About this service...

The word Eucharist comes from the ancient Greek and means *Thanksgiving*. A 'Eucharist' follows a particular pattern of listening and responding to God's word and celebrating Holy Communion.

The entire order of service is contained here including the texts of the bible readings and in the second half of the service, we celebrate Holy Communion. If it is your custom to receive Communion, you are welcome to do so here. Please follow the direction of the Steward.

KEEPING YOU SAFE!

During this period of heightened alert in the fight against the Covid 19 pandemic, we must adhere to the Government guidelines concerning the safe use of places of worship.

- Please wear your mask at all times whilst inside the church building, removing it only briefly, after you have received communion in your hand, to consume it.
- Please maintain social distancing at all times and do not interact, whilst inside the church building, with anyone not in your household or social bubble.
- At the end of the service, the priest will not stand at the door to greet you

 not because we are unfriendly! but because it causes a queue to form
 making social distancing difficult and interaction with others likely!
- The service will be shorter today than it might be during 'normal times' and, at this time, we are not permitted to sing as a congregation. Please, therefore, allow the cantor to sing on our behalf throughout the service.
- At the end of the service, we ask you to remain in your seats until guided out by a steward.

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About the season of Lent...

Lent is the forty days and six Sundays before Easter Day, a time for self-examination and penitence, a time for deeper reflection to discover and remove the self-made barriers that keep us from God. It is a time to concentrate on fundamental values and priorities, and not a time for self-punishment.

Many people choose to mark the season of Lent by giving up some things and taking on others. Both serve to mark the season as a time of preparation. This is also why people try to engage more intentionally in study and learning about faith. For those who can, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, and Fridays throughout Lent, may be appropriate days of fasting (eating and drinking more sparingly rather than not at all).

Throughout Lent, the liturgy takes on a simpler tone. The *Kyrie eleison* (Lord have mercy) is sung instead of the Gloria. The word *Alleluia* is not used in the words of the liturgy or hymns and there are no flowers displayed throughout the season in church. The colour of the vestments and hangings is purple, to reflect the spirit of penitence and renewal (except for Mothering Sunday (Lent 4) or *Laetare* Sunday when the colour is rose, to reflect a moment of refreshment in the desert journey).

At Easter, there is a joyful contrast when the Gloria is used and Alleluias abound. There is an explosion of colour in flowers and the purple is replaced with white and gold to symbolize great celebration and joy. If we keep a holy Lent, it makes the celebration of Easter all the more joyful.

INTRODUCTION TO CONFESSION



OLD TESTAMENT READING

Jeremiah 31.31-34

A reading from the book of the prophet Jeremiah.

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD.

But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD:

I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people.

No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the LORD', for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

THE GOSPEL John 12.20-33

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him,

'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.'



Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified.

Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit.

Drink this, all of you;

this is my blood of the new covenant,

which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Jesus Christ is Lord:

Lord, by your cross and resurrection you have set us free; you are the Saviour of the world.

Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with the Blessed Virgin Mary,

Mary Magdalene, Martin and all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.

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
INVITATION TO COMMUNION
