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## Biographical / Historical Note

Charles H. Buck was born in Lexington, Kentucky, in 1846. He served as a private in the Confederate States Army during the American Civil War under the command of his brother, Samuel H. Buck. (Samuel was born in Versailles, Kentucky, in 1841.) After the war, C. H. moved to New Orleans to study law and quickly became involved in the cotton business. He also worked for the postal service under his brother's orders. C. H. was involved in the battle for Liberty Place as a member of the White League during Reconstruction after the Civil War and died in August 1934.
