MACLAS 2016 call for papers

- Open to faculty, graduate students, undergraduate students, and other scholars
- 250-word proposals for individual papers, full panels, and workshops are due electronically by Dec. 4, 2015, at <u>maclas2016proposal@gmail.com</u>

We are now accepting proposals for the MACLAS annual conference, to be held Mar. 4-5, 2016, at the Fox School of Business at Temple University in Philadelphia. The theme of



the 2016 conference is **Cycles and Encyclicals in Latin America**. The lifting of the US trade embargo on Cuba, the expanding economic relations between Latin America and China, and the Pope's

moral stance against the social injustices engendered by neoliberalism and the "technocratic paradigm" are just a few current topics related to this year's MACLAS theme. Similarly, the historical cycles and tensions in the relations between Latin American countries with respect to migration, politics, as well as literary and artistic trends and movements, are worthy of exploration.

We encourage submissions that address this year's theme, and also welcome paper and panel proposals dealing with all other aspects of Latin America, as well as proposals for workshops that inform faculty and students on practical issues such as study abroad programs in Latin America, academic publishing, the road to tenure, and effective pedagogical techniques.

All submissions are due by Fri., Dec. 4, 2015. Please send your proposal to <u>maclas2016proposal@gmail.com</u> with the following information:

- The title of your individual paper, panel, or workshop (specify which);
- Your name (panel proposals must include the names and paper titles of all presenters; discussants are optional);
- Your institution and position (faculty, graduate or undergraduate student, other); and
- A 250-word abstract in English or Spanish.

Applicants will be informed by Wed. Jan. 6, 2016 whether their proposals have been accepted.

Call for Senior Editor

The Middle Atlantic Council of Latin American Studies (MACLAS) seeks a senior editor for its new on-line journal, which was published as a print journal, *Latin American Essays*, for the past 28 years. The senior editor will serve a three-year term from January 1, 2016 to December 31, 2018. S/he will work with two associate editors, a book review editor, and an outreach coordinator.

The journal will be a multi-disciplinary, peer reviewed serial. It will publish original scholarship related to Latin America in all social sciences and humanities disciplines.

Working with the support of an editorial board, the senior editor will be responsible for journal content. This may include advancing the journal's mission and reputation, soliciting articles, overseeing the peer review process, working with authors, consulting with and managing the editorial board, and collaborating with the journal platform to increase the journal's visibility and readership.

Interested candidates should send a CV and a brief (1-2 paragraph) statement explaining their qualifications and vision to lead this journal in its new form to mmd@udel.edu, no later than December 4, 2015.

MACLAS returns to Temple University

MACLAS is very happy to be returning to Philadelphia, and particularly to Temple University. Temple was the site of the second annual MACLAS conference in 1981 (the first was at the University of Delaware). The conference was held April 3-4 at the Sugarloaf Conference Center, at the time owned by Temple. Today it is the Commonwealth Chateau, Sugar Loaf Campus of Chestnut Hill College.



The MACLAS president at the time, Charles Ameringer, moved the creation of "an award for the outstanding article or book written by a member of MACLAS and published during the calendar year prior to the annual meeting ... to be known as the Arthur P. Whitaker Prize." The motion was approved unanimously. The award carried a \$50 cash prize. The Whitaker Prize was first awarded to Carmelo Mesa-Lago in the following year for his *The Economy of Socialist Cuba*. That was long before MACLAS created the Whitaker Address, to be given by the previous year's winner, but we still got Dr. Mesa-Lago back for a keynote address at our 2011 meeting at the University of Pittsburgh.

Michael Burke of Villanova University and MACLAS Secretary-Treasurer from 1980 to 1983, reported that over seventy people participated in the program at Temple, and 105 individuals attended. He reported the finances were strong. Thirty-five years later, our finances are still strong, and we hope more than seventy people will appear on our 2016 program in Philadelphia. – by Brian Turner

In Memoriam

MACLAS members were sad to learn of the passing of Doug Cameron, Professor of Modern Languages at Ursinus University and participant in many of our conferences over the last few years. Here is an excerpt of the Ursinus memorium of the beloved Spanish professor.



Doug, whose Aug. 8 death was due to complications of cancer, loved bringing Cervantes to life for his students. Other favorite courses included Mexican Cinema and Spanish Golden Age Literature. He taught all levels of Spanish language, and for many years led summer programs that took Ursinus students to Cuernavaca and Puebla, Mexico, for the study of language and culture.

Born in New York City, Doug lived in many countries in his youth. His family left Cuba just ahead of Castro taking power. He graduated cum laude from Harvard University, and earned his Ph.D in Spanish and Comparative Literature from the University of California, San Diego.

He is survived by his wife, Edith Guay, and daughters, Maya Houston of Houston, Texas, and Rima Cameron of Harrisburg. He has five loving grandchildren.

In his long career at Ursinus, Doug influenced the lives of thousands of students, inspiring them with his playful love of life and literature. He will be deeply missed. A celebration of his life, learning, and teaching at Ursinus College is being planned for Saturday, November 7th.

Dominicana de la Historia (Santo Domingo, República Dominicana)

Bridget Chesterton

Bloomsbury Academic Publishing will release two new texts co-edited and edited by Bridget María Chesterton (SUNY Buffalo State).



In November 2015, Transformations of Populism in Europe and Latin America, edited by John Abromeit, Gary Marotta, York Norman, and Bridget María Chesterton (all SUNY Buffalo State) will be

released. Chesterton was editor of the Latin American section and contributed an chapter entitled "Performing Populism in Paraguay: *Febrerismo* on Stage in the works of Correa and Ruffinelli, 1933-43." In February 2016 Chesterton's edited volume The Chaco War: Environment, Ethnicity, and Nationalism will also become available. The

Chaco War volume is the first volume of its kind to explore the Chaco War from the perspective of both combatants, Bolivia and Paraguay, and highlights the war's effects from new historiographical angles. Chapters include



works from Erick D. Langer (Georgetown University) entitled "Indigenous Peoples and the Chaco War: Power and Acquiescence in Bolivia, Paraguay, and Argentina" and Elizabeth Shesko (Oakland University) contribution entitled "'Same as here, Same as Everywhere:' Social Difference among Bolivian Prisoners in Paraguay." Bridget María Chesterton co-authored a chapter with Thilo F. Papacek (Freie Universität, Berlin) "Paraguay *Guazú*: Big Paraguay, Carlos Fiebrig, and the Botanical Garden as a Launching Point for Paraguayan Nationalism."
