Communication: It is our belief that close cooperation between home and school is one of the keys to a child's success in school. Two-way communication helps to provide an effective partnership between teachers and parents, and promote parent input into educational decisions. PFCS provides opportunities to involve parents with our instructional and extracurricular programs:

Communication between teachers and parents regarding student progress and achievement with the opportunity to respond will be accomplished through:

- Opportunities to volunteer and participate in their child's classroom and observe class activities
- Classroom newsletters

The PFCS School-Parent Compact: The PFCS School-Parent Compact outlines how parents, school staff, administration and students will share the responsibility for improved student academic achievement and the means by which the school and parents will build and develop a partnership to help children achieve the Arizona Department of Education's academic standards. Parents of students who have been selected for the PFCS Title I Targeted-Assistance Program will be notified in writing at the beginning of the school year. Students are identified for the program through multiple measures, including:
