists (ATSS) approved the credits towards Trauma Specialist certifications. The California Association of Alcoholism & Drug Abuse Counselors (CAADAC) approved continuing education credits for alcohol and drug counselors. Victim Advocates were able to receive documentation for their continuing education hours for the National Advocate Credentialing Program.

Exhibitors

38 exhibitors were involved with the Summit located in the Town & Country/San Diego Ballroom. Exhibitors included partner organizations such as federal government agencies in the field of family violence, trauma, child maltreatment, and sexual assault, as well as publishers, community based organizations, and vendors selling merchandise. The take-one tables had an abundance of valuable information from various agencies and collaborating organizations. Once again, a combination of both

Silent Witnesses and Silent Companions from Southern Indian Health Council and Rancho Coastal Humane Society were placed throughout the Summit venue to raise awareness of intimate partner violence fatalities and violence against animals. Future art exhibitions showcasing local art therapy projects will be highly encouraged.

Bookstore

The IVAT Bookstore offers books, videos, games, and other educational resources for clinicians, advocates, attorneys, nurses, social service and criminal justice personnel, and others at a reduced rate. The Bookstore offered hundreds of titles, including treatment manuals, videos, games, and books related to family violence, trauma, child maltreatment, elder abuse, youth violence, and sexual assault. **152** books were sold this year.

Evaluations

The Pre-Summit, Summit and Post-Summit evaluations showed an overall high satisfaction, with the overall indicators rating at an average of **4.5** on a **5**-point scale. 92% of attendees would recommend the 21st International Pre-Summit, Summit and Post-Summit to others. Many wonderful comments were received from the summit attendees, including:

National Partnership to End Interpersonal Violence Across the Lifespan (NPEIV)

Think Tank Summary

The mission of the NPEIV is to make the prevention of interpersonal violence a national priority and to encourage healthy relationships by linking science, practice, policy and advocacy. Our vision is to end all types of interpersonal violence, for all people, in all communities, at all stages of life. We hosted the 7th Annual NPEIV Think Tank this year, on August 27th, 2016. We were honored to have the following speakers presenting "*Making Violence Prevention Urgent*" by James A. Mercy, PhD, with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; "*Engaging Bystanders by Changing Organizational Policy & Culture*" by Joan Tabachnik, MPPM, with DSM Consulting; and "*A National Plan to End Interpersonal Violence Across the Lifetime*" by Victor Vieth, JD, with Gundersen National Child Protection Training Center.

We were pleased to have 126 participants join us for this year's Think Tank – our largest attendance yet! During the Think Tank our seven Action Teams, listed below, reviewed accomplishments and discussed this year's upcoming goals.

- *Action Team 1 – Public Awareness* will contribute to increased national public awareness surrounding the issues of interpersonal violence.
- *Action Team 2 – Training and Mentoring* addresses training and mentoring needs in each profession and helps to create educational opportunities and mentoring.
- *Action Team 3 – Practice* focuses on increasing the evidence-based knowledge available regarding best practices and standards for competent services at every level.

- *Action Team 4 – Research* focuses on promoting research on interconnections across types of violence, integrating practice issues into research, and supporting basic and applied research.
- *Action Team 5 – Public Policy* focuses on coordinating education efforts on policy impact, identifying needs and developing points of view directly involved with policy, with respect to reducing and eliminating interpersonal violence and abuse.
- *Action Team 6 – Dissemination/ Translation* focuses on developing strategies and processes for making basic and applied scientific study of interpersonal aggression accessible to all advocates, clinicians, and others who have limited research backgrounds.
- *Action Team 7 – Global Peace* focuses on collaboration with allies internationally engaged in parallel efforts to address violence by focusing on initiatives which provide analysis, education and resources to those working for peace.

The NPEIV recently accomplished finalizing the publication of “*An Awesome Opportunity: The National Plan to End Violence Across the Lifespan*” which summarizes many ideas rooted in research, best practice and common sense which if fully implemented would dramatically advance the goal of ending interpersonal violence.
