

Police eye two double homicides

Police in Eugene and Portland continued their search for clues today in two double homicides reported Saturday.

A Eugene couple, Harley Moon, 74, and his wife, Ester, were found dead in their west Eugene home by a police officer.

He had been asked to check up on the couple by friends who said they had not been able to contact the Moons since Thursday.

The officer found one body in the house and the other in a garage.

Both were killed by chop wounds to the head, Lane County medical authorities said.

The time of death and the weapon used have not been determined.

In Portland, two women were found bludgeoned and stabbed to death Saturday in a north Portland home.

They were Delores Thompson, 27, and Gwendolyn Fulce, 21.

Police said they died from stab wounds to the neck and what appeared to be hammer blows to the head.

Miss Thompson's three-year-old son was found unharmed in the house. He was placed with relatives.

Medical school's lectures will be beamed to Alaska

SEATTLE (AP) — Lectures from the University of Washington Medical School will be launched up, up and away from campus and beamed to students in Fairbanks, Alaska, classrooms through a unique satellite teaching program.

An ATS-F satellite will be used to determine if satellites can help teach students in different locations, said Dr. M. Roy Schwarz, director of the Wash-

The satellite also will be used to contact with WAMI Family Medicine Clinic in Omak, Wash. Actual patient-doctor sessions will be beamed back from the clinic to Seattle for consultation with specialist and instructors, he said.

Medical students at the clinic will be evaluated on the sessions with patients. Special electronic scramblers, however, will keep the audio portion of the signal private, Schwarz said.

Leads Sought in Double Homicides

Police say they still are without leads in the double homicides reported Saturday in Portland and Eugene.

Delores Thompson, 27, and Gwendolyn Fulce, 21, were found dead Saturday

afternoon in Miss Thompson's home.

They died from stab wounds to the neck and apparent hammer blows to the head.

Harley Moon, 74, Eugene, and his wife, Ester, were found dead in their west Eugene home Saturday by a police officer.

He went by the home when police were told the couple hadn't been seen since Thursday.

They died from what Lane

County medical authorities described as "chop wounds" to the head. Police said the time of death and weapon used has not been determined.

The Portland murders were discovered by a man police identified only as a friend of Miss Thompson. He

apparently is the father of her three-year-old son, they added.

The boy, found unharmed in the house, was placed with relatives.

Miss Thompson had a record of narcotics convictions, but police said there is nothing yet to link the killings to illegal drugs.

Miss Fulce had no criminal record. Her mother described her as a regular church-goer who was a student at a Portland beauty college.

She had gone to Miss Thompson's house to spend the night, her mother said.
