SPRING 2019 COACH'S NOTE

The Columbia Sailing team should be extremely proud of themselves. They made incredible strides this year and the momentum is just beginning. We started the semester by upgrading venues for the "Annual" team and alumni fundraising event to the Faculty house. I look forward to pulling in more prestigious speakers from throughout the sailing community in years to come.

Throughout the winter, the team met daily for workouts at Dodge and Monday night meetings to organize the Spring season. We started the season at Stony Brook's Spring Open in a very windy 20+ knots; the season opener did not let down for cold water and true spring college sailing. Columbia finished just below mid fleet with debuting College sailing B division Crew Min Kim (aka Andrew) '23.

The following weekend was held in NJ at Ocean County College, Columbia sailed excellently, ending Saturday in 3rd of 17. Although the scores are not as indicative of the ability of the sailors, a hard Sunday left us tied for 6th. The team reflected on what happened and took the lessons learned into practice.

The weekend of April 13-14 was a tough one, Columbia had two events, the Grant Trophy which was a conference qualifier and the Owen, Mosbacher and Knapp Trophies at Yale. Yale presented a challenge for the new Columbia sailors participating, but we came away with a win over Princeton! The Grant trophy was a huge success as our finish qualified us for the America Trophy! Through gusty conditions and a boom to the head resulted in a tough weekend at the America Trophy, it was a huge

SEASON'S HIGHLIGHTS








This season was jam-packed, with a regatta almost every week, and sometimes even two in one weekend! A few new members also joined this spring, keeping CUST growing.


